Committee discussed:

- Appreciation for the staff's work in progressing Council's priorities.
- A neighbourhood led approach to transportation planning.
- Concerns of deferring the proposed split-rail fence for Dallas Road as there are significant safety concerns in this area.
- A desire for further emphasis and research on upgrading and maintaining the City's tennis courts.
- The desire for the amount of *Freedom of Information Requests* to decline as the City's goal is to be transparent.
- Lack of seating at the newly upgraded Clawthorpe Park and the possibilities of including benches and picnic tables.
- Balancing all the changes on Higgins Street.
- Working with the province towards potential amalgamation.
- Engaging the community in strategic plan objectives.
- Concerns that significant or incremental changes could be made through the proposed delegation process such as the five light standard for the lower causeway.
- Other impacts of payment in lieu such as government house and the legislature.
- Timeframes for various projects.
- A potential workshop to inform Council of emergency management procedures.
- Various initiatives brought forward from staff.
- Concerns that trees are being removed without being replaced.
- Reviewing properties gained through the annual tax sale to determine if there is a potential to use these for affordable housing or nonprofit societies.
- Budgeting for a generic playpark in Topaz Park and then engaging the community to determine the playpark they would like to see.

- Police approach to the medical marijuana dispensaries.

- 2. Requests that the Mayor write to the Premier of British Columbia, the Minister

Responsible for Housing and the Minister of Advanced Education, (1) requesting cooperation with the Federal and Municipal governments in the establishment of National Registries of public buildings and public maritime vessels containing asbestos and building products containing asbestos; (2) proposing more rigorous training in asbestos safety, mitigation and removal within the provincial trades training, apprenticeship and accreditation system; and (3) recommending improvements to the BC Building Code to increase protections for workers from the health and safety risks of asbestos.

4.1 Motion – Increasing Opportunities for Pedicab Entrepreneurs in Victoria

Committee received a motion dated November 5th, 2015, from Councillors Alto and Loveday regarding recommendations for pedicab licences.

Action:

- It was moved by Councillor Alto, seconded by Councillor Loveday, that Committee recommends that Council approve the following motion:
- 1. That staff be directed report back within 2 GPC meetings on the resource implications of bringing forward for Council consideration an amendment to the Vehicles for Hire Bylaw that would
 - (a) increase the total number of pedicab licences from 28 to 35, and
 - (b) introduce selection criteria to ensure that license-holders have sufficient experience and expertise to ensure a safe and reliable service, and
 (c) cap the number of licenses held by any one operator.
- 2. Once staff return to Council with draft bylaw amendments, that Council consider those amendments, and if approved, that Council

- (a) Introduce and give second reading to the proposed amendments to the Vehicles for Hire Bylaw, and
- (b) direct staff to mail a notice to all pedicab businesses in the city to advise of Council's intention to adopt this bylaw and the opportunity to make representation to Council via written (and/or oral) submissions prior to adoption of the bylaw.

- Ensuring licensing is fair.
- Having a bi-annual review to ensure the amount of licenses is in keeping with the market demand.

4.2 Motion - Stewarding Water Systems Responsibly through Eliminating the Use of Single-Use Plastic Bags

Committee received a motion dated October 30th, 2015, from Councillors Isitt and Loveday regarding recommendations on eliminating the use of single-use plastic bags.

<u>Action</u>: It was moved by Councillor Isitt, seconded by Councillor Loveday, that Committee recommends the following motion:

THAT Council refer the following resolution to staff to report back within two GPC meetings at the most on the implications of adding the proposed action to the strategic plan and operational plan as action items:

(1) THAT Council direct staff to prepare a bylaw for first reading modelled on the attached draft bylaw, stewarding water systems responsibly through the elimination of single-use plastic bags in the City of Victoria;

(2) AND THAT Council invite public comment on the proposed bylaw following first reading;

(3) AND THAT Council requests that the Mayor write to the Mayors and Councils of the thirteen municipalities within the Capital Region, and to Directors representing the three electoral areas, proposing elimination of single-use plastic bags and the introduction of bylaws by these local government jurisdictions to extend the responsible stewardship of water systems throughout the Capital Region;

AND THAT Council consider directing staff to prepare a bylaw for First Reading upon receipt of the preliminary staff report on resource implications.

Committee discussed:

- The various views from the public on this proposed initiative.
- Looking into the research done by other municipalities that have banned plastic bags.

- The resistance to change when it comes to changes in consumer habits.
- Potential of rescinding first reading of the bylaw if public consultation shows a lack of support for the initiative.
- The 4,000 signatures that have been added to the petition for eliminating plastic bags since the agenda was published.
- Introducing nylon bags at a low cost to ease the implication.
- The environmental effects of plastic bags.

Councillor Lucas recused herself from the meeting at 11:20 a.m. due to a pecuniary conflict of interest as she runs a retail store that supplies plastic bags to its clients.

Committee discussed:

- Several retailers that have stopped using single-use plastic bags on their own initiative.
- Reducing the amount of plastic bags in landfills and bodies of water.
- An opportunity to innovate and lead as Victoria would be the first capital city to ban plastic bags.
- The large amount of public support for the initiative.
- Ensuring there is adequate public consultation and having staff advise on whether consultation should take place before or after first reading of the bylaw.
- Various other plastic bags such as produce and leaf pick up bags and how the initiative would affect these types of bags.
- Discussing potential alternatives when engaging the public such as biodegradable bags or deposit systems.
- Preference to introduce a phased approach so that retailers are not wasting their unused plastic bags.
- Providing alternative solutions to resident who use plastic bags to pick up their pets excrement.
- Prioritizing the initiative and ensuring it is not punitive.
- Looking into the affects this initiative has had on other cities.
- Community values and how eliminating plastic bags would be good for the community's environment.
- The positive affect this initiative would have on future generations.
- Various implications that need to be reviewed before a final decision is made.

Jas Paul, Assistant Director of Engineering and Brianne Czypyha, Stormwater Management Specialist provided Committee with a detailed presentation.

Committee discussed:

- Ensuring the work is completed through a simple process.
- The charges for removing contaminates from the street.
- Looking at how to charge the people who impose the costs.

Action:

- n: It was moved by Councillor Alto seconded by Councillor Lucas, that Committee recommends that Council:
 - 1. Direct staff to bring forward amendments to the *Sanitary Sewer and Stormwater Utilities Bylaw* to regulate all businesses who operate under Schedule 'E' in the Stormwater Codes of Practice pollution prevention program for protection of the environment.
 - 2. Direct staff to bring forward an updated *Sanitary Sewer and Stormwater Utilities Bylaw* Stormwater Fee to charge "Low Density Residential" properties the 'Local' frontage rate for all frontage lengths, and an update to the Street/Sidewalk Cleaning Factor rate for 'Local' frontages.

- 5. Direct staff to bring forward minor housekeeping updates to the *Sanitary Sewer and Stormwater Utilities Bylaw* as outlined in this report.

5.1 Motion – Regulating Cannabis in Victoria

Committee received a motion dated November 5th, 2015, from Councillors Alto and Coleman regarding regulating cannabis in Victoria.

Action: It was moved by Councillor Alto, seconded by Councillor Coleman, that Committee recommends that Victoria City Council write to the new Prime Minister asking for clarification on whether and when the new federal government intends to implement the legalization and regulation of cannabis in Canada, and proposing that the federal/provincial/territorial task force described in federal Liberal policy include a representative of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, to reflect the concerns and interests of municipalities.

Further, that Victoria City Council postpone consideration of any local regulatory regime until a response to that letter to the Prime Minister is received, or at February 19, 2016, whichever comes first.

Committee discussed:

- The Federal Government's platform on medical marijuana.
- Implementing regulations and the practical time to do so.
- Support from the Police Chief for a regulatory regime.
- Ensuring a conservative approach to regulation if going ahead before Federal Government guidance or waiting for the Federal Government's legislation to be implemented.
- The large amount of dispensaries in the City and concern that holding off on regulating could amount in another surge of dispensaries.
- The various issues with the unregulated dispensaries such as distances from schools, playgrounds and other dispensaries.
- The timeframe for public engagement.
- Concerns of the recent robberies that have taken place at the dispensaries.
- The potential issue of grandfathering and possibility of implementing a moratorium.
- Receiving the staff report before implementing a regime.
- Councillor Alto discussed a potential amendment to the motion for the City to not authorize the opening of any new cannabis dispensaries before February 19, 2015.
- That the City has not authorized any openings of the dispensaries in the past and the potential amendment may not restrict them from opening.
- Council's choice to regulate not enforce the dispensaries.
- Vancouver's approach to regulating the dispensaries.
- Mayor Helps suggested voting on the motions separately as follows:

Action: It was moved by Councillor Alto, seconded by Councillor Coleman, that Committee recommends that Victoria City Council write to the new Prime Minister asking for clarification on whether and when the new federal government intends to implement the legalization and regulation of cannabis in Canada, and proposing that the federal/provincial/territorial task force described in federal Liberal policy include a representative of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, to reflect the concerns and interests of municipalities.

5.2 Motion – Consistency of Parks Regulation Bylaw and Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms

Committee received a motion dated October 30th, 2015, from Councillors Isitt and Loveday regarding the *Parks Regulations Bylaw*.

Action: It was moved by Councillor Isitt, seconded by Councillor Loveday, that Committee recommends, THAT Council direct staff to review City of Victoria *Parks Regulation Bylaw* 07-059 in light of the recent BC Supreme Court decision in *Abbotsford (City) v. Shantz*, 2015 BCSC 1909, and recommend any amendments deemed advisable to ensure the City bylaw is constitutional and does not unreasonably infringe on the rights of people who are homeless.

- An individual's right to shelter.
- Extending the permitted sheltering hours in the parks to 7pm-9am.
- Having the City Solicitor ensure the bylaw is sound.
- Concerns of extending the permitted hours as the current hours are not adhered to.
- The preference that some of the homeless people have for sheltering in the parks as opposed to shelters.
- Other municipalities that do not allow sheltering in the parks.
- Impacts of poverty and ability to obtain shelter.
- Prohibiting camping in the parks if adequate shelter space is available.

Gift Presentation
