Subject: Rezoning Application No. 00660 and Official Community Plan Amendment for 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street

RECOMMENDATION

- That Council instruct staff to prepare the necessary Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw in accordance with Section 475 of the Local Government Act, the necessary Zoning Regulation Bylaw Amendment that would authorize the proposed development outlined in Rezoning Application No. 00660 for 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street, that first and second reading of the Bylaw Amendments be considered by Council and a Public Hearing date be set once the following conditions are met:
 - 1. Preparation of the following documents, executed by the applicant, to the satisfaction of City Staff:
 - Housing Agreement and Bylaw to ensure that a future strata corporation could not pass bylaws that would prohibit or restrict the rental of units to non-owners;
 - ii. Housing Agreement and Bylaw to secure 130 dwelling units as affordable housing
 - iii. Legal agreement to secure a plaza and front setback for a public access at all times of the day, in perpetuity with maintenance and liability under the owner's responsibility.
 - iv. Preparation of a phasing plan.
 - 2. That Council determine, pursuant to section 475(1) of the Local Government Act, that the affected persons, organizations and authorities are those property owners and occupiers within a 200m radius of the subject properties; that the appropriate consultation measures would include a mailed notice of the proposed OCP Amendment to the affected persons; posting of a notice on the City's website inviting affected persons, organizations and authorities to ask questions of staff and provide written or verbal comments to Council for their consideration.
 - 3. That Council, having provided the opportunity for consultation pursuant to section 475(1) of the Local Government Act with persons, organizations and authorities it considers will be affected, specifically, the property owners and occupiers within a 200m radius of the subject properties having been consulted at a Community Association Land Use Committee (CALUC) Community Meeting, consider whether the opportunity for consultation should be early and ongoing, and determine that no further consultation is required.

- 4. That Council specifically consider whether consultation is required under section 475(2)(b) of the *Local Government Act* and determine that no referrals are necessary with the Capital Regional District Board; Councils of Oak Bay, Esquimalt and Saanich; the Songhees and Esquimalt First Nations; the School District Board; and the provincial and federal governments and their agencies due to the nature of the proposed amendment.
- 5. That Council give first reading to the Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw.
- 6. That Council consider the Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw in conjunction with the City of Victoria Five-Year Financial Plan, the Capital Regional District Liquid Waste Management Plan and the Capital Regional District Solid Waste Management Plan, pursuant to section 477(3)(a) of the Local Government Act, and deem those Plans to be consistent with the proposed Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw.
- 7. That Council give second reading to the Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw.
- 8. That Council refer the Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw for consideration at a Public Hearing.

LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY

In accordance with section 479 of the *Local Government Act*, Council may regulate within a zone the use of land, buildings and other structures; the density of the use of the land, building and other structures; the siting, size and dimensions of buildings and other structures; as well as, the uses that are permitted on the land, and the location of uses on the land and within buildings and other structures.

In accordance with section 482 of the *Local Government Act*, a zoning bylaw may establish different density regulations for a zone, one generally applicable for the zone and the others to apply if certain conditions are met.

In accordance with section 483 of the *Local Government Act*, Council may enter into a Housing Agreement which may include terms agreed to by the owner regarding the occupancy of the housing units and provided such agreement does not vary the use of the density of the land from that permitted under the zoning bylaw.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to present Council with information, analysis and recommendations for a Rezoning and Official Community Plan Amendment application for the properties located at 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street. The proposal is to rezone from the R-48 Zone, Harris Green District, and the S-1 Zone, Limited Service District, to a site-specific zone. The proposal is to increase the density and allow institutional and multi-unit uses at this location to allow for the construction a twelve-storey, mixed-use firehall building with affordable dwelling units and three mixed-use buildings of fourteen, fifteen and seventeen storeys. A concurrent Development Permit Application (DP No. 000536) for the first phase of the project accompanies this application. Three additional phases of development are envisioned which will require Development Permit Applications; although not proceeding immediately, the applicant has provided conceptual plans suitable for an evaluation of density and massing and the creation of a new zone for the entire site.

A third-party economic analysis of the lift in land value resulting from the proposed increase in density has been undertaken. As detailed in the report (attached), the economic analysis determined that there is no lift from the proposed rezoning due to a significant drop in supported land value with the inclusion of affordable housing.

The following points were considered in assessing this application:

- The application is consistent with the criteria set out in the Official Community Plan, 2012 (OCP) for consideration of an OCP amendment.
- The application is consistent with the OCP policies targeted toward community safety, disaster resiliency, emergency management, place-making and the provision of affordable housing.
- The proposed uses, including institutional and multi-unit residential, are consistent with the OCP.
- The OCP Urban Place Designation is Core Residential, which sets maximum densities at 5.5:1 floor space ratio (FSR). The proposal for 6.8 FSR is not consistent with this maximum density; however, it is consistent with the criteria established to consider an amendment to this maximum density.
- The application is consistent with the OCP policies that encourage the logical assembly of parcels to enable the best realization of permitted development potential, including the distribution of density comprehensively.
- The application is consistent with the *Downtown Core Area Plan* in terms of the general massing, form and character of the proposal.
- The proposed streetscape and public realm design are consistent with the urban design guidelines set out in the *Downtown Core Area Plan*.

BACKGROUND

Description of Proposal

This Rezoning Application is to remove the subject properties from the R-48 Zone, Harris Green District, and the S-1 Zone, Limited Service District, to create a site-specific zone to increase the density and allow institutional and multi-unit uses at this location.

The following changes from the current zones are being proposed and would be accommodated in the new zone:

- increase the density in the S-1 Zone from 1.5 FSR to 6.8 FSR
- increase the height from 30m in the R-48 Zone to 50.0m
- increase the height from 15m in the S-1 Zone to 44.0m
- increase the number of storeys from 9 and 10 in the R-48 Zone to 12 and 17 respectively. The existing R-48 Zone permits nine storeys when the ground floor is not commercial and ten storeys when the ground floor is commercial.

In addition to the above changes, several additional uses are also being proposed. The table below outlines the changes from the existing zone with an "X" indicating that the use is not presently permitted in a zone, and a " \checkmark " indicating that the use is currently permitted in the zone and/or the OCP supports it:

The request to amend the *Official Community Plan*, 2012 (OCP) is considered in order to increase the density beyond what the OCP envisions for these lands, and in order to spread the density garnered from the lands in the R-48 Zone over the entire area.

Affordable Housing Impacts

Within the first phase of the development, the applicant proposes the creation of 130 new residential units, which would be secured with a legal agreement as affordable housing. BC Housing has indicated their support of the application and has identified Pacifica Housing as the intended operator (see attached letter dated January 9, 2019). Additionally, Pacifica Housing has provided a letter (dated January 24, 2019) which indicates that they will be seeking a tenyear tax exemption on the portion of the project devoted to affordable housing and a contribution from the Victoria Housing Reserve Fund (VHRF). It is Staff's understanding that the project has received Preliminary Project Approval (PPA) from the Province, subject to a number of conditions. The conditions include a requirement for the Housing operator to request the tax exemption and contribution from the Victoria Housing Reserve Fund.

Under the Community Charter, Section 224, Council may choose to grant a property tax exemption to non-profit organizations. A separate application for a tax exemption will be provided by the Housing operator for Council's consideration at a future date. The VHRF contribution request will also be made at a future date, via a separate application. Beginning in 2019, two intake dates (March 31 and September 30) will allow all HRF applications to be evaluated concurrently.

The applicant has stated that they will follow the BC Housing standards for affordability, wherein, rental units would be split as follows:

- 30% for affordable rental (\$1,211 max rent in 2018 Low to Moderate Income)
- 50% with rents geared to income (\$725 max rent in 2018 Low Income), and
- 20% of units with a deep subsidy (\$455 max rent in 2018 Very Low Income).

The proposed unit types include:

- twenty-four studio units
- fifty-six one-bedroom units
- forty-three two-bedroom units
- seven three-bedroom units.

Over the subsequent three phases of development, potentially 320-400 market, strata-titled dwelling units could be created, which would increase the overall supply of housing in the area. The proposed 130 affordable housing units represents approximately 25% to 35% of the total proposed units the site could accommodate in all four phases. A Housing Agreement is proposed to ensure that future Strata Bylaws could not prohibit the rental of units anywhere on the site.

Tenant Assistance Policy

The proposal does not include the renovation, demolition or redevelopment of the existing residential rental units, and as such, the Tenant Assistance Policy would not apply.

Sustainability Features

As stated in the applicant's letter dated January 3, 2019, the applicant has identified the objectives achieved by incorporating a civic function (post-disaster building and firehall) with low-income housing as a social sustainability feature.

Active Transportation Impacts

The applicant has not identified any active transportation impacts associated with this application.

Public Realm Improvements

The following public realm improvements are proposed in association with this Rezoning Application:

- a publicly accessible plaza area of 250m²
- an average front setback on the ground-floor of 2.5m.

These public realm improvements would be secured with a legal agreement and registered on the property's title prior to Council giving final consideration of the proposed Zoning Regulation Bylaw Amendment. Through the legal agreement, public access will be secured for all times of the day in perpetuity. Additionally, maintenance and liability would fall to the land owner. The zoning regulation bylaw would stipulate dimensions, standards and areas for the proposed public realm improvements as noted above.

Accessibility Impact Statement

The British Columbia Building Code regulates accessibility as it pertains to buildings.

Land Use Context

Surface parking lots and low scale development associated with automotive sales activities characterize the area. Additionally, both recently developed and older multi-unit buildings, ranging from five to seventeen storeys, are prevalent as well as low scale commercial buildings, east of Cook Street.

Existing Site Development and Development Potential

The site is presently compromised of four lots which function as a car sales lot with surface parking, a single-storey sales office, an automotive garage and pay parking lots.

Under the current R-48 Zone, the property could be developed with a multi-unit, mixed-use building up to ten storeys and with a theoretical density of approximately 9.8:1 FSR. When design guidelines are incorporated, including setbacks and building separation distances, the density that could be achieved on the R-48 lands would be reduced to 6.96:1 FSR. Under the current S-1 Zone, the property could be developed as a variety of commercial uses (bank, office, bakery, etc.) or other light industrial oriented uses (vehicle impound lot, milk processing and distribution station, tire vulcanizing, etc.) up to five storeys in height and at a density of 1.5 FSR.

Data Table

The following data table compares the proposal with the existing R-48 Zone, Harris Green District, the S-1 Zone, Limited Service District, as well as, the *Official Community Plan* (2012) and *Downtown Core Area Plan* policies. An asterisk is used to identify where the proposal is less stringent than the existing zone(s).

Relevant History

As additional background to this Rezoning Application, the City and the applicant have entered into an Agreement of Purchase and Sale, dated March 15, 2018 pursuant to which the City, as

purchaser, has agreed to purchase from the applicant, as vendor, a two storey firehall within a building to be constructed by the applicant on the subject property. The Agreement of Purchase and Sale includes several pre-conditions to the vendor's obligations to construct and sell the firehall to the City. These include that the zoning bylaw and the OCP be amended as contemplated by the Application and that the vendor be satisfied with any requirements and conditions imposed by the City. Importantly, the Agreement expressly provides that it does not "affect or limit the discretion, rights, duties or powers of the City" and does not create "any implied obligations concerning such discretion, rights, duties or powers". Also, under the Agreement, the vendor has expressly acknowledged and agreed that the adoption of any bylaw or passage of any resolution in connection with any of the conditions under the Agreement "shall be within the absolute and unfettered discretion of Council and the provisions of this Agreement will not in any way obligate the Council to adopt such bylaws or pass such resolutions".

Community Consultation

Consistent with the *Community Association Land Use Committee (CALUC) Procedures for Processing Rezoning and Variance Applications*, the applicant has consulted the Downtown Residents Association CALUC at a Community Meeting held on *July 31, 2018.* A letter dated November 22, 2018 is attached to this report.

Advisory Design Panel

The Advisory Design Panel (ADP) considered this application at their November 28, 2018 meeting (minutes attached) and recommended in their motion that the application be approved as presented.

ANALYSIS

This analysis focuses on the land use and density, which are the main issues for Council's consideration for the *Official Community Plan* and *Zoning Regulation Bylaw* amendments. The following City polices were applicable for the analysis: *Official Community Plan* (2012), *Downtown Core Area Plan* (2011), and the *City of Victoria Density Bonus Policy* (2016).

The Development Permit Application report provides a more in-depth analysis from an urban design perspective for the first phase of the proposal, which further considers building height and massing; as well as, public space, views, and the overall contextual fit, relative to the applicable policies and design guidelines.

Official Community Plan Amendment: Consistency

The proposed amendment to the *Official Community Plan* (OCP) is to amend the Urban Place Designation from Core Residential to include a Core Residential category with a higher density. Currently, the Core Residential designation in the OCP contemplates buildings up to seventeen storeys with floor space ratios ranging from 3:1 up to 5.5:1 and uses including institutional and multi-dwelling residential; as well as, commercial and visitor accommodation. The proposed density is 6.8:1 FSR and is not consistent with this policy in the OCP. On balance, the proposal is consistent with the broad objectives in the OCP and advances a number of strategic goals, however, the OCP amendment is recommended in line with a thoughtful and considered approach with regard to this specific inconsistency. The proposed change to the OCP designation would only affect the contemplated densities and would not affect, or introduce, new uses not contemplated in the OCP.

Specific policies in the OCP address how, and by what rationale, plan amendments should be considered by Council. Under specific conditions, the OCP is intended to be flexible and adaptable while still ensuring broadly consistent direction for growth and change in the City over the next thirty years. Decisions regarding OCP amendments must consider the goals and objectives that support an amendment, the overall rationale for an amendment, and receipt of enough development approval information.

Specifically, the OCP speaks to considering site-specific amendments that are consistent with the urban place designations and which further the broad objectives and policies in the plan, as appropriate to the site context. The advancement of the proposed placemaking and complete-community objectives, the inclusion of a firehall, the proposed affordable housing, and the context of the existing Zone with its inherent permitted densities, all provide support to consider a plan amendment.

The OCP further encourages that regulatory tools are used strategically to support and implement plan goals and objectives. Again, the inclusion of a firehall and a large proportion of affordable housing, advance a variety of goals and objectives within the OCP. Advancing objectives aimed at improving disaster resiliency are particularly unique to this proposal.

Amendments to the OCP, through Council's discretion, may also be undertaken in response to new opportunities. A firehall, constructed to post-disaster specifications, may be considered a new opportunity.

The general pattern of land use and densities are defined for each urban place designation in the OCP; however, policies in the OCP also recommend site-specific evaluations of proposed developments in relation to the site, block and local area context. This includes a consideration of the underlying zoning and permitted densities. Under the existing zone, a theoretical density of approximately 9.8:1 FSR could be achieved for the land in the R-48 Zone, Harris Green District. When design guidelines are incorporated, including setbacks and building separation distances, the density that could be achieved in R-48 zone is reduced to 6.82:1 FSR. The proposal is for a density of 6.8:1 FSR.

Official Community Plan: Process

Section 475 of the *Local Government Act* (LGA) requires a Council to provide one or more opportunities it considers appropriate for consultation with persons, organizations and authorities it considers will be affected by an amendment to the OCP. Consistent with section 475 of the LGA, Council must further consider whether consultation should be early and ongoing. This statutory obligation is in addition to Public Hearing requirements. In this instance, staff recommend for Council's consideration that notifying owners and occupiers of land located within 200 metres of the subject site, along with positing a notice on the City's website, will provide adequate opportunities for consultation with those affected.

An OCP Amendment application to change the Urban Place Designation of the subject lands from Core Residential to Core Residential with a higher density is contemplated. Given that, through the Community Association Land Use Committee (CALUC) Community Meeting process all owners and occupiers within a 200m radius of the site were notified and invited to participate in a Community Meeting, the consultation proposed at this stage in the process is recommended as adequate, and consultation with specific authorities, under Section 475 of the LGA, is not recommended as necessary.

Should Council decide to proceed with the OCP Amendment, and if it is supported, Council is required to consider consultation with the Capital Regional District Board; Councils of Oak Bay,

Esquimalt and Saanich; the Songhees and Esquimalt First Nations; the School District Board, and the provincial government and its agencies; however, further consultation is not recommended as necessary for this amendment to the Urban Place Designation as this matter can be considered under policies in the OCP.

Council is also required to consider OCP Amendments in relation to the City's *Financial Plan*, the *Capital Regional District Liquid Waste Management Plan* and the *Capital District Solid Waste Management Plan*. This proposal will have no impact on any of these plans.

Rezoning

Official Community Plan

The proposal is within the Core Residential Urban Place Designation and Development Permit Area 3 (HC), Core Residential. The objectives of this designation are to transform the function, form and character of the area through mid-to-high-rise residential, mixed-use and commercial buildings. The proposal is consistent with the objectives of this designation and the OCP policies targeted toward community safety, disaster resiliency, emergency management, placemaking, and policies encouraging the provision of affordable housing. The suite of land uses proposed, including institutional, are also envisioned for this area in the OCP; however, the proposal is not consistent with the densities outlined for this designation. Densities outlined in the OCP range from 3:1 to 5.5:1 floor space ratio (FSR); the proposal is for a density of 6.8:1 (FSR).

The uses proposed are consistent with those considered in the OCP. Included for consideration is the proposed institutional use to accommodate a firehall. In response to community feedback, the applicant has offered to limit the extent of institutional use to correspond to the area dedicated to the firehall, and for those uses associated with a firehall and ambulance building only. The limitations on this use will be written into the site-specific zone.

The OCP does not provide specific policies regarding the shifting of density among neighbouring properties. The policy encourages site-specific evaluations of proposed developments to guide decisions regarding the density and scale of buildings for an individual site. Historically, similar comprehensively designed proposals in Victoria with multiple parcels, have moved density among parcels. In the case of this proposal, adherence to the *Downtown Core Area Plan* as demonstrated from the plans provided by the applicant, has provided the necessary level of confidence to evaluate a range of massing alternatives that would accommodate the density allocation, while still meeting the design guidelines.

Downtown Core Area Plan (DCAP)

This section provides an analysis against the DCAP for the entirety of the site. Only Phase 1 of the proposal (firehall and affordable housing building) is associated with a concurrent Development Permit application, which is reviewed in a separate report (DP No. 000536); however, as per the criteria outlined in the OCP, development approval information is a prerequisite to consider an OCP amendment. To this end, the applicant has submitted plans that provide enough information to assess the general massing, density, streetscape, views and context, all of which are analyzed against the DCAP as described further in this report.

The proposal is within the Residential Mixed-Use District (RMD) in the DCAP. The objectives for this district broadly encourage developing complete communities, ensuring an active street level, increasing pedestrian activity within the public realm, and accommodating mid-to-high-rise

densities. Support for existing commercial uses is encouraged but does not include vehicleoriented uses that require large outside storage/display areas, such as car lots.

Overall, the proposal is generally consistent with the *Downtown Core Area Plan*. Specifically, the proposal is consistent with several of the guidelines used to evaluate massing, height and scale; this includes ensuring that all portions of the proposed buildings and building massing are within a 1:5 step-back ratio above 20m on Yates Street and above 15m on Johnson Street. The massing renderings and elevations provided confirm that these criteria can be met within the heights specified in the OCP and at the densities proposed.

The proposed tower massing also meets or exceeds the minimum building tower separation distances specified in the DCAP. Proposed building separation distances are in excess of twenty metres in some locations where the guidelines set the minimum at twelve metres.

All proposed building heights are consistent with the design guidelines and those outlined in the OCP and range from twelve storeys to seventeen storeys. The building heights specified for this area in the DCAP range from fifteen storeys to seventeen storeys.

At staff's request, the applicant has provided additional massing renderings to demonstrate the variety of ways in which the density could be distributed. The intent of these additional models was threefold: to demonstrate alternative ways in which the density might be realized with future development permit applications; to illustrate that approval of the rezoning does not limit future development to specific building schemes; and to demonstrate that the benefits of a comprehensively designed site can translate to a variety of massing approaches in the absence of accompanying development permit applications. These benefits include improved building separation distances, greater street set-back distances, building massing in-line with step-back ratios, and a more consistent and thoughtful distribution of density.

While the application is consistent with the policies and guidelines for building massing, height and scale, through the review process, staff explored reducing the overall density of the project with the Applicant. A reduction in the overall density being proposed may provide a simpler distribution of density across the site, reduced potential for cantilevered building mass over open space areas and improved transition to the lower scaled neighbourhood to the east. However, as discussed in the bonus density section, the results of the land lift analysis identify that the densities proposed are at the economic threshold required for the amount of affordable housing proposed.

Streetscape

There are large and small-scale streetscape considerations provided in the DCAP. At the rezoning level, only the larger-scale guidelines are analyzed, given the commensurate level of detail provided with a rezoning application. A more detailed analysis of the streetscape is provided in the concurrent Development Permit Application. Development Permit applications with subsequent phases require a more detailed analysis of the streetscape, as well as, other form and character considerations. Specific guidelines address step-back and massing of buildings from the sidewalk, encourage varying the heights of buildings to avoid uniformity, and encourage the use of building forms to distinguish building podiums from upper storeys. The proposal includes stepped-back building massing, clear podium and tower building forms, and a variety of building heights (twelve, fourteen, fifteen and seventeen storeys), which is consistent with the applicable policies.

The proposed additional front setbacks also achieve the intention of the policy direction as it encourages generous sidewalk widths.

Plaza

The Harris Green neighbourhood is identified in the OCP as a key, high-density, residential neighbourhood. To this end, the OCP includes strategic direction to add parks and open spaces in the Harris Green neighbourhood to support increased population growth. The strategic directions map identifies an area for consideration of parks and open space in the block south of View Street. While the subject site is not strategically identified as including a park or plaza, policies in the OCP encourage the provision of open space to support population growth in Harris Green with all new developments. The proposal is consistent with these policies with the provision of a 250m² plaza, to be included in the latter phases of the development along Yates Street, to provide the maximum exposure to natural light. For reference, 250m² is equal to the size of Trounce Alley or the Fort Commons area, or approximately 60% the size of Millie's Lane. The exact location of this plaza is not determined at this stage; however, the applicant has provided models and renderings to illustrate the variety of ways in which the plaza could be located. The provision of a plaza will be written into the zone and secured through a legal agreement.

While the OCP does not envision a mid-block walkway at this location, this feature was considered in the project design. Ultimately, the applicant opted to not include a mid-block walkway, and instead, concentrate on a plaza option to provide useable outdoor space. Given the policy, the lack of connection to adjacent walkways, the low-level amenity this would provide compared to a plaza, and the challenges associated with animating mid-block walkways at a distance from strong, established retail locations, staff concur with the applicant's approach to exclude a mid-block walkway.

Additional Policy

The DCAP provides specific policies regarding rezoning of the Harris Green lands in the R-48 Zone. The policy excludes this zone from a density bonus consideration and the maximum densities specified in DCAP unless a rezoning is applied for. As a rezoning application is being considered with this proposal, this policy is relevant. If a rezoning application aims to increase the size of a development beyond what is currently permitted in the zone, the intent of the policy is to consider a density bonus for land in the R-48 Zone. The proposal is to reduce the size of development from what is currently permitted in this zone, and therefore, this policy would not apply.

Project Phasing and Zoning Bylaw Structure

The project is proposed to occur over four phases. At present, a Development Permit Application has only been submitted for Phase 1. Subsequent phases will require additional Development Permit Applications for Council's consideration. The timing for the delivery of the public amenities, plaza and additional front setback will be written into the site-specific zone and correspond to the relative phase. The additional front setback and related public realm improvements will be delivered with each phase of the development. The public plaza is proposed to be delivered with the third phase. The motion set out in the recommendation to Council provides the appropriate wording to secure a phasing plan.

The provision of affordable housing, an area of 250m² dedicated to a public plaza, additional sidewalk area secured though an increased front setback and a post-disaster emergency services building, all form the Community Amenity Contributions (CACs) attributable to this Application. As such, the Zoning Bylaw will stipulate a range of densities applicable to the site if these CACs are not provided.

Parking

Given the unique parking demands of a firehall, portions of the required parking are proposed to be provided off-site. As such, the zoning bylaw will be written to extend the off-site parking radius to 600m. This provision in the Zoning Bylaw will provide flexibility, while ensuring the parking standard is met. It is also worth noting, that while the parking bylaw (Schedule C) required parking standard is being met, the anticipated actual parking demand for a Firehall is less as there is significant area dedicated to the storage of emergency vehicles and equipment within the building. This also provides additional operational benefits, as the offsite parking will be able to be utilized in emergency instances when additional fire suppression crew may be required.

Density Bonus Policy

Under the City of Victoria's Density Bonus Policy (2016), the value of a Community Amenity Contribution (CAC) is negotiated based on an independent land lift analysis. G.P. Rollo and Associates was retained by the City of Victoria to analyze the financial performance of the proposed project and to estimate the change in property value associated with the proposed rezoning on the privately held property.

As detailed in the attached report, the amount of the amenity contribution is set out in Council policy in the Downtown Core Area Plan, 2011, which stipulates that the City may recover 75% of the land lift value through amenity contributions. The land lift analysis estimates a lift in land value for the portion of development above the base density. The base density is determined as the lower density outlined in the OCP for the relevant urban place designation; or, where the property's starting zoning allows more density than the OCP base density, the zoned density is considered as the base density. In this instance, the lands zoned S-1 have a base density of 3.0 FSR and the existing density permitted in the R-48 zoned lands results in a theoretical base density of 9.8 FSR. The R-48 Zone does not specify a density; therefore, a theoretical density is imputed. For this reason, staff requested the land lift analysis also consider an alternative base density more stringent than that outlined in the Bonus Density Policy. Design considerations such as setbacks and floor plate limitations were included in the additional analysis resulting in a reduction of the overall gross buildable area. Typically, developments occurring in the R-48 Zone do not achieve the theoretical density in the zone, as they must also address design guidelines which result in building setbacks and reduced floor plates. The land lift analysis also addressed a scenario where a base density was set at the maximum buildable area a project could achieve on the R-48 Zone lands while adhering to the design guidelines.

The lift in land value for the portion of development above the base density is then reduced by the difference in value that a developer would see from developing the entire site as a mix of commercial and market residential, compared to the proposal, which includes roughly 98,000 square feet of affordable housing. On this basis, the economic analysis determined that there is no lift from the proposed rezoning, for both base density scenarios, due to a significant drop in supported land value with the inclusion of affordable housing. The economic analysis also calculated the applicable lift if the proposed affordable housing units were offered as market rental. Under this scenario, the analysis concluded that the rezoning would not result in a lift in the land value. Additionally, the provision of the public plaza and enhanced public realm has not been factored into the land lift analysis, which would further reduce the potential for a land lift.

CONCLUSIONS

The proposal suggests a significant addition of affordable housing, market housing and commercial space to the Harris Green Neighbourhood and includes an opportunity to provide a post-disaster, modern firehall and ambulance facility. The proposal is consistent with the *Official Community Plan* except for the overall density sought; however, a rational consistent with the goals and objectives of the OCP has been provided. The proposed uses, building form and character, and building massing and siting are all consistent with the applicable policy and design guidelines; therefore, staff recommend for Council's consideration that the application be advanced to a Public Hearing.

ALTERNATE MOTION

That Council decline Rezoning and Official Community Plan Amendment Application No. 00660 for 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council, after giving notice and allowing for an Opportunity for Public Comment at a meeting of Council, and after the Public Hearing for Rezoning Application No. 00660, if it is approved, consider the following motion:

"That Council authorize the issuance of Development Permit Application No. 000536 for 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street, in accordance with:

- 1. Plans date stamped February 4, 2019.
- 2. Development meeting all Zoning Regulation Bylaw requirements.
- 3. That Council authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute encroachment agreements, to be executed at time of the building permit approval, in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor and the Director of Engineering and Public Works for:
 - a. building encroachment(s) in the City Right-of-Way
 - b. anchor-pinning in the City Right-of-Way.
- 4. Final plans to be generally in accordance with the plans identified above, to the satisfaction of City staff.
- 5. The Development Permit lapsing two years from the date of this resolution."

LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY

In accordance with Section 489 of the *Local Government Act*, Council may issue a Development Permit in accordance with the applicable guidelines specified in the *Community Plan*. A Development Permit may vary or supplement the *Zoning Regulation Bylaw* but may not vary the use or density of the land from that specified in the bylaw.

Pursuant to Section 491 of the *Local Government Act*, where the purpose of the designation is the revitalization of an area in which a commercial use is permitted, a Development Permit may include requirements respecting the character of the development, including landscaping, and the siting, form, exterior design and finish of buildings and other structures.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to present Council with information, analysis and recommendations for a Development Permit Application for the property located at 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street. The proposal is to construct a twelve-storey, mixed-use building containing ground-floor emergency service functions (firehall and ambulance services), office space and non-market residential housing.

The following points were considered in assessing this application:

- The application is consistent with the *Downtown Core Area Plan (2011)* Guidelines in terms of placemaking and urban design objectives, built form that is complementary to the local context, and design of a positive interface with the public realm and the space between individual buildings.
- The application is consistent with the *Guidelines for Fences, Gates and Shutters (2010)* and the *Advisory Design Guidelines for Buildings, Signs and awnings (1981)* in terms of providing a design that is complementary to the context, comprehensive in approach, and relevant in expression.

BACKGROUND

Description of Proposal

The proposal is for a twelve-storey, mixed-use building containing ground-floor emergency service functions (firehall and ambulance services), office space and non-market residential housing.

Specific details include:

- a twelve-storey, post-disaster building with a four-storey podium and an eight-storey tower
- two levels of underground parking
- a three-storey (including the mezzanine level) firehall and ambulance building
- a fourth-storey for office use
- eight storeys of affordable housing with approximately 130 units, with recessed floors at levels 4 and 12
- an approximate 6m step-back from the face of the podium to the face of the residential building at the fifth level
- common and private patio areas at the fifth level on the north and south elevations
- randomized punched windows on the residential portion of the building
- exterior building materials include dark brick veneer in stack bond, exposed concrete, glazed curtain wall with perforated metal panels and a light-coloured composite metal panel on the residential portion of the building
- landscaping is generally proposed above the podium level on the north and south building elevations.

Affordable Housing Impacts

Affordable housing impacts are discussed with the concurrent Rezoning Application No. 000660.

Sustainability Features

Sustainability features are discussed with the concurrent Rezoning Application No. 000660.

Active Transportation Impacts

The applicant has not identified any active transportation measures associated with this application.

Public Realm Improvements

Proposed public realm improvements are discussed in association with the concurrent Rezoning Application associated with this property.

Accessibility Impact Statement

The British Columbia Building Code regulates accessibility as it pertains to buildings.

Existing Site Development and Development Potential

The site is presently a surface parking lot.

Data Table

Community Consultation

Consistent with the *Community Association Land Use Committee (CALUC) Procedures for Processing Rezoning and Variance Applications*, the applicant has consulted the Downtown Residents Association CALUC at a Community Meeting held on July 31, 2018. A letter dated November 22, 2018 is attached to this report.

Advisory Design Panel

The Advisory Design Panel (ADP) considered this application at their November 28, 2018 meeting (minutes attached) and recommended in their motion that the application be approved as presented.

ANALYSIS

The Official Community Plan, 2012 (OCP) identifies this property within Development Permit Area 3 (HC), Core Residential. The objectives of this designation are to transform the function, form and character of the area through mid-to-high-rise residential, mixed-use and commercial buildings. Applicable design guidelines include the *Downtown Core Area Plan* (2011), *Guidelines for Fences, Gates and Shutters (2010), and Advisory Design Guidelines for Buildings, Signs and awnings (1981).*

The *Downtown Core Area Plan* (DCAP) sets out urban design objectives that seek to ensure an attractive, livable urban space while supporting economic viability, sustainability and placemaking. Additional objectives aim to promote contextual design, integrated with its surrounding area that address and respond to future changes in use, lifestyle, economy and demographics.

Building Form, Scale and Massing

Guidelines related to building form and massing are outlined in the OCP to help achieve the urban design objectives. The application includes generously sized sidewalks, street wall proportions similar to neighbouring properties, stepped-back building massing, recessed entries, and a well-defined podium and tower consistent with the streetscape objectives in the guidelines.

Building setbacks from the property line are in excess of those outlined in the DCAP. The ground floor setback is just over six-and-a-half metres from the property line and the majority of the tower portion of the building steps back an additional three metres from the podium, providing over nine metres of setback from the property line. Based on the DCAP guidelines, a zero-lot line setback up to the fourth storey, a three-metre setback to the eleventh storey, and a six-metre setback on the twelfth storey would be consistent with the guidelines.

A realignment of the sidewalk along the building frontage is proposed to provide a paved apron for operational purposes associated with the firehall. This sidewalk realignment would result in an additional two-and-a-half metres of perceived setback between the sidewalk and the building. While this increased condition creates a more open feel to the public realm and may potentially increase light access, typically, interruptions to sidewalks of this nature would not be supported. The intended uses of the apron include increased sight lines, safer vehicle movements, fire truck supply loading and truck regeneration. Although these unique uses present a compelling argument for the realigned sidewalk, there may be an opportunity to reduce the sidewalk realignment and/or incorporate design elements to mitigate the sidewalk's proximity to Johnson Street to create a greater sense of a "buffer" as experienced by pedestrians when a boulevard is present. Given that the City is responsible for constructing the driveway and apron, staff will continue to explore design options.

The DCAP specifies maximum floor plate sizes to mitigate the overall scale and massing of taller buildings and to contribute to a more graceful skyline. The residential portion of the application proposes a floor plate area greater than what is outlined in the DCAP. From levels seven to ten, the floor plate limitation is 930m², and for levels eleven and twelve, the floor plate limitation is 650m². The proposal is for a floor plate size of 1189m² between the seventh and eleventh storeys, and 1024m² for the twelfth storey, a difference of 259m² for the seventh to tenth storeys, 539m² for the eleventh storey and 374m² for the twelfth storey. These floor plate sizes are largely governed by the requirements of the firehall portion of the building and the post-disaster design. The overall length of the building was set to accommodate the number of bays for the firehall vehicles on the ground-floor. The length also sets the elevator and building core dimensions. The building length is carried up through the building into the residential tower. To reduce the floor plate area on the upper-portions of the building, consideration was given to creating two smaller towers above the podium; however, this building form could not meet the requirements of a post-disaster building.

Reducing the width of the building to reduce the floor plate sizes could not be achieved as this would result in a non-functional building. Only one row of dwelling units could be accommodated in a narrower building width, as opposed to two rows with a unit on either side of the corridor. To reduce the apparent mass of the building, the fifth and twelfth storeys are recessed. Additionally, the floor plate is broken into two massing elements forming a T-shape. Together, these design strategies have reduced the apparent mass of the building separation distances, provide a solution that staff consider consistent with the intent of the guidelines.

The Design Guidelines categorize Johnson Street as a "Narrow Street" which sets a step-back parameter for building massing above fifteen metres. This step-back is expressed as an imaginary angled line that rises at a ratio of five (5) metres vertically for every one (1) metre horizontally above fifteen (15) metres. The proposed building massing is consistent with this step-back ratio.

The podium elevation of the building facing Johnson Street includes a uniform, rectilinear, threelevel building massing sitting over a ground-floor comprised of building entrances and several glazed firehall and ambulance vehicle doors. This design arrangement is consistent with the DCAP policies aimed at encouraging the articulation of building façades and rich detailing to provide a high-degree of public interest along streets. Similarly, the rectilinear, three-level building massing is consistent with policies aimed at encouraging building expressions consistent with their use. The proposed mass, scale and length of the podium is considered consistent with the civic function of a firehall.

Green and Open Space

Given the firehall use on the ground-floor, opportunities for green space and open space are limited. Four boulevard trees are proposed to be removed along the building frontage and two trees are proposed to be planted in locations that do not conflict with the operation of the firehall and ambulance building. Landscaping above the podium level, where the tower portion of the building is set back, includes trees and landscaping that would be consistent with what is normally programmed at street level. Additionally, a common patio area is provided on the south elevation off the firehall communal spaces and at the first level of residential uses on the north and south building elevations. The residential communal areas include a dog-run, picnic area and outdoor seating. A total of eight dwelling units have direct access to outdoor areas on the fifth level, and an additional seven units have access to outdoor balcony areas on the top floor. The overall provision of outdoor space is more than what is typically found in similar developments in this area and is consistent with the DCAP policies.

Tree Preservation Bylaw and Urban Forest Master Plan

There are four public trees impacted by this application. All four trees are Carpinus Betulus (Hornbeam) trees along Johnson Street. The underground excavation required for the parkade and construction of buildings will impact these trees. A fee for their appraised values will be attached to the Building Permit.

New street trees and planting beds are to be irrigated on a separate system and installed to City standards, which are set out in Schedule C of the Subdivision and Development Servicing Bylaw. A project arborist will be required to review and provide a report for the retained Hornbeam tree on the west portion of the Johnson Street sidewalk.

CONCLUSIONS

The objectives for Development Permit Area 3 (HC), Core Mixed-Use Residential aim to enhance areas through high-quality architecture, landscape and urban design which reflect the function of a major residential centre on the edge of a central business district in scale, massing and character, while still responding to its context. The application advances these objectives as it demonstrates general consistency with the relevant guidelines and policy. On this basis, staff recommend for Council's consideration that the application be supported.







Knocking on doors, meeting community members for coffee, hands on sessions, one-on-one meetings, and public engagement events were all measures taken in this project in order to facilitate a robust and extensive communication system with those impacted.

WHAT IS THE COMMUNITY AND REZONING PROCESS?

The schedule of community consultation meetings and presentations has closely adhered to the process set out by the City of Victoria Planning Department. This is outlined in the Rezoning and Offical Community Plan Amendment Process and shows which milestones are key to an effective rezoning and OCP amendment process.




DIAGRAM OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION PROCESS

EXTENSIVE PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT & CONSULTATION

Through a comprehensive series of meetings spanning over six months, our team has developed, shared, presented, refined, and above all - listened to stakeholders and community members. We have listened to individuals, to neigbourhood associations, resident groups, and to the public, facilitating approximately 25 meetings with over 100 people. As the project is large and complex, we have used extensive material to facilitate a participatory process, including models, boards, and reference materials.

Ourfeedback from residents has been generally supportive of the development as beneficial to the Harris Green area and the future of a safer and more vibrant Victoria. We have received significant input and feedback from various stakeholders. Common themes we have heard relate to:

- parking
- building heights
- building separation
- public open space

The balance of this application will show how we have heard and responded to these concerns.

COMMUNITY MEETING WITH DOWNTOWN RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION CALUC JULY 31st

The community meeting was well attended and made the project available to a large group of well-organized residents. Many public features not seen previously in projects of this scale in Harris Green were shown and discussed for their civic importance and need in this location including the firehall, potential for a significant affordable housing component, and green space. Comments from the meeting are currently being prepared by the Downtown Residents Association for inclusion in the rezoning and OCP amendment process. At the time of application, comments and feedback have yet to be received.


iii. CONTEXT ANALYSIS SITE CONTEXT

The Cook Johnson Yates site is a part of the Harris Green district and located at the eastern edge of downtown Victoria. Cook, Johnson and Yates streets are all major arterial roads & thoroughfares, extending to the harbour, ocean front, and to other communities north and east of Victoria. Together, these impressive axes form a vital junction in a rapidly developing area.

For downtown Victoria, this location has great amenities and potential to be a success for residents, employees, and citizensin the area. A well-structured, mixed-use, urban development can also be a significant positive catalyst for the Haris Green district and for the future of city form in Victoria.

The site is in close proximity to major Victoria institutions, making it an excellent location for a comprehensive development serving the downtown and surrounding neighbourhoods.

The demographic of this area is changing fast. Gone are open lots with car dealerships and small service buildings set back from street frontages. Coming are families and people who wish live in a vibrant and very livable downtown with close access to the best Victoria has to offer. This location is one of the best in the downtown district and will form the gateway to downtown from the east, creating a distinctive silhouette on the Victoria skyline.

SITE HISTORY

1060 YATES

As far back as 1903, fire insurance plans show small, residential structures on the property. These remained in place until the mid-1950's, at which point a larger commercial building to the south and smaller building to the west was constructed for wholesale business and unemployment insurance offices respectively. In addition, it was around this time that the history of automotive service began on the property with the operation of a car wash at the east corner of the property.

From the late 1950's through to present day, automotive dealerships have existed and been the main use on the property. In the mid-1960's after moving to Victoria to be the General Manager for Olson Motors, Peter Pollen purchased 1060 Yates Street and shortly thereafter changed the name to Peter Pollen Ford.

Peter Pollen Ford operated on the lands for 20 years before Peter's retirement and successful City of Victoria Mayoral bid in 1981.

In 1988, Pacific Mazda began operations on the lands and has now operated and served its loyal customer base for over 30 years.

1025-1031 JOHNSON STREET

Similarly to 1060 Yates Street, records show 3 small, residential type structures on the property as far back as 1903. These structures remained on site through the mid 1950's until in 1969 when aerial photographs show the transition to a parking lot, which is today's present use.

DOWNTOWN CORE AREA PLAN

DCAP OVERVIEW

The Downtown Core Area Plan is concerned with locating building density, height, massing, and setbacks to create successful urban development and achieve the density aoals for each district.

The DCAP includes Harris Green as the largest district, a Residential Mixed Use District supporting mid and high-rise residential construction. The project site is along the major east west street in the Harris Green District, with numerous high rise residential projects underway in the immediate area.

This proposed development plans to follow and build within the DCAP. All proposed development is to conform to the DCAP and rules concerning density, height, and setbacks, as well as more specific goals of the DCAP.

According to DCAP, this block forms a defining piece of the east end of downtown core, a gateway to downtown Victoria from surrounding areas. The skyline to Victoria is easily seen from the Rockland Water Tower.

In referencing values identified within DCAP, this project addresses key challenges for the next 30 years.

STRATEGIC GOALS

- 1.1. Ensuring the Downtown Core Area has enough residential and office space available to keep up with short- and long-term growth forecasts and remain the preferred location for Provincial Government offices, services and associated institutional buildings.
- 4.1. Encouraging high quality architecture and diversity in the design of buildings and surrounding public areas.
- 4.3. Supporting context-sensitive developments that complement the existing Downtown Core Area through siting, orientation, massing, height, setbacks, materials and landscaping.
- 5.1. Developing diverse housing types and sizes to attract both individuals and families, including smaller units as well as rowhouses, townhouses and stacked townhouses.
- Supporting new residential development that integrates a blend of market and non-market housing.







AMENITIES & TRANSPORTATION

The proposed site boasts some of the best amenities in Victoria. All of downtown's public, cultural, historical, and service locations are within easy reach by foot or transit. The city's greatest concentration of streetside business and establishments are spread throughout the surrounding blocks. Overall, public infrastructure is superior and the site is well-served.

Bordered by three major arterial roads in and out of downtown, Cook, Johnson and Yates carry substantial traffic and transit capacity. All sides of the site are accessible to passenger and commercial vehicles 24/7 for loading, parking, and curbside delivery. With good access to good roads at a good location, all factors contribute to aood site exposure and connectivity.

WALKABILITY + BIKE ROUTES

Presently, walkability for the area is exceptional with large roads served by typical sidewalks with well grown trees. This contributes to localized access to amenities.

The proposed development will vastly improve walkability on the entire block, adding much needed life and captured public space, to create a lively urban streetscape with connections to downtown. Several new residential development high-rise projects underway on the next block will add continuity to the walking environment.

Bikes fall into this category as well. The area's cycling network is robust with hard and soft bike paths. Cyclists and pedestrians are more in scale with each other, so combined they add life and variety to the streetscape. The streetscape is changing fast in Victoria, especially in this area around downtown, where new bike lanes and landscaped sidewalks in a well-defined downtown core are quickly creating a new, modern, younger identity.



EXISTING ZONING AND CITY POLICIES

DEVELOPMENT POTENTIAL AND MASSING -EXISTING ZONING

The first step in the planning for the site was to look to the development potential and massing under existing zoning.

The R-48 Zone does not prescribe a maximum density through a floor space ratio (FSR) calculation. Instead, standard practice is to determine the "theoretical" FSR based on the height and setback regulations as they relate to the subject property. The R 48 Zone stipulates a maximum height of 30m (10 storeys) front yard set backs of 0.5m for mixed use buildings, with no requirement for side and rear yard setbacks. An analysis has been completed showing that the theoretical density for those portions of the subject property zoned R-48 to be an FSR of 9.8:1.

The S-1 Zone stipulates a maximum height of 15m (5 storeys) and an FSR of 1.5:1

DEVELOPMENT POTENTIAL AND MASSING -EXISTING ZONING AND CURRENT POLICY

We then look to the goals and directions set out in the OCP and DCAP to determine the development potential for the S-1 Lands and to shape the theoretical density on the R-48 Lands according to current policy.


The massing and theoretical density on the R-48 lands are formed according to the DCAP guidelines for height, setbacks and floorplate sizes. This creates two 17-storey residential towers with retail at arade, at a density of 9.0:1 FSR. Setbacks are more generous with retail at grade.


The massing and density of the S-1 lands are formed according to DCAP and OCP guidelines for density, height, setbacks and floorplate sizes. This creates two stepped, 15-storey towers achieving the maximum density of 5.5:1 identified by DCAP.

SHAPING DENSITY

INTRODUCTION OF THE FIRST PHASE (FIREHALL, OFFICE AND RESIDENTIAL)

Next, we introduce the siting and massing requirements for the Firehall, which is to be located on the mid-block of Johnson Street for operational reasons. Due to the structural requirements of constructing this building to postdisaster seismic requirements of the Building Code, the achievable height is limited to 12 stories in an area where the DCAP contemplates maximum heights of 17 storeys. The density that could otherwise be constructed on this area is applied to the balance of the site.

The lower portion of the towers are joined to form a continuous podium. The site now has a continuous perimeter, but tower separation is still at a minimum.

Gross Floor Area: 51,200 m²

TOWER SEPARATION AND MASSING REFINEMENT


The massing is further refined to reflect the anticipated massing for first phase of development along the midblock of Johnson. Podium height comes down according to function and adjoining urban fabric, creating a continuous facade and scale in the neighbourhood.

The towers are trimmed towards views. In addition, in our common consultations it was desired to have maximum tower separation, allowing view corridors that provide access to daylight through the site.

The massing shown conforms to DCAP guidelines for height, setbacks and floorplate sizes, except the Phase 1 building, which exceeds the floorplate size above the podium levels.

Finally, the massing is further refined to accommodate the proposed first phase of development and to demonstrate the development potential for the balance of the site which conforms or improves upon DCAP heights, set backs and tower separation.


The low continuous podium and slender towers with good separation are an efficient form for density at this scale. Building heights and form can be layered into vertical neighbourhoods, responsive to surrounding buildings and context. Overall site density can be used to create consistent urban form with an active and vibrant city street front using a continuous overhang and setback at street level.

There is an opportunity for the southeast corner at Cook and Yates to be used as open green space; a park at the gateway to downtown Victoria. This sunny area has the potential to be surrounded by terraces and vibrant street-level businesses. The podiums have potential for extensive green and recreational spaces.










SETBACKS AND TOWER SEPARATION

USE SETBACKS FOR OPEN SPACES

The site follows primary and secondary setbacks for the Yates, Johnson and Cook Street corridors.

Each setback is also expressed as open space, where decks and terraces allow more open access to the exterior. In addition, a continuous setback / overhang at street level gives cover and room for outdoor terraces.

Site sections and street setback profiles are shown in the drawing set.




DCAP SETBACK PROFILE - WIDE STREET


GENEROUS TOWER SEPARATION

A continuous podium allows for better tower separation above. Distances between towers are shown for illustrative purposes.

As the towers sit on a podium, the apparent separation is even greater, as the space between towers is also shorter. This allows a more humane proportion to the space between, and for towers to be oriented towards view corridors and shaped by surroundings.

SUSTAINABLE BUILDING FEATURES

WHAT IS SUSTAINABILITY NOW?

The idea of sustainability has changed in recent years. From sustainability being primarily environmental and focused on energy issues several years ago, sustainability has evolved to include social dimensions and life cycle. These new sustainable parameters include both the life and function of buildings and their larger role in the built environment.

SOCIAL & CIVIC SUSTAINABILITY

This large, comprehensive development houses several important civic and semi-public functions, including the firehall and housing. These make up over 20 percent of the entire development, forming a significant portion of the overall area, and thereby playing an integral part in the local city fabric.

MIX & LONGEVITY OF BUILDING

The mix of diverse & socially sustainable functions in a large urban project help ensure the project will be relevant for years to come. Recent projects in Harris Green have contained residential uses only and there is now single purpose "fatigue" which can often plague high density residential areas. The inclusion of large public and civic functions in the podium level will diversify the streetscape and give life to the project through all hours of the day.

The Phase I Post-Disaster seismic building offers both a public safety and longevity function which both play a vital role in maintaining the integrity of the Downtown Core Area over the long-term.

PODIUM LANDSCAPING & GREEN STREETSCAPES

The increased setback at street level creates the opportunity for high quality, well defined hard and soft landscaping areas creating places for people who live and work in the development as well as all residents and visitors of Victoria to gather and enjoy outdoor life in the city.

Rainwater captured from rooftops and ground surfaces will be integrated into the design of the public realm using raingardens. Water can be reintroduced to the underground water hydrology, resulting in a healthier system than what currently exists of the predominantly paved site.

The top of the podium level will provide semi-private landscaped areas. Carefully planned common areas will be designed to encourage interaction between residents and workers in the development. Rainwater can be used for irrigation. Plants will be selected to minimize water demand, provide visually pleasing spaces for residents, views from below, and habitat for pollinators and other critters that are esential for a healthy urban ecosystem.

PROPOSED PARKING

The development is designed in accordance with the new Schedule-C for off-street parking in Victoria. Despite no requirement for parking for R-48 zones, the development will adhere to the parking numbers prescribed in schedule C in effect for 2018. The development will be able to include 2 stories of underground parking under the majority of the site. Each phase will be planned with the potential for connection to adjacent phases which will reduce the number of driveway access points at grade.

Parking for Phase 1 on Johnson Street for the Firehall and housing is proposed to include 116 spaces on 2 levels of underground parking.

BICYCLE AND SCOOTER PARKING

Ample bicycle and scooter parking will be available around the entire site. The bicycle parking will include both class 1 & 2 as defined by the Schedule-C bylaw and will be well spread out and accessible.

Phase 1 bicycle parking will be located at street level and in the upper of the underground parking.

URBAN FIREHALL


The new Firehall provides an important civic presence on the street 24/7. In a building designed to seismic structure capacity, the firehall building is a solid and reliable beacon in the neighbourhood.

The firehall will have on-street presence and transparency, showing off the technology and equipment in modern, compact layouts. The space is clean and bright, making the neighbourhood more safe and secure.

In a mixed use building with offices and housing, the firehall will be a good neighbour. An agreement will be implemented to ensure negative impacts due to activity and noise are mitigated.

HOUSING

The housing proposed for Phase 1 provides much needed living space for individuals and families in the downtown core. This housing targets a key sector of the Harris Green residential vision and provides life and diversity in the neighbourhood.

Presently the applicant is working in conjunction with a local not for profit housing provider to deliver some or all of the 130 residential homes as affordable housing. The provision of this affordable housing is contingent upon approvals from upper levels of government.

DEDICATED RECREATION SPACE -PLAYAREA & DOG RUN

Atop the podium of the Phase 1 building is an indoor common area flanked on either side by landscaped outdoor recreation areas for use by the residents of the tower above. To the north is substantial dog run and to the south is a landscaped terrace and children's play area. Both areas are heavily landscaped to give the sense of an a street level experience. Firehall operations require that there be a 6m set back at street level for the apron, where some of the cleaning, daily check overs and maneuvering of aparatus takes place. This limits opportunities for landscaping and community space at grade.





OFF-STREET PARKING

The existing R48 zone has no parking requirement. The applicant is proposing that the new site specific zone require parking for the entire development site to be provided in accordance with Schedule C – Off Street Parking. Within the first Phase of the proposed development, the applicant is proposing parking for both residents and occupants off the building as well as the general public.

CAPTURED PUBLIC SPACE -CONTINUOUS STREET LEVEL SETBACK


Looking at the site as a cohesive development, a unifying raised podium with zero side-yard setbacks at lower levels can be achieved to ensure captured public space through all phases of the proposed development. Taking direction from DCAP and the OCP, this application proposes a consistent 2.5m minimum front yard setback at grade. This roised podium approach with greater street level setbacks creates wider street level spaces with semi covered outdoor terraces, contributing to an improved pedestrian experience.









IV. SITE MASTERPLAN

1: The master plan for the site proposes a variety of designated uses, located around three major arterial boulevards at the edge of downtown Victoria. These will include residential dwellings of several types across the site, commercial & professional offices, public buildings, retail spaces including food & beverage establishments, potential for indoor recreational spaces, public walkways and last but not least, a firehall.


2: Retail, commercial, and institutional uses, with residential mid-high rise above, are all located in close proximity on a half block site at a major juncture in downtown Victoria's east end. This site has the potential to become an eastern anchor for Harris Green, bolstering activity and inhabitants to bring street life to this gap in the downtown fabric. Combined for a variety of potential uses, outdoor activity spaces, podium gardens, and covered streetfront patios, the Johnson Cook Yates Block will offer life and energy to the neighbourhood.

3: Along the streets at ground level, a tall podium with generous overhang will animate the sidewalks and allow for landscaping, creating a sustainable public realm where all ages are welcome. A regular rhythm of retail units and food establishments will be created with wide, accessible sidewalks and outdoor patios. Streetfront townhomes with front doors and yards are connected to paths and walkways throughout the site are possible.

4: Considering the direction of the OCP and DCAP, feedback from the community and City Staff and integrating the requirements of a post disaster public safety building in phase 1, the application has been developed and refined to conceptualize a site-wide master plan that proposes the following:

- Unique site with 3 street frontages and orientations
- Phase 1 Firehall and housing responding to neighbouring building heights on Johnson Street
- Cook Street sets up for two towers responding to rhythm and form of new development on Cook Street
- Tower on Yates Street responding to existing development from 1991 across the street
- A unifying podium creating continuity between the various elements and providing a continuous street frontage

5: In consultation with the City of Victoria and the Victoria Fire Service, it was determined that the most appropriate location for the new fire hall was the mid block of Johnson Street. This sets up an overall master site plan that is responsive to each of the three site orientations and tied together by a common base and continuous street edge.








Dear Mayor Helps and Council,

We are pleased to submit this Rezoning and Development Permit Application for the above noted property.

The vision for this site is a master-planned community that incorporates the best of city design principles and includes a smart mix of housing, commercial and retail spaces, along with a new public safety facility. The proposal contemplates four buildings that will be arranged on site to create a sense of place, maximize light and view corridors and add vibrancy to the Harris Green Neighbourhood. The first phase (Phase 1), for which a development permit application is being made concurrently with the rezoning, proposes a 12 storey building (11 plus mezzanine) constructed to the National Building Code 2015 (BC Building Code 2018) Post Disaster level requirements. If approved, this building will be home to the City of Victoria's Fire Hall No. 1 and emergency operations centre, BC Ambulance ready centre, office space plus 130 homes, all over two levels of underground parking. The applicant is working with Pacifica Housing Advisory Association to deliver the 130 homes as affordable rental units pursuant to BC Housing's Community Housing Fund Program.

This application has been thoughtfully developed to promote the goals of the Official Community Plan 2012 (OCP) and to respect the Downtown Core Area Plan 2011 (DCAP) design guidelines.

Existing Land Use & Applicable Planning Policy

The site is comprised of nine separate legal lots with a combined area of 7,200m² in the Harris Green Neighbourhood. The site is prominent in its position on the centre of the city, being bordered by Johnson Street to the north, a one-way street leaving the city, Cook Street to the east, marking the border of the downtown, and Yates Street to the south, a one-way street entering downtown. Located on the edge of the downtown district, the site is one of the last remaining automotive service lots within the Harris Green, an area that is targeted by the OCP to accommodate a significant share of the 50% of Victoria's forecast new population and housing growth earmarked for the Urban Core over the next 30 years. The site has a gentle slope from Johnson down to Yates Street and is bordered by sidewalks and bike lanes on these one-way streets. Cook Street to the east has the characteristic established line of chestnut trees that continues to

the Cook Street village and Dallas Road. The site is currently occupied by the Pacific Mazda car dealership and a pay parking lot. Directly adjacent to the west of the site are a single-story insurance agency and two multi-storey residential buildings. Across the street on Johnson, Yates and Cook, buildings vary in height from 1 to 17 storeys.

The site boasts proximity to some of the best amenities in Victoria with access by foot, bicycle and transit to schools, cultural centres, restaurants, shops and civic facilities. The harbour is an fifteen minute walk away, George Jay and Central Middle schools and Victoria High School are all within ten minute walk, and a healthy mix of street-side businesses and amenities are within a few minutes: Conservatory of Music, grocery stores, restaurants, cafes, drug stores and shops.

The property is split zoned. The western portion (43% of the entire site area) is zoned Harris Green District (R48) and the eastern portion is zoned Limited Service District (S1). The OCP designates the site as Core Residential and within *Development Permit Area 3 (HC) - Core Mixed-Use Residential*, anticipating multi-residential development along with other land uses, public amenities and services that help to develop complete communities.

The R48 zone permits mixed use residential and commercial developments up to 10 storeys but does not prescribe a maximum density through a floor space ratio (FSR) calculation. A "theoretical" FSR for these lands has been calculated using an approach confirmed in consultation with the City of Victoria and applied to recent development applications zoned R48. The "theoretical" density is calculated based on the building height and front yard setback regulations stipulated in the zone. This confirms a theoretical density of 9.8:1. The R48 zone has no parking requirement.

The S1 zone permits an FSR of 1.5:1 and a maximum height of 15m. However, as the site prepares to transition from its historical automotive use to meet the needs of the future community, the OCP and DCAP for this site identify a base density of 3:1, a maximum density of 5.5:1 and building heights of up to 15 storeys along Cook Street and 17 storeys in the mid-block of Johnson and Yates Street.

This proposal has been developed to meet objectives set out in the OCP and DCAP. The provision of housing in the downtown, plus the emergency services program help the City in achieving OCP Section 3, Plan Values 3.6 *Individual Well-Being, 3.7 Community Capacity Building,* and 3.11 Adaptive and Responsive. There has been a coordinated, collaborative process in planning for Phase 1 of the project between the proponent, multiple departments at the City, BC Ambulance and Pacifica Housing Advisory Association. This unique building program is only possible through careful, coordinated planning between the varied agencies and stakeholders (OCP Plan Value 3.13 Coordinated Planning).

Several of the OCP Plan Goals are addressed with this proposal, including those Plan Goals that relate to:

- Accessibility
- Access to affordable housing
- A range of housing types
- Victorians know their neighbours, are connected to communities of interest
- Victoria is a safe city
- Victoria is prepared to deal with known hazards and emerging threats

Description of Proposal

The proposed development is a multi-phase, mixed use development to be constructed over a number of years, commencing with the Phase 1 along the mid-block of Johnson Street. Phase 1 proposes a 12 storey building (11 storeys

plus mezzanine) containing a first level and mezzanine of fire service and ambulance operations, a second level containing fire hall operations/administration and emergency operations centre, a third storey of office, 130 homes over eight storeys and two levels of underground parking. The balance of the development is envisioned to be a mixed-use development conforming to the DCAP design guidelines with building heights ranging from 14 to 17 storeys and uses consistent with the Core Residential OCP designation. The specific design for these subsequent phases will be brought forward as separate development permits at the time those phases advance.

Proposed Zoning

To accommodate this proposal, a site-specific zone is being requested that is generally in compliance with the OCP and DCAP. The overall density for the site being proposed is derived from the aggregate of (i) the current development potential for those portions of the site zoned R48 (which is greater than the maximum development potential identified in the OCP) and (ii) the development potential identified in the OCP and DCAP for those portions of the site currently zoned S1.

A site specific amendment to the OCP is required to permit the overall density proposed for the site, and the applicant feels this is supportable on the basis that the application is consistent with the Core Residential urban place designation and furthers the broad objectives and policies of the OCP.

Massing and Siting

The proposed massing strategy has been formed by applying the directions of the OCP and DCAP, community feedback and the program requirements of a post-disaster public safety building to the development potential for the lands. A detailed massing development study is included with the rezoning application.

The proposal contemplates building heights of 12 storeys fronting Johnson, 15 storeys fronting Johnson and Cook Streets, 14 storeys fronting Cook and Yates Street and 17 storeys fronting Yates Street, consistent with DCAP height guidelines. The overall site density proposed is 6.8:1. When the area dedicated to the fire hall is excluded, the overall site density is 6.26:1.

The proposal for a 12 storey building in Phase 1, in an area where the OCP contemplates a 17 storey maximum height, is driven by the structural limitations of a post-disaster building, while giving consideration to the existing row of 10 storey residential and mixed-use buildings across Johnson Street to the north.

The proposed massing for the site complies with the setbacks outlined in the guiding documents, stepping back away from the street at upper levels to ensure light and views are enhanced at street level. By treating the site as a cohesive development and creating a unifying raised podium with zero side-yard setbacks at lower levels, the massing at the upper levels can be reduced, resulting in more slender towers with greater separation for light and air for residents and at the street level. The raised podium approach with greater street level setbacks also creates wider street level spaces with semi covered outdoor terraces (an 2.5m average setback at grade is being proposed). The large floor plates of the raised podium provide for flexibility in programming, creating the opportunity for a variety of uses which results in greater vibrancy for the neighbourhood. Potential podium uses may include multi-level townhomes, apartments, live work spaces, offices, recreational and other uses.

In response to community and City staff feedback, the application has been updated to include the provision of a 250sm open space/plaza along Yates Street.

As requested by City staff, we have updated the rezoning application materials to show three different massing scenarios which illustrate examples of possible DCAP compliant massing solutions that could be brought forward for future phases through separate Development Permit applications. The massing of the remaining phases in all three scenarios demonstrates that the proposed site-wide density can be developed sensitively in a manner that conforms to, or improves upon, the DCAP guidelines for height, setback, building and street interface and building separation. All building massing as shown in the rezoning application illustrations comply with DCAP maximum floor plate sizes, with the exception of the residential portion of the Phase 1 building. This exceedance is due to structural limitations associated with the construction of a post-seismic structure and is described in more detail below.

The three massing scenarios also illustrate different possibilities for the open space/plaza location and orientation; corner location marking a gateway to downtown at Cook and Yates, linear open space running along Yates Street, and inset outdoor 'room' that would have buildings lining three sides with south side open to Yates Street. All options are located on the south side of the development, opening onto Yates Street and are 250sm in area. The open space/plaza will be on private land, cared for by the development, yet open to the public. We feel that the size and location on Yates Street are ideal for the neighbourhood requested public space for this development. At 250sm, the space will be large enough for informal gathering of individuals or small groups as well as space for potential spill-out of adjacent businesses. At the same time, the open space/plaza will be intimate enough that adjacent businesses can express some form of ownership over the space by way of overlook.

The idea of a mid-block walkway or interior plaza was considered by the design team. Although there are some good examples of mid-block walkways in Victoria's old town, we believe that this development on the eastern edge of the block at the eastern end of downtown does not have sufficient 'people energy' to make one successful. Without a network of mid-block paths to the north and south, a stand-alone mid-block walkway could detract from the urban life around the perimeter of the development on Johnson, Cook and Yates Streets.

Proposed Uses

In response to City staff feedback, the rezoning application is revised to propose only the following uses:

- 1. Assembly
- 2. Assisted Living Facility
- Care Facility 3.
- 4. Civic Facility
- 5. **Financial Services**
- 6. Food and Beverage
- Home Occupation 7.
- 8. Hotel
- 9. Office

- 10. Personal Service
- 11. Residential
- 12. Residential Lock-Off Unit
- 13. Retail Liquor Store
- 14. Retail Trade
- 15. Small-scale Commercial Urban Agriculture
- 16. Studio
- 17. Utility
- 18. cinemas, art galleries and places of recreation

The above revised list of uses are intended to align with the use definitions in the Zoning Bylaw 2018, and to provide greater clarity regarding the scope of 'institutional' uses being permitted on the site as a whole (in response to community feedback).

Phase 1

Building Program

Phase 1 of the development is for an 12 storey (11 plus mezzanine), mixed use building that includes the Victoria Fire Department Headquarters, BC Ambulance station, commercial space, 130 rental apartments, all over two levels of secure and public underground parking. The residential 'building' contains 24 studio, 56 one bedroom, 43 two bedroom and seven three bedroom homes. The Victoria Fire Department will be the primary 'face' to the building, taking up the majority of the lower levels, including street presence. As such, the building has been designed to have a prominent civic presence.

Building Siting, Setbacks and Massing

The urban firehall requires that there be a 6 metre setback at street level for the apron, for some of the cleaning, daily check overs and maneuvering of aparatus will occur. As well as being a practical requirement of the fire department, this forecourt sets the building apart as one of civic importance.

The building meets the Built Form Policies described in DCAP, including the inclusion of a terrace to distinguish between podium and upper levels, recessed entries, reduced building bulk of upper storeys, and upper floors stepping back to stay within the 1:5 Building Setback Ratio that starts at the 20m level. As noted previously, the residential portion of the building exceeds the DCAP guidelines for maximum floor plate sizes. This is primarily due to the structural limitations of placing additional residential uses above the broad base of the firehall function in a post-seismic building that will be built to the newly adopted BC Building Code. The building is required to have uniform floor plate sizes and uniform building height surrounding the two elevator/stair cores. Any asymetry to the floorplates and heights creates forces on the lower portion of the building that can not be accomodated. A detailed explanation of these limitations and the impact on massing is provided in a separate memo by Leon Plett of RJC, the project's structural engineers.

The three different program elements will stand out as unique, yet at the same time will combine to create a cohesive building with a modern take of the traditional tripartite expression of *base* (apparatus bays at grade), *middle* (VFD1 headquarters and office in the raised podium) and *top* (8 storeys residential building). The building meets the skyline with a floating flat roof with a tapered edge and exposed soffit.

Building Materials and Expression

The base (aparatus bays and entry lobbies) is occupied by the six firehall aparatus bays, two ambulance bays as well as two entry lobbies that lead to the VFD1 head quarters, office and residential occupancy above. The aparatus bays are visually and kinetically active spaces that will be highlighted by the glazed lower level and glazed bay doors. Entry lobbies will be articulated with the use of landscape forecourts, signage, lighting and highlight material and colour of the elevator and stair cores on the inside. The building base will have full height curtain wall windows with minimal mullion caps and dark framed glass doors in order to maximize transparency.

The *middle* (raised podium) is a two storey volume that houses the administration, the emergency operations centre and suppression crew areas of the Victoria Fire Department, plus one floor of commercial space above. This raised podium volume will be clad in textured cementious panels on the east and west walls and cantilevered soffit, plus a prominent

glazed 'monitor' façade facing the street that will provide 'eyes on the street', and references the early modern expression of the existing firehall #1 building. The raised podium will have floor to ceiling window wall with vertical mullions and screening that responds to the building program and will add texture to the front wall, in keeping with the textured cementitious cladding.

The *top* (apartment) is an 8 storey residential 'building' that appears as 6 storeys by including recessed floors at its base and top. The base of the residential building sits on top of the two storey raised podium and includes walk out terraces from the residences. The base of the residential 'building' on the 5th level contains several spaces for residents to gather in informal settings; exterior dog run and interior common room on the north side of the hallway and a landscaped exterior patio and children's play are to the south. The residential floors will be clad in light coloured composite metal panels, combining multiple tones of simmilar finishes (reflective and matt finish, plus darker tones for accents). The recessed floors will be clad in the same metal panels, but in darker, matt finish to enhance the shadowing. The top of the building will have punched windows that will enforce the residential character and will contrast the window expression on the lower portions of the building, further enhancing the tripartite expression

Landscape

The entry lobbies on Johnson Street will be marked with soft and hard landscaping including benches positioned to view the aparatus inside and on the apron. Because the six firehall and two ambulance bays greatly limit the extent of at-grade landscaping, additional landscape has been added to upper areas of the building, on the north and south sides, providing amenity to the building occupants. The upper landscape which includes trees in large planters will reinforce the design concept of stacked buildings, with an elevated ground plane on the top of the raised podium.

Parking

The exisiting R48 zone (43% of total site area) does not require any car parking. The proposed Phase 1 building includes two levels of underground parking containing 116 parking stalls, plus 172 class 1 bicycle parking spaces. There are an additional 24 class 2 bicycle parking space at grade, near the entry to the apartment building and at the back of the parking ramp (south-west corner of the site).

Project Benefits and Amenities

Post-Disaster Public Safety Building

This project will achieve the OCP goals of replacing Fire Hall No. 1 with a new facility that meets the present and future requirements of the Victoria Fire Department for service delivery. The co-location of the fire service with BC Ambulance furthers the OCP's broad objectives that emergency response is coordinated and delivered efficiently and effectively. The public safety facility will provide an important civic presence on the street 24/7 and the post disaster nature of the building furthers the OCP goal of strengthening the resiliency of structures and infrastructure to seismic events through high standards.

Housing and Affordability

This project will initially bring 130 new homes to the Urban Core, in a form that is supportable relative to the OCP policy direction that the Urban Core is to accommodate and foster a greater range of housing options across the housing

spectrum, including non-market housing. The applicant is working with Pacifica to deliver the 130 homes as non-market housing, which delivery is contingent upon approvals from upper levels of government. A variety of unit sizes are being proposed ranging from studios to 3-bedroom homes, consistent with BC Housing Design Guidelines for suite sizes. Further details regarding the proposed affordable housing component are included with the application materials by way of a letter from Pacifica.

This project will also add a significant number of new homes in the subsequent phases, consistent with the strategic directions in the OCP for the Harris Green Neighbourhood to accommodate a significant share of the 50% of forecast new population and housing growth earmarked for the Urban Core over the next 30 years.

Sustainability

This project proposes a number of sustainable building features. Most importantly, it promotes social and civic sustainability, incorporating the important civic function of a new public safety facility in an innovative manner together with much needed housing. Together, these uses will play an integral part of the City fabric. The post-disaster nature of the Phase 1 building offers both public safety and longevity of the structures.

This project further serves sustainability goals as it is a higher density project located in close proximity to bike lanes, major transit routes and within walking distance to the Central Business District and numerous amenities.

The project will be fully compliant with the new energy requirements in the BC Building Code. For Phase 1, Step Code 1 will be achieved. It is anticipated that the residential component will achieve a higher level of energy efficiency due to the compact building form and absence of exposed concrete floor plates that are commonly incorporated into residential towers. These two factors greatly influence energy efficiency and building envelope durability.

Response to Community Feedback

Over the last nine months, information regarding the proposed development has been communicated through more than 25 meetings, reaching over 150 community members, through which process significant feedback was solicited and received from the community. During this extensive consultation process, certain common themes were identified:

- <u>Need for adequate parking</u> This application responds by meeting the requirements of Schedule C site wide, despite the existing R4B zone (43% of total site area) having no parking requirement.
- <u>Daylight and views through upper levels of buildings</u> The massing strategy for this application focusses the density in the lower levels of the building (the raised podium at levels 2-5) thereby allowing for smaller floorplates of the tower elements, increased architectural articulation and space between. DCAP tower separation requirements will be met or improved upon.
- Improved public realm/pedestrian experience Again, the massing strategy and unified building massing over the entire site allows for the lifting-up of the podium level and provisions of 2.5m average setback at grade, resulting in greater area at the street level for semi-covered pedestrian spaces.
- <u>Building heights</u> The proposal is consistent with the City's vision for building heights on the site as described in the OCP and DCAP with heights dropping towards the eastern border of the downtown core.
- Impacts of an urban fire hall The Victoria Fire Department has worked closely with the development team on a building design that will align with the VFD's operational plan to mitigate traffic and noise through a variety of strategies, while improving responsiveness and efficiency between fire and ambulance services in the City of Victoria. At the CALUC held on July 30, 2018, Chief Bruce responded to questions regarding the impacts of

an urban firehall and detailed the VFD's efforts to mitigate impacts. In addition, a "good neighbour" agreement will also be implemented. The applicant shares the concerns of the community in this regard, as it will be a neighbour through the development of the subsequent phases.

<u>Density</u> –The feedback relating to the density proposed by this application was received by the applicant from Downtown Residents Association Land Use Committee. Concerns expressed related to the overall density being inconsistent with the existing area and policy objectives of the OCP, and the potential for density in subsequent phases not being applied in compliance with DCAP. In response to these concerns, the applicant completed further analysis to confirm that the proposed density can be applied sensitively and in compliance with DCAP heights, tower separation and at grade setbacks, as demonstrated by the three DCAP compliant massing models for future phases included in this submission. The applicant and tower separations will be specifically included in the new zone. Additionally, the City's planning documents specifically target Harris Green Neighbourhood for the growth of housing. Specifically, new growth in the form of taller and denser buildings in the Downtown Core Area are proposed to be concentrated along the two intersecting corridors of Douglas / Blanshard Street and Yates Street in order to, amongst other things, strengthen the Harris Green Neighbourhood with a concentration of higher density residential and commercial uses centred on Yates Street. It is the position of the applicant that, because the density can be applied in a way that meets or exceeds DCAP requirements, that the applicant that, because the density can be applied in a way that meets.

Safety and Security

The Phase 1 building has been designed to consider CPTED guidelines. The Johnson Street façade will be predominantly glazed, with views in and out of lobbies which will provide a level of safety for public passing by and residents entering the building. The apparatus bays will again be largely glazed with fire department and ambulance staff regularly on duty on the ground floor. The hard and soft landscape that is to be located at the two primary building entrances will be low and visually porous to ensure safety for both pedestrian/apparatus interface and CPTED reasons. Until future phases of the project are built, the east and south sides of the Phase 1 building are open to the Pacific Mazda dealership parking lot and Cook Street and Yates Street respectively. Future phases will also be designed to consider CPTED guidelines to ensure safety and security of the occupants of the development.

Transportation & Infrastructure

The project is well situated and serviced by City of Victoria infrastructure. Walkability and access to transportation for the project is exceptional, with immediate proximity to major transit routes and bike lanes. The location of higher density transit-supportive development along Yates street is consistent with DCAP objectives.

Conclusion

We are very pleased to be submitting this rezoning application for this comprehensive development on this prominent and important site on the border of the downtown core. The proposed development is compliant with the overall goals of the Official Community Plan and the Downtown Core Area Plan, and directly responds to many of the Values, Goals and Policies of these guiding documents. Phase 1 of the project will include public amenities that address specific, pressing needs of the City of Victoria with inclusion of a new home for the Victoria Fire Department Headquarters, Emergency Operations Centre, BC Ambulance Station and the continued need for a range of housing types in the downtown area.

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The assembly of multiple development sites into a cohesive development results in new opportunities for a mix of uses that could possibly include larger institutions or businesses. The proposed massing will allow for this sort of mix, while ensuring high quality public spaces (greater setbacks at street level, a 250sm plaza/open space), cohesive street wall (raised podium) and narrower upper floors that maximize daylight and view.

Dear Mayor Helps and Council,

The DRA LUC hosted a CALUC meeting on 31 July 2018 for the above-mentioned application. 93 members of the public attended the meeting. Correspondence has also been received from the public regarding this application.

Based on the information presented by the applicant, the purpose of this application is to rezone a total of 7200m² of lands bounded by Johnson, Cook and Yates Streets to allow a mixed use development of 12 to 17 storey buildings with a proposed overall density of 6.8:1. As the proposed density exceeds the OCP designation for the local area of 5.5:1, an amendment to the OCP is also required. The first phase of the proposed development covers approximately 30% of the site and includes facilities for a new municipal Fire Hall with emergency bays and above those, office space and an affordable housing component administered by Pacifica Housing.

The site is currently split zoned with 43% of the site zoned R-48 and the balance zoned S-1. The applicant presented an argument that a theoretical zoning entitlement existed for the R-48 lands for a density of 8.8:1 and that due to the structural constraints of the Fire Hall any unrealizable density on the R-48 portion of the property would be transferred to the S-1 lands and be applied in addition to the maximum OCP designation of 5.5:1 creating an average for the entire site of 6.8:1.

The DRA has obtained through an FOI request a heavily redacted copy of the contract between the applicant and the City of Victoria for the construction of the fire hall. This contract shows that Council has agreed prior to any public engagement to terms that require rezoning approval to include the densities in significant excess of the OCP maximums for properties outside the scope of the actual fire hall building.

Comments and concerns expressed at the public meeting include:

Several concerns were expressed regarding providing institutional uses allowable under the
proposed zoning; including Homeless Shelters, Shooting Galleries, Needle Exchanges, Drug and
Alcohol Treatment or prisons. It was questioned why an institutional use will be applied to the
entire site. Guarantees were requested that rezoning for institutional uses be restricted to only

the Fire Hall portion of the site. The applicant represented that in order to accommodate the Fire Hall the entire site had to be rezoned to include institutional use.

- There were concerns expressed by a great many attendees regarding the impacts on livability caused by the excessive construction noise that will be produced by this site over a period of many years (and other sites in Harris Green) and the continuing disregard of the Noise Bylaw by contractors and lack of response by Bylaw Enforcement or adequate penalties to dissuade such activities.
- The potential for noise from the emergency vehicles themselves and why the Fire Hall would be located in the most densely populated neighbourhood of the City were also common concerns.
- The lack of open or green space was a recurring concern mentioned by several attendees with general consensus from the room. The excess density, the massive nature of the proposed zerosetback streetwall and the apparent lack of planning or commitment for the future phases were common themes.
- There have been no amenities provided to the Harris Green neighbourhood with the massive amount of development approved to date and there appears to be little amenity value provided by this development apart from the possibility of including a pocket park somewhere within the 7200m² property.
- Concerns expressed regarding the height of the proposed building and the blockage of light by the proposal on adjacent existing buildings. The applicant did not provide a shadow study at the CALUC meeting.
- It was confirmed by Planning Staff that the transfer of theoretical density entitlements from an R-48 zone to another separate parcel was unprecedented.
- Concerns were expressed whether it was appropriate to house children above a Fire Hall.
- Midblock crosswalks have caused serious problems with antisocial behaviour and public safety with no support from the police. There were concerns how a midblock walkway would be designed and managed on this site.
- There were concerns expressed regarding the Planning Department entertaining a theoretical density for the R-48 lands calculated at 8.8:1 when there is no built example of this being achieved over FSR 5:1 within the 10 storey limit of that zone.

A more comprehensive record of comments raised by the public at the CALUC meeting is included in the attached Minutes. While members of the public expressed appreciation for the services that Pacifica Housing provides to the city, no member of the public spoke out in favour of the proposal at the public meeting. Two emails were received by the DRA after the CALUC meeting from members of the business community expressing support for the proposal.

Review and response to the application by Land Use Committee Members:

- Was Council aware of the Contract Requirements for excessive density? Council has entered into a contract for the Fire Hall that included, as part of the contract, Council approval of density entitlements significantly in excess of the current OCP maximums on lands that have no direct association or need for approval concurrently with the Fire Hall site. This Council decision was made in camera and calls into question whether Council was aware of all the facts at the time. The applicant has continually resisted any attempt to sequester the Fire Hall site from the rest of the application and Council appears now bound by the terms of the contract which includes approval of this rezoning for the entirety of the 7200m² lands. This is cause for significant concern.
- **R-48 Zone-"Theoretical Density".** The R-48 Zone was originally created as a City-led initiative to incentivize downtown residential development in the 1990s which gifted extremely generous entitlements for density to all parking lot owners in Harris Green at the time. This has since become a windfall for the property owners who contributed nothing to the community in exchange. The R-48 Zone was poorly written and recent changes to the DCAP height guidelines has been exploited by applicants by promoting the concept of "theoretical density entitlement calculations" under "as-of-right" Development Permit with Variance applications. This simple

process then allows buildings to be constructed that far exceed the original intent of the bylaw and the density limits currently set by the OCP as-of-right. In this case, the applicant has calculated an extraordinary "theoretical density entitlement" of 8.8:1 on its R-48 zoned portion of the property and approval by Council of this unchallenged density calculation forms nonnegotiable terms of the contract for the Fire Hall. A historical inventory conducted by the DRA of built examples of R-48 properties clearly shows that no buildings have been constructed at densities over 5:1 when the 10 storey height limit in the bylaw was respected. Consideration by staff and Council of these "theoretical" densities makes a mockery of the OCP and the R-48 bylaws original intent.

- No Legal Right to Transfer Density Entitlements to a different property. Regardless of the
 argument of the amount of density the applicant perceives they are entitled to, it is a fact that
 the density entitlement for the R-48 lands applies <u>only</u> to the property that carries that zoning
 and is not legally "transferable". While Council may have the discretion to allow this density
 transfer to take place, it will be unprecedented and we suggest that it would be highly
 inappropriate to do so.
- Rezoning the entire site vs Fire Hall alone. The applicant stated at the public meeting that the entire site has to be rezoned as one because the lands contain many parcels and a portion of the Fire Hall straddles the existing parcel and zoning boundaries and so the institutional use would be required to cover the entire site. This is simply not true, as nothing prohibits the Fire Hall site and the corresponding institutional use be rezoned in isolation. The only purpose for rezoning the entire site is to facilitate the transfer of unsubstantiated density rights from the Fire Hall site to a completely separate property that currently has no such rights.
- R-48 Change of use precludes existing zoning entitlements. The applicant is seeking a different use for this project and is rezoning to a different zone from R-48. The applicant has no legal "right" to carry forward density entitlements permitted by the current R-48 zone when it aspires to add an additional use necessitating a rezoning. DCAP also reiterates the reality of "use it or lose it" in section 4.17 stating that this property will now be subject to provisions of the density bonus system "as the property owner seeks to rezone the property to a different zone".
- Density inappropriate for the Local Area. In terms of scale, the application is 36% more dense (larger) than 1515 Douglas Street (at FSR 5:1) located right across from City Hall or the Hudson District (FSR 5.1:1). The proposed density of 6.8:1 across the site is also misleading. Due to the post-disaster restrictions on the Fire Hall, the remaining two thirds of the site fronting Cook and Yates Street will actually be built to a density of approximately 7.3:1; which is very unlikely to be achieved within the 15 and 17 storey heights referenced. Other sites of this density such as "Yates on Yates" or the "Hudson Place 1" required heights in excess of 20 stories to achieve these densities.
- **Pre-zoning in advance of a Complete Design.** The applicant has represented that this is a "Master Planned Development" but has produced little planning for the two thirds of the site that would receive a massive density entitlement almost 50% greater than the current (and already generous) OCP maximums. The lack of corresponding development permit drawings to confirm that construction of the project is even possible as it is pictured by this proposal is problematic. The densities included in this application may well require over 20 stories to be realized and will likely be obtained under "as-of-right" applications in the future. A process that grants a rezoning without corresponding fully-vetted development permitting plans should not be entertained by Council for <u>any</u> application.
- Noise and Livability. The placement of a Fire Hall and the corresponding disruption of the densest residential neighbourhood in the city when alternatives exist elsewhere appear counterintuitive. The addition of the Ambulance Emergency Bays will severely compound this issue; substantially increasing the frequency of nuisance noise that will be caused by such a concentration of emergency vehicles in this dense residential neighbourhood.
- DCAP Design Guidelines Significantly Exceeded on Fire Hall Building. The maximum floor plate sizes in the upper stories prescribed by DCAP in Appendix 6 appear to be significantly exceeded. Floor plate dimensions for the Fire Hall building appear very similar to those of View Towers. The result is a building much too massive in its upper portions presenting a monolith to its several

immediate neighbours to the north. Floor plate limits appear to be exceeded by approximately 30% between the 20m to 30m height (Floors 6, 7, 8) and by over 80% over the 30m height (floors 9, 10, 11). Side yard setback requirements appear to have also not been met. Minimum clearances of 6.0m to property lines at above 30m height have been reduced by over 50%. There are no guarantees that buildings shown in massing diagrams for other areas of the site comply with DCAP. It is essential that all applicants comply with DCAP Design Guidelines, especially when the City itself is a conflicted participant.

- CACs. Rezoning this huge property at this time will also allow the applicant to avoid reasonable Community Amenity Contributions. The current CAC structure is under review and will likely yield significantly higher contribution levels for amenities. Approval of the entire site now will forgo all but a pittance.
- OCP. The DRA has a policy not to support OCP amendments without a compelling rationale to do so. There appears no evidence (let alone compelling) to support this application under the proposed density and use.

The provision of a post-disaster Fire Hall and a modicum of affordable housing at a fixed cost is indisputably a desirable outcome. This aspect is being well promoted by the applicant; in what appears to be an expertly orchestrated strategy to leverage approval to gain a windfall density entitlement on the remaining two-thirds of the site. Closer examination reveals this is not an exchange of equal value for the public.

The City is a conflicted partner in this development and Council needs to recognize it is afoul of its own commitment to transparency and public process and its ethical obligation to support and respect its own foundational planning documents. The signing of the contract for this Fire Hall was made by the previous Council without any public knowledge or assent and has locked the City into terms that are highly questionable. The public is invited to participate as an afterthought but is told that the deal has been struck; it's this or nothing. But we propose this is a false choice and that this application is not the only way forward. We ask our new Council to consider themselves not bound by the terms of this contract as written.

There are many bad precedents that we would like to avoid setting here, but the main one is, regardless of motivation, that we must not find ourselves corrupting the planning and approval process to the detriment of the public, especially when we need a public building constructed.

CALUC Meeting Minutes - Firehall/Pacific Mazda - July 31, 2018

Presentation: David Jawl-Jawl Residential

Property owned for around 50 years by Nadar Holdings and the Pollen family. City of Victoria's call for proposals to replace Fire Hall #1 precipitated the proposed development. The Firehall is only part of a multiphase mixed use master planned development. The first phase will include the fire hall with residential rental units over with "some if not all" of the units as some form of affordable rental administered by Pacifica Housing.

Agreement was signed in March of this year and engagement with neighbours and the DRA commenced to obtain feedback regarding the proposed development.

HCMA Architects:

The City of Victoria's guiding documents for planning in the local area are the OCP and DCAP. The current zoning is R-48 and S-1. Key items they are pulling out of the OCP "encourage the logical assembly of development sites that enable the best realization of permitted potential land management and development for the area" "there are benefits in pulling it all together into one comprehensive development rather than dealing with individual smaller parcels "and "site specific amendments that are consistent with the urban place designation "Core Residential".

The OCP also identifies the need for a new Fire hall.

DCAP is about guiding the design of a neighbourhood so we end up with a vibrant friendly pedestrian neighbourhood. In terms of building height DCAP prescribes a tapering off of building height from Harris Green to this site which is the edge of Downtown of 15 storeys at Cook Street.

Density Bonus applies to this site by allowing extra height to achieve bonus density.

The R-48 zone does not have a specific density but there are other ways of defining it with height and setbacks. That is not necessarily the building that you would build but it provides you with the density. Combined with the allowable density from the OCP provides an overall site density of 6.8:1. That is the base density based on regulations. No parking is required by R-48.

Harris Green is the part of the City that has the most development and population growth in the downtown core. There is a large consensus that the newer projects by and large are quite OK with a tower and podium. This project proposes a lifted podium with an overhang. Growing the podium together makes for more slender towers.

Post disaster design for the fire hall limits its height to around 11 storeys. We struggled with this to keep it within DCAP.

Fire hall Specific:

Parking is underground. BC Ambulance Service will share this building with 2 dedicated bays. Fire hall will be 6 bays. R-48 zone doesn't require parking but there will be 117 parking stalls.

Q and A:

Local Resident: With the new institutional uses proposed will there be a homeless shelter, needle exchange or shooting gallery, there will be opposition we would like guaranteed assurances in writing that these uses won't be contemplated.

A: The housing is intended to be affordable not supportive. Pacifica will be managing the affordable housing component.

Local Resident: Concerned about the institutional use stated on the form distributed as it will apply to the entire site. This use includes carehomes classes A,B,C. Class A includes people who are lawfully detained as prisoners. Class B includes facilities for the treatment of alcohol and drug addiction. Class C includes critical mental health patients. The residents of the local neighbourhood need clarification and a declaration that these uses will not be permitted on this site.

A; The institutional use will be applied to the whole property and it would be difficult to lock it off to one part of the property

Local Resident: But you can isolate the institutional use to the part of the site that contains the fire hall.

A: We hear your concerns and will take them under consideration with our discussions with the city

Local Resident: I am a Johnson Street resident concerned about the disturbance from fire and ambulances. I work at night and will likely have to sell my property and leave the area. The cumulative effects of all the development going on in the immediate area are going to be unbearable. The sound of sirens echoes badly through the tall buildings and will be worse with more buildings. The new shooting gallery will even make it worse with more emergency vehicles attending.

Q:When do the trucks turn their sirens on? A:You won't hear a siren until the trucks reach the corner

Local Resident: I'd like to find some Green space and parks that are useable not littered with used needles. We have 9 buildings under construction within 3 blocks with 8 more proposed. We have 11 that are 13 storeys or more. The architect stated that they are working within the permitted development density. That is not true. We also have not seen any amenities in the Harris Green area from all this development.

Local Resident: I live across the street. Sounds like the relocation of the fire hall is already approved?

A: It is approved subject to rezoning

Local Resident: Is there a reason why it cant remain in its current location? A: It would be cost prohibitive to get a post disaster rating on the existing site

Local Resident: I live across the street. The maximum height currently allowed on the S-1 site is 15m?

A: It will require rezoning but 15 stories is within the DCAP for this area.

Local Resident: We applaud the work that Pacifica housing does to provide affordable housing. The current R-48 zoning allows only 10 stories and you are proposing 17 and that difference makes a big impact on light coming into the street and light into the neighbouring buildings. Local residents are not compensated in any way for having to put up with blasting, building , blockage of sidewalks and streets. We are told that it's temporary but its not and I don't see my taxes going down and we get no compensation from Campbell or Farmer. Construction people don't abide by the bylaws for hours of operation. *Applause*.

Local Resident: There is a rep from Pacifica Housing here? Can we have some info on the rental units?

John Luton Pacifica Housing: This is an opportunity aimed at providing affordable housing for low and moderate income individuals. This is not supportive housing but rent geared to income. We are working with CMHC to try and make the entire building affordable for workers in local industries in the city such as tourism to live in the city.

Local Resident: There is a density transfer proposed from the R-48 to the S-1 can you explain? A: DCAP is the guiding tool for development and on one portion of the site it calls for 17 stories and on the other 15 stories. The firehall building has height limitations due to the post disaster requirements. We are looking not to loose any density and distribute it in a way that meets the DCAP. Nothing planned is taller or does not meet the building separations in DCAP.

Q: Has this ever happened before?

Alison Meyer COV Planner: As far as density transfer I am not certain but density has been apportioned around specifics sites such as the Hudson.

Q: Can you explain R-48 zoning?

Alison Meyer COV Planner: R-48 originated about 20 years ago. It has no parking or floor space ratio requirements but has a height limit of 10 stories. Theoretical density has been calculated by applying the setbacks and height and creating an allowable floor plate from which densities can be calculated.

Q: what are the different ratios here?

Alison Meyer COV Planner: The developers have figured out the R-48 at 8.8 to 1 and the S-1 is 1.5 to 1 $\,$

Q: And all R-48 have achieved these densities?

Alison Meyer COV Planner: The newest ones have achieved these higher densities.

CALUC Chair: The Mondrian across the street achieved 4.8:1 and the Jukebox on View achieved 4.4:1 sticking to the 10 storey height maximum.

Local Resident: This is a phased development. Do you have rough timelines on the entire buildout?

A: Right now the plan is for a 4 phase development the first being the fire hall building. There is no specific timeline for the balance of the site. One of the benefits of pre-zoning the site will be to be able to move quickly with construction of subsequent phases.

Local Resident: I live opposite this development. How many years of construction am I facing? A: The fire hall phase will take anywhere from 24 to 30 months. This project could take 5 to 7 years before it is complete. Local Resident: Is living above a fire hall a suitable environment for children? Where are the kids going to play

A: There are many examples of families living adjacent to fire halls. There is an outdoor area on level 4 that can accommodate children's activities.

Q: So I'm not going to hear sirens going down Yates all the time?

A: Yes you may still hear them on Yates

Q: Green space. I live at 1020 View and everyone admires our green space. Where is the green space in this project? You show a little corner of the site and that's it, and parking? A: We intend to accommodate city parking regulation schedule C for this project. As far as green space is concerned we are providing a significant cutout on the corner. There is significant green space on top of the podium which belongs to the users of the buildings.

Local Resident: What we are seeing in this whole area is buildings built right to the sidewalk and only stepping back after 3 or so storeys. What the pedestrians experience is a concrete jungle. This is like Vancouver and not what Victoria has been about. There seems a policy to cram more and more buildings in no green space and parking is going to be insane. We can't keep putting more and more people in here without adequate parking or adequate green space. *Applause* A: We are trying to pull the building up and back and provide an overhang. Q: We do not see any thought being put into amenities for the public just cramming more and more density into our area

Local Resident: I live right next door. I feel I'm part of a social experiment to see how much noise and disruption I can take before I'm pushed out of this area. The people in this room will be subject to 5 to 7 years of disruption and we get no benefit from this, we get more aggravation, noise, and traffic disruption. Even when this is done then it will then be the other side of the street and 30 years go by with it never ending. *Applause*

Local Resident: Affordable housing is supportable but will it change after a few years to something else like air bnb or hostel use.

A: No Pacifica housing will run this, or a portion thereof, as affordable rental housing only.

Local Resident: When our building was constructed the City required a significant portion of green space. Do you think what is proposed reflects the name of the community Harris Green? Do you have a midblock crosswalk? There are major safety problems with midblock walkways A: Community amenities will be contributed as per city requirements. There are bad midblock walkways and good ones. They work well when there is a series of them across several blocks but that doesn't exist here.

LUC Member: We see that there has been a theoretical calculation of density for the R-48 part of the site that is to be transferred to another part of the site. The level of density that has been calculated cannot be built. Other R-48 buildings in the local area that have been built that stayed within the 10 storey limit managed an FSR of about 5:1. This application is claiming density rights of 8.8:1 on the R-48 which they want to move to a different property. This is what happens when you let the developers do the math, and that's their role, they are trying to maximize density, and it's our role to try and catch it. What I'd like everybody to acknowledge is there is a lot of pushback in the room around livability and green space and I would quibble with their math and question why the city is allowing developers to apply calculations of this type. *Applause*

Local Resident: My comment is to the city staff. The developers do what they need to do but the city should be looking after us. My question is why there is so much is given away with so little in return. *Applause*

Local Resident: Was your application for the fire hall contingent on rezoning approval for the entire site not just the fire hall? Will the property be amalgamated or will the lots be kept separate and possibly sold off separately? If the lots are kept separate nothing is stopping you from selling to another developer who will do something entirely different from what you propose here with the new density entitlements

A: We have to rezone the whole property as one. The fire hall straddles I believe 5 lots so the whole property needs to be rezoned. We will subdivide the fire hall parcel off as one parcel. We want to set the development up for future phases. We have a long track record of doing development work in the City of Victoria and it is our plan to develop this site.

Local Resident: We will be subject to more noise and more traffic. I have a friend who lives next to the existing Fire hall and before the truck leaves the bay its already sounded its siren. What is the wisdom of putting the fire hall on a one way street? Cook street has two directions. I'm just sorry this is happening.

Local Resident: Just complimenting the developer being open to coming and providing answers and facing criticism. It sounds like there is a willingness to work with the community which I appreciate. My comments are actually directed at the City representatives here tonight and that they are actually hearing the community and the crap we have to deal with. We would like to be respected as taxpayers and that they understand the community wants noise and traffic bylaws enforced and particularly that we want of green space. We want the City to be listening tonight. *Applause*

Local Resident: My comment is also to the city. Talking about all the housing that we need to provide we also need to provide the amenities that go along with the housing like schools, medical services offices and green space.

Local Resident: This is a message to City representatives. Projects like this can come with many unknowns. If locals find out that there is a hidden agenda around the institutional use such as treatment centers, homeless shelters, shooting galleries etc there will be massive pushback from the local residents.

Local Resident: There are also 5 and six storey buildings in this 3 block area. Harris Green is not getting the amenities that they should. I think we can feel safe with Pacifica Housing and Jawl but this site is proposing a much higher density but we don't seem to be getting anything for it.

Local Resident: Thank you Chief you and your workers deserve the best and thank you for your service. *Applause* As far as the rest of it build the fire hall build the facilities not the buildings and more green space *Applause*

LUC Chair: Just like to make a comment regarding the R-48 Properties and the proposed theoretical 8.8:1 density, and that this density could not actually be built on that site. If you look at all of the other R-48 properties that have been constructed to date in the city, all of them except for one have come in under the OCP maximums for this area at 5.5:1 or lower. This one is about 25% more dense than any other R-48 property built to date. Other developers have come forward with these theoretical densities but this is the highest we have ever seen

Local Resident: Can you tell us what R-48 means?

LUC Chair: R-48 was a zoning that was created back in 1997 by the Council of the day to stimulate residential construction Downtown. It was meant to create 10 storey buildings with residential capacity but it turns out the bylaw wasn't very well written because no one thought to write a maximum density into it. Ten years ago no one would have considered building a building taller than 10 stories in Victoria but that has changed but the R-48 zoning stayed the same so now rather than being restricted to building a building only 10 stories high developers have applied for height variances to increase the buildable area. The building across the street the Mondrian is pretty much the example of what an R-48 building built to the original intent of 10 stories would be. It is 10 stories high and 4.8:1 density. I think the R-48 zone is problematic the way it was written.

Applicant: Yelling at whoever made the R-48 zone 20 years ago is a futile experiment. The zoning exists and the density is there to facilitate housing to provide residential housing and that was the purpose of the zoning to begin with. The Yates on Yates went forward last year with DRA support and had a theoretical density of 7.57:1 and went through at 7.4:1 so we are not the first to break this mould. We are trying to bring forward a representative density to the entitlement that we have. We will take the feedback we heard tonight under consideration.

Pacifica Housing Advisory Association (Pacifica) has recently entered into a purchase and sale agreement with Dalmatian Developments Limited Partnership by its general partner Dalmatian Developments GP Ltd. (Dalmatian), to purchase 130 units of affordable housing at 1025 Johnson Street in Victoria's downtown. Pacifica is excited to be partnering with BC Housing Management Commission, under the Community Housing Fund, to provide deep affordability to our tenants. The units will be located above the City of Victoria's new Firehall No. 1, which requires that the building be constructed to post-disaster standards, which has increased the construction costs. Due to these higher construction costs, Pacifica is seeking to partner with the City of Victoria through its Housing Reserve Fund and through a 10-year property tax holiday. By providing an equity contribution of \$1.12M and ongoing tax holiday, this will reduce the amount of operational subsidy required, or to deepen affordability. Pacifica is planning on offering rents between 27-78% below private market rents, with the following rental structure and unit mix. This unit mix is subject to fluctuations as the project proceeds through BC Housing approval process.

3.4 Development Permit Application No. 000536 and Rezoning Application No. 00660 for 1025-1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street

The City is considering a Rezoning and Development Permit Application and Official Community Plan Amendment to construct a twelve-storey mixed-use fire hall building, a fifteen-storey mixed-use building and a seventeen-storey mixed-use building.

Applicant meeting attendees:

Mr. Betanzo provided the Panel with a brief introduction of the application and the areas that staff is seeking advice on, including the following:

- the overall massing and distribution of density in terms of access to light, liveability, and building separation distances
- the massing as it relates to the floor plate size of the residential portion of the nonmarket housing above the fire hall
- the podium portion of the fire hall building along Johnson Street
- the pedestrian experience, specifically along Johnson Street in front of the fire hall, and generally along all three streets at the perimeter of the subject properties
- the provision of green and open space.

Mr. Jawl, Mr. Rupp and Mr. Fawkes provided the Panel with a detailed presentation of the site and context of the proposal.

Questions of clarification were asked by the Panel on the following:

- what is the rationale for the 1.5m setback?
 - this setback was determined through neighbourhood consultation and provides more space within the public realm and more options for potential tenants
- is the City involved in further defining the dedicated urban plaza?
 - at this stage, the location has not been determined but it will be included within the new site-specific zone to increase green space
 - the plaza would be private property
- how many phases does the development include?
 - there will be four phases, starting with Cook and Johnson Streets then moving to Yates and Cook Streets
- is there any requirement for a mid-block crosswalk?
 - Mr. Betanzo noted that a mid-block crossing is not required through policy, but that applicants are welcome to propose one

- what is the intention for the wide truck apron outside the fire hall? Is this space meant to be animated, or to encourage lingering?
 - the apron is designed as a small plaza, providing integrated public art for the project
 - it is intended to be interesting to look at while going past the site, but not so interesting as to need further exploration
- what density and building separation distances are envisioned for the entire site?
 - the separation distances outlined in the Downtown Core Area Plan have been used to illustrate some concepts for the entire site
 - some of the other buildings may come as close as 20m from the fire hall, but the precise distances have not yet been determined
 - the distances can be increased to ensure liveability, and the concepts illustrated demonstrate that this can be achieved
- how does the site's overall density compare to the requirements in the Official Community Plan (OCP)?
 - Mr. Betanzo noted that the OCP specifies a range of densities from 3:1 to 5.5:1 FSR, and that the proposal includes an amendment to the OCP to allow a density of 6.8:1 FSR
- how will noise from the fire hall be mitigated?
 - there is not significant noise at fire hall itself; noise is managed pre-emptively through the traffic light manipulation, and sirens are not turned on inside the bays
 - fire hall staff will continue to be good neighbours as they move closer to the downtown core
 - o any noise from the site is not worse than other downtown locations
- will the six bays house six fire trucks?
 - there are several types of vehicles including ATVs
- do the trucks have to manoeuver within bays?
 - the vehicles regularly on call are kept at the front of the bays, and seasonal vehicles and ATVs are kept towards the back
- will fire and ambulances have to back into the bays?
 - the apron allows trucks to back in
- if funding cannot be sourced for the housing component above the fire hall, will the units be rentals?
 - o in that event, affordable housing would be reconsidered
 - an agreement for social housing is already in place and is only awaiting funding from upper levels of government
 - o the goal is to deliver 130 homes above the fire hall
- can the fire hall be pushed further towards the front setback to increase the distance towards other buildings on the site?
 - the fire hall has been located as far northwards as possible without exposing the core to exterior
 - the cores cannot move, as they provide just enough width for the emergency service bays; there is not a millimetre to spare
- what is the rationale behind not having the tallest building at the corner?
 - higher towers were considered, but it did not meet City policies and did not look right in context
 - the goal is to emphasize the corners, but this can be done in ways other than increasing height

- how specific are the requirements for the new zone?
 - Mr. Betanzo clarified that the height, density and general distribution will be outlined in the new zone, and further development applications will specify the particular buildings' designs.

Panel members discussed:

- the emergency services building as a well-composed, simple and elegant solution to a number of urban components
- appreciation for the concept of urban integration
- concern for the coexistence of fire, ambulance and residential services
- the floorplate of the apartment being appropriate given its location above a larger structure and for the type of development
- the housing component's playful but sterile feel; however, the starkness working within the context
- opportunity to include more outdoor spaces and patios for residents above the fire hall
- desire for further information such as sustainability objectives
- concern that the common spaces will not be used, and that a level of animation could be lost
- appreciation for the rhythm of fenestration and colour of the emergency services and residential building
- appreciation for the glass bar above the emergency services portion of the building, helping to signify entrances and residential uses

Justin Gammon left the meeting at 4:32pm.

- concern for the master planning of the pedestrian realm
- the need to consider the provision of a mid-block pedestrian connection to improve pedestrian circulation and animation of the site
- appreciation for the overall sensitivity to the public realm
- the proposal's success in providing a gateway experience, particularly around the south corner
- appreciation for the third concept provided which proposed a pedestrian plaza on the south side; this may provide a compromise if a mid-block pedestrian connection cannot be achieved
- opportunity for smaller breaks in the podium for the proposed pedestrian plaza
- cautioning against a triangular plaza design on the corner of Cook and Yates Streets, due to the difficulty in animating these spaces
- the need to avoid a heavy overhang with pillars within the public realm, for the benefit of the pedestrian experience
- opportunity to conduct a wind study to assist in evaluating the outdoor public spaces
- appreciation for the level of detail conceived in the master plan
- the overall distribution of massing, height and density is appropriate, and it is understood that each building will be evaluated on its own merits at the development permit stage
- · hesitancy in committing to the height without further information for the entire site
- the need for the site's landmark aspect to be the buildings' architectural significance rather than the public space aspect

- appreciation for the lightness and airiness of the concepts presented for the rezoning portion of the application
- desire for on-site storm water solutions to be examined over the entire site
- opportunity for public art and animation along Cook Street instead of at the truck bays.

G.P. Rollo & Associates (GPRA) has been retained by the City of Victoria to complete a Land Lift and Amenity Contribution Analysis for the proposed rezoning of 1025, 1029, and 1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street Victoria (the Site) from the current mix of Harris Green District Zone (R-48) and Limited Service District Zone (S-1) to the proposed new Zone by the Developer.

The purpose of the analysis is to estimate the land lift and amenity contribution on the site from an increase in density between the base density and the proposed development with an overall density of 6.8 FSR with 48,980 square metres of gross building area. The City of Victoria Density Bonus Policy (2016) and the OCP (2012) establish the criteria by which the base density is determined. The base density (as specified in Policy) would result in a maximum of 42,578 square metres of gross buildable area on the 7,200 square metre site. The City has also asked for GPRA to consider an additional land lift analysis that examined a potential lift between the proposed density and a base density determined after incorporating design guidelines and building heights up to the maximum within the R-48 Zone at the OCP base density of 3.0 FSR for the S-1 Zone Through this analysis, the base density would result in a gross buildable area of 33,810 square metres.

The Developer is also proposing 130 residential units be secured as Affordable Housing in perpetuity through a housing agreement. The City has also requested a new fire hall of roughly 3,880 square metres be built on the site which will be purchased by the City from the Developer, along with some compensation for off-site servicing, sidewalk improvements, equipment, and project management.

The analysis consisted of preparation of residual land value analyses which determines the maximum value that a developer could afford to pay for the Site, assuming it already had the new Zoning and the maximum value a developer could pay for the site if developed as permitted under the OCP with prevailing market conditions. GPRA has been asked to assess the value of the Site with the following potential uses:

- 1) Residential strata
- 2) Residential rental
- 3) Residential Affordable
- 4) Commercial retail uses;

GPRA used standard developer proformas for each case to model the economics of typical development as proposed/allowed under the each zoning scenario. The 'Lift' is then calculated as the difference in residual land values under both current zoning and the proposed new zoning/density.

METHODOLOGY & ASSUMPTIONS

The Site can be developed under the OCP Policies with up to 42,578 square metres of gross building area (GBA) for strata apartments (33,810 square metres with the lower base density allowance). The proposed new development would amount to approximately 48,980 square metres of GBA, comprised of 31,911 square metres (gross area) of strata apartments, 9,155 square metres (gross area) of residential rental (composed of 130 rental apartments to be secured as rental in perpetuity through a housing agreement), 4,034 square metres of commercial space, and 3,880 square metres for the fire hall. The developer has indicated that their intention is to dedicate the residential rental units as Affordable Housing.

The analyses are created using a standard developer proforma wherein estimates of revenues and costs are inputs and the remaining variable is the desired output. In typical proformas this output is usually profit, following a revenues minus costs equals profit formula.

For a residual land valuation, however, an assumption on developer's return needs to be included in order to leave the land value as the variable to solve for. For these analyses GPRA has determined the residual value based on the developer achieving an acceptable profit of 15% on total project costs (calculated as a representative portion of overall project costs for the proposed development) for the base analysis as a strata apartment building. For the rezoned rental apartment project a profit to project cost metric is not appropriate, as it would be difficult to support any land value and achieve a profit on cost when building in concrete materials and with rents at market rates. Instead, developers would typically look at the yield of ongoing revenue measured as an internal rate of return (IRR). GPRA has determined the residual land value for the rezoned property using a target IRR of 5.68%, reflective of current capitalization rates for rental apartments and commercial retail in the City (the 5.68% IRR is set at 1.5% points above the blended cap rates for rental at 4.0% and the cap rate for commercial at 5.25%). The residual values are the maximum supported land value a developer could pay for the site (under the density and conditions tested) while achieving an acceptable return for their project.

The residual land value determined from this analysis is then compared to the value of the site using the supported base density as determined by the OCP to establish a 'lift' in value that arises from the change in density. This lift in value is the total potential monies that are available for public amenities or other public works not considered as part of the analysis. GPRA have made allowances for streetscape and public realm improvements that would typically be incurred through development in both sets of analysis. Any additional improvements or Community Amenity Contributions required as a condition of the rezoning would impact the lift and would need to be identified, priced, and included in a revised analysis.

Typically there is some sharing of the lift value between the Municipality/District and the developer, but the percentage shared varies by community and by project. It is GPRA's

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understanding that in compliance with current policy, the City has determined that they will seek 75% of the lift for amenities.

GPRA determined strata revenues used in the base analysis from a review of recent sales and offerings for sale of recently developed apartments of concrete construction within roughly 10 km of the Site, with a focus on projects that were deemed comparable to that which could be developed at the Site. Rents for apartment units and commercial uses have also been drawn from a scan of projects with current listings in the area. For the Affordable Housing analysis the Developer has indicated they would follow BC Housing's guidelines wherein rental units would be split 30% for affordable market rental (\$1,211 max rent in 2018), 50% with rents geared to income (\$725 max rent in 2018), and 20% of units with a deep subsidy (\$455 max rent in 2018). Under a market rental scenario GPRA has utilized an average rent of \$1,795 per month.

Project costs were derived from sources deemed reliable, including information readily available from quantity surveyors on average hard construction costs in the City. Development or soft costs have been drawn from industry standards, and from the City's sources. All other assumptions have been derived from a review of the market and from other sources deemed reliable by GPRA.

CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

GPRA estimates that there is no lift from the proposed zoning for the entire site when 9,155 square metres (or 130 units) is devoted to either market rental or affordable housing as compared to a strata project at the base density as indicated in the OCP, in fact there is a drop in supported land value from the rental compared to the strata. When shifting to the Affordable Housing analysis the supported land value drops even further. As such, GPRA does not recommend the City seek an amenity contribution from this rezoning under these conditions.

I trust that our work will be of use in the City's determination of the Amenity Contribution they will seek as part of rezoning 1025, 1029, and 1031 Johnson Street and 1050 Yates Street, Victoria. I am available to discuss this further at your convenience.

I must submit my extreme objection to the above land use proposal. As a resident of 1026 John St for the past 20 years, I and my family have been subjected to a near non-stop assault on our senses daily with the many developments that have being going up in and around our block. Now this is apparently to continue with the building of a fire hall and ambulance station directly across the street. This will mean not only continued disturbance from the construction, but then the unremitting noise of emergency vehicle sirens for the entire rest of the time we continue to live in our home (and not only during the daytime but also now all night long, when construction is mercifully ceased).

I cannot help but feel that we are part of some kind of sinister social experiment in which people who choose to live downtown are subjected to an endless cacophony of noise and disruption just to see how long it will take to break us. Unfortunately for us, we are only renters and have been fortunate to have a landlord who has kept our rent low over the years, a lucky thing since we only have moderate incomes. We probably will not be able to afford to escape a future in which we never again get a good night's sleep.

The current location of the fire hall seems a much more reasonable location - across from a large school yard and with only minimal residential units around. I have no idea what the motivation is to build such a facility literally in the middle of a bunch of residential high rises, but I can certainly tell that the motivation was not the well-being of current residents.

I've lived on the 1000 block of Johnson in a 2 bedroom apartment for just over 10 years. Now my wife and I have a 2 year old toddler (this makes life very busy and it seems also impossible to get out to CALUC meetings and so I am very thankful I can send in an email to you!). I saw the letter from the DRA in response to the proposal (online copy link <u>here</u>) and I wanted to write in with my thoughts on the matter. I think there are a few valid concerns but many I don't fully agree with.


I am heartily in support of the proposal for 1025 Johnson street, firehall and all. In our apartment, we are exposed to traffic noise from yates and johnson and hear the fire engines all the time. It's what we expect living downtown. It is not really a problem now and I don't expect it to be when a firehall moves in on our block. We all, toddler included, sleep through fire engines all night long. On another note, there's lots of noise pollution from the Mazda dealership. Their PA system makes outdoor announcements all day long (on weekends too!) that we can hear from our apartment. I'm merely pointing out that the existing facility is not perfectly silent.

Where do I take my son to play? Franklin green (mason street) playground mostly but also the courthouse playground. But guess what? We have a blast walking all around the city, up and down stairs and ramps on the front of the buildings on our street and around town (like at the Atrium building) too. I don't think a playground is necessarily needed in the building itself as they tend to be too limited and not as useful as a larger more central one. (For that matter why not add a new large playground on Harris Green Lawn itself? (:) Otherwise, I think raising kids in a dense downtown area is fantastic as-is (and you don't need a playground in the building). But a large enough courtyard could be a lot of fun and used for many different purposes other than playing, too. Actually, I think a better courtyard space is far more useful than a green space at a street corner.

Here's a picture of the courtyard behind the Museum downtown with several food trucks. It's a great use of a courtyard. Can the building sit be designed so that food trucks can get in there? It offers a wonderful reason for people in the area to check out the space. Right now, in the area, a lonely Taco Justice food truck sits in the parking lot behind Wellburn's. It's not quite critical mass to draw people in.

Speaking of drawing people in, what better way to do this than connect the mid-block walkway to the Regents Park Tower walkway? (google street view link of what I am talking about <u>here</u>). I can see the lawn from where I live. Almost nobody ever uses that path or the lawn. I believe this is because the walkway goes nowhere - there's no reason to use it. It is also not clear if that is private property or not because of how it is designed and integrated into Regents Park (there are no shops along the path or anything indicating it's open to the public). With the Jukebox building with 200+ units finishing behind Regents Park, a mid-block walkway across yates would draw a lot of traffic to food trucks and coffee shops in this development's potentially bustling courtyard. The crosswalk right at the end of the walkway would help invite pedestrians to use the walkway through Regents Park (probably to the ire of some of the residents of course...).



RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Receive the Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy progress report for information;
- Direct staff to proceed with either Option 1 or Option 2 to inform the final stages of the policy work.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to present Council with progress on the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy that includes initial feedback from a working group meeting, and to seek direction on the final stages of policy work. The working group members, who range from tenant advocates to developers, have raised significant concerns with the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus policy. However, the group is committed to developing a policy solution that achieves Council's objectives of supporting the delivery of affordable housing units through the collection of community amenity contributions.

One of the key changes that working group participants have indicated should be considered is exploring a revised cash-in-lieu option. In light of this feedback, staff are seeking direction from Council to confirm the final phase of this work. Two options are provided for Council:

- 1) Explore policy solutions that include cash-in-lieu contributions in collaboration with the working group; or
- 2) Continue to advance the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus policy to focus community amenity contributions on achieving on-site affordable housing units.

Confirming this direction will help staff structure the next working group meeting on February 19.

With both options, staff will strive to deliver the policy by the March 31, 2019 date specified by Council. However, should Council choose Option 1, a limited amount of additional time would be needed for the consultant to update the fixed rates in the new policy to ensure the latest market changes are reflected.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with a progress report on the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy that includes initial feedback from a working group, and to seek direction on the final stages of policy work.

BACKGROUND

The Victoria Housing Strategy 2016-2025 identified the creation of an inclusionary housing and density bonus policy as a priority action item for 2016, and on October 27, 2016, Council approved the *City of Victoria Density Bonus Policy*, which utilized a fixed-rate community amenity contribution system for residential strata developments seeking bonus density. In July 2017, Council noted no on-site affordable housing had been achieved with this policy, and directed staff to replace the *Density Bonus Policy* with an inclusionary housing and density bonus policy to achieve on-site affordable housing units in new developments. On March 8, 2018, Council gave further direction on strategic approaches to consider for the new policy, and on September 6, 2018, Council received for consideration a draft policy.

Council directed staff to undertake further consultation on the draft policy, providing further clarification on November 8, 2018 that this should take the form of a working group consisting of rental housing advocates, non-market housing providers, community association land use committees, and members of the development community.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

The Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy working group was struck in December 2018, and consists of a range of stakeholders representing a diversity of interests. (See Table 1 below).

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The first meeting was held on January 23, 2019, and was facilitated by an independent facilitator, with information and analysis provided by Coriolis Consulting, and staff support provided from Community Planning, Development Services and Engagement. Due to a high level of interest and to support greater transparency and trust in the process, the first workshop was opened to several additional interested stakeholders who were able to observe the meeting and ask questions at set times. Staff advised participants that the objective of the working group was to receive feedback and informed suggestions for improving the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus policy.

Working Group Feedback

Overall, participants expressed concern with the draft policy. Some of the feedback received included:

- Participants did not feel that the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus policy offered the best approach for achieving the most affordable housing units, with the deepest level of affordability
- Cash-in-lieu community amenity contributions to affordable housing could produce more net new housing units, especially considering renewed funding commitments from senior levels of government
- Concern that the draft policy would see all amenity contributions go towards housing, with no community amenities for amenities that sustain city wide and neighbourhood level livability for current residents and future generations
- A desire to see a revised policy similar to the previous Density Bonus Policy (2016) that offers greater flexibility
- Cash-in-lieu contributions allocated to both affordable housing and other community amenities, including parks, recreational facilities as well as public realm and heritage improvements
- Concerns were expressed about how the affordable housing units would be managed and operated in strata buildings and expressed support for an affordable homeownership option in addition to affordable rental tenure option
- A desire to see the process slowed down to involve greater participation from impacted stakeholders to ensure a workable policy
- The development community needs to be seen as supporting the City's goals of affordability

Table 2 below outlines a summary of stakeholder feedback received thus far. A full engagement summary including all working group feedback will be included when staff return to Council with final policy options.

Non-Profit Housing Developers/providers	The City's capital contributions to new affordable housing developments through the Victoria Housing Reserve Fund will achieve more net new units with deeper levels of affordability compared to the small number of net new inclusionary units within market strata developments. The ability and interest of non profits to purchase, lease or manage inclusionary units in strata buildings is unclear and presents significant challenges.
Community Association Land Use Committees (CALUCs)	Cash-in-lieu Community Amenity Contributions (CACs) should be allocated to both affordable housing and other community amenities that preserve livability for residents and future generations, such as parks, public realm and heritage improvements. A desire to see a revised policy similar to the 2016 Density Bonus Policy that offers a more balanced allocation of CACs and does not sacrifice livability for a limited number of inclusionary units.
Developers	The inclusionary housing targets are too high, as costs have increased since the financial analysis was undertaken last spring, and as the land is sold in Victoria

	without taking into account the costs of community amenity contributions. The focus of affordable housing policy should be on neighbourhood inclusivity rather than on-site inclusionary unit in one building.
Community-at-Large	Bonus Density should be calculated from existing zoning not from OCP base density. The amount of community amenities collected with the previous policy has been limited and there should be more transparency about the process and methods of calculating bonus density.
Strata Association	The operation of rental units within strata developments is challenging.
Generation Squeeze	The City should pursue a policy that achieves the most amount of affordable housing overall, without sacrificing all other amenities that cities need.
TAPS	There is extreme hardship in the City that is felt by many who are not able to access adequate or affordable homes. The development community needs to be seen as contributing to affordability. The City cannot continue to build housing that the majority cannot afford. Cash-in-lieu is supportable if this creates more affordable units.

OPTIONS & IMPACTS

Staff are seeking clarity from Council on next steps to determine if the policy work should continue to focus solely on achieving on-site affordable housing units, or whether Council is open to exploring cash-in-lieu opportunities per working group feedback. The following options are provided for Council's consideration:

Option 1:

That Council direct staff to explore cash-in-lieu density bonus approaches as part of ongoing work with the Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy working group, report back to Council by March 31, 2019 and allocate \$30,000 as part of the 2019 Financial Plan to ensure the policy reflects current market conditions.

This option acknowledges the concerns of the working group by allowing for an exploration of cashin-lieu amenity contributions.

Should Council choose to explore a policy that is based on cash-in-lieu, staff could return with the policy by March 31, but would need a limited amount of additional time and funds for the consulting land economist to update fixed rates to reflect current market conditions since this work was initially completed in 2016.

Option 2:

That Council direct staff to continue to focus community amenity contributions towards onsite affordable housing units by progressing the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy with final policy wording by March 31, 2019.

While the working group raised concern with this approach, if this remains Council's preferred approach staff will continue to develop this policy with the working group.

Accessibility Impact Statement

There are no immediate accessibility impacts associated with this report.

2015 – 2018 Strategic Plan

This report supports Objective 6: Make Victoria More Affordable by revisiting a 2015 action to "look at zoning, bylaws, and specifically inclusionary zoning."

Impacts to Financial Plan

Council allocated budget to support this ongoing consultation as part of the 2018 budget process. During Council's Special Committee of the Whole meeting of February 4, 2019 at which Council considered the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan and 2019 Draft Financial Plan, Council requested that staff advise how much budget has been spent on the Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus policy initiative. To date, \$79,000 has been spent which included the following work:

- Financial Analysis Report that included inclusionary housing targets within and outside of the Downtown Core Area and assessment of multiple case study sites throughout the city to determine targets
- Financial analysis of calculating community amenity contributions from existing zoning vs base density in the Official Community Plan
- Multiple stakeholder workshops including:
 - Urban Development Institute (2 workshops)
 - o COTW presentation
 - o Working group meeting including presentation

Should Council with to proceed with Option 1 to explore a refined cash-in-lieu system, an additional \$30,000 will be required to update the fixed rates.

Official Community Plan Consistency Statement

This ongoing initiative is consistent with the Official Community Plan which identifies opportunities for bonus density and encourages affordable housing.

CONCLUSIONS

Consultation on the draft Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus policy has revealed significant concerns for the inclusionary housing approach, as well as support for exploring a refined cash-inlieu system for achieving more affordable housing in Victoria. Staff are seeking direction from Council on how to proceed so final policy wording can be delivered by March 31, 2019.

RECOMMENDATION

That this matter be risen and reported on by way of a staff report to the February 14, 2019 Committee of the Whole meeting to consider the following:

- That Council, under the authority provided in Section 73 of the Community Charter, declare the building (the "Building") located at 1176 Yates Street on lands legally described as Lot 1 Plan 740 Section SR Victoria (the "Lands"), to be in an unsafe condition and creates a hazard to the public that requires remedial action to demolish and remove it from the Lands;
- 2. That Council, under the authority of Section 74 of the *Community Charter*, declare the Building located on the Lands as being in a condition so dilapidated and unclean that it is offensive to the community and declare it a "nuisance" that requires remedial action to remove and/or demolish the Building;
- **3.** That Council, under the authority of Section 72 of the *Community Charter*, impose the remedial action requirements as set out in Schedule A to this Report (see attached);
- 4. That Council authorize Staff to take all appropriate actions in accordance with Section 17 of the *Community Charter* to ensure the Building and Lands are brought into compliance with the remedial action detailed in Schedule A subject to the following:
 - a. The property owner has not fully complied with the remedial action order on or before the compliance date specified in this Council Resolution; and
 - b. That all costs incurred by the City of Victoria to bring the property into compliance shall be at the expense of the property owner and, as per Section 17 of the Community Charter, these costs shall be treated as a debt owed to the City of Victoria;
- 5. That Council set the time limit for compliance with the remedial action detailed in Schedule A at 60 days commencing February 14, 2019;
- 6. That Council set the time limit for a notice of a request for Council to reconsider the remedial action requirements detailed in Schedule A at 60 days, commencing February 14, 2019.

7. That, in the event of non-compliance by the owner, Council authorize the City Solicitor, at his discretion, to initiate legal proceedings to enforce compliance with this remedial action requirement, including prosecution or proceedings seeking injunctive relief.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The property at 1176 Yates Street has been the subject of bylaw enforcement action related to the provisions of the City's *Property Maintenance Bylaw* and *Abandoned Properties Bylaw* on an ongoing basis for the last 15 years. In addition, other City resources including Police and Fire are continually being called upon to manage incidents directly related to the derelict condition of this property, and the criminal and nuisance activity that it attracts.

Occupancy of this residential building was revoked and the structure posted unsafe to occupy in 2003 after an inspection revealed that unpermitted demolition work in the basement, involving the cutting of weight bearing beams and the undermining of weight bearing posts, had severely compromised the structural integrity of the building. The condition of the building has been in steady decline ever since as the property owner has done nothing to address the unpermitted work and restore occupancy.

The *Community Charter* provides Council the authority to order remedial action if the Council consider that the structure is in or creates an unsafe condition. The *Community Charter* also provides Council the authority to declare a Building on private property, including structures that are so dilapidated or unclean as to be offensive to the community, to be a "nuisance" and impose remedial action requirements, including the removal or demolition of a building.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to advise Council that the property located at 1176 Yates Street is in an unsafe and unclean condition which poses a significant safety hazard to the community; and seek Council's authorization to impose a Remedial Action Requirement on the property to remove the unsafe and unclean conditions by demolishing the building. Staff is also seeking Council's approval to proceed with the remedial action on the property if the property owner does not comply as directed within the time limit set by Council.

BACKGROUND

Section 72 of the *Community Charter* allows Council to impose remedial action requirements in relation to:

- a) matters or things referred to in Section 73 (hazardous conditions), or
- b) matters or things referred to in Section 74 (declared nuisances).

In the case of matters or things referred to in Section 73 or 74 a remedial action requirement may require the owner or occupier of the land to:

- a) remove or demolish the matter or thing,
- b) fill it in, cover it over or alter it,

- c) bring it up to a standard specified by bylaw, or
- d) otherwise deal with it in accordance with the directions of council or a person authorized by Council.

Section 73(2) of the *Community Charter* allows Council to impose remedial action requirements under Section 73(1) (*hazardous conditions*) if

- a) the Council considers that the matter or thing is in or creates an unsafe condition, or
- b) the matter or thing contravenes the Provincial building regulations or a bylaw under section 8 (3)(1) (spheres of authority – buildings and other structures) or Division 8 (Building Regulation) of this part.

Section 74 of the *Community Charter* allows Council to declare that any of the following is a "nuisance" and may impose a remedial action requirement in relation to the declared nuisance:

1. a building or other structure, an erection of any kind, or a similar matter or thing.

This applies in relation to a thing that Council considers so dilapidated or unclean as to be offensive to the community.

Section 76 of the *Community Charter* stipulates that the minimum time period that Council may set for compliance with a remedial action order must not be less than 30 days from the date of the notice to the owner. Section 78 allows the owner to request that Council reconsider its decision to impose remedial action and an opportunity to make representations directly to Council, provided such request is received within 14 days from the date of the notice.

Section 79 grants Council the authority to reduce the time limits stated in Sections 76 and 78 if Council considers that there is a significant risk to health or safety if action is not taken earlier.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

This property is zoned R3-1 and the approved use of the structure is 17 light house-keeping units. The structure was posted "unsafe to occupy" in 2003 after an inspection by City staff revealed that substantial demolition work in the basement, involving the cutting of weight bearing beams and the undermining of weight bearing posts, had severely compromised the structural integrity of the building. The structure was fully tenanted at the time and due to the safety concerns those tenants had to be displaced. The property owner was given written direction to obtain the permits necessary to correct the deficiencies (see Schedule B and C).

To date the owner has taken no action to repair the structure and return it to a state where it can be occupied. Instead, the structure has remained vacant for the last 15 years and the unsafe conditions have only deteriorated further. The City receives public complaints regarding this property on a regular basis, and as a result, City resources are continually being called upon to manage incidents directly related to the derelict condition of this property, and the criminal and nuisance activity that it attracts (see Schedule D). Records show numerous Bylaw, Fire, and Police calls for service at this address, including 2 fires. Information provided by the Victoria Police show 24 calls for service in the last 2 years alone related to unwanted persons, drug use, break and enter, and squatters. A number of these police calls have come from the property owner himself.

The unsafe conditions are such that anyone who enters the structure is at risk, including first responders who have deemed the structure unsafe to enter even in an emergency. The property owner takes only minimal action to maintain the property, and only as a result of repeated enforcement action taken by staff under the provisions of the *Property Maintenance Bylaw* and the *Abandoned Properties Bylaw*. On December 19, 2018 a letter was sent to the property owner regarding the on-going issues upon this property and requesting that he provide staff with his intentions in regards to the property (see Schedule E). Although, the owner has confirmed receipt of the letter he has not provided a formal response.

OPTIONS & IMPACTS

The essential elements that must be considered in this case are as follows;

- 1. The structure was deemed unsafe and the occupancy was revoked in 2003 because the property owner carried out demolition work which significantly undermined the structural integrity of the building and placed the tenants at risk;
- 2. The property owner has taken no action to remediate the unsafe conditions and restore occupancy to the building despite having 15 years to do so, and has instead allowed the building to deteriorate which increases the risk that it poses to the public;
- 3. The property owner has taken no action to maintain the condition of the property and has allowed it to become so unclean that City resources are continually being called upon to manage the criminal and nuisance activity that it attracts.
- 4. Demolition of the building as outlined in Schedule A is the only certain and effective remedy for the current unsafe and unclean conditions;
- 5. There is a significant risk to public safety if action is not taken immediately to remediate these conditions.

CONCLUSIONS

Due to the significant risk to public safety posed by the unsafe and unclean condition of this property, and the need to take effective and timely action to remediate the hazardous conditions, staff have determined that the appropriate course of action at this time is to proceed with issuing a Remedial Action Requirement to the property owner. Doing so will not only provide the property owner incentive to act voluntarily, it would allow the City to take the required action should the owner fail to do so themselves.

NOTICE OF REMEDIAL ACTION REQUIREMENT

WHEREAS the Council of the City of Victoria (the "Council") has determined and declared that the building (the "Building") located at 1176 Yates Street, legally described as Lot 1 Plan 740 Section SR Victoria (the "Lands"), is a nuisance, hazard and creates an unsafe condition pursuant to Section 74 of the *Community Charter*.

THEREFORE under statutory power, including Sections 16, 17, 64, 72 to 74, 79 and 154 to 156 of the *Community Charter*, the Council orders as follows:

- Within sixty (60) days of February 14, 2019, the registered owner of the lands (the "Owner"), at the Owner's expense, must obtain a building permit, and adhere to the conditions of the building permit, to remediate the unsafe conditions by removing and/or demolishing the Building and removing from the Lands any and all debris or accumulated materials.
- 2. If the Owner does not take the action required under Section 1 of this Notice, the Council, or any persons authorized by the Council (including private contractors) are authorized to enter upon the Lands pursuant to Section 16 and 17 of the *Community Charter* for the purpose of carrying out the required work.
- Any action taken by the Council or other authorized person with respect to Section 2 of this Notice will be undertaken at the expense of the Owner, and the City of Victoria may recover the costs incurred in doing so as a debt from the Owner in accordance with Section 17 of the *Community Charter*.
- 4. If the City takes action and the costs of the action are unpaid on December 31 of the year in which the costs were incurred, the amount owing will be added to the property taxes and deemed as taxes in arrears in accordance with Section 258(1)(c) of the *Community Charter*.
- 5. Within fourteen (14) days of February 14, 2019, the Owner may request, in accordance with Section 78 of the *Community Charter* that the Council reconsider the remedial action requirement imposed under Section 1. A request that the Council reconsider the remedial action requirement must be given in writing within the time stated to:

On November 10, 2003, I made an inspection of the building at this address accompanied by the Building Inspector, Plumbing Inspector, Electrical Inspector, and officials from the Ministry of Human Resources. Also present was your local manager, Albert Ward.

The approved use of the building at 1176 Yates is 17 housekeeping units. A housekeeping unit is defined as "a room or rooms used or intended to be used for normal living purposes including cooking, eating and sleeping but without separate bathrooms or toilet facilities."

According to the Building, Plumbing, and Electrical Inspectors, there is evidence of substantial construction (including demolition), plumbing, and wiring without valid permits. Each housekeeping unit has had its own bathroom installed without permits, and this work has had the effect of converting the building, illegally, to an apartment building. There is evidence that uncapped or illegal plumbing is allowing sewer gas into the building. There is also evidence of construction of extra apartments, in particular on the top floor and attic, and in the basement. Finally, there has been a substantial amount of demolition work in the basement, involving the cutting of weight-bearing beams and the undermining of weight-bearing posts.

As a result of these findings, the Buildng Inspector has posted the building "unsafe to occupy" and has informed your manager of this decision.

To comply with building and zoning regulations, you must take immediate steps to terminate occupancy of the building. If you wish to reoccupy the building, you must take steps to return it to its approved layout and use through the permit process.

On November 06, 2003, I made an inspection of the building at this address to accompany the Electrical Inspector and Bylaw Enforcement Officers. Your local manager, Albert Ward was present. I was prepared to immediately post the building as "Unsafe" due to the scope and nature of the infractions and let Mr. Ward know of my intention.

I returned in the afternoon with my Manager, a fellow Building Inspector, Plumbing Inspector, Senior Bylaw Officer and Officials from the Ministry of Human Resources. We were accompanied, again, by Mr. Ward.

I could find no evidence of any permits, or applications for permits, for the structural, architectural, plumbing or electric work that was either in progress or completed since our last recorded entries. Substantial alterations were underway on all storeys.

The strong smell of sewer gases from numerous sources and the various liberties taken with the integrity of load bearing structural elements were sufficient to invoke section 2.5 of the Building Bylaw to prohibit the occupancy of the unsafe building.

I posted the building and all suites "Unsafe – No Occupancy" and informed your manager of this decision.

Plans, prepared under the seal of a professional architect and structural engineer, must be submitted in support of a building permit application to bring the building into compliance with the intended use. The application should be submitted within 14 days.

Records show numerous Fire and Police calls for service at this address, including 2 fires, and 24 calls in the last 2 years alone related to unwanted persons, drug use, break and enter, and squatters.

This is an unacceptable situation as City resources are continually being called upon to manage incidents directly related to the derelict condition of this property, and the criminal and nuisance activity that it attracts. The City would like to know what you have planned for this building, and if you intend to take any immediate action to address any of the concerns detailed above. Be advised that if you are unwilling or unable to take the necessary action, the City will exercise the authority granted under the Community Charter and move forward with whatever action is deemed necessary to ensure public safety.

Call for a Public Inquiry into Money Laundering in B.C. and Impacts on Real Estate and the Overdose Crisis

WHEREAS Peter German's 'Dirty Money' report commissioned by B.C.'s Attorney General, revealed significant money laundering taking place in casinos, estimating over \$1 million has been laundered in B.C.

AND WHEREAS the work of local investigative journalists, including findings from an RCMP study, has revealed links between money laundering, fentanyl distribution, and real estate. The Provincial Government continues to investigate these links, through an Expert Panel on Money Laundering, an anonymous tip portal, and a second study by Peter German to be completed in March 2019

AND WHEREAS in 2018, despite extensive harm reduction investments, there were record numbers of drug overdose deaths in B.C., and Victoria was among the top three cities with the highest number of deaths.

AND WHEREAS Victoria and British Columbia's housing affordability crisis has skyrocketed over recent years. Local housing costs exceed local incomes, and the gap between housing costs and local incomes has increased in recent years.

AND WHEREAS Charbonneau Commission deputy chief prosecutor Simon Tremblay has stated that an inquiry could exist side-by-side with any other investigation in B.C., as happened in Quebec. Meaning that existing investigations needn't be a barrier to beginning a larger Public Inquiry.

AND WHEREAS British Columbians are in favour of a public inquiry into money laundering. A Research Co poll last August showed that three-in-four residents (76%) believe the provincial government should "definitely" or "probably" call a public inquiry.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

- 1. THAT Council endorse a call for the Provincial Government to launch a Public Inquiry into money laundering in B.C., similar to the Charbonneau Inquiry in Quebec, to begin after Peter German's review of money- laundering in B.C. real estate, due in March.
- 2. THAT the Mayor write a letter to the Premier, the Minister of Finance, and the Attorney General, communicating the City of Victoria's support for a Public Inquiry.
- 3. THAT Council request the terms of reference for this Public Inquiry include:
 - i. Investigation into money laundering in BC real estate that may have deepened the housing affordability crisis;
 - ii. Investigation into links between organized crime, money laundering, and the overdose crisis, which resulted in the deaths of an average of one person dying every four days in Victoria, and nearly 1500 people across BC in 2018.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council receive the report for information.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since 2014, a new public engagement strategy has been developed and implemented to increase public understanding and input on the financial planning and strategic planning processes. Efforts have focused on improving the presentation of financial information, increasing notice of public participation opportunities, an improved online survey, and new tools for the public to engage in the decision-making process.

The City began public consultation on the draft 2018 Financial Plan on December 17, 2018. Citizens were invited to provide input on the proposed budget through a variety of ways: including by completing an online survey, submitting correspondence, and through the Town Hall held on January 16.

The budgeting process continues to evolve and improve each year. Feedback on budget materials and the budget survey will inform next year's process.

PURPOSE

To provide Council with feedback and correspondence received during the 2019 Financial Plan public consultation period.

BACKGROUND

Projected budget impacts were communicated holistically, including impacts from utility increases in addition to municipal property tax increases and five-year forecasts for both residential and business properties. Information items developed for the public were provided online at <u>www.victoria.ca/budget</u>, including a video to explain the nature and purpose of a City budget, the full Draft Financial Plan, the "Budget Summary" piece, a four page "Budget at a Glance", Town Hall details, and the online survey.

Consultation was promoted widely through social media, home-page placement on the City's website, print advertising, digital display boards at City Hall and the Save-on-Foods Memorial Centre, e-newsletter, stakeholder emails, posters and handbills. A focus on increasing youth and renter feedback continued, including working once again with the City of Victoria Youth Council, and creating renter-specific messaging to encourage participation.

Online Survey

A total of 1,483 citizens responded to the online budget survey. The survey asked questions regarding priorities for strategic objectives, overall value for tax dollars, spending priorities for new revenue and prior year's surplus funds. It allowed participants the option to dive deeper into specific areas related to the operating budget, capital budget categories and supplementary budget requests for the City and VicPD.

It should be noted that the online budget survey is not a random, representative survey of Victoria residents, but rather only represents the views of those who became aware of the survey and decided to opt in.

Comments provided in the survey are enclosed as provided and their reproduction does not indicate any endorsement of them; they do not reflect the views of the City, its elected officials or employees. Some comments have been redacted to remove personal information, hate speech, or potential libel.

Budget Town Hall

For the fifth consecutive year, the City hosted a budget Town Hall with an e-Town Hall component. The meeting was interactive and webcast live. Participants were able to attend and provide feedback in person at City Hall, or from the comfort of their own homes. Citizens were invited to submit questions and feedback in a variety of ways:

- in person
- through Twitter using the hashtag #victownhall
- using the website form
- · by phone during the meeting

The meeting was well attended in person and had 56 online submissions. Comments and questions covered a wide variety of topics.

Correspondence

Formal correspondence was welcomed as part of the budget feedback process. Several pieces of correspondence were received from groups and individuals.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

What We Heard

1,483 people participated in the online survey over four weeks. Of those:

- 82.5% of respondents said they live in the City of Victoria, with the highest neighbourhood representation from Fairfield Gonzales and James Bay
- 52% indicated they own property in Victoria while 38% responded they rent in Victoria
- 21% of total respondents indicated they owned or operated a business in Victoria

In general, survey respondents noted that spending in operating categories was "just right", with the exception of VicPD, where more respondents noted that spending was "too low" with many comments noting the desire to see school liaison officers reinstated.

Regarding capital budget categories, survey respondents noted that spending in capital categories was "just right", with the exception of Active Transportation, where respondents felt spending was "too high."

The majority of survey respondents (51.2%) stated they agreed with the proposed tax increase for City operations, with 33.7% saying they feel the increase should be reduced.

49.6% of respondents noted that they were moderately or very satisfied with programs and services received from the City for tax dollars.

When asked how Council should fund the Employer Health Tax, 62.6% responded with "use new tax revenue from new developments."

When asked how the City should allocate 2018 surplus, the majority of respondents (50.3%) answered "combination of invest in new initiatives and save for future infrastructure investment" and 40.8% answered "save for future infrastructure investment."

When asked how the City should allocate new assessed revenue the majority (52.4%) responded with "save for future infrastructure investment."

Strategic Objectives

Survey respondents were asked how they would distribute \$100 among the proposed strategic objectives. The top three objectives where respondents noted they would allocate funds were:

- Affordable Housing
- Strong, Livable Neighbourhoods
- Good Governance

When asked to rank the strategic objectives from most to least important, the top three objectives were:

- Affordable Housing
- Good Governance
- Sustainable Transportation

Impacts to Financial Plan The public input should inform the 2019 financial plan.

CONCLUSIONS

The budgeting process continues to evolve and improve each year. Feedback from this year will inform next year's budget process.

2019 Budget Town Hall Online Submissions

- An overlooked priority is the urban forest. Will council spend more money on trees to not only maintain our urban canopy but increase it? At 17% we are way behind other cities like Vancouver- 30%. The focus on development has come with a heavy price for our natural environment
- Will there be an increase in funding for community centre's to run their youth drop-in programs? As these are very underfunded but extremely important for the youth in our community.
- We motion for an increase in City of Victoria Youth Council funding to \$30,000/year. How much money will be allocated for Youth Programs in the Victoria on top of the participatory budget?
- How much money will be allocated for the Skate Park in Topaz park? we motion for \$300,000.00 just for the Skate Park itself
- Why has council decided to not continue the Indigenous Artist Residency? I
- My first question would be how much did it cost to produce the glossy financial plan with its superfluous photos and overdone graphics? One can only imagine the hours wasted by highly paid people congratulating themselves on wasteful window dressing. Another example of city hall overkill, cost be damned.
- I am aware of two incidents involving a young adult being accosted at a bus stop when she was attempting to bus home from work in downtown Victoria. It was 6:30pm. I have experienced the same concerns when confronted with violent and abusive individuals during daylight hours. I never see police on bikes or patrol anymore. How will the new budget improve safety downtown?
- I would like to know why Ben Isitt was not transparent with the citizens of Victoria that he was leading a slate of candidates for the municipal election.
- Bike lanes Pandora will it be moved to the other side of the road? Douglas Street bikes in Bus lane - cars can't be in bike lanes unless it is clear - why are bikes allowed to slow buses down when the bus lane was specifically created to speed bus transportation up!
- Will the budget contain funding for an Urban Forest Coordinator, with adequate resources, to implement the Urban Forest Master Plan, approved in 2013?
- Police on Pandora st is essential , please keep them at 941 and on the block .They do great work an keep it under control ,without them it would be a disaster on Pandora St, thank you

- I truly wonder how sincere this administration is when it comes to affordability? When 50% of the budget is salaries and benefits one might have thought the looking into amalgamation would a priority. One line item in the strategic plan is far from a priority. It is the only way we will ever address staffing and the associated cost. Why is there not more urgency
- I support the City's proposed budget and hope Council will support Urban food and ecosystems by: supporting increased funding for community garden volunteer coordinator grants in all neighbourhoods, by removing property taxes and supporting urban farms and by providing \$6,000 for the Urban Food Table to continue and expand their efforts to promote urban food production and education.
- The City strategic plan that supports urban food systems. Please support the food in development guidelines and explore how parks operations can support urban food systems/ecosystems. I would like to see the City expand the scope and increase the funding for the Community Garden Coordinator Grants, remove the mill rate on urban farms and provide \$6,000 of annual funding to the Urban Food Table.
- Why, when statistics demonstrate that crime rates and crime severity have been on a downward trend for years, has the VicPD received funding increases every year well over the rate of inflation, and given this why are they asking for a further 6% increase this year?
- Urban gardeners are a large part of the city's population. They garden for many reasons: land stewardship, growing food for their families, concern for insect populations, etc. In order to encourage this, could council look at how city sewer and water taxes are decided? Those of us with microdrip watering systems are not pouring water down the drains, so why are we being charged as if we were?
- Why does the Draft Financial Plan repeatedly mention policing and bylaw as a response to homelessness, when housing not law enforcement is what is needed to address homelessness?
- The Draft Financial Plan identifies these priorities: land use planning, supporting businesses, affordable housing, active transportation, climate change, and emergency preparedness. However the proposed budget doesn't align with these priorities, allocating 24% of the operating budget to policing and 0.15% to housing. Can you clarify how the City's budget aligns with political priorities?
- We need a larger budget to enable more parks Downtown, and also for planting more trees. Herald Street is an example where trees are needed and there are currently none between Douglas & Government.
- STVR enforcement needs a larger budget a 2% increase over 2018 is not enough as this is a major problem.
- I am opposed to any reduction in the budget amount that VPD has requested. Property & violent crime is up. My neighbourhood is becoming less safe. VPD plays an important role in dealing with with the most marginalized & individuals with mental health/addiction issues
- We hear people say that the high cost of housing is our biggest personal expense. In general that is not true, taxes are the largest personal expense. How does continuing to spend more and more money on pet projects, therefore increasing taxes and leading to increases in rents, help affordability?

- As a citizen who would like to cycle around town to go to work and shop, I would like an
 education program for cyclists. I am terrified cycling in Victoria because many cyclists go
 so fast and yell at people to get out of the way, some speed by at 50 or more km/hr on
 motorized bikes. As such, it's been a year and a half since I took my bike out and I walk
 instead.:(
- Hello friends In City Hall! Are you going to be committing budget money to fulfill the Create Victoria Cultural Masterplan? I really hope so! You are doing great cultural things in this city. I hope you continue on this path by fulfilling the Create Victoria Cultural Masterplan. Thank you!
- How much in parking fine revenue last year that had to be written off, foregone because of the inability to collect ?
- I am a volunteer with the Greater Victoria Green Team and live in Victoria. I am not sure why the City of Victoria does not support GVGT activities in Victoria, like many other municipalities do. I would love to see the City support the GVGT who are doing so much to take care of local habitat through volunteer engagement. Are there plans for Victoria to connect with the GVGT soon?
- Langford St directly east of Vic West School does not have a reduced speed limit; one could drive 50 km/h, while the parallel street, Craigflower/Skinner, has a 30 km/h limit. Can Council direct engineering to implement a 30 km/h limit leading up to the school and implement traffic calming measures on Langford St between Tyee Rd and Russell/Front?
- As a social worker with the ACT teams I would like to express my support for the
 ongoing collaboration w/ VicPD. Police support is helpful for both client's in crisis/risky
 situations- as well as for staff who put themselves at risk to support some of the most
 marginalized and vulnerable folks in our community. PO offer clients compassion, dignity
 & resp and do the opposite of criminalize them.
- we support the idea of Mayor and Council being full time positions and support at a minimum living wage!
- our youth run a food kart to learn employment skills. It would be awesome to be able to park on a city street with a small fee for the city of course! And of course with a non-profit rate! #yyj
- Speeding traffic is a problem in my neighbourhood of Hillside-Quadra and my family supports lowering the speed limit on residential streets to 30km/hr. When can the Hillside-Quadra start neighbourhood-led traffic calming process?
- UDI's members build the majority of housing & commercial/office/retail space in the city. If the city wants a variety of residents, including families, to live downtown - for our businesses and retail to thrive - our streets must be safe. UDI supports/encourages an increased budget to add more police and social workers to ensure that our streets are safe for people to work, live & visit Victoria
- The E&N trail is a great asset and I anticipate the improvements east of Esquimalt Rd planned for 2019. However, the most western E&N access point in Victoria at Hereward Green is poor for those on bikes; one needs to climb the sidewalk at a driveway, navigate around a large bush and climb a gravel/mud path. Do the Parks Department and the Engineering Department have plans to improve this access?
- youth for a variety for reason need safe and affordable housing. We would like to see money in the budget for this!

- we are wondering about free transit for youth. Any chance that will happen we are in full support of this!!!
- I want to highlight to council the excellent work done by the collaborative HART (housing access response) team carried out by BC housing, Vic pd, island health and msdsi. The work of this team has been very successful at the challenging work of finding appropriate housing for many our cities homeless. Is the Vic of involvement in this initiative at risk with the new proposed budget?
- I would like to support the initiative for the Douglas to Dallas intersection alignment. Having worked with residents of James Bay on the Live on Douglas initiative I appreciate the value of integrating better pedestrian spaces and access to the Park, which includes improving the connection to Downtown and to the waterfront.
- I ask the mayor and this council to please grant the request of Vic PD for increased funding. In doing so, I ask this council to demonstrate true leadership in supporting the model of community policing which is so well demonstrated by the officers of this force. In particular, I ask the new councillors to turn away from adversarial methods of political leadership and towards collaboration.
- I would like to know how much money the VicPD spent in their efforts to organize this lobbying effort (e.g., staff time organizing speakers, funding from the police union for online ads etc.)
- If, as Mayor Helps states, "housing is not a municipal responsibility" why is it a City of Victoria strategic priority? Does this mean the city's approach will be lip service? Is that why housing action manifests as 0.15% of the 2019 proposed budget? #VicTownHall
- How much has the budget for bus shelters been increased in this budget?
- At a pre election forum about homelessness hosted by Our Place, Mayor Helps, referenced an initiative called Mayors for Modular Housing. BC housing has dedicated funds for the CRD to build modular housing to address the homelessness crisis and lack of low barrier housing for some of our most vulnerable citizens. Where is the Council at in regards to identifying a location for this housing?
- I still stand by my beliefs of not freezing police budget. Thank you to the person believing in police on ACT teams.
- Can we get any guarantees regarding the waste treatment project and a maximum amount it will go over budget? The blue bridge and bike lanes cost overruns make many taxpayers nervous.
- Victorians with inadequate pensions (self-employed or 35 yrs of service for a corporation that goes bust: Nortel, Sears...) must buy property for income in old age: a VITAL aspect of retirement planning requiring a significant amnt to even approach a City pension to last 25+yrs. Housing providers are not medieval landlords & need your help. Simplistic solutions threaten all-let's partner in this.
- Why is funding for the Affordable Housing Reserve not increasing in 2019 given the priority of affordable housing? Are there notional budget allocations for fee waivers for affordable housing developments and if so, are there plans to increase these fee waivers?
- can someone speak on what the hereditary chiefs of the Songhees and Esquimalt nations have asked of the city budget!

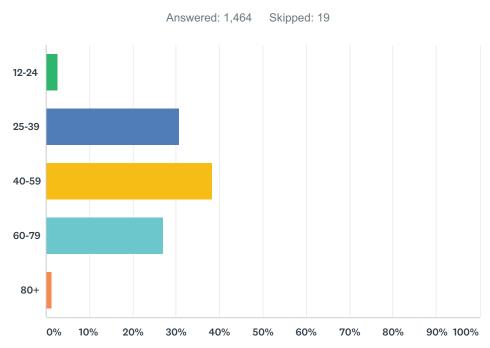
- How is council's declining of @VicPDCanada's budget request reflected in the current budget proposal? What impacts will that have to the overall budget? Where will the money needed to fund mental health & addiction response come from?
- Volunteer community groups may bring forward resources as part of testing ideas. How can City Hall embrace the LQC "Lighter Quicker Cheaper" approach to support community? That is, when ideas are floated & run up against "there's no budget" or "there is a process", how will Council recognise need to empower staff to collaborate on that level?
- the youth outside at the band shelter are hoping the city will fix the grass under the oak tree and would like you to consider safe sites to smoke that is in doors. As well as better health care for street youth.
- How does the budget reflect responses to the increasing traffic congestion in the city, working with BC Transit?
- Hello Mayor Helps and Council, Several years ago before you were elected as Mayor we had a conversation about the equitable distribution of amenities between neighbourhoods. An example amenity could be the scheduled build out of the bicycle lanes. How have you addressed equity between neighbourhoods?
- Why is so much money set aside for the public engagement department? Can the city of 85,000 residents justify this amount of money for 12 employees?
- A budget overage is anticipated in the blue bridge project due to such things as lawsuit costs and fendering costs. Has this been allowed for in the 2019 budget?
- What is city hall's plan to increase business and tourism downtown after 6h00 pm all year long? For example, Quebec City, a similar sized city and Parliement town, has vibrant business and tourism activity after 6h00 pm all year long even at -30 with wind and this is not a new innovative thing. Wake up Victoria! It can be done... How is it done? SAFETY AND LOTS OF FOOT PATROL
- There is no funding request in the draft 2019 Financial Plan for work to address accessibility of the planted environment. Is this because it can be handled within existing resources, or is no work planned? The problem to be addressed is that a large and growing number of children and adults with asthma and allergies cannot enjoy City parks and the outdoor environment to the same extent that other children can, especially while physically exerting themselves, due to triggers like pollen. Less allergenic species and female trees can be planted to correct the imbalance, without detracting from pollinator habitat. Failing to plant with the health risks in mind is contrary to the Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan objectives of making parks accessible to all yet the Urban Forest Master Plan does not include human health as a factor in planting decisions. Staff are under direction from Council to work with the Accessibility Working Group and Urban Food Table and to report back on options for balancing accessibility considerations with pollinator habitat, including in the vicinity of playgrounds, dating from November 2017. They provided an update as part of the Parks and Open Spaces annual update in July 2018 with a report of two actions they intended to take, but Staff have yet to work with these groups or the community to develop options for Council's decision. Thus, AWG made the following recommendation in October 2018 which has not been brought to the attention of Council:

"that Council direct staff to plan, scope, cost & look at options to resource a project for 2019 to consult, research, analyze & develop a long-term, phased plan and policies for addressing accessibility of the planted environment, to remove barriers for people with environmental disabilities, consistent with the accessibility objectives of the Parks & Open Spaces Master Plan."

What steps will the City take in 2019 to lead by example and start on the multi-decade process of improving accessibility of the planted environment?

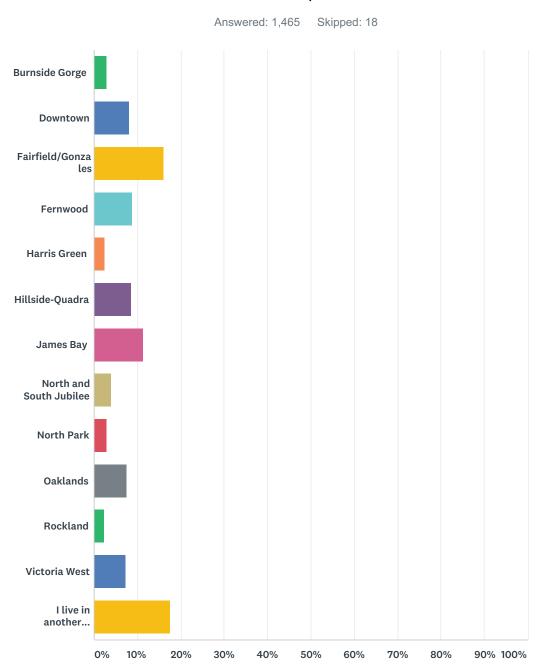

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



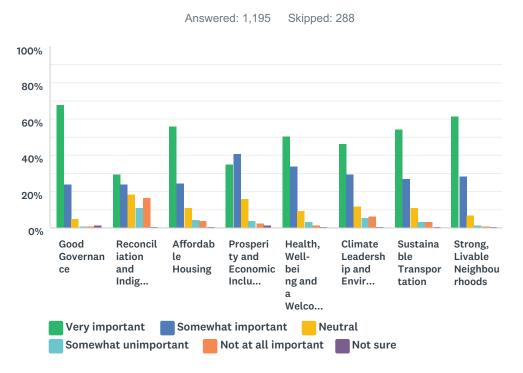

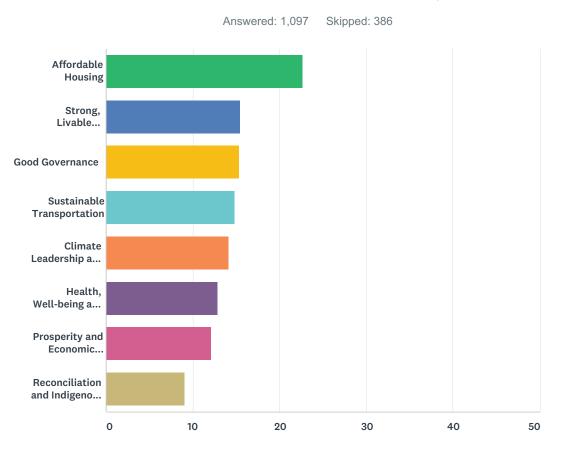
Q5 Do you own or run a business in Victoria?


Q6 In your view, how important is each Strategic Objective to making life better for you, your family, and your community?



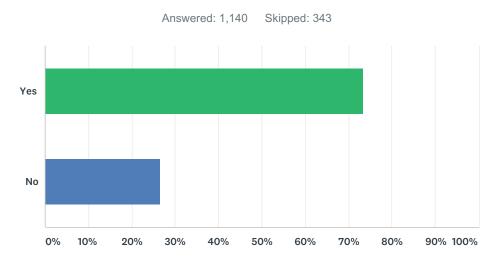
Q7 If you had \$100 to spend on the Strategic Objectives below, how would you allocate it? (graph shows total dollars in thousands of all respondents to this question)



Q8 Please rank the Strategic Objectives from most to least important.



The VicPD is requesting an operating budget increase of \$3,240,949, which would be a 6.01% increase from the previous year. Over the past 10 years the VicPD has received a cumulative total of \$12,840,711 in new funding, with the City's portion being a cumulative 31.59% increase (compared to a 12.1% inflation increase in the same period). According to Statistics Canada between 1985 and 2013 police expanding police funding it is not appropriate that the police budget continue to expand again this year. The City should not agree to VicPD's request for funding 12 new officers over 3 years and 1 new civilian position, as there is no evidence suggesting need for additional VicPD staffing. According to Statistics Canada and the VicPD sown data, the most recent available data show that from 2014-2018 calls for service to the VicPD decreased, and in the past 3 years crime rates and the crime severity index have also dropped (with consistent lon	12/25/2018 3:44 PM

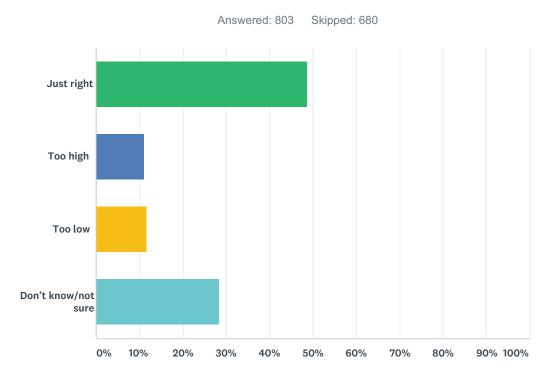
consistent with broader societal trends of declining crime rates across Canada for the past 20+ years. Additionally, since 2009 Victoria has been the most heavily policed major city in all of Canada and there is no rationale for why Victoria in particular should have this intensive a level of policing (e.g., no evidence has been provided that Victoria has more calls for service per capita than other major Canadian cities; Victoria has lower crime rate and crime severity than many other Canadian cities). To look at how to appropriately invest money that might otherwise go to policing, we can learn from what has been done in other regions particularly in areas where, like Canada, policing is tied to colonialism. For example in the Indigenous-led justice reinvestment movement in Australia, communities most impacted by criminalization have created investment plans diverting money away from policing and prisons into building material community infrastructure -- affordable housing, culturally relevant education programs, etc. -- as well as funding system changes to address racism and economic injustice. The Oakland Power Projects uses community-based action research to facilitate collective identification of reasons why people are coming into contact with police, and to identify and implement community-driven solutions. There are alternatives that have been implemented in other regions at all points of the spectrum, including non-police-based prevention initiatives, peer and mixed peer-professional intervention alternatives, and transformative justice programs that address repair and healing after harm has occurred. Alternatives to policing not only reduce the harms inherent in law enforcement but also are often much more cost-effective. For example the CAHOOTS team which has been running for 27 years in two cities in Oregon, and which was designed specifically to provide an alternative to police response to substance use, poverty, and mental health crisis, runs a 24/7 response service for \$800,000 per year (responding to 15,000 calls, approximately 25% of all non-emergency calls). As part of budget planning and financial oversight for use of public funds, the City should require that the VicPD provide meaningful information to guide determination of operating budget. This includes providing information about calls for service to the police to help determine what infrastructure might best suit different community needs. For example, it is relevant to know not only how many calls are being made to police but also how many calls are about violence, how many are about property, how many are about public intoxication or other non-violent 'nuisance', etc as policing is not necessarily the right response to all types of calls that come to police. The VicPD should also have to provide more information about what funding is going to initiatives that are not responses to calls, such as 'pro-active policing' where the VicPD is prioritizing surveillance of specific populations -- for example locations where people with low incomes gather and live -- as police targeting of marginalized populations is not an appropriate use of public funds. I also want to comment here on specific VicPD deliverables set out in the Draft Financial Plan. Although the Police Board and not Victoria/Esquimalt Council has oversight of police operations, the municipalities that fund the VicPD are responsible for ensuring that public funds are being spent appropriately. When the VicPD is in its budget request identifying that they plan to use municipal funds to operationalize in ways that are not consistent with the municipalities' strategic plan, policies, or other commitments, or commit to activities that have the potential to cause harm to the public, it is not appropriate that the City fund these activities. I have particular concerns about the deliverables identified in the Draft Financial Plan below. On page 626 of the Draft Financial Plan, the deliverables of the VicPD Community Engagement Division include "Fostering new, bold and innovative ways to connect with the citizens of Victoria and Esquimalt", "Building enduring partnerships with media agencies by offering sustained and transparent access to VicPD people and stories", facilitating "community engagement activities", and employing "leading-edge social media practices and explor[ing] emerging technologies to connect more of our citizens in a meaningful, helpful and sustained way". It is not appropriate that nearly \$2M per year is allocated to a division that has the mandate to propagandize for the VicPD, engaging in pro-policing communications in ways that profoundly shape media and public perceptions of policing, public safety, crime, and marginalized populations who are targets of police attention. Funds required for IT technicians who can ensure public access to police data and other transparency and accountability measures should be separated out from public relations and the remainder of this division's funds cancelled. On page 628 of the Draft Financial Plan, the deliverables of the VicPD Patrol Division include "strive to increase the visibility and accessibility of our officers in the community". In a society with laws and bylaws that criminalize homelessness and use of certain substances and where atypical behaviour is deemed 'social disorder', more patrol officers means more harm for individuals who are already highly criminalized. In its November 2018 presentation to the City the VicPD identified that four of the proposed 12 new officer positions will be used to create a new "Community Response Team" actively patrolling the the downtown area with a mandate to "suppress criminal element preying on vulnerable populations"; the VicPD Q3 2018 report to the City states that the Patrol Division is focusing specifically on a presence "in the areas of Rock Bay, the 2900-block of Douglas Street, Centennial Square and the 800 and 900 blocks of Johnson Street and Pandora Avenue" -- locations of homeless shelters, low-income housing, street community survival services, and places where unhoused people congregate during the day. The portrayal of increased VicPD presence as providing enhanced safety and security for

people who are highly criminalized is perverse given the harms law enforcement inflicts on the street community. Financially supporting intensification of such anti-poor initiatives is contrary to multiple stated commitments in the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan regarding Health. Well-Being. and being a Welcoming City, including fostering a compassionate city and fostering a welcoming environment that treats all people with compassion and respect. On page 638 of the Draft Financial Plan, VicPD HR division deliverables include the following: "Identify new and more efficient ways to deliver services through an alternate response unit". This deliverable has been in past year's financial plans as well, and again this year there are no details on what an alternate response unit would have the mandate to do, how it would be structured, budget implications, etc. Detailed information should be made available, with opportunity for public input, prior to any approval of budget for these activities so it is clear what would actually be funded. On page 640 of the Draft Financial Plan, VicPD Community Services deliverables include the following: "proactively engage with various service providers to address issues and concerns of homelessness, mental health and addiction in order to assist in connecting people to services in order to prevent entrenchment of the most marginalized persons in one geographical area" (also a deliverable in the previous year's Draft Financial Plan), "complete the review of the 2 year pilot for the expansion of our members in the ACT team to determine the most efficient way to utilize police resources", and identification that a pilot project is underway to "centralize the VicPD's response to mental health and addiction and to implement the new VicPD Mental Health Strategy Action Plan" (both were deliverables in the previous year's Draft Financial Plan but this is the first mention of a pilot being underway). There are multiple concerns with this. In particular, policing is not the right response to homelessness, mental health or addiction concerns. These are not problems that can be solved by laws or law enforcement; on the contrary, police-based responses to homelessness, mental illness and substance use causes significant harm to people who are homeless, people with mental health concerns, and people who use drugs. Funding policing as a response to homelessness takes money away from actual solutions to homelessness (e.g., addressing the shortage of affordable high-quality housing), and similarly prioritizing budget for policing instead of affordable high-quality mental health and addiction services makes no sense. The City should not fund police to be embedded in health services and public funds should not be used to continue expansion of police presence in ACT teams. The police mandate of law enforcement, which uses surveillance and information gathering to pursue arrest and criminal charges, is fundamentally incompatible with the delivery of health services and embedding police in health teams criminalizes people, bringing surveillance, control and coercion into everyday life and increasing the social control function of mental health services which is contrary to a disability justice approach to mental health care. Police are in health services to be a hammer, to force people into compliance. That function is predicated on the power that police have over people's lives, the ever-present threat that if people do not comply the police have the power to detain, confine, arrest, and use force to subdue. In the very rare instances where there is immediate threat to life, health personnel, like any other individual, can call 911 for emergency response - there is no need to have police embedded in health services or otherwise routinely a part of care. It is an ineffective use of public funds to have the VicPD facilitating referrals to health and social services that are already oversubscribed and have long waiting lists. VicPD's October 27, 2018 memo to the Police Board regarding the expansion of ACT police acknowledges that of 30 attempted referrals by VicPD to ACT and 713 Outreach teams, only 10 of those had been accepted as the teams already have full caseloads. We do not need more referral agents, we need more health and social services. The VicPD Mental Health Strategy Action Plan is not available on the VicPD website and no details are provided on what is involved in implementing this action plan, budget implications, etc. Detailed information should be made available, with opportunity for public input, prior to any approval of budget. Moving on to the next issue regarding deliverables, on page 646, the Investigative Services Division deliverables include the following: "Investigative Services will continue to develop effective ways to gather and use intelligence to target crime and disorder. This includes:...Continued focus on the opioid crisis that is gripping the Province". The War on Drugs has been in place for many years and is widely recognized as ineffective and harmful. Pouring even more money into trying to control the drug trade is throwing more money down the drain and creates more stigma, secrecy, and shame around substance use, which leads people to use alone and increases the risk of injury and death from overdose. Of particular concern, VicPD identified in their 2018 Q3 report to Victoria council that they are focusing surveillance and visible police presence in the city blocks around three overdose prevention and supervised consumption sites on Johnson Street and Pandora Avenue, ignoring that increased police presence creates significant barriers to people accessing these services and accordingly increasing risks that people will use alone without immediate access to help in case of overdose. Financially supporting a law enforcement approach to the overdose crisis is contrary to the stated commitments in the City's 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan to advocate for destigmatization of mental health and addictions, expansion of harm reduction services, and provision of substances that are currently deemed illicit so people have access to safer drug supply. Public funds should instead be used for community,

	grassroots responses such as the peer first responders who have been at the very frontlines of responding to the overdose crisis, and the peers, family members and loved ones who every day provide sophisticated mental health support and prevention care but whose work is completely ignored in favour of strategies rooted in surveillance, control, and management by police and health professionals. Fire officials bringing in police to accompany them during fire inspections of homeless camps furthers criminalization and a combative approach to working with people who are sheltering outside. It would be more appropriate for the Fire Department to move to a collaborative, cooperative approach to this issue that emphasizes working with, not against, people who are sheltering outside to help them figure out how best to stay warm and cook food. I also note with concern that this year the Draft Financial Plan identifies that the VFD has had a 10% increase in calls to act generally as first responders and that this is explicitly stated as being connected to the overdose crisis including administration of naloxone and "providing pre-hospital care". While prompt first aid in case of overdose is life-saving and it is vital that this be available, it doesn't make sense to me that fire staff are the best choice for immediate response on an issue that has nothing to do with fire safety. 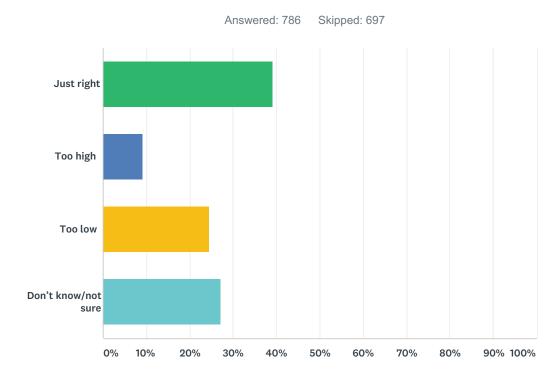

	Most of the Fire Department's work is appropriate to their highly specialized technical expertise. The Fire Department sometimes uses its expertise and authority to support criminalization and displacement of people sheltering outside. Taking away people's heat sources without providing any alternatives is not helpful in promoting safety, it just worsens people's living conditions and drives people into more secluded locations which increases the risk of harm should there be a fire. Fire officials bringing in police to accompany them during fire inspections of homeless camps furthers criminalization and a combative approach to working with people who are sheltering outside. It would be more appropriate for the Fire Department to move to a collaborative, cooperative approach to this issue that emphasizes working with, not against, people who are sheltering outside to help them figure out how best to stay warm and cook food. I also note with concern that this year the Draft Financial Plan identifies that the VFD has had a 10% increase in calls to act generally as first responders and that this is explicitly stated as being connected to the overdose crisis including administration of naloxone and "providing pre-hospital care". While prompt first aid in case of overdose is life-saving and it is vital that this be available, it doesn't make sense to me that fire staff are the best choice for immediate response on an issue that has nothing to do with fire safety. These types of measures are encouraged by VicPD through their Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design program which is based on the widely debunked 'Broken Windows Theory'. According to this theory, which has now been proven to be ineffective and harmful, policing low-level offenses maintains social order thereby preventing more serious crimes a tactic that has been shown to increase racial and social profiling, increasing rather than decreasing harm. People with mobility disabilities are especially impacted by these measures as removal of benches, putting in armrests, etc. prevents people from being able to sit and get rest. I would like to see the city allocate funds to consulting with people who have been targeted and impacted by hostile architecture to identify priorities for removal of barriers, restoration of infrastructure removed by the City in past years, and other measures consistent with the City's stated commitments in the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan to foster a compassionate city, foster a welcoming environment that treats all people with compassion and respect, and identify and remove barriers. 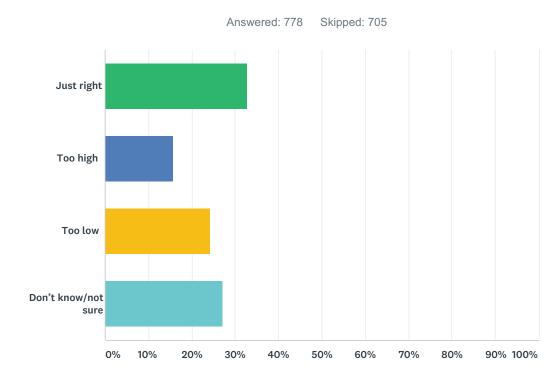

I am concerned that hostile architecture and exclusionary design is being widely used to discourage and prevent unhoused people from accessing public spaces, with particular impacts on people with disabilities. Examples of hostile architecture include removing benches from neighbourhood spaces where low-income people congregate, inserting armrests in the middle of benches to prevent someone from lying down, implementing spikes or concrete planters to prevent people from gathering, and gating alleys or other thoroughfares. These types of measures are encouraged by VicPD through their Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design program which is based on the widely debunked 'Broken Windows Theory'. According to this theory, which has now been proven to be ineffective and harmful, policing low-level offenses maintains social order thereby preventing more serious crimes – a tactic that has been shown to increase racial and social profiling, increasing rather than decreasing harm. People with mobility disabilities are especially impacted by these measures as removal of benches, putting in armrests, etc. prevents people from being able to sit and get rest. I would like to see the city allocate funds to consulting with people who have been targeted and impacted by thostile architecture to identify priorities for removal of barriers, restoration of infrastructure removed by the City in past years, and other measures consistent with the City's stated commitments in the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan to foster a compassionate city, foster a welcoming environment that treats all people with compassion and respect, and identify and remove barriers. Currently, planning and development is oriented towards a vision that emphasizes expanded economic prosperity for some, at the expense of people with low incomes. The rapid gentrification and expansion high-end luxury housing currently happening downtown is increasing criminalization of people who are marginalized, stigmatized, and considered 'undesirable' in this glossy vision of Victoria as a rich person's playground. Improving sustainable planning and community development requires both additional resources to be invested in this area and also a political reorientation so the work is to further building communities of care, respect, and consent, rather than to advance a profit-oriented agenda of what matters and who is important. Sustainable planning and community development is not about cashing in to make money as quickly as possible, it's about ensuring that infrastructure meets real social needs in ways that are environmentally sustainable and respectful. There is huge momentum behind current settler abusive, violent relationships to Lekwungen people and their territories and it will take very significant investment to change that, to actually enact decolonization, reconciliation, and reparations for harms done. 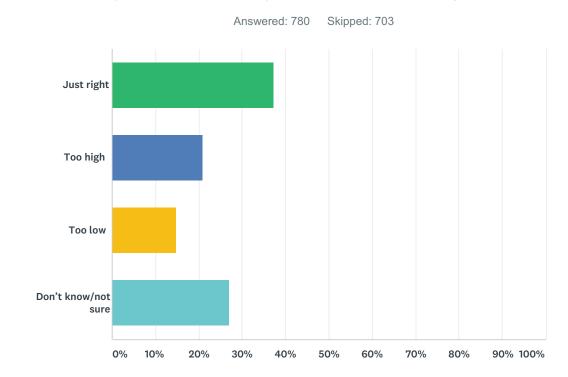

There is huge momentum behind current settler abusive, violent relationships to Lekwungen people and their territories and it will take very significant investment to change that, to actually enact decolonization, reconciliation, and reparations for harms done. 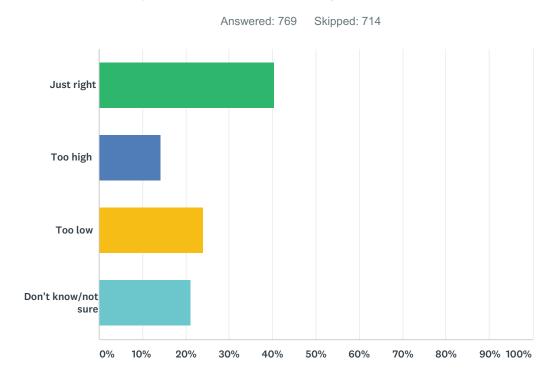



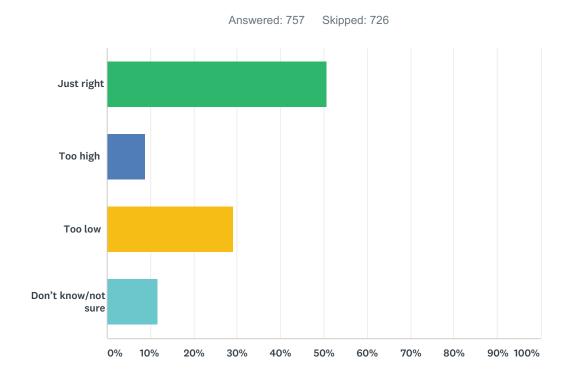

It is extremely important to have public spaces where people can gather, socialize, rest, enjoy nature, etc. And, for some people who do not have private spaces where these things can also happen, public spaces are, additionally, spaces of survival. When recreational wants of housed people conflict with unhoused people's survival needs, survival needs must take priority. The budget should be increased to work collaboratively with people sheltering outside to determine what amenities should be installed in parks to facilitate survival -- e.g., platforms to elevate tents above damp areas, storage lockers, 24/7 bathrooms, showers, food storage and preparation infrastructure, access to drinking water and electricity, etc. Maintenance of parks and other public spaces should not be used as a rationale to police and displace people who are sheltering outside, or seeking a safe place to use drugs. It is not appropriate to use public funds to "improve" parks by driving away people who are visibly low-income, whether by creating amenities like playgrounds or sports fields that whittle away the few spaces left where people can shelter, putting more pathways through sheltering spots to undermine privacy, creating terraced areas to make it more difficult for people to tent, or undertaking park redevelopment in areas currently used for sheltering. Given the dire housing crisis, budget should be prioritized not for amenities that are nice but not necessary, but rather for potentially repurposing buildings, parking lots, and other city-managed spaces to meet immediate human survival needs. (This would likely involve a mix of capital costs and operating budget.) The City currently has a hostile working relationship with people who shelter outside that is premised on the City using its power to displace people. This could shift to a respectful working relationship where the City works with people who are sheltering outside to find out what kind of spaces would improve safety, shelter, and access to necessities such as clean water, bathrooms, showers, and safe food storage/cooking facilities. City facilities could be readily adapted for these purposes and by engaging in this in a respectful, collaborative manner the City could also be well positioned to work on broader community initiatives such as reduction of discrimination against people who are living in poverty. The 'Leisure Involvement for Everyone' (LIFE) program currently discriminates against people with no fixed address by requiring that proof of address be provided to gualify for the program, contravening the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan mandate to "make Victoria barrier-free". Additionally the application process requires a CRA notice of assessment to prove income and that BC Identification be provided -- requirements out of reach for many people living in extreme poverty. An alternative application process should be investigated in consultation with the street community and advocates, to determine a respectful way forward for people with very low incomes who cannot meet these criteria (e.g., a letter from someone who is able to vouch that the person meets program criteria). Recognizing that people who are unhoused experience significant systemic barriers to being able to safely secure their belongings, there should be no blanket requirement that lost/stolen passes can only be replaced once per year, a \$5 replacement fee will be charged and 4 visits per month will be deducted from the card; instead this should be determined on a case-by-case basis -- the number of people this applies to will be small so will have no economic impact on the program's viability but will make a difference for individuals who rely on the LIFE program to access showers and other basic necessities.



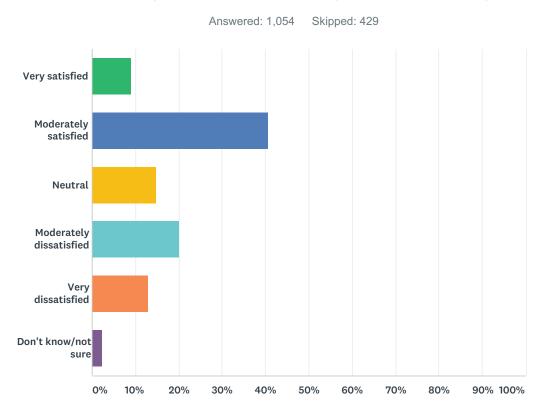



However the proposed budget doesn't align with these stated priorities. Policing is by far the highest expenditure at > \$57 million per year (23.4% of the operating budget) while in contrast only \$109,403 is proposed for implementation of the Victoria Housing Strategy and \$250,000 as transfer to a reserve for affordable housing projects (total of the two 0.15% of the operating budget). The City's budget should align with the City's stated priorities. The Draft Financial Plan states that a key goal is to "allocate additional city revenue to affordable housing" but the proposed budget does the opposite, decreasing the funding for the implementation of the housing strategy and keeping the housing reserve annual allocation the same as last year which given inflation means a decrease in real dollars. This does not reflect the widespread public concern about affordable housing, which has been the #1 issue for several years in the annual Vital Signs survey of Victoria residents and is getting worse not better. As identified in the Draft Financial Plan 61% of residents rent and that number is likely to increase as local prices for ownership of a townhouse, condo, or house have all skyrocketed in the past 20 years making home ownership unaffordable for most people. For renters, especially those with lower incomes, the situation is grim -- according to the Canada Mortgage & Housing Corporation rental rates for housing in the Victoria private market increased by 7.5% over the past year, 7.7% in the previous year and 13.2% in the two years prior to that, putting housing further out of reach for many people and resulting in increased risk of homelessness. The CMHC's fall 2018 rental market report for BC identified that the average rate for a bachelor apartment in Victoria in Oct 2018 was \$926 (up from \$850 in Oct 2017), far above the \$375 maximum shelter rate for individuals receiving income assistance. Given this context of a severe shortage of affordable housing it is particularly inappropriate that so much of the City's operating budget goes to policing. According to the VicPD, many of the service calls that come to police are not for emergency situations involving violence but rather are for policing people who are homeless (wake-ups/move-alongs, seizure of goods, acting in ways that don't conform to middle-class norms, using substances in public, etc.) under the guise of addressing 'social disorder'. This exaggerated panic about 'social disorder' both conceals the very real harms experienced by people who are homeless and also keeps money flowing to policing rather than actually meeting people's needs. This approach is not only social profiling but given the disproportionate number of Indigenous people who are homeless as a result of colonialism, is also racial profiling. As long as policing continues to take up such a giant proportion of tax dollars this will be a self-perpetuating cycle: more homelessness and social inequality, and more policing of marginalized people to appease the anxiety of people who have money and political power. We need to divest from extremely expensive responses that do nothing more than keep a small but highly marginalized population intensely trapped in daily surveillance and criminalization, and invest in programs that build community capacity to effectively meet people's needs, resolve conflicts, and otherwise collectively address societal problems. 

The City's budget should align with the City's stated priorities. The Draft Financial Plan states that a key goal is to "allocate additional city revenue to affordable housing" but the proposed budget does the opposite, decreasing the funding for the implementation of the housing strategy and keeping the housing reserve annual allocation the same as last year which given inflation means a decrease in real dollars. This does not reflect the widespread public concern about affordable housing, which has been the #1 issue for several years in the annual Vital Signs survey of Victoria residents and is getting worse not better. As identified in the Draft Financial Plan 61% of residents rent and that number is likely to increase as local prices for ownership of a townhouse, condo, or house have all skyrocketed in the past 20 years making home ownership unaffordable for most people. For renters, especially those with lower incomes, the situation is grim — according to the Canada Mortgage & Housing further out of reach for many people and resulting in increased risk of homelessness. The CMHC's fall 2018 rental market report for BC identified that the average rate for a bachelor apartment in Victoria in Cct 2018 was \$226 (up from \$850 in Oct 2017), far above the \$375 maximum shelter rate for individuals receiving income assistance. Additionally a plan is set out on page 779 for a total of \$4.879M from 2019-21 towards renewing existing police infrastructure and making new capital investments, with projections starting on page 781 for a *20 year* investment in capital expenditures for the VicPD. All of this is going in the wrong direction. We should not be supporting police expansion, whether in operations or capital, but should instead be divesting from expanding police power and reach and using that money for community-based solutions. It is unclear from the information presented by VicPD at the Joint Board/Councils meeting in November 2018 did not include any information about the VicPD's capital budget request and did not identify the VicPD's current balance available for capital expenditures and whether there is a surplus on reserve (other than identifying that \$400,000 of the operating budget was for "Expenditures Dedicated Reserves" which includes replacement of capital infrastructure as well as retirement obligations). This information is needed to be able to move siting reserve funds. Technology upgrades are very expensive. Yet no information is given regarding how technology is being deemed "obsolete". For example, funds were included last year for CCTV last year but it is identified this year that a planned project is "complete replacement of obsolete CCTV systems with newer technology". 

Additionally a plan is set out on page 779 for a total of \$4.879M from 2019-21 towards renewing existing police infrastructure and making new capital investments, with projections starting on page 781 for a *20 year* investment in capital expenditures for the VicPD. All of this is going in the wrong direction. We should not be supporting police expansion, whether in operations or capital, but should instead be divesting from expanding police power and reach and using that money for community-based solutions. It is unclear from the information presented what has already been committed to in previous years and what is a new request/project/expense. This information is needed to be able to provide meaningful input. The information presented by VicPD at the Joint Board/Councils meeting in November 2018 did not include any information about the VicPD's capital budget request and did not identify the VicPD's current balance available for capital expenditures and whether there is a surplus on reserve (other than identifying that \$400,000 of the operating budget was for "Expenditures Dedicated Reserves" which includes replacement of capital infrastructure as well as retirement obligations). This information is needed to be able to meaningfully assess whether additional capital funds is at all appropriate or whether any needed replacements should come from existing reserve funds. 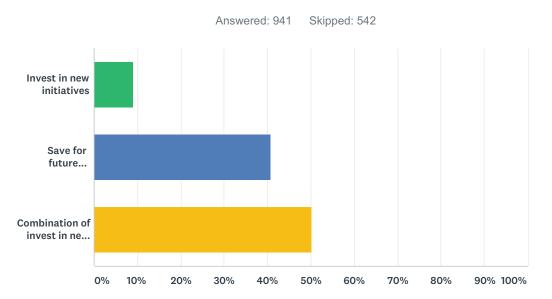



Q49 How should the City allocate 2018 surplus revenue?



Q50 How should the City allocate new assessed revenue generated from new development for 2019? (select all that apply)





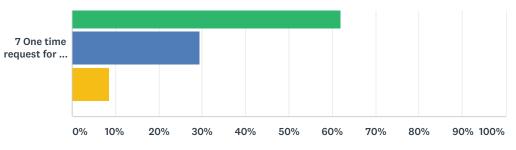

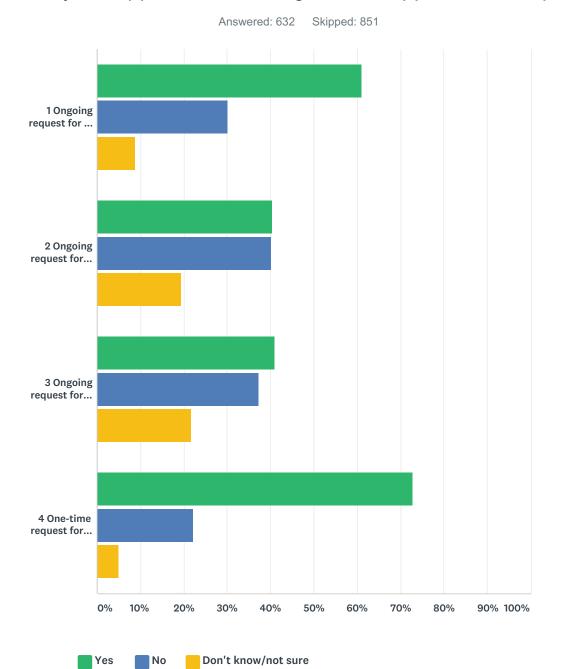

I do not support the \$1.13 million proposed over three years to support the phased-in creation of 12 new VicPD officer positions + 1 new civilian position. There should be no expansion of the VicPD force and no new hires as there is no evidence suggesting need for additional VicPD staffing. According to Statistics Canada and the VicPD's own data, the most recent available data show that from 2014-2018 calls for service to the VicPD decreased, and in the past 3 years crime rates and the crime severity index have also dropped (with consistent longitudinal trending downward over the past 10 years). This is consistent with broader societal trends of declining crime rates across Canada for the past 20+ years. Additionally, since 2009 Victoria has been the most heavily policed major city in all of Canada and there is no rationale for why Victoria in particular should have this intensive a level of policing (e.g., no evidence has been provided that Victoria has more calls for service per capita than other major Canadian cities; Victoria has lower crime rate and crime severity than many other Canadian cities). As mentioned earlier, of particular concern in relation to potential social and racial profiling the VicPD is seeking an increase of 10 patrol positions with 4 of these going to a new "Community Response Team" that would proactively target areas where people with low incomes live, socialize, and access services. For all the reasons stated earlier I do not support this direction. While I support public access to VicPD data, the proposed civilian research analyst position can be accomplished by shifting money away from existing unnecessary civilian positions (e.g., VicPD public relations). I strongly object to police being embedded in ACT teams and any other embedding of police in mental health or other health services, as set out in earlier comments. The \$262,210 proposed here for 2 officer positions in ACT teams should not be funded. No information is provided in the Draft Financial Plan or the VicPD November 2018 Council presentations about what would be covered by the VicPD's request for \$139,892 for "Special Duties Funding". In the absence of any information about what this line item is for, it should not be funded. I note a one-time request of \$362,000 for "overnight sheltering support and clean up in City parks and green spaces, allowing for reduced risk of those using City parks, as well as reduced damage to vegetation and eco-systems". While I strongly support public funds being used to increase amenities to people sheltering in parks (including bathrooms) and would also support using public funds to engage with people sheltering in parks to create new amenities to better meet their needs (e.g., storage of belongings), I am concerned that the funds identified here do not seem to be earmarked for this purpose by instead may be used to fund increased security patrols or other efforts to surveil, police or displace people sheltering in parks, and to dispose of their belongings. I am also concerned at the overstating of impact of the small number of people who shelter in parks on the natural environment and particularly the suggestion that people sheltering in parks is detrimental to ecosystems. The environmental impact of unhoused people is miniscule compared to the very significant environmental impact of industry, road and building construction -- yet unhoused people are singled out and scapegoated. I am disturbed that this language is included in this survey and hope that future surveys will consider how to frame this item in a way that does not encourage social profiling and anti-homeless hate.



Hello,

I wanted to add support for increasing the rate of green stormwater infrastructure implementation.

As we know from the research from Dr. Jenifer McIntyre at Washington State University, <u>exposure to road runoff</u> <u>is causing acute mortality in coho salmon spawners and busy roads are the land use most closely associated</u> <u>with the mortality phenomenon</u>.

However, this research has also shown that there is an <u>extremely effective and inexpensive solution for treatment</u> through filtering runoff through green stormwater infrastructure (raingardens, bioswales, simple bioretention with filtration through sand/soil). Actions that could be enacted for this relatively simple remedy include:

- 1. Implementation of bio-filtration methods (raingardens, bioswales or simple bioretention with filtration through sand/soil) in the stormwater runoff infrastructure of all new transportation projects.
- 2. Gradual (but speeded-up) retro-fitting of existing stormwater runoff infrastructure.

Raingardens and Bioswales save salmon - it is as simple as that. Unfiltered road run off can kill them outright.

This reduction in direct pollution has impacts for every aquatic organism, from the zooplankton nobody sees to the Orcas that bring Victoria so much tourism. You can add in all the benefits of planted raingardens that increase flowers for pollinators and many other benefits.

I am emailing from the Townhall mtg. As the father of Personal info, I want to emphasize to council the value of this program and ask you to restore its funding under the policing budget.

My daughter looked forward to "Constable Craig's" visits and frequently spoke fondly of them. The regular presence of the police liaison is a valuable investment in our future citizenry, inculcating a deep sense of connection in children to law enforcement as a public good that can be trusted.

Also, the Constable's advice to students on conflict management--"walk away, use your words, or seek help"--have significantly helped to make the school yard a safer, less violent place. My children hold his instruction in high regard and have internalized it. School teachers use it. At home we have also incorporated this advice into our parenting methods. Constable Craig has made a significant positive contribution to the school and community culture, schooling many on the fundamentals of conflict management. This will benefit us all, culturally and fiscally someday.

I have not researched the public policy studies on the cost-benefits of police-school liaisons, but I suspect that the social science data will corroborate my personal experience of it's value.

I hope my children and other children in our community will continue to benefit from this program. Please restore its funding.

The Housing Action Response Team (HART) is an integrated outreach team that offers support and information to homeless individuals within our community who are staying in parks, encampments, cars and on the street; not in shelters.

Based on a model seen in Seattle, BC Housing invited the City of Victoria and community partners including Victoria Police, to begin a pilot in May 2017 to focus on homeless encampments. On a weekly basis, community partners and outreach workers reach out to some of our community's most vulnerable citizens in parks and on the street. Within the first year of the project, HART outreach met more than 140 individuals; not only making personal connections, but encouraging service access, making countless referrals to shelter, social assistance and health care.

HART Outreach Team members now include (but is not limited to) City of Victoria Police, City of Victoria Bylaw Department, Pacifica Downtown Outreach Service, Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction, BC Housing, Beacon Community Services, Island Health 713 Outreach, and more recently, Saanich Police.

HART Outreach team engages with homeless persons on the street or in parks:

- To assess individuals and identify barriers to housing
- To provide immediate referrals to a wide range of service providers including for food, shelter, clothing, and other resources in the community
- To provide referrals to a wide range of other services including but not limited to social assistance, obtaining identification, and mental health support or physical health care
- Liaising closely with emergency shelters to identify vacancies; identifying individuals who are some of our most vulnerable homeless and then fast tracking them and transporting them into available shelter beds
- To identify and prioritize homeless persons who are particularly struggling or unwell, or highly vulnerable to prioritize "VAT" housing assessments and supportive housing applications (housing with on-site support)
- To share knowledge and resources amongst HART members

Victoria Police, and in particular Community Resource Officer Sean Hand have an important role to play on the HART outreach team; as well as part of a broader system of care for serving homeless individuals. These contributions vary on a weekly basis but also include:

- Working closely with supportive housing providers to develop and implement a support plan as we move some individuals from homelessness into supportive housing
- Participating through committee work (CAA Placement Committee) as we prioritize supportive housing applicants into supportive housing resources
- Participating at the planning level through committee work (CAA Advisory Committee), Greater Victoria Coalition to End Homelessness (System Improvement Working Group)

We sincerely appreciate Victoria Police contribution to our broader system of care for people who are experiencing homeless, and who live with mental health and addiction. If you have any further questions about HART outreach or Victoria Police contribution, please feel free to contact me.

I can't make it to your Jan. 16 or Jan. 19 meeting so thought I would send some comments on your Draft Strategic Plan for 2019-2022.

Sentiments seem worthy; scope of your intentions very wide; workload planned for your staff very broad (and deep?) I agree with much of the comment from Grumpy Taxpayers today and particularly this comment: *Often there's insufficient focus on the core mandate of providing quality, basic services that are affordable to all of its residents. Often councils pursue pet projects or ideological bound expenditures or stray into areas of provincial or federal jurisdiction.*

I'll focus on the three significant omissions I see, plug three other comments.

- Strategic Objective 7 item 7. Striking absence of any intention to assist or promote or even notice an issue of mobility for those who need to use a mobility scooter. I already knew this, because when I wrote to the last council asking for mobility aids (e.g. navigable sidewalks, cutouts to road) to be introduced in Fernwood I elicited absolutely no interest from council or staff. Still this is a shocking omission from a council's core responsibilities. "Accessible" might be a good concept to introduce instead of or as well as "Sustainable" in Transportation.
- Strategic Objective 7 item 12. Silly and retrograde to lower speed limits when you don't enforce existing ones. Fernwood Rd for instance has a speed limit of 30 but the average vehicle speed would be about 55 or 60.
- Strategic Objective 5. Absolutely no reference to what I consider one of the most serious offences against public health, and one that modern cities have generally coped with: the absence of any facilities for those who need a toilet. The amount of human feces visible in Fernwood last summer was shocking. If Victoria had a public health officer, he or she would surely be calling this to attention.
- Strategic Objective 5 item 9. I'm not sure what this means. Accessible in what sense? Depriving the downtown of parking opportunities probably lessens the need for uniformity or accessibility in standards.
- Strategic Objective 1 item 3. You might also advocate for updating the civil governance model for municipal policing by removing mayors from police boards. "Civil governance", which almost all policing authorities advocate, should not mean "political governance".
- Strategic Objective 8. You do not mention city parks other than Beacon Hill but I want to congratulate the last council for having improved the little city parks so greatly. They had been totally neglected for ages! But in the last four years wonderful improvements have been made. I hope the Council means to keep this up this excellent maintenance standard.

I looked over the list of budget priorities and these additions came to mind. More input may come tomorrow. I will send this off to you tonight.

Protection of endangered Garry Oak Ecosystems

Could you kindly include protecting the endangered Garry Oak ecosystems from leash free dogs. I note there are an increase of leash free areas and I hope they are not in endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. There is less than 1 % of the original Garry Oak ecosystems remaining. These precious Garry Oak ecosystems were properly stewarded by our ancestors for the past 800 years. The Garry Oak ecosystems have diminished mostly in the past 2 generations because of the burgeoning dog population. I do not believe that all areas in the the public parks can be home to both Garry Oak ecosystems and dogs, on leash or off leash. There should be contained separated areas that are dog free zones as well as contained leash free zones. The 2 are not compatible in the same area.

Toronto is one of several cities that have transformed empty school play grounds after school hours and weekends to include areas that are contained leash free zones with special ground material to absorb the dog feces and urine. Could Victoria also follow this model instead of allowing dogs to run in parks that have endangered plant species as Garry Oak meadows.

I recommend bylaws about numbers of dogs allowed in parks on or off leash to 2 dogs per owner or dog walker. I see dog walkers with 6 or more dogs on or off leash that are crashing through endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. The number of ground nesting song birds has diminished to almost zero in some parks. The sound of song birds has been replaced by dogs crashing through the bushes.

It may take courage and strong intention to protect natural and landscaped areas from devastation by dogs as there are many dog owners who feel that dogs are entitled to run freely in parks.

I can provide examples of 'no dog' signs at nature preserve parks and green city centers. One example of No Dogs or Dogs on Leash at all times is in Ganges, Saltspring Island that demonstrate preservation of nature sanctuaries as Ruckland Park and the city center.... as a priority over dogs thrashing through and destroying the endangered ecosystems. Stiff financial penalties are enforced.

Could dog owners be taxed higher than non dog owners, considering the huge amount of tax payers money needed to haul away dog excrement from the garbage cans as well as the glut of plastic bags containg dog excrement? This takes huge management and expense at the city dumps.

<u>I wish to support Jacques Sirois' effort to recreate Southern</u> <u>Vancouver island coasts as marine bird sanctuaries.</u> Eliminate plastic and sterofoam service utensils from hotels and restuarants

Lets get back to paper or better yet, washable service utensils.

Eliminate plastic straws . Keep up the work to eliminate single use plastic straws and bags. Lets carry our own fabric bags to the stores and markets.

Support glass bottles instead of plastic bottles for all bevereges.. and encourage carrying home thermoses on a daily basis..

Eliminate excess bubble dome plastic packaging in food stores and for all merchandise

Eliminate plastic wrap at floral shops. Brown paper is attractive on floral arrangements.

Stronger pesticide restrictions and enforcement..... provide education for alternatives to Roundup.. eg vinegar Support organic farming, community gardens and home organic gardens.

<u>Grow crops that purify the soil from previously used pesticides.</u> I can provide more information if required.

<u>Please continue to maitain Victoria as a GMO free zone and</u> <u>support local organic farmers markets.</u>

Apologies for the delay in getting this out to you. It's not formal but this is just a quick list of some of the high priority areas that could use some attention via city budgets.

- Burnside & Jutland intersection the corners closest to the Gorge are dangerous for pedestrian traffic, both in terms of visibility and also mobility for strollers, wheelchairs, etc
- A crosswalk across Gorge Road at the Goose Trail access point (at Gorge Bridge) is a priority for the neighbourhood.
- Comments from the community for more green space, (parks, trees along streets.
- Pedestrian / bike access from the Goose Trail to Carroll and Albany Streets.
- Community Centre funding increase Community Centre operational funds, currently all seniors and community centres receive just over \$50,000 annually regardless of facility size or service delivery. The centres have been in conversation with City staff to develop more equitable and standardized operating agreements and funding models.
- Any improvements to streetscape and walkability along Burnside & Gorge Roads would be welcome
- The creation of internal green corridors remains a priority for the neighbourhood to allow for safe walking routes for residents.



A total of 148 individuals participated in an inspiring day of sharing ideas, learning together and community building. Participants were asked to roll up their sleeves and join their neighbours to dive deep into the proposed Strategic Plan to help set the course for their city over the next four years. The community representatives had the opportunity to discuss and highlight what was important to them as part of the draft Strategic Plan, what kind of engagement they were interested for various projects in 2019, and what actions Council could consider for future planning.

One of the long-term goals of the City's public engagement activities is to grow connections among people – or social capital – building a sense of belonging, social trust and increasing the levels of civic participation. This question probes where people place themselves on the social capital rubric. Participants were asked at the beginning and end of the event to see if there was a change. By the end of the day, some people were already indicating that they had moved up the social capital scale, seeing themselves as influencing and effecting change in the community.

5. Participants also participated in two word cloud activities. At the beginning of the Engagement Summit, they were asked: *What is the ONE WORD that describes how you would like to interact and be treated today?*

The words "respect", "respectfully", "heard" and "meaningfully", were prevalent.

Feedback from Participants

The online registration form asked participants to indicate in order of preference the Strategic Plan objectives they would like to engage on at the Summit. Prior to the event, they were assigned their **top two** preferences to do a deep dive on at the Summit.

This format provided participants with advance time to prepare for the discussions.

Participants were seated in circles of 8-12 and session facilitators fostered dialogue between participants.



At each Engagement Station, there were 2-3 large information panels that displayed the strategic objective (e.g. Good Governance) and the list of proposed actions and their associated year of completion. The facilitator guided the conversation. Recorders noted insights and feedback. A designated City Councillor and staff content expert were available to answer guestions.

Morning Engagement Sessions – Strategic Objectives and Actions

The two morning sessions were each 45 minutes in length and designed to explore the draft actions within each strategic objective and consider any new actions for Council's consideration, as well as identify potential outcomes to help measure success.

Each engagement station's facilitator asked their group to:

1) Identify outcomes - How will we know if we have been successful?

In most cases, participants wanted to see clear measures of performance in each program area.

2) Review draft actions:

- a. Do you think the draft actions will achieve this objective?
- b. Is there an action that should be removed/moved?
- c. Any new actions proposed were discussed and noted on New Action Worksheets (the level of support within the group was also identified). Please see the New Actions section (page 8) for more information.
- 3) Set priorities To help provide Council with a community lens on priorities and make tough trade-off decisions, participants were tasked to indicate their top five actions that they thought would be the most effective in achieving this objective over the next four years.



Input recorded at Engagement Stations regarding outcomes, comments on Council-proposed actions, and the priority setting exercise has been compiled and synthesized by objective and included in *Appendix A - Draft Strategic Plan Objectives and Actions Feedback*.

Outcomes suggested by participants will be helpful to staff as part of an evaluation framework and key performance indicators, to be developed following Council's adoption the final for 2019-2022 Strategic Plan.

Afternoon Engagement Sessions – 2019 Levels of Engagement

The afternoon portion of the Summit began with the IAP2 Spectrum 101 presentation and interactive "stakeholder" activity by Amelia Shaw, Executive Manager of the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2) Canada. This mini-workshop introduced participants to the IAP2 levels of engagement used in the City's Engagement Framework: *Inform; Consult; Involve; Collaborate; and Empower*.

Following the IAP2 interactive activity, participants returned to their two morning engagement stations for 25-minute sessions to discuss the levels of engagement they thought would be appropriate for the draft 2019 actions.

In many cases, individuals in the groups failed to have consensus on the manner in which the City should engage with different stakeholder groups, along different phases of proposed actions. When consensus on the level of engagement for an action could not be reached, recorders noted the number of participants who supported a level of engagement for an action. This information is also included by Strategic Objective in *Appendix A - Draft Strategic Plan Objectives and Actions Feedback*.

NOTE: Once the Strategic Plan is finalized by Council, City staff will consider the range of input collected on the levels of engagement as part of determining 2019 engagement plans. Levels of engagement for 2019 actions will **not** form part of the final 2019–2022 Strategic Plan.

New Actions

During the morning engagement station sessions, there was an opportunity for participants to suggest **new actions** for their strategic objective that they would like Council to consider.

Participants were informed that any new actions proposed would be considered by Council for implementation from 2020-2022. This would provide an opportunity for Council to receive a report from staff on the proposed new action and its associated implications on existing City programs, services and costs.

If there was general support in the group following a facilitated discussion of the new action, the participant completed a New Action Worksheet. If more than one new action was proposed,




participants within the group were asked to indicate the action *most important to be achieved* over the next four years.

A selection of new actions proposed by participants were pitched on stage during an **Open Pitch session** and voted on in real-time to gauge the views of all Summit participants. Participants could select how strongly they supported the new action by selecting: | *Very Important / Important / Neutral / Somewhat Important / Not Important*

- 31 are already included in the Draft Strategic Plan in some capacity or already in progress, and
- 6 suggest modifications to specific actions in the Draft Strategic Plan

One person from each table was invited to share their table's draft Goal Statement with the larger group. All Goal Statement Worksheets were collected, along with the content shared on the Goal Murals, and entered into a spreadsheet for Council's consideration.

I note there are an increase of leash free areas and I hope they are not in endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. There is less than 1 % of the original Garry Oak ecosystems remaining. These precious Garry Oak ecosystems were properly stewarded by our ancestors for the past 800 years.

The Garry Oak ecosystems have diminished mostly in the past 2 generations because of the burgeoning dog population.

I do not believe that all areas in the the public parks can be home to both Garry Oak ecosystems and dogs, on leash or off leash. There should be contained separated areas that are dog free zones as well as contained leash free zones. The 2 are not compatible in the same area.

Toronto is one of several cities that have transformed empty school play grounds after school hours and weekends to include areas that are contained leash free zones with special ground material to absorb the dog feces and urine. Could Victoria also follow this model instead of allowing dogs to run in parks that have endangered plant species as Garry Oak meadows.

I recommend bylaws about numbers of dogs allowed in parks on or off leash to 2 dogs per owner or dog walker. I see dog walkers with 6 or more dogs on or off leash that are crashing through endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. The number of ground nesting song birds has diminished to almost zero in some parks. The sound of song birds has been replaced by dogs crashing through the bushes.

It may take courage and strong intention to protect natural and landscaped areas from devastation by dogs as there are many dog owners who feel that dogs are entitled to run freely in parks.

I can provide examples of 'no dog' signs at nature preserve parks and green city centers. One example of No Dogs or Dogs on Leash at all times is in Ganges, Saltspring Island that demonstrate preservation of nature sanctuaries as Ruckland Park and the city center.... as a priority over dogs thrashing through and destroying the endangered ecosystems. Stiff financial penalties are enforced.

Could dog owners be taxed higher than non dog owners, considering the huge amount of tax payers money needed to haul away dog excrement from the garbage cans as well as the glut of plastic bags containg dog excrement? This takes huge management and expense at the city dumps.

I wish to support Jacques Sirois' effort to recreate Southern Vancouver island coasts as marine bird sanctuaries.

Eliminate plastic and sterofoam service utensils from hotels and restuarants

Lets get back to paper or better yet, washable service utensils.

Eliminate plastic straws . Keep up the work to eliminate single use plastic straws and bags. Lets carry our own fabric bags to the stores and markets.

Support glass bottles instead of plastic bottles for all bevereges.. and encourage carrying home thermoses on a daily basis..

Eliminate excess bubble dome plastic packaging in food stores and for all merchandise

Eliminate plastic wrap at floral shops. Brown paper is attractive on floral arrangements.

Stronger pesticide restrictions and enforcement..... provide education for alternatives to Roundup.. eg vinegar

Support organic farming, community gardens and home organic gardens.

<u>Grow crops that purify the soil from previously used pesticides. I can</u> provide more information if required.

<u>Please continue to maitain Victoria as a GMO free zone and support</u> <u>local organic farmers markets.</u>

Support education on using organic home/kitchen vegge food waste to nourish the soil. I can provide ideas if required that prevent rats and flies. Agricultural land is being used for growing marijuana which formerly grew vegetables, Restrict marijuana grow ops. Preserve agricultural land for organic food farms

Prevention and Rehabilitiation through Transcendental Meditation

I am a former Victoria resident (UVic Class of 1984) with plans to retire there in the next few years. I work as a business media editor/writer, covering communications/technology, finance, marketing, and transportation. I am also a long-time transportation advocate including having Personal info

and supported downtown streetcar and LRT plans and the SaveRail Coalition in 2002 when the E&N was threatened with abandonment.

I would like to provide comments to the draft 2019 – 2022 Draft Strategic Plan and wish for them to be entered into the public record in view of my not being able to attend Saturday's **Strategic Plan Engagement Summit**.

My comments address Strategic Objective #7: Sustainable Transportation, Section 6 "Work towards a regional rail system/advocate for commuter rail and inter-city rail along the E and N railway from Victoria Harbour without delay".

I applaud and support this Objective as the restoration and revitalization of the E&N is essential if the City and the region and Island is to support a sustainable green economy. To enable the realization of this Objective I would like to offer the following draft amendment as an addition to the existing section to read as follows:

"Designate and protect an easement from Victoria Harbour for a new rail bridge and right of way into the city centre. Study, in partnership with BC Transit and other stakeholders, hybrid commuter rail/rapid transit TramTrain."

Here is the background and rationale:

--The planned Victoria Harbour terminus would work for intercity rail, but only in the interim for commuter rail and only provided there Is bus and water transit (to the Legislative Precinct) access. But long-term it is not competitively sustainable for commuter rail because of lengthy and inconvenient transfers. Even when the E&N was still at the more convenient Store Street location it lost the 2002 *Commuter Challenge*.

Commuter rail requires downtown access to be successful, particularly in smaller markets like the CRD. Commuter rail in the similarly-sized city of Burlington, Vermont (The Champlain Flyer) failed in part because its station is at the foot of a steep hill from the city centre.

--Designating and protecting a suitable easement protects the option of bringing commuter rail and also LRT over the E&N into the downtown i.e. future-proofing. *Once lost it will be impossible to provide direct service.*

--TramTrain is hybrid commuter rail/rapid transit that permit trainsets to operate both on existing railway tracks and onstreet to supply direct no-transfer access to city centres. It combines the advantages of commuter rail and LRT, including the ability to draw motorists and attract sustainable transit-oriented development.

TramTrains are popular in Europe with applications in the USA, notably Capital Metrorail (Austin, Texas) and the RiverLINE (NJ Transit). I am firsthand familiar with the RiverLINE through having ridden it often while living in Bordentown, New Jersey in 2017-2018.

--TramTrains can be electric, diesel, and alternatively-powered with green energy. They may not need the costly installation of unsightly overhead wires in the city centre.

--TramTrains can permit high-quality (every 12 minute/15-minute service in each direction) on a signalled single-track right of way with passing sidings: which could be implemented at a fraction of the capital cost of LRT over the Highway 1 corridor (estimated at \$950 million) even with a new bridge.

Ottawa, Ontario's Trillium Line offers a template as it operates on that frequency also on a signalled singletracked/passing siding railway line also formerly owned by the Canadian Pacific Railway (that too once had a daily CPR/later VIA Budd RDC-equipped passenger train).

The Trillium Line features a single-tracked bridge over the Rideau River and tunnel under Dow's Lake. There had been plans for a North-South LRT on the same alignment, but they were scrapped. Ottawa is about to open an east-west LRT.

--TramTrains have the versatility to provide Victoria-Langford rapid transit and Island-wide commuter and intercity rail. The RiverLINE operates over 55 km from Trenton to Camden with plans to extend it south to Glassboro, providing local and intercity service every 15 minutes each way in the peak periods and every 30 minutes in the off-peak.

--Evolving best practices combined with recent regulatory changes and waivers in the U.S. (Canada tends to follow U.S. practices) now permits lightweight TramTrain trainsets to be used in mixed traffic with conventional freight and passenger trains.

--While the E&N corridor for LRT and limited E&N commuter rail has been examined, TramTrain under the above parameters has not been studied.

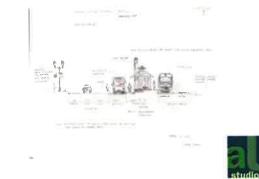

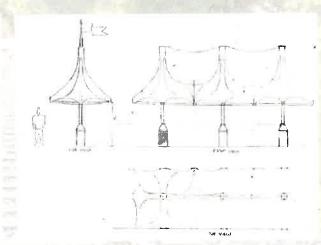

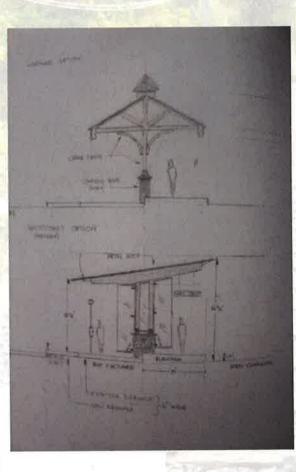
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


Drawings showing different types of station designs; modern and heritage.



Above a basic site map of what the station and bus exchange along Kimta Rd could look like.







Health, Well-Being and a Welcoming City

We want a healthy population in a healthy city within a healthy CRD. To achieve this we need be sure in our policies and language that we stop equating "medical" and "health." We need to focus on the promotion of wellness based on the World Health Organization's Social Determinants of Health:

- Clean air we are so fortunate to benefit from the clean air from the Pacific Ocean but need to do much more to reduce emissions, maybe significant fines for idling engines including those used or owned by the City, some 'parking for low or no emission vehicles' blocks at 25% the cost of other areas
- Clean water making progress but we need to ban bottled water and all microplastics. We also need to significantly reduce the waste of water, encouraging planting low water-use plants, accepting that grass naturally browns in the summer, set guidelines for everything from restricting water-greedy bathroom and kitchen fixtures to restrictions on in-unit washers, driers and dish washers.
- Nutritious food encourage boulevard gardening, maybe an annual prize in each neighbourhood?
- Social connections another good reason for shared use laundry facilities, food exchanges, boulevard veggie gardening etc. Anything that gets people together is a factor in safety and health.
- Safe housing whatever leads to social connections also supports safety.

By focusing on these determinants of health and the whole range of primary health care resources, including all the professions that focus on health and wellness, such as dieticians, social workers, kinesiologists we can reduce the dependency on very expensive and scare medical and surgical resources. When medical resources are needed, Nurse Practitioners offer the advantage of being aware of 'the whole person' and the community and providing almost the entire range of services provided by Family Physicians.

Can the City respond to opportunities to place Nurse Practitioners in community organizations? Can the City support attracting Nurse Practitioners rather than focusing on physicians who are not available and may not be ideal.

Can the City respond to community need for a wide range of health and wellness services for people who have no extended care plans.

My Goal is that in four years the City of Victoria will be a well governed, healthy, affordable, diverse community, keeping the best of our traditions and becoming environmentally responsible.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council receive this report for information.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On December 18, 2019, City Council released the draft 2019-2022 Strategic Plan which will set priorities for new key initiatives over the next four years for the City of Victoria. Based on the draft Strategic Plan, two concurrent streams of input are being sought by Council prior to its anticipated adoption in early 2019: (1) public engagement through a community "summit" held on January 20, 2019; and (2) staff assessment of human and financial resources required to achieve the actions and objectives of the Plan. The following report focuses on the results of the latter stream (resource assessment).

The draft 2019-2022 Strategic Plan is organized into eight Strategic Objectives with over 160 associated Actions that are to be completed over the next four years. Many of the Actions identified are complementary to work that is already underway and/or planned through the 2019 Financial Plan and align with recent Council direction. Examples of this alignment to the new Strategic Plan Objectives include, but are not limited to:

- Objective 1: Good Governance Continuous improvement of open government initiatives to improve transparency
- Objective 2: Reconciliation and Indigenous Relations City Family and Protocol
 Office Operations
- Objective 3: Affordable Housing Housing Strategy Implementation, Market Rental Revitalization
- Objective 4: Prosperity and Economic Inclusion Living Wage Policy, Business Hub operations
- Objective 5: Health, Well Being and a Welcoming City Accessibility Framework, Youth Strategy
- Objective 6: Climate Leadership and Environmental Stewardship Climate Leadership Plan, Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan, Waste Management Strategy
- Objective 7: Sustainable Transportation Sustainable Mobility Strategy, Bike
 Master Plan Implementation

Objective 8: Strong Livable Neighbourhoods – Create Victoria (Arts and Culture Master Plan), Local Area Planning

Over 100 staff were involved in the assessment of human and financial resource impacts of all Action items over a four-week time period, while maintaining current programs and services. Principles for this assessment included:

- Actions are to be assessed for additional human and financial resource requirements over and above those contained in the 2019 Financial Plan
- No assumptions of trade-offs or decreasing existing service levels to accommodate new Actions for 2019-2022 are to be included, to align with Council's direction for 2019 financial planning (maintain all current services at current service levels)
- Where there are known options for an approach or scope of an Action item, these will be provided for information to receive further direction from Council
- In cases where staff require more time to scope the Action item(s), note that and follow up report to Council is to be provided and approximate timing
- Where there is a lack of clarity of the Action and intended outcomes, indicate additional direction is requested from Council
- If there are legal or authority concerns, these are to be flagged for Council

Given the number of items that required assessment, best efforts were made by staff over the allotted time period, to provide Council with the most accurate information and analysis possible to inform decisions. In several cases, additional time and effort would be required to complete analysis of proposed initiatives; in other cases, staff are seeking further clarity from Council on the scope and desired outcomes.

Additionally, this report contains responses to all of the Financial Plan motions that were forwarded to the Strategic Plan discussions, some of which are directly linked to the draft Strategic Plan.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with a preliminary assessment of additional human and financial resources that will be required to undertake Actions identified in the draft 2019-2022 Strategic Plan, as well as identify those areas where staff require more time to assess Actions and/or require clarification from Council.

BACKGROUND

On September 6, 2018, Council received the Second Quarter Operational Plan Progress report, which included an update on the progress toward the 2015-2018 Strategic Objectives. At that time, it was noted by staff that almost 30% of the previous Council priorities had not been completed and would be carrying forward into 2019. As part of that report, staff also noted limited staff resources to complete projects within the timeframes indicated, as well as external pressures that that are impacting operations.

On November 17, 2019, Council received the draft 2019 Financial Plan for consideration. The Financial Plan includes all current programs and services provided by the City, and as directed by Council, maintains all existing service levels.

From November 26 to December 12, 2019, five Council Workshops were facilitated by the Mayor to develop the draft 2019-2022 Strategic Plan. The Plan includes over 160 Action to be undertaken over a four-year period which are aligned to eight overarching strategic objectives.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

Given lessons learned from the previous strategic planning cycle, staff developed a rapidassessment methodology and process for conducting a more fulsome assessment of the draft 2019-2022 Strategic Plan. To support Council's decision making, the assessment provides financial and human resource requirements to undertake the Actions. Principles for this assessment include:

- Actions are to be assessed for additional human and financial resource requirements over and above those contained in the 2019 Financial Plan
- No assumptions of trade-offs or decreasing existing service levels to accommodate new Actions for the 2019-2022 cycle are to be included to align with given Council's direction for 2019 financial planning direction (to maintain current services at current service levels)
- Where there are known options for approach or scope of an Action item, these will be provided for information and further direction from Council
- In cases where staff require more time to scope the Action items, these will be provided in a follow up report to Council along with an approximate report back timeframe, where possible
- Where there is a lack of clarity of the Action, staff will indicate additional direction is requested from Council
- If there are legal or authority concerns, these are to be flagged for Council

Some Actions have been 'clustered' for staff assessment efficiency and given a "Topic" name for reference purposes. In a limited number of cases, Actions that have been clustered and may fall under two separate objectives, but similar in nature – these have been highlighted in the Attachments to this report.

The resource assessment included every Action item in the draft 2019-2022 Strategic Plan, excluding those that are to be solely led by Council. A list of these Council-Led actions are contained in Attachment A. In some cases, staff involvement could be required later in 2019 or beyond; this has not been analysed or scoped.

The staff assessment was conducted in a short four-week time period and included well over 100 staff. In some cases, partial staff responses or background information has been provided given the limited amount of time. The Strategic Plan is highly "front loaded" in that approximately 75% of the Actions are to be achieved in the first two years (by the end of 2020). Other key challenges and limitations of the assessment include:

- Budget estimates have been made on assumptions of the expected deliverables
- The order of magnitude or cumulative impact on support departments has not been assessed and major impacts for enabling service operations are expected as outlined in the table below:

External pressures and trends are continuing to impact day to day City operations, including limited or no responses to RFPs, high development activity, lack of qualified candidates or long recruitment times due to a competitive labour market for talent, and cost escalations given market conditions.

Staff have not considered what services could be reduced or re-prioritized to accommodate new initiatives given Council's previous direction for the Financial Plan to maintain current services at current service levels. Should Council choose to look at trade-off with existing programs, services and initiatives to fund new Council priorities, staff request Council direction on areas to focus on to ensure effort is not spent on services or programs Council would not consider shifting.



Based on the findings of the preliminary staff assessment of the 2019-2022 Strategic Plan, Attachment B provides a listing of each of the Topics [Action] Items organized into the following general categories:

Attachment B is a reference to each of the Action items and the level of assessment that was undertaken, as well as the applicable resource impacts where known. Overall, staff were able to assess approximately 70% of the Strategic Plan in some detail (Preliminary, Complete or Included in the Financial Plan), with another 17% requiring further clarification from Council and 5% requiring more time to assess due to staff capacity or complexity of the initiative, as depicted in the chart below.

Attachment C includes a detailed listing of the staff assessment and is broken down into "Topic" for the Action items that were assessed and includes information in the following fields:

- Expected Outcomes and Impacts Interpretation of staff on the deliverables that are expected to be achieved.
- Staff Assessment Response Indication of which category the Action primarily falls within, including additional background information where applicable and the type of work required.
- 3. Risks, Dependencies and Assumptions Additional information on issues or unintended impacts for Council's information.
- 4. Estimated budget impact In addition to existing resources that are committed.

For the estimated budget impacts, these are over and above existing resources. Should Council include these Actions in the Final 2019-2022 Strategic Plan, a revenue source will need to be identified and included within the Financial Plan. Council could consider funding one-time items through surplus or reserves (if an appropriate reserve with sufficient funding exists), and ongoing items through new property tax revenue from new development, reallocation of funding by reducing an existing service, or a tax increase. Depending on the approved scope and timing for the Actions, tax increases are likely required.

In addition to the staff assessment, Appendix D contains responses to all of the Financial Plan Motions. Where applicable, these are cross-referenced with Strategic Plan Action responses in Appendix C where they are connected, or of the same Topic area.

CONCLUSIONS

Well over 100 staff have been involved in the assessment since the conclusion of the Council Strategic Planning Workshops in mid-December with best efforts made to provide Council and citizens with the initial assessment findings. The City remains committed to continued transparency and accountability of tax dollars while achieving the City's Strategic Objectives.

FESTIVAL INVESTMENT GRANTS PROGRAM: (See Strategic Plan Action 4.4)

That Council direct staff to report back on options for a funding increase of \$50,000 for the Festival Investment Grants starting in 2019 potentially from new assessed revenue.

BACKGROUND:

The Festival Investment Grant program was established to create and sustain a healthy community, vibrant downtown core and enhance economic development. Over the past twenty years, the City has supported festivals through the Festival Investment Grant Program. Additional in-kind support is provided based on need and the availability of departmental resources.

The FIG program is perennially oversubscribed. Council directed staff to review the FIG program in 2019. Staff have examined opportunities to expand the program to community association led events, events in the shoulder season and to continue support for signature events. In addition to a thorough policy review, staff look forward to utilizing the newly appointed Music Advisory Committee in an effort to identify opportunities to better align with the local music community.

The annual FIG recommendations are typically approved by Council shortly after budget approval in February. Applicants require an indication of the level of support from the City before the financial plan is adopted in May. Should Council still be in budget deliberations when the FIG applications come forward for consideration, pre-budget approval of the potential funding increase to the program in 2019 would be required should Council desire funding be made available for 2019 festivals.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Unfortunately, staff have no suggestions for funding sources that are not from the City. If Council chooses to implement this increase, funding could come from new property tax revenue from new assessment, reallocation of funding through a reduction in another service, or through a tax increase of 0.04%.

FESTIVAL AND ARTS FUNDING:

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2020, 2021 and 2022 budget on options for increasing investments in festivals and community arts events.

BACKGROUND:

As part of the City's role as event producer, facilitator, regulator and venue/equipment manager, the Arts, Culture and Events Office assists hundreds of festivals and community arts events annually.

Through the issuance of hundreds of permits and related work orders annually, staff coordinate and allocate the appropriate City services necessary for the safe use of public space. Related City services include the deployment of traffic control equipment, sign shop, street cleaning, waste management, as well as staff support from parks, engineering and public works, fire and police.

Increases to the department's City services budget have not kept pace with service requests or with the changing nature of services required to ensure public safety at large public gatherings. As a result of evolving approaches to policing large public events, there has been a steady increase to the scope of police services required at large community events.

In 2018, Council budgeted the following for the facilitation of not-for-profit use of public space for accessible public events:

\$222,380 – Festival Investment Grants (cash)
\$25,000 – Seed funding Canada Day production
\$115,430 – work orders regular time (City staff and equipment deployment)
\$113,000 – work orders outside purchases (mostly police)

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

In addition to the potential \$50,000 increase to the Festival Investment Grant program in 2019, any increase to the annual special events City services budget would assist in maintaining the current level of access to community events. Without an increase, beyond COLA levels, proposals for increased levels of cost recovery will be necessary. Increased funding for event related City service support at accessible public events in public space will help to ensure safe accessible community events for residents and visitors and assist in maintaining the current public event inventory.

Options to be assessed as part of the 2020 Financial Plan.

ART IN PUBLIC PLACES

Council passed a number of motions regarding public art. They have been grouped in this response as they all currently draw from the same funding source.

1. ARTIST IN RESIDENCE PROGRAM

As part of the 2019 financial planning process, consider allocating an additional \$75,000 into the Culture operating budget for the Artist in Residence Program starting in 2019.

BACKGROUND:

Allocating funding for the Artist in Resident program to the culture operating budget rather than funding through the public art reserve fund would allow further public art projects to be funded from the reserve fund. The combined expenses of both the Artist and Indigenous Artist in Residence Programs totals \$144,000 which draws the total annual contribution from the reserve fund, \$135,000 annually, and an additional \$9,000 from reserves each year. This does not leave room to fund additional public art projects from the reserve fund.

2. INDIGENOUS ARTIST IN RESIDENCE PROGRAM

That Council direct staff to report back on the budget implications of continuing the Indigenous Artist in Residence Program.

BACKGROUND:

The position was created with the intent to add an Indigenous artistic presence to the City of Victoria and provide the opportunity for a local artist to develop artistic works, engage the community and City staff to produce a range of artistic works, which may include performances, workshops and/or a forum.

The Indigenous Artist in Residence works 20 hours per week for a total fee of \$42,000 per year and up to \$30,000 project budget annually. This position was funded through the City's Art in Public Places Reserve Fund in 2017 and 2018.

3. ART INSTALLATIONS

That Council direct staff to report back in the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budgets for options to increase the number of public art installations in the city.

4. MURALS IN PUBLIC SPACE

That Council direct staff to report back in the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budgets for options to increase the number of murals in public space and on private buildings to make Victoria a City of Murals.

BACKGROUND:

Currently, \$135,000 is funded annually from the public art reserve to install public art throughout the city. Staff consult with the Art in Public Places Committee, as well as Urban Design, Planning and Parks Design staff to plan out and program public art each year. Additionally, public art projects are funded from the My Great Neighbourhood grant program and the up to 1% public art policy for significant civic capital projects.

In 2018, the Concrete Canvas project created 17 murals by international, national and local artists in the Rock Bay neighbourhood as per direction in the Burnside Gorge Neighbourhood Plan. On average, each mural was \$8,000 to \$15,000 depending on the size of the mural and artist fee.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Options for providing additional funding for the public art program include:

- 1. Create a mural stream through the My Great Neighbourhood grant program to fund mural projects at the neighbourhood level. Staff recommend \$50,000 for the community art stream to fund between 5-8 murals each year. A mural toolkit currently in development by Culture staff would accompany the grant stream to support community- led mural projects.
- 2. Increase the annual contribution to the public art reserve fund from \$135,000 to \$200,000 to fund the expansion of the public art program and number of murals.
- 3. Maintain \$135,000 annual contribution to the public art reserve fund and increase the culture operating budget by \$147,000 annually to fund the Artist and Indigenous Artist in Residence programs ongoing.

Should Council wish to expand the public art, residence program and murals programs, one additional FTE (\$83,000) in the Culture Department would be required. Currently, 0.8 FTE coordinates public art as well as the literary art portfolio. Staff are currently beyond capacity tracking 25 public art projects in various project stages through 2019 and 4 maintenance projects.

Should the all of the above options be approved, the total financial impact is \$345,000:

Artist in residence	\$75,000

VANCOUVER ISLAND SOUTH FILM AND MEDIA COMMISSION:

Direct staff to consider alternative future funding options - during the 2019 City budget process and request a business plan from the Film Commission to assist staff with this work.

BACKGROUND:

The Vancouver Island South Film and Media Commission (VISFMC) creates jobs and economic development by marketing the locations, crew, talent, business and services of Greater Victoria to the international film and television industry. The commission works to help develop the necessary infrastructure for production, communication, standards of practice and workforce training for the region and supports the growth of local production services and expertise. The VISFMC was the first Film Commission in BC (1971). The commission is a registered not-for-profit society and has 3 full time staff. The VISFMC estimated that through their efforts they have helped generate an estimated \$10 million in direct economic impact in the region in 2017.

City grant awards since 2015: 2015 requested \$45,000 - awarded/paid \$45,000 2016 requested \$45,000 - awarded/paid \$45,000 2017 requested \$45,000 - awarded/paid \$35,000 2018 requested \$45,000 - awarded/paid \$20,000

The remarks from the External Grant Review Committee in 2018 were as follows: "Final report incomplete. Scope extends beyond Victoria; should consider broader regional funding support."

The City currently has 6 grant funding streams. 5 are competitive and 1 is "direct award". The Film Commission currently applies under the Strategic Plan grant category and goes through a competitive process. Direct award grants (i.e. grants that do not go through a competitive process) are for organizations that deliver a service on behalf of the City, including operating City-owned facilities, with an agreement in place. These include recreation and youth programming at the City's community centres, the City of Victoria Youth Council and the City's heritage programs administered through two heritage societies established by the City.

As outlined in a presentation by VISFMC to Council, many film commissions in BC are funded through Regional Districts. Staff's understanding is that VISFMC is not eligible under the CRD's grant programs. Council may wish to request the CRD to change its eligibility criteria so that this could be a potential funding option for VISFMC.

Staff's understanding of the intent of Council's motion, is to provide funding that is not through a competitive process. Should Council wish to move in this direction and since the VISFMC does not fit the definition of an organization that receives direct award grants under the City's policy, Council could consider setting up a new category with a definition that pertains to VISFMC. To ensure transparency for all organizations who may wish to apply for a City grant, it would be important to differentiate VISFMC to other non-profits who do have to go through a competitive process, such as Our Place Society, VIATEC, Destination Greater Victoria, Maritime Museum, School Crossing Guards, and Victoria Compost and Conservation Education Society, to name a few.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to implement this new grant category, funding could be reallocated from the Strategic Plan grants budget (which is where all the grant funding was pooled when the new program was introduced in 2015/16), a reallocation through a reduction in another service, new property tax revenue from new development or through a tax increase.

CITY STUDIO

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2020 budget process on the opportunities for engaging a City Studio Coordinator and on potential funding partnerships.

BACKGROUND:

CityStudio Victoria was a deliverable from the Mayor's Economic Development & Prosperity action plan called *Making Victoria – Unleashing Potential*.

The CityStudio Victoria concept/model (based on Vancouver CityStudio) started as a partnership between the City and our three post-secondary institutions; Camosun, Royal Roads University, and University of Victoria. The CityStudio space is owned by the City and solely operated and managed by the City and has since opening in February 2016. We have made requests for funding from our partner post secondary institutions to support a full-time Program Coordinator. In 2017 and 2018, management of the space was further supported by co-op students to help alleviate staff time. However, the co-op students required orientation/onboarding, regular supervision, and regular evaluation reports to be completed, which added a different workload onto staff.

In March 2018, Camosun decided to leave the CityStudio partnership and through recent discussions with Royal Roads University and University of Victoria they have also decided to leave the partnership. This is primarily due to the size of the space which they all feel is too small and the layout it awkward with the change in location to 711 Douglas. Further to this the space is more heavily used by non-profit community groups, which has caused harsher wear and tear and in some cases the user groups are difficult to manage.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The City continues to be responsible for all costs associated with CityStudio. Costs include; all utilities, wifi, website, booking platform and all hard goods (tables, chairs, etc). Staff time to manage impacts higher priority projects and day to day business.

Option 1:

There are interested groups both within the arts community and other non-profit community groups that may be interested in responding to an Expression of Interest to operate the space at a reduced lease cost that provides a valuable return to the community.

Option 2:

Close CityStudio and return the asset to Real Estate to lease.

PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING:

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2022 budgeting process on taking a participatory budgeting approach to neighbourhood transportation.

BACKGROUND:

Participatory budgeting empowers people to decide together how to invest a portion of the City of Victoria's annual budget. It is practiced in more than 1,500 cities across North America and around the globe.

In 2018, following a successful pilot project, Council directed staff to take a participatory budgeting approach to allocating \$60,000 of the City's budget for the next three years in the following areas: Youth (2019), Newcomers (2020) and Neighbourhood Spaces (2021).

An independent community-led Steering Committee will lead and administer the process each year, with support from the City's Engagement department. Proposals from residents for infrastructure, programs, services or events that will improve the City of Victoria in the designated focus area will be put to the public for voting to determine how to allocate the funds.

The goals of the City's Participatory Budgeting process, developed in collaboration with the citizen-led Steering Committee are to:

1. Increase civic engagement

• Engage and empower more people in the budgeting process to deepen democracy.

2. Showcase City decision-making processes

• Allow residents a greater role in and understanding of municipal spending decisions and increase transparency.

3. Build community relationships and support diverse communities

 Inspire people to more deeply engage in their communities, and to create new networks, organizations and community economic opportunities.

4. Encourage inclusive participation

 A focus on equitable participation, by working hard to engage the most marginalized populations, will lead to a more diverse and representative process.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

As part of the 2022 Financial Planning process, staff will recommend for Council's consideration a participatory budgeting approach to neighbourhood transportation. This recommended approach will be based on lessons learned from the City's 2019-2021 process and the experience of other cities that use participatory budgeting to empower citizens to decide how to allocate a portion of their transportation or other departmental budgets. The approach will support the City's strategic plan goals for neighbourhood transportation.

BACK-UP BEEPERS IN THE DOWNTOWN

On April 19, 2018, City Council passed the following resolution on the resources needed to explore what other cities are doing in terms of replacing their fleets' back up beepers with new technologies due to noise concerns:

"... direct staff to report at the next quarterly update on the resources needed to explore what other cities are doing, whether there are policies that the City can implement and whether there are other costs needed to have this considered."

BACKGROUND:

Part 16 of the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Regulation requires that when operators of mobile equipment cannot directly or by a mirror or other effective device see immediately behind the mobile equipment, the mobile equipment must not be used unless the mobile equipment has an audio warning device that

a. provides a signal to people in the vicinity that, if practicable, is audible above the ambient noise level in the workplace where the equipment is being used, and

b. is activated automatically when the equipment controls are positioned to move the equipment in reverse.

In 2014, the University of Victoria (UVic) installed a broadband backup alarm on a compactor truck, in an attempt to address noise complaint issues during quiet hours, associated with traditional backup alarms. WorkSafe BC inspected the installation, to assess the appropriateness of the device with respect to compliance with the OHS regulations, subsequently confirming the installation met the regulation requirements.

In addition to UVic, Whistler and the City of Delta have installed broadband back up alarms on fleet vehicles. An initial / cursory review by staff suggests there does not appear to be widespread use of this technology by federal, provincial or municipal agencies.

A review of documentation from various sources, including UVic and WorkSafe BC, offer the following feedback:

- Broadband alarms appear less intrusive to nearby public at distances greater than 300 meters from the vehicle
- Broadband alarms are most prominently heard in the hazard zone
- Broadband alarms reduce the risk of hearing damage to vehicle operators
- Broadband alarms provide a clearer indication of location of truck (directional sound for better hazard location) compared to traditional alarms, and meet WorkSafe BC requirements
- Location of alarm placement on trucks is vital to be effective
- Broadband alarms pose the risk of 'blending' into background noises.

An important issue of concern is that broadband beepers may be impacted significantly by surrounding noise, where the warnings may be less effective in busy urban centres, with high levels of background or surrounding noise. These issues question its suitability for use during the vehicle's high-idle periods, and/or in areas with interfering background noise, masking the broadband alarm's discrete frequencies. In these circumstances, the broadband alarm may not meet ISO or OHS standards.

Approximately 100 of Victoria fleet vehicles have back-up alarms installed and comprise only a very small percentage of the total number of urban vehicles operating in the City (including private waste collection, commercial delivery, and construction companies); converting the City's fleet to broadband alarms would have a small impact on overall noise associated with vehicle backing movements. A number of City fleet vehicles (such as mini-sweepers and other street cleaning equipment) currently have manual over-ride capabilities, giving operators the option to suppress the backup alarm, once the ability to carry out a safe backing movement has been confirmed by the operator.

Vehicle safety sensors and related technology continue to advance, and replacement optical/proximity sensors will likely replace any need for audible alarms in the future. The speed at which this transition will occur will be related to cost and regulatory requirements, which would have to be studied further. Municipal regulations for backup alarms may also not be enough on their own to incent the shift for commercial operators and be difficult to enforce – any requirement for the use of this type of technology should be mandated at a provincial or federal level.

In addition to the larger City of Victoria Fleet, the Fire Department has researched available technology for an alternative to the current back up beepers installed on our fire apparatus. The department will be piloting broadband white sound reverse indicators on our apparatus which are instantly locatable, directional and self-adjusting to 5-10 decibels above background ambient sound levels.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

At this time there is not enough information to determine an appropriate capital equipment/sensor replacement program cost or timeline.

Further study and investment would be required to research and determine the most suitable equipment alternatives, review risks/benefits/considerations, implementation plans, policy review, etc. Such an exercise could cost between \$20-50,000 or more to complete with support from an external consultant to cover required resources. A pilot program would likely be required, which would add further costs.

This work is currently beyond the staff and financial capacity based on Council's approved commitments for the City's fleet management priorities. Staff would assess any investment in backup beepers to be lower than the work required to plan the future fleet replacement program, assess and review vehicle telematics information to inform procurement priorities, and continue work on fleet emissions and GHG reductions. Staff would assess that any additional resources in fleet would be best allocated to work on these priority issues.

For the Victoria Fire Department, the pilot will be undertaken on one Engine initially to investigate whether the installation is worthy of costs and value in noise reduction. The cost of this pilot is approximately \$200.

COMMUNITY AND SENIOR CENTRE MAINTENANCE:

That Council direct staff report back on the financial implications of providing a uniformly high level of service to community and senior centres with respect to janitorial services, facilities maintenance, solid waste services and cost of utilities.

BACKGROUND:

Currently services for these City facilities are delivered through either City staff or contractors. The following table demonstrates which community facilities are serviced by City staff.

The following is a brief description of services the City provides.

Janitorial Services

The general daily cleaning of each facility includes mopping, vacuuming, and dusting of all rooms including washrooms, as well as garbage and recycling collection. The service standard also consists of weekly floor burnishing, along with annual deep cleaning. Daycare staff would be responsible for minor cleaning requirements during the day.

School District 61 currently provides janitorial services for the community facilities located adjacent to schools, namely Oaklands Community Centre and the James Bay Community School. For this reason, staff have excluded these two centres from the assessment of options and implications.

Maintenance Services

This service consists of repair and maintenance of the building, including mechanical systems, building envelope, structure, electrical systems, paint, carpentry components, and graffiti removal. This includes all permits and regulated inspections for all life safety equipment, but excludes service specific repairs or permitting, such as Island Health requirements for specialized programs like daycare.

Solid Waste

The City does not currently have the equipment needed to service all the waste, recycling and

organics collection for City-owned facilities. Options for corporate waste collection services will be outlined in the *Zero Waste Strategy* currently in development.

<u>Utilities</u>

Water, natural gas, and electricity use at community centres are presently funded by the City, with the exception of James Bay Community School. This does not include internet or cable services where applicable.

Conclusion

Based on the discussion with Council, staff understand Council's motion to assume staff (CUPE Local 50) would be responsible for the additional scope of work. At present, each community centre operator sets the level of service based on the needs of the society. Staff have not investigated the level of service being provided by other parties at the centres where janitorial service is not through City staff. Based on previous dialogue with community centre operators in 2018, there appears to be a preference for City funding support, but with flexibility for operators to determine their own delivery model and service levels. The financial and human resource impacts outlined in this response reflect providing the same service level as the centres that City staff currently support.

Should Council wish to move forward with this initiative to expand the provision of janitorial and solid waste management at all centres not currently being serviced by the City or School District 61, Council may consider directing staff to first consult with the impacted operators regarding the potential impacts of this change. Subsequently, staff should be directed to amend the contracts with centre operators and allocate the necessary funding to the operating budget for the Facilities division.

Currently the City provides a total of \$111,000 in janitorial funding (grants) to three of the centres. Having City staff provide the janitorial services would mean these grants could be allocated into the operating budget for janitorial expenses. The total operating cost to provide all the building services and materials including janitorial, maintenance, solid waste management, and utilities would be approximately \$372,000. The incremental increase in cost would include \$261,000 in ongoing operating expense, plus a one-time capital investment of approximately \$80,000 for two fleet vehicles and janitorial tools to deliver these services.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

- Financial Implications
 - One-time capital expense for two janitorial fleet vehicles \$80,000
 - Total additional ongoing annual operating expenses required \$372,000 (incremental increase of \$261,000)
 - Labour \$309,000
 - Janitorial Supplies \$15,500
 - Fleet fuel/maintenance \$9,000
 - Solid Waste Disposal \$38,500
- Human Resources Implications
 - Additional Building Service Workers (3.25 FTE)
 - Additional Assistant Supervisor of Building Services (1 FTE)

WASHROOMS AND DRINKING FOUNTAINS:

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budgets on opportunities to expand public washrooms and drinking fountains, with a priority in the north half of the city, and;

That the City give consideration to a new "sidewalk washroom" in the 900 block of Douglas Street in the 2019 budget.

BACKGROUND:

The City does not have a formal plan that identifies the number, location, and design of public washrooms and drinking fountains required in the municipality.

Staff recommend hiring an external professional to assess opportunities for additional public washrooms and drinking fountains based on leading practices in other jurisdictions and local demand, and to develop an implementation plan to guide future investments.

In response to Council's direction to give consideration to build a new "sidewalk washroom" in the 900 block of Douglas Street, staff have already completed a preliminary review of two potential sites. Should Council wish to move this forward, the next steps would include hiring a consultant to complete the planning and design work.

Should Council wish to move forward with this initiative, additional funding of \$287,000 is required to cover the professional service expenses and additional Project Administration staff resources required to complete both the design and construction phases.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

- Financial Implication
 - One-time capital expense (design services) \$75,000 (cost of construction to be determined once the design of the Douglas Street washroom is complete)
- Human Resources Implications
 - Additional Project Administrator (1 FTE for 2 years)
 - 2019 Design Phase \$106,000
 - 2020 Construction Phase- \$106,000

FAIR TRADE:

That Council direct that this item be considered as part of the 2019 budget process.

BACKGROUND:

Since April 2009, the City's Dining and Catering Policy has implemented a practice of Fair Trade which states that the catering of all civic meetings and events at City Hall, only Fair Trade coffee may be purchased. However, this does not extend to other City facilities.

As well, the City of Victoria's Purchasing Policy incorporates sustainability guidelines that consider the environmental, social and economic value of the goods and services being purchased. The intent is to shift spending away from goods and services that negatively impact the environment and society towards products and services that are more environmentally sound and socially beneficial. The evaluation criteria used are tailored to the specific competition; however, more points will be awarded for higher impact activities.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

With Council direction, City staff can amend the purchasing policy to add a clause for Fair Trade. This can be accommodated within existing resources.

A full promotional campaign will require additional resources. Engagement staff resources are fully allocated to completing priorities previously approved by Council or contemplated in the 2019-2022 Strategic Plan. Implementing this item in 2019 require an additional 0.2 FTE (approximately \$20,000) in the Engagement Department to meet Council's direction to develop and implement a communications strategy to attract media attention and promote the City's status as a Fair Trade Town, publish campaign/designation information on the municipality's website, and work with City staff in Sustainability to develop and implement a public awareness campaign to promote ethical and sustainable consumption.

Activities to promote sustainable food consumption are already part of the 2019 Financial Plan. Additional operational resources of \$10,000 would be required to expand those activities to include education and promotion of ethical consumption.

Alternatively, simply adding information to our website and sharing information via social media can be accommodated within existing resources.

COUNCIL BUDGET:

That Council direct staff to report back on the financial implications of increasing the Council travel and conference budget to \$45,000 for the conferences and travel with the direction that this be indexed to inflation in subsequent years.

BACKGROUND:

The 2019 Draft Financial Plan includes a \$35,000 budget for Council's conference and travel expenditures.

In accordance to the City's Travel Policy, members of Council are reimbursed for their travel expenses while representing the City, engaged in City business or attending a meeting, course or convention related to representation of the City, City business or the duties of the office of Mayor or other members of Council. All Council travel require a Council Resolution to authorize the reimbursement.

Actual travel expenses allocated to the Council conference budget have ranged \$25,000 to \$47,000 over the last 5 years, with an average expense of \$37,400. In addition to this budget, protocol and trade mission related travel have separate funding allocations and are not included in these figures.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to increase the funding, the financial impact would be \$10,000. If this is a permanent increase, it could be funded through new property tax revenue from new development, a reallocation by reducing another budget, or increasing property taxes by 0.01%.

COUNCIL BUDGET:

That Council direct staff to report back with options and implications for including budgetary allowance in 2019 for constituency funds for up to \$8,000.

BACKGROUND:

This would be a new budget line item.

Should Council wish to move ahead with this funding, an overarching reimbursement policy should be considered that would outline the purpose and use of the funds, as well as the process and required documentation for reimbursement. Council may also wish to consider how the funding would be allocated between each member of Council. This could be done on a first-come first-served basis, through an equal allocation between each Council member, or by identifying the specific planned activities for the year during the financial planning process. Staff could develop the policy based on further Council direction.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to add an additional \$8,000 budget to the 2019 Financial Plan, this ongoing increase could be funded through new property revenue from new development, a reallocation by reducing a different budget, or by a property tax increase of 0.01%.

That Council direct staff to report back on how the youth outreach grants are allocated and the implications of increasing the youth outreach grants by the rate of inflation.

BACKGROUND:

In October 2015, Council approved classifying the youth outreach programs administered by the Burnside Gorge and the Fairfield Gonzales Community Associations as Direct Award Grants since the City already has existing agreements with both organizations for operating City-owned facilities. The outreach grant amounts were allocated based on the requirements requested from the individual Community Associations.

Direct Award Grants are for organizations who provide a service or program on behalf of the City on an ongoing basis, including a service to operate City-owned facilities and have agreements with the City. These grants are awarded annually by Council without a competitive process; annual reporting back to the City is required.

The 2019 Draft Financial Plan includes a budget of \$10,000 and \$15,000 for the Burnside Gorge and Fairfield Gonzales Community Centre's youth outreach grants respectively. The budgets have remained the same since 2015.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to increase the youth outreach grants by the rate of inflation or 2.4% for 2019, this would result in a budget increase of \$600 resulting in a total budget of \$10,240 and 15,360 each.

That Council direct staff to report back on the implications of increasing the per capita base grants to community associations by the rate of inflation.

BACKGROUND:

Neighbourhood base grants are a per capita allocation provided to all neighbourhood associations for the purposes of space rental, communications and celebrations. The per capita base grant is determined through the formula of 0.75 times the population of each neighbourhood.

The 2019 Draft Financial Plan includes a total budget of \$64,500 for the per capita base grants for the neighbourhoods of Blanshard (Hillside Quadra), Burnside/Gorge, Downtown, Fairfield Gonzales, Fernwood, James Bay, North and South Jubilee, North Park, Oaklands, Rockland and Vic West.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to increase the neighbourhood per capita base grants by the rate of inflation or 2.4%, this would result in a budget increase of \$1,548 or total budget of \$66,048.

That Council direct staff to report back on the implication of indexing the Strategic Plan grants to the rate of inflation.

BACKGROUND:

Strategic Plan Grants are awarded annually by Council through a competitive process and are for eligible organizations working on a project or program that supports the actions and outcomes of the City's Strategic Plan.

On August 25, 2016, Council approved to implement an external grant review committee for the City's Strategic Plan Grants. The external grant review committee was established to promote a merit-based evaluation process by appointing members with expertise in the areas that are eligible under the grant program.

The Strategic Plan Grant budget of \$510,000 is comprised of both Micro Grants and Strategic Plan Grants. Micro Grants are grants of up to \$500 to cover supplies needed for food production in commons and community gardens.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to increase the Strategic Plan and Micro Grant budget by the rate of inflation or 2.4%, this would result in a budget increase of \$12,240 or total budget of \$522,240.

That Council direct staff to report back on the implications of increasing the community garden volunteer coordinator grant to \$10,000 per neighbourhood in 2019 with indexation to inflation for subsequent years.

BACKGROUND:

Community Volunteer Coordinator Grants are available to neighbourhoods that have community gardens which are established under the City's Community Garden Policy, with food production as the primary focus. These grants are to fund a person to coordinate volunteers.

The 2019 Draft Financial Plan includes a budget of \$49,840 for eight neighbourhoods that have community gardens with food production. The neighbourhoods are Vic West, Fairfield-Gonzales, Fernwood, Burnside-Gorge, James Bay, Hillside-Quadra, Downtown and North Park.

This grant budget is comprised of a \$6,230 budget for each neighbourhood, with the exception of Fernwood where the grant is equally split between the Fernwood Neighbourhood Resource Group and the Fernwood Community Centre. The budget is annually indexed at a rate of inflation.

Council may wish to direct staff to engage with the neighbourhoods who currently receive this grant to explore whether an increase to the coordinator funding is desired or whether other funding, such as funding for materials, would be preferred.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to increase the Community Garden Volunteer Coordinator Grants budget to \$10,000 per neighbourhood, this would result in an increase to the budget of \$30,160 for a total budget of \$80,000.

That Council direct staff to report back on implications of indexing the My Great Neighbourhood grant program to the rate of inflation.

BACKGROUND:

The My Great Neighbourhood Grant Program was developed to support strong, connected neighbourhoods through funding for projects that would be bring neighbours together and empower them to shape their local area.

The 2019 Draft Financial Plan has a budget of \$125,000. This budget is comprised of \$120,000 for the grant program and a budget of \$5,000 which the City provides for placemaking projects to match the equivalent contribution from the neighbourhood.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to increase the My Great Neighbourhood Grant Program by the rate of inflation or 2.4%, this would result in a budget increase of \$3,000 or total budget of \$128,000.

PARKING:

That Council direct staff to report back on the revenue generating potential of charging for parking on Sundays.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Victoria has nearly 2,000 on-street parking spaces downtown. On-street parking is free in the evenings Monday to Saturday from 6pm – 9am and free all day Sundays and holidays. On-street parking generates approximately \$7 million in revenue annually.

Parking is also free in parkades on Sundays. The following analysis pertains to on-street parking only, with the assumption that parkades would remain free. The rationale for this assumption is that parkades do not currently reach capacity on Sundays (with the exception of Yates Street) and that on-street turnover is the main concern rather than revenue-generation. Should this assumption be incorrect, staff can report back on estimates for revenue generation in parkades.

Paid parking on Sundays has been considered by Council in the past though no direction was given to staff for further exploration. In the past, discussions with some business owners that are open on Sundays have revealed there is a concern regarding the turnover of on-street parking on Sundays.

In the past, this discussion has generated high interest in the community. Therefore, Council may wish to consider an engagement strategy before a final decision is made.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Currently, staff do not have detailed on-street statistics for Sundays as parking is free. Though previous studies over the years have indicated that a large number of cars park on-street for over four hours. To determine the revenue impact on Sundays, staff have used pro-rated Saturday statistics in addition to past Sunday survey results to estimate the financial impacts.

Like most new initiatives there are many factors to take into account, therefore staff have provided two options for Council's consideration:

- Implementing on street pay parking at the current rates and time limits on Sundays is forecasted to generate approximately \$600,000 in revenue a year. This calculation is based on total Saturday space availability of 18,000 hours (2,000 spaces multiplied by 9 hours of pay parking) that generates approximately \$1 million a year. A pro-rated percentage of 60% has been applied for Sunday estimates which factors in a reduction of businesses that are open on Sundays and the possible reduction of cars parking due to a rate increase.
- 2. Implementing on street pay parking at a reduced rate of one dollar an hour with no maximum time limit is forecasted to generate approximately \$500,000 in revenue a year. This calculation is based on estimating the total amount of Sunday parking at 10,000 hours (2,000 spaces multiplied by 5 hours of pay parking) multiplied by a rate of one dollar an hour. With this model, the assumption is that the introduction of Sunday pay parking will have less of an impact on the number of cars parking.

Currently, the Yates Street parkade reaches full or near full capacity on Sundays. With the implementation of either on-street parking option, it is anticipated that this parkade will become busier. The increased volume is expected to create a low turnover and a higher demand for short-term parking. One option for Council's consideration is to increase the rates in this parkade only equivalent to current rates or one dollar based on the options above.

Should Council wish to move forward with this initiative, staff would develop the scope for an engagement strategy and report back on the resource implications.

PARKING:

That Council direct staff to increase on-street and parkade parking for people with disabilities on an ongoing basis and report to Council on a quarterly basis with the net new number of spots added.

BACKGROUND:

The City provides permits and specific parking spots for people with accessibility challenges. There are approximately 28 designated metered on-street parking spaces in the downtown core for use by people with a valid disabled placard on their vehicle. Drivers with disabilities can purchase up to two hours of parking time at all these spaces.

To maximize choice and accessibility, the City offers an additional hour of free parking time at any 90-minute (or greater) parking space for drivers displaying a valid BC Disability Parking Permit.

The City offers two types of parking permits for people with disabilities: a Monthly Permit and a Periodic All-Day Permit to support mobility and accessibility to jobs and services while offering maximum flexibility.

Staff continue to review the current policies developed in 2002 and explore opportunities to increase and enhance accessible parking spaces throughout the City. Staff in Parking Services and Transportation work with the Disability Resource Centre (who provide ongoing input on changes to the parking system) to identify options for improvements. Continual review of the use of on-street accessible metered spaces is done to provide meaningful information on usage at the various locations.

Recent service improvements have included moving an accessible parking spot on Yates Street closer to the Post Office and a recently installed ramp adjacent to a loading zone to provide better access to the sidewalk. Also, six accessible spaces were added to the View Street Parkade.

Further analysis through the Accessibility Framework will inform future work in this area. See more information provided through the motion responses related to the Accessibility Working Group.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

This work can be accomplished within existing resources. Any future resource implications will be reported back upon completion of the Accessibility Framework.

PARKING:

That Council direct staff to report back on the option of bringing the operations of the Victoria Conference Centre parkade in house.

BACKGROUND:

The parkade operations have been contracted since opening of the facility 1989. The contract was initiated to ensure that the facility opened with professional services in each department which would establish the reputation of the excellent service that the VCC has today. All in an effort to compete in the highly competitive event industry.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

In order to provide a complete analysis of the options and implications of changing the service delivery model for this operation, external expertise would be required to analyze both the needs of the Victoria Conference Centre and best practices in running parkade facilities in that industry. In addition, since the VCC is operated under an agreement, legal review of that agreement and any other agreements would be required.

Should Council wish to explore this further, staff could develop a complete scope of work and associated resource needs and bring back to Council for consideration in 6 months.

PROTOCOL FUNCTION FUNDING:

That Council direct staff to report back on the budget implications of adding resources to the City Manager's office sufficient to facilitate a dedicated protocol function.

BACKGROUND:

The Protocol Liaison position would oversee the protocol functions of the City of Victoria, including the relationships, events, activities and services that benefit, promote, celebrate and enhance the City of Victoria. The position would develop and coordinate the provision of protocol programs and executive support including: preparing and managing annual operational budget; leading protocol relations between the City of Victoria and its Twin Cities, representatives of home and foreign governments, and First Nations; determining annual corporate protocol events, level of involvement and budget; advising the Mayor, Council and City staff on protocol relations; developing and implementing policies, standards and procedures to guide protocol activities.

This position would represent the City to other organizations, government agencies and the public including liaising with Twin City and other dignitaries during protocol visits. This position would also manage the delivery of protocol services including: briefing Council and staff on protocol matters, coordinating protocol for visiting delegations and arrangements for City officials conducting international visits.

This position would develop and implement strategies and operating plans for protocol, aligned with the City's Strategic Plan and key objectives.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to proceed, this would result in one additional FTE and a budget requirement of \$95,000 - \$100,000.

HOUSING ADDITION TO FIRE HALL # 3:

That Council direct staff to report back on the feasibility of locating housing on top of the emergency management facilities on Bay Street.

BACKGROUND:

The discussion at Committee of the Whole referred to the mechanics bays facility to be constructed at the property of Fire Hall #3. Although the above motion says "emergency management facilities", this response is regarding adding housing to the new mechanical facility, not the existing Fire Station.

Council directed that staff work towards the replacement of Fire Station No. 1, through public process to determine if privately owned siting was available for exploration of the development of this project. Through the process, a site identified on Johnson Street was selected for rebuilding and replacing Fire Station #1. Due to the post-seismic nature of construction, costs associated with this type of construction and, land value associated with the downtown core, it was determined that relocation of the mechanical facility would be included in planning. Staff focused on location for fire mechanical in addition to review of all operational aspects of maintaining "specialized" mechanical services, both corporately and regionally, in addition to maintaining and enhancing fire department training grounds located at 740 Bay Street, Fire Station # 3.

Geotechnical work to further stabilize the rear area of No. 3 Fire Station is required work to ensure the viability of the area with regards to fire department routine standards training, with exploration on enhancement to the site to further prepare for improved departure for emergency response and, re-entering the fire station from Bay Street, upon return. Additionally, exploration of providing an apparatus maintenance bay in the planning to allow the Victoria Fire Department Historical Society with an area to refurbish and maintain their historical apparatus, when required. The Society provides great promotion of the City of Victoria and the Fire Department in relation to public display of historical apparatus and artifacts.

A portion of this area also presently includes a "drafting" pit which, when filled with water, is used to complete the annual industry testing of each fire "pumping" apparatus to ensure Fire Apparatus meet Industry Standards and are compliant with information provided to Fire Underwriter's Survey to determine public fire protection rating for the City of Victoria. This is also a source of revenue generation as the mechanical division completes these tests for regional fire departments such as Sooke, Langford and Metchosin, in addition to annual inspections and required maintenance of their equipment and apparatus.

The planning proposes a three-bay mechanical facility with potential for an extended roofline to provide a carport type protection to fire department assets such as engines and/or trailers requiring protection from the weather, electrical and air connectivity to ensure operational readiness and, storage for equipment to be utilized for training. Specifically, with the ability to expedite "return to service", any equipment used for training that needs to be re-assigned to first line response capacity. The geotechnical surveys of the property indicate the need for restructuring the asphalt section of the property and redesigning of the drafting pit to convert to a "confined space" training aid when not in use for apparatus testing. This will provide effective an efficient training opportunity for members of the service and potentially, external training opportunity for other agencies. This and other training aids coordinated with the installation of the training tower (erected in 2008) will confirm and provide long term strategy for utilization, the save for fire department and emergency response training. Once further work is detailed, the

departure of the apparatus from the station will be reviewed to allow for an emergency response from the north of the station as opposed to the south to create a greater safety to personnel and traffic, as well as to provide a different angle of departure which is impacting the apparatus springs and alignment as they maneuver the tight turns on to Bay Street when exiting the station.

Due to the limited space at this site and the use as both a mechanical facility and an active operational training area, adding housing to the mechanical facility is not viable from an operational perspective. However, in the future, when Fire Station #3 is refurbished/replaced, there may be an opportunity to explore the addition of rentable housing units through that planning process.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The Financial Plan provides for funding for the design of the mechanical facility in 2019 with construction commencing in 2020/2021.

LATE NIGHT TASK FORCE:

That Council direct staff to report back on the Late Night Great Night Task Force, including options for adjusting the allocation to policing and/or delivering services through non-police resources.

That Council direct staff to report back with options for recovering costs related to the Late Night Great Night Task Force from bar and nightclub operators through business license fees

BACKGROUND:

The Late Night Great Night Task Force was formed in 2009 by the Mayor to examine a range of late night issues. Part of the resulting Late Night Strategy approved by Council in 2010 included four VicPD Special Duty Officers assigned to the downtown entertainment district from 10:30pm to 3:30am on Friday and Saturday nights (accompanied by two auxiliary officers).

Other elements of the strategy included supervised taxi stands (hosted through the City's current private security contractor), portable urinal program (sponsored by several late night businesses), three late night food vendors, and other related support (e.g. sexual harassment awareness workshop). The Late Night Advisory Committee, comprised of business organizations and government agency representatives, meets quarterly to review issues and make suggestions for achieving strategy objectives. The Multi-Agency Task Force also tours late night venues and public spaces quarterly to monitor conditions and identify issues. A Council update on the Late Night Strategy is planned for 2019.

On the first motion, commissioning of Special Duty officers was chosen over regular patrols because (1) the service was specific to Victoria and not shared with Esquimalt, and (2) police personnel would otherwise be directed by VicPD command to a variety of duties as they saw fit, rather than specifically to late night patrols. Police report that there are currently insufficient existing resources to dedicate solely to late night downtown patrols.

On the second motion, the question of recovery of costs associated with the Late Night Strategy was previously referred to staff in 2015 and again in 2017. In these cases, the question related to *per drink levies* and *per licensed seat levies*, respectively. These reviews both indicated that such levies would constitute taxes that are not permissible through the Community Charter. The analysis undertaken at the time by Legal Services suggests that any levy intended to pay for additional costs, especially policing costs, related to Late Night Strategy would most likely constitute a tax and would be outside of the City's authority to collect.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The impact of service delivery through non-police resources, rather than continuing to deploy VicPD officers to patrol the entertainment district includes:

- Commanding less respect from late night patrons than police officers
- Less proactive identification and resolution of issues that may otherwise escalate
- No mandate to enter private businesses and to implement the successful Bar Watch program that combats gang and criminal influence
- Absence of skill set and capacity to immediately respond to dangerous situations, and

• Less effective communication and coordination with the police force when issues arise that require additional support

Re-examination of these issues and development of possible fee options, including associated research into best practices in other municipalities and legal considerations, would involve the following:

Legal Services preliminary estimate suggests that another review of options for recovering Late Night Task Force costs, if it included development of bylaws, would involve approximately 50 hours of legal time (0.04 FTE) and cost between \$17,500 and \$20,000 if handled through external counsel. There is no in-house capacity to take this work on and additional funding would be required.

Existing staff could research and review any viable alternatives to Special Duty Officers.

URBAN FOOD TABLE:

That Council refer to the City's 2019 budget process consideration of an annual allocation of \$6,000 for the Urban Food Table.

BACKGROUND:

Since 2015, the Urban Food Table has provided advice to Council and staff on matters related to urban agriculture, including input into the Official Community Plan, Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan and the "Growing in the City" initiative.

In July 2018, Council adopted revised Terms of Reference and referred "to the City's 2019 budget process consideration of an annual allocation of \$6,000 for the Urban Food Table".

Should Council approve this, staff recommend that the Urban Food Table report to the City annually on outcomes resulting from the allocated funding.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The impact to the financial plan would be an annual allocation of \$6,000 and there would be no human resource implications.

ARTIFICIAL TURF REPLACEMENT:

That Council direct staff to report back with information on the current condition of the artificial turf field and the implications of deferring the replacement to 2021 including options for reducing design costs.

BACKGROUND:

Council approved the Topaz Park Improvement Plan in June 2018. The proposed implementation approach considered replacement timelines for existing amenities, impacts on park users, construction efficiencies, priorities from public consultation, and financial impacts.

Artificial Turf Field: Current Condition

The existing artificial turf field was installed in 2005 and is currently entering its 14th year of service. A recent condition assessment by a contractor who specializes in these facilities, concluded that the field is in relatively poor condition. The reasonable serviceable life for similar synthetic turf fields is about 10 years, with most surfaces replaced between 10 to 12 years. According to the consultant, the City has maximized the usable wear of the turf fibres, as well as safe and conducive playing condition for field users. When a synthetic turf field ages, the playing surface characteristics change, turf fibers wear down lowering the depth of the fill and making the playing surface harder. As a result, risks to player safety increases with respect to concussion and other injuries.

The consultant recommends replacing the field as soon as feasible. If field replacement is deferred, the consultant recommends the City undertake a risk management review to consider how best to proceed with programming until the field is replaced.

Deferring Replacement to 2021

Detailed design of both the artificial turf field and southern park enhancements were recommended to commence in early 2019, with construction of the artificial turf field proceeding in 2020, construction of the southern park enhancement proceeding in 2021. Staff understand Council's request for deferring work, to relate specifically to the construction and assumes that the design work would still proceed in 2019.

Deferring construction of the artificial turf field to 2021 would primarily impact local sport groups, who currently use the playing fields in Topaz Park.

At present approximately 26 sport organizations currently use the grass field in the south area of the park, for games and practices each year, representing roughly 20 hours of use per week. These users were expected to be accommodated within the expanded artificial turf field in the park, however, the change in the sequence of work would require that these clubs find alternative arrangements elsewhere in the region, during the construction period.

Design Costs

The estimated design cost for the artificial turf field (\$430,000) included for consideration in the draft 2019 Financial Plan, is based on professional advice and industry standards for cost estimation, given the scope of improvements planned as approved in the Topaz Park

Improvement Plan. Following a competitive procurement process, the project team will work with the consultant to explore opportunities for maximizing value and reducing costs as the design work progresses.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial or human resource implications related to this motion. Budget requirements for implementation of the turf field will be brought to Council upon completion of the design work.

DOG FRIENDLY SPACES DOWNTOWN:

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budget on options to create more dog friendly spaces downtown.

BACKGROUND:

Dog owners and their pets are a large user group of park spaces. Pets often provide the impetus for people to visit parks, to exercise and to socialize with others while visiting the park. Developing leash-optional facilities in parks, provide dog friendly spaces that also help to reduce conflicts with other park users.

There are currently 15 parks with leash-optional areas throughout the city, three of which were established as pilot sites in 2017. There are currently no designated leash-optional park spaces in the downtown core. Completion of a "Dogs in Parks" Strategy is identified as a priority action in the Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan (2017).

To address Council's immediate focus on creating dog-friendly spaces in the downtown core, staff recommend completing a study to engage with residents and assess existing public sites, investigate creative solutions in other jurisdictions, and provide recommendations. This work would inform future investment proposals. Information from this downtown-focused study would also help be helpful in the development of a future city-wide strategy.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to advance this initiative, \$50,000 would be required for consultant support. Staff support to manage the consultant could be accommodated within existing resources.

DOWNTOWN GREEN SPACE:

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budget on options to create more greenspaces downtown.

BACKGROUND:

In 2019, the City will be proceeding with three projects that will create approximately 2.5 acres of new greenspace in the downtown area, including the Songhees Park expansion, new public space adjacent to the Johnson Street Bridge, and the Wharf/Humboldt AAA Cycling Corridor.

The further development of existing public space and acquisition of new land are further potential tools for meeting Council's strategic objectives. The completion of a Park Development and Acquisition Strategy is identified as a priority action in the Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan (POSMP), and in the draft Strategic Plan. The proposed Strategy is intended to explore options for acquisition (purchase, establishing first rights of refusal, interagency land transfers, joint use agreements, leases, easements and rights-of-way), in order to achieve the City's parks and open space goals.

In 2019, staff recommend developing the scope of work for a consultant to assist the City with the new Strategy in 2020. Once completed, this material will be incorporated into the City's overall Real Estate Strategy and related capital reserve requirements.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to advance this initiative, funding of \$125,000 for consultant support would be required in 2020. Staff support for the consultant can be accommodated within existing resources.

GARDEN BED NATURALIZATION:

That Council direct staff to report on climate implications and options for re-naturalizing all the City's garden beds between 2019 and 2022, with the exception of Beacon Hill Park and the hanging basket program.

BACKGROUND:

In 2017, the Parks division initiated a change in planting practices to prioritize species that are drought tolerant/resistant and are native to the local environment. Annual display beds have been reduced in certain areas, including medians, and have been replaced with lower maintenance, drought tolerant, environmentally sensitive plants that are friendly to pollinators.

Staff understand Council's priority to address operational practices that contribute to climate change, including activities undertaken by Parks staff. The report requested by Council would provide a valuable input into the planning and implementation of further operational changes. To acquire this information, staff would need to develop a scope of work for an external consultant to assist with a Climate Impact Study, specific to plant selection, implications and options. The estimated cost of this study is \$50,000. Council may wish to consider the relative value of this action in the context of the overall priority actions within the Climate Leadership Plan.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to advance this initiative, funding of \$50,000 for consultant support would be required. Staff support for the consultant can be accommodated within existing resources.

INCREASED FOOD PRODUCTION:

That Council direct staff to report back in the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budgets for options to increase food production on public land including increasing community gardens in all neighbourhoods in the city and building urban food systems into our Parks operations.

BACKGROUND:

In 2015, the City initiated the "Growing in the City" initiative to advance several key directives in the City's Official Community Plan towards the goal of a more sustainable local food system. The project included developing policies and guidelines to support urban food production in the public realm as well as a series of amendments to City regulations to better support small-scale commercial urban agriculture.

Since 2016, resources to generate awareness and provide information on the new policies, programs and guidelines in relation to food production on public land have been developed and widely disseminated including:

- Urban Food Tree Stewardship Pilot Program Fact Sheet and Maintenance Agreement
- Boulevard Gardening Guidelines and Fact Sheet
- Community Gardens Policy (2016), Expression of Interest Form and a 'Building a Community Garden on City Land' Guide
- Interactive Map of Existing Community Gardens and the Inventory of City-Owned Land with Community Gardening Potential

Many of the regulatory amendments proposed through "Growing in the City" were new to Victoria and unique in a Canadian context. The program has resulted in new community gardens, food trees planted in parks, urban food production business licenses and public education on urban food production and boulevard gardening.

Over the next few months staff will be evaluating the "Growing in the City" initiative and working with the Urban Food Table on recommended adjustments to the program that will further support growth of urban food production in the City.

A report to Council on the results of the evaluation is planned for Q2 2019. This report will outline recommended adjustments to the program including options on increasing community gardens in all neighborhoods and building urban food systems into park operations.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

None

POLLINATOR HABITAT:

That Council direct staff to report back a part of the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budgets for opportunities to increase pollinator habitat on public and private lands.

BACKGROUND:

In 2017, the Parks division shifted focus to strategically plant species that better align with the lifecycles of pollinators in an effort to provide more available sources of pollen at key times. As staff renovate garden beds and planted medians, plant trees or install new landscapes, plants are selected that are drought tolerant and are sensitive to the natural environment while providing aesthetic value and pollinator habitat. Since 2017, staff have planted upwards of 650 plants considered pollinator-friendly in the public realm including Fort Street, Bay Street and Amphion Street, as well as in parks such as Fisherman's Wharf, Stadacona, and Beacon Hill Park.

In 2018, five new mason bee hives were installed in Beacon Hill Park, with eight more installations planned for 2019. New interpretive signs are being installed near these hives to promote the value of pollinator friendly gardening. Planning for the landscaping around the Johnson Street Bridge also consists of roughly 1,500 pollinator friendly plants, including native species, to be planted in the next year. Finally, a new City webpage provides information to residents on the benefits of pollinators and resources to increase pollinator habitat

If the actions described above are insufficient in meeting the spirit of Council's direction, Council may consider instructing staff to initiate an independent study to evaluate the impact of work currently being performed and to recommend additional strategies to increase pollinator habitat. It is estimated the cost of this assessment would be no more than \$30,000.

With respect to increasing pollinator habitat on private property, staff note that further consultation with colleagues in Planning and Legal Services is required to explore the opportunities and limits of such an initiative. Therefore, this component requires a report back to Council later in 2019.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to advance this initiative, funding of \$30,000 for consultant support would be required. Staff support for the consultant can be accommodated within existing resources.

ROSS BAY CEMETERY:

That Council direct staff report back on options with regards to the Ross Bay Cemetery trust fund with regards to funding operations of the Ross Bay Cemetery.

That Council direct staff to explore cooperating with Royal Oak Burial Park on the marketing of grave spaces in Ross Bay Cemetery.

BACKGROUND:

The Ross Bay Cemetery (RBC) Bylaw and the Provincial Cremation, Interment and Funeral Services Act includes regulations regarding the management of the RBC Perpetual Maintenance trust fund. The regulation states the interest income earned by the trust fund may be used for the purpose of paying the operator's liabilities arising out of care and maintenance services. The balance of the Perpetual Maintenance Trust at December 31, 2017 was \$755,659, and over the last 5 years earned between \$5,000 and \$10,000 per year in interest income. This income could be used for the purpose of paying for care and maintenance services, should Council wish to proceed with this direction. The draft 2019 maintenance budget for the cemetery is \$234,000. Since about 2003, this income has been accumulating within the trust to save up for larger maintenance projects.

Staff have met with a representative of Royal Oak Burial Park to discuss the potential for marketing coordination. The discussion was very positive, and unless Council objects, staff will further explore this potential with Royal Oak Burial Park staff for the remaining plots in Ross Bay Cemetery.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to use the annual interest to offset the costs, this would result in an offset to property taxes of 0.0038% to 0.0076%. Alternatively, Council may wish to continue setting aside this income for funding of larger maintenance projects in the future.

URBAN FOREST MASTER PLAN: (See Strategic Plan Action 6.4)

That Council direct staff to report back on options for increasing parks planning staff resources for coordinating the acceleration of implementation of the Urban Forest Master Plan.

BACKGROUND:

Council approved the City's Urban Forest Master Plan (UFMP) in 2013, following extensive consultation with community members, staff and industry experts. The plan provides guidance on the long-term management and enhancement of the urban forest, with 26 recommendations relating to trees on public and private lands to be completed over the next few decades. At present, the City has direct control over roughly one-third (33,000) of the urban forest inventory. The other two-thirds consists of trees on private land. The City's overall tree canopy coverage when last measured in 2013 was approximately 18%. The UFMP recommends increasing this coverage to 40-45%, a figure aligned with targets for cities around the world.

Over the past four years, the Victoria made limited progress towards the UFMP recommendations. Despite the efforts of staff required to make that progress, it is important to recognize the challenges presented by the recent increase in pressure on staff capacity. In the past few years, operational demands associated with supporting Victoria's unprecedented growth have resulted in reduced capacity to plan and process the recommended actions in the pro-active manner necessary. The total annual City investment in tree care and management is approximately \$1.7 million.

Staff acknowledge Council's sense of urgency regarding climate action. With increased investment and focus, the City can more effectively address the challenges highlighted by the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change in its special report on the impacts of global warming. In regards to the role of the urban forest, Victoria has the necessary strategic direction; however, to respond to this call for action staff recommend an updated approach, as envisioned in the UFMP, in pursuit of the goals identified for the long-term benefit of citizens.

The new approach for consideration would accelerate the implementation of priorities relating to the Urban Forest Master Plan and recent Climate Leadership Plan. This direction involves restructuring the Parks division to establish a dedicated team focused on the management and enhancement of the urban forest. Led by a new full-time leadership position, the section would consist of a combination of new and existing planning and operational staff. This team would be responsible for long-term planning, coordination with stakeholders, execution of all arboriculture activities and practices, as well as reporting on progress.

The short-term actions for this section would include, but not be limited to, the following proposed Strategic Plan actions outlined by Council:

- 4. Develop and lead the implementation of the Urban Forest Master Plan
- 5. Strengthen the Tree Protection bylaw
- 21. Strengthen tree protection and enhance tree canopy and urban forest
- 37. Create annual tree planting festival like "Tree Appreciation Day"

The new team would be structured with three areas of focus.

- **Planning:** City-wide, long-term planning (ie risk management, design guidelines, etc), as well as support for trees located on private property (land-use application review, partnership opportunities, community events and education)
- Large Tree Care: Management and maintenance of large trees on City property
- New Tree Care: Planting and maintenance of new trees on City property

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Staff have identified two potential investment approaches to accelerating the implementation of the UFMP. Both options focus on increasing the level of new tree planting, maintenance of existing trees, as well as support for private tree programs (ie protection, education). Option 2 is presented as a "leading practice" example for urban forestry management. Either option would allow the City to undertake nearly all operational tree care functions with in-house resources, other than specialized functions.

Human Resource Implications:

Financial Implications:

The projected costs of increasing the level of service for each option are provided below. The capital estimates are associated with increased maintenance of existing trees as well as planting and caring for new trees, include new vehicles and heavy equipment. The operating costs include trees, tool/vehicle maintenance, supplies, equipment, and staffing.

Acceleration of the implementation of the UFMP requires a substantial increase in focus and resourcing. Staff have outlined above the key elements based on an assessment of the incremental changes in resourcing necessary to meet the priority outcomes in the UFMP and a healthy, sustainable urban forest.

ANIMATION PROGRAM:

- 1. Council direct staff to review the delivery model for the city's animation program and report back to Council.
- 2. That Council direct staff to report back on options for increasing the diversity of the elements of the seasonal animation program.

BACKGROUND:

The animation of the public realm can take many forms including events, festivals, public art, heritage and historical interpretative signage, and placemaking. The seasonal animation program is an important part of the mix to add vibrancy, animation and economic spin off for the business and tourism sectors.

Over the past 15 years, the City in conjunction with partners Downtown Victoria Business Association and Destination Greater Victoria, have worked together to coordinate a year-round display highlighting the winter season (November to January), Chinese New Year (January – February), summer banners (May-September) and Halloween (October).

Recognition of community and cultural anniversaries, holidays and annual celebrations is best served through the festivals, events and public art programs due to the short-term nature of these celebrations and the desire by the community to actively participate in the programming, animation and celebration of cultural customs and beliefs.

The maintenance of infrastructure for lighting, banners and seasonal décor within trees and lamp standards is a major component of this program and requires a heavy workload to ensure the current program is well maintained including replacement of bulbs, electrical and banner infrastructure and general overall condition of décor due to weather conditions. The removal and installation of lighting and décor requires considerable contracted staff time, maintenance and capital costs.

The current delivery model for the animation program is through contracted services for labour to install and dismantle décor and lighting throughout the year. Currently, the budget line is \$64,000 for these services. The contractors provide a vehicle with lift, insurance and additional staff as required.

The focus will be on décor elements using colours and lighting styles rather than specific iconic symbols to ensure the program is inclusive as possible and interpretation is limited.

Staff will also endeavour to promote the My Great Neighbourhood and Festival Investment Grant opportunities to community and multi-cultural groups to ensure groups are aware of the funding and special event permitting function to facilitate request to celebrate community and cultural events throughout the year.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

To diversify the current program, staff require time to consult and study the matter further. This work could be undertaken in 2019 with report back as part of the 2020 Financial Plan. This work can be accommodated within existing resources.

Should Council wish to bring the service in-house, ongoing operating costs would total approximately \$90,000 for labour and equipment operating costs. The additional FTE would also be able to support the Festival & Event Coordinator who is fully subscribed during the summer months.

POET LAUREATE PROGRAM

That Council direct staff to report back on increasing the project funding for the poet laureate and youth poet laureate from \$1000 to \$2000.

BACKGROUND:

The Poet Laureate, "people's poet", is an honorary position that was established by City Council in December 2006, to honor and celebrate the contribution of literature and poetry in the life of Victoria.

Created in 2013, the Youth Poet Laureate position provides the community access to strong youth voices. The Youth Poet Laureate is tasked with reaching out to vulnerable youth populations and encouraging peer to peer education and inspiration through new works and by developing a community youth poetry event.

Past projects have funded poetry events, workshops, outreach and learning opportunities for the community typically through the month of April during National Poetry Month.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Although additional staff time would be needed to support promotions and event coordination beyond April's poetry month activities, it can be accommodated within existing resources.

The financial impact is \$2000 in ongoing funding.

CHILD FRIENDLY SPACES:

That Council direct staff to report back as part of the 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 budget on options to create more child friendly spaces downtown.

BACKGROUND:

The downtown core has a limited inventory of parks to accommodate activities and events, particularly for children. To address this issue, in recent years staff and representatives of other agencies have identified both temporary and permanent opportunities to use the public realm for child-friendly activations. Recent examples include the orca whale installation in Centennial Square, playground at the Hudson Walk development, and temporary play features at Ship Point.

Staff understand Council desires to increase the focus in the immediate term on creating more play spaces in the downtown core. Given this, staff recommend initiating a project in 2019 to seek ideas from the community, investigate creative solutions in other jurisdictions, and assess costs, along with a list of potential actions. This work would expand on the outputs from the Downtown Public Realm Plan, Draft Centennial Square Action Plan, and Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan and would inform potential future capital investments.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Funding of \$70,000 would be required in 2019 to hire a consultant to support this initiative. Any funding requirements resulting from this work would be reported back as part of the 2020 financial planning process.

LIFE PROGRAM: (See Strategic Plan Action 5.8)

That Council direct staff to report back on the implications of extending the LIFE program for a one-year pilot project in 2019 to allow for unlimited use of the Crystal Pool and the arena community ice time for holders of the pass.

BACKGROUND:

The LIFE program provides a combination of annual credit and program fee discounts to eligible individuals and families facing financial barriers, towards recreational programs and services in City facilities, community centres, and participating regional municipalities. At present there are approximately 15,750 residents who are eligible for the program in the City of Victoria. Approximately 18% of the eligible population in Victoria currently participate in this program.

Program participant benefits:

- Up to 52 drop-in visits or 50% off the annual pass
- \$40 to \$60 credit that can be used towards annual pass, drop-in punch cards and program registration fees

The program generates approximately \$26,000 in revenue from membership passes and the City currently budgets \$52,000 in subsidy annually to fund the credit received by participants of the program. On average the actual cost of the subsidy is appropriately \$43,160 (83% the City's allocation).

Program eligibility requirements and guidelines are standardized across the participating municipalities, based on a national formula. Victoria is the only municipality that offers the credit benefit as part of the program, which allows for participants to apply towards programs and services at the Crystal Pool and Fitness Centre, the Save On Foods Memorial Centre, and local community centres. In 2019 approximately 799 program participants took advantage of the credit benefit equating to 28% of the program's total participants.

Staff interpreted the motivation behind Council's direction as the intention to provide program participants unlimited drop-in use of the Crystal Pool and arena. This program adjustment has the potential to increase the value of the program, with relatively low financial and human resource implications. Should Council wish to move ahead with this program change, staff recommend a minimum two-year pilot program, to account for the time required at the outset to update systems, train staff and communicate the adjustment to potential participants and stakeholders.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

If Council chooses to implement this program change, the proposed adjustment to the program would result in a loss of \$26,000 in revenue, thereby increasing the subsidy beyond the existing value. As the proposal is intended to increase participation, staff suggest increasing the annual budget to \$100,000 for the service. The total additional funding required would be \$74,000.

This change could be managed within existing staffing resources.

VIC HIGH SOCCER PITCH:

That Council direct staff to inquire with the School District about opportunities to create a lighted soccer pitch at Victoria High School.

BACKGROUND:

Staff are engaged with School District 61 and will report back with a timeline.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Council has previously approved a \$250,000 contribution to the project subject to:

- a. Community consultation for the project by School District 61 or its designate
- b. Council approval of the final design of the project
- c. Entering into a joint use agreement between the City and School District 61

This grant has not yet been factored into the draft 2019-2023 Financial Plan. As per Council direction, the funding for this project will be considered once all terms of the Council motion have been addressed.

WASTE COLLECTION FROM CITY FACILITIES:

That Council direct staff to report back on the cost and service level implications of having garbage from the Crystal Pool and other city operated facilities collected by municipal employees.

BACKGROUND:

The City does not currently have the equipment needed to service all the waste, recycling and organics collection for City-owned facilities. Options and actions for corporate waste reductions and City collection services will be developed through the Zero Waste Strategy currently in development.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

No additional financial or human resources are required at this time as the study is currently in development.

HOUSING RESERVE:

That Council refer consideration of potentially increasing the funding allocation to the Housing Reserve Fund to the 2019 financial planning process.

BACKGROUND:

As part of the 2017 Victoria Housing Strategy Annual Review, and during a 2018 report to Council at which updates to the Victoria Housing Reserve Fund program were considered, staff estimated that an increase of \$750,000 above the annual contribution rate of \$250,000 would be necessary from 2019 going forward if the City is to meet the affordable housing targets identified in Victoria's Housing Strategy.

Renewed commitments by senior levels of government to support the construction of low and moderate income housing in recent years has led to an influx of partnership requests to the City and an anticipated increase in applications to the Victoria Housing Reserve Fund.

This increase, to a total of \$1,000,000 per annum would allow the City to support the construction of approximately 80% of the 115 rooms of very low and low to moderate-income housing required per annum (the remaining 20% of the affordable housing target is anticipated to be fulfilled through the City's upcoming Inclusionary Housing and Density Bonus Policy). Increasing the allocation to the fund may further support new affordable housing projects and help the City reach its affordable housing targets.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Assuming a permanent \$750,000 increase to the allocation, Council could consider using new tax revenue from new development, reallocating funding by reducing other services, or increasing taxes by 0.57%. A one-time increase could be funded using surplus.

Human Resource impacts include additional staff time spent meeting with project proponents and processing an increased volume of applications requesting funding from the Victoria Housing Reserve Fund. It is not known how many additional applications would be received per year and per intake period (the City will now process fund applications twice per year with application deadlines of March 31 and September 30 respectively), however, an increase is anticipated. Staff would report back to Council should the need arise to increase staffing from current levels.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING:

That Council direct staff to report back on options for providing some resources for neighbourhoods to help expedite the neighbourhood planning process.

BACKGROUND:

Under the accelerated local area planning program, neighbourhood planning has been undertaken concurrently in order to update and align neighbourhood plans with the vision, goals and objectives of the Official Community Plan (OCP) in a timely manner. To date, neighbourhoods which have updated local area plans that align with the OCP are Downtown and Harris Green (the Downtown Core Area Plan), Burnside and Victoria West. Neighbourhood planning in Fairfield is ongoing and nearing its final phase, and the draft neighbourhood plan for Gonzales was placed on hold to be revisited in future. The next phase of local area planning was to include North Park, Fernwood, Jubilee and Rockland, and the final phase to include James Bay, Hillside-Quadra and Oaklands.

If members of the community are interested in undertaking some work themselves to support local area planning or help expedite the planning process by undertaking work while City staff are planning in other neighbourhoods, there may be key tasks that are well suited to citizen-led initiatives. These could include:

1) preparing background information as many of the neighbourhood plans include chapters dedicated to the history of neighbourhoods;

2) identifying issues experienced in the neighbourhood across a wide variety of topics;

3) other topics of interest identified by neighbourhoods that are within municipal jurisdiction and would typically form part of a neighbourhood plan.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Staff time would be required to inform neighbourhoods of this initiative, prepare a program that outlines goals and parameters for the citizen-led work, provide guidance on various tools or engagement techniques community members could use, and administer any budget to support community work and activities (e.g. book venues for community meetings, etc.). Uptake on this is anticipated to vary from neighbourhood to neighbourhood as it will depend on community interest and capacity.

Should Council wish to explore this further, staff would report back to Council within 6 months on financial and human resource implications and the approach for the next phase of local area planning, following consultation with Community Association Land Use Committee representatives.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ASSESSMENT OF PANDORA 900 BLOCK:

That Council direct staff to report back on the potential to cost share a full spectrum neighbourhood assessment with Island Health and BC Housing for the 900 block of Pandora Avenue, subject to the terms of reference of the assessment being approved by Council prior to any municipal funds be expended.

BACKGROUND:

The 900 block of Pandora Avenue has long welcomed people in need of assistance. In 2005, Our Place Society was formed to provide transitional shelter, food and other drop in services. The opening of the nearby Johnson Street Social Housing project in 2016, and supervised consumption services in 2018, resulted in increased social impacts on the block. 'Good neighbour' agreements between local businesses and impacted organizations resulted in various initiatives to improve the appearance and use of the public realm and limit camping and overnight loitering. Despite these initiatives, street use and activities continue to have a significant impact on businesses, perception of safety, and in the overall character of the block.

As a result of 900 Block Pandora Task Force meetings in 2018, it was acknowledged that it would be beneficial to evaluate opportunities for enhancing the block so that all people would feel as safe and welcome as they would on any other block in the City through a collaborative process led by an external consultant. A project scope, methodology and set of deliverables was co-created by members of the Task Force to develop an outcomes-based strategy including a detailed assessment of current conditions, identification of short and longer-term actions and resource requirements, a joint agreement between project partners to support project goals and resourcing, and development of a monitoring framework. Stakeholders are envisioned to include people accessing services, business owners and staff, non-profit societies, health delivery agencies, City staff and Victoria Police. The project would be focused on the 900 block of Pandora, with considerations for relevant context and conditions in the surrounding area, and based on best practice in Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), Change Theory, Placemaking, Peace Building and other approaches.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to proceed with this initiative, City staff would manage and administer the project including procurement of services and project management of the process and deliverables. The Pandora Task Force would function as the Steering Committee. The timeline would be approximately 8 months.

An additional 2.75 FTEs would be required for project management and technical support totaling approximately \$300,000.

In addition, funding of approximately \$30,000 for consulting support, engagement and events would be required. All resource and funding levels would be refined once detailed project scope has been developed.

ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE 2019 BUDGET INPUT

BACKGROUND:

The Active Transportation Advisory Committee (ATAC) was established in 2016 and consists of 12 members of the community with expertise in public transit, walking, cycling, and accessibility of the built environment. The committee meets 9 times each year and has provided valuable input on capital construction design, city policy and bylaw amendments, as well as participating in local area planning processes. All committee motions are reported back to Council through the Quarterly Report process or via Council Liaison roles. The City is currently recruiting members for the next 2-year term.

At its November 2018 meeting, the following ATAC motion was forwarded for Council's consideration in the 2019 – 2023 Financial Plan.

- 1. At a minimum, funding levels for Pedestrian Master Plan Implementation are maintained at the same amount as 2018 levels for the 2019 Budget
- 2. Pedestrian Master Plan implementation funding continues to increase to a total budget of 1 million dollars between 2020 and 2022.
- 3. Funding for Bicycle Master Plan Implementation is allocated to design and construct all planned AAA projects by 2022
- 4. For the next 5 years, \$500,000 be spent annually on crosswalk installation and upgrades (new funding; maintain other budget items)
- 5. Council consider all other necessary resources (community engagement, design fees, data collection, maintenance and operations) associated with all active transportation capital investments.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The draft 2019 financial plan identifies capital projects and funding allocations for walking and cycling that can be achieved with existing staff resources.

The Sustainable Mobility Strategy (SMS), informed by 2019 pavement and sidewalk condition assessments, will ensure a robust policy and data framework is in place to ensure the most appropriate scope, priority and delivery approach is undertaken for infrastructure and asset management plans that support human powered mobility in the City. Further allocation of funding at this time would be considered premature until such a time these are in place.

Staff will report back separately on the implementation of the Bicycle Master Plan.

Other capital budget programs have significant investment planned in the next four years, much of which enhances pedestrian, transit and cycling infrastructure, improves safety and functionality for all modes of transportation.

The ATAC motion calls for an increased level of funding for pedestrian master planning activities (increasing to \$1m in 2022) and \$500,000 for crosswalk installations (see separate motion on crosswalks), as well as increases in staff complement across disciplines. Funding levels for these

programs currently sit at \$371,000 for pedestrian master plan projects, and \$260,000 for crosswalk installations, split into dedicated and capital improvement funding lines.

Any increases in 2019 spending or additional FTEs will directly impact taxation, or conversely could displace higher priority capital investments in safety and service across several domains (parks, fleet, facilities, streets - to name a few).

The SMS (completing in 2019) will provide further direction to staff in the prioritization and recommendations for healthy, long-term funding requirements for these and other important transportation asset groups. Staff would assess that SMS completion and subsequent financial planning is critical *before* any major changes to these funding allocations. Master planning processes, like the SMS, that are currently underway, are the best tools we have for defining asset-group long term funding needs. Improved tools / systems to prioritize projects across domains would improve our ability to prioritize across asset groups. Awaiting the outcomes from the SMS and other priority management plans will greatly reduce the risk of spending funds in a manner that does not align with priorities of public safety and other important municipal services.

ACCESSIBILITY WORKING GROUP 2019 BUDGET INPUT

That Council forward this report with the recommendations from the Accessibility Working Group to the 2019 budget process to receive the financial implications of all of the un-actioned recommendations.

BACKGROUND:

Since its inception in 2015, the *Accessibility Working Group (AWG)* has raised a number of issues for the City's consideration. The establishment of a city-wide accessibility policy and framework was a key recommendation of the Working Group. This project is currently under development and includes the following within the approved scope of work:

- City-wide accessibility policy
- Accessibility guidelines and standards
- Training and awareness for city staff
- Dedicated staff position to support enhanced accessibility in City services and projects
- Cross-department accessibility planning
- Risk, budget and prioritization of accessibility actions to set a multi-year barrier reduction plan
- Accessibility Impact lens
- Progress monitoring and reporting
- Compliance and enforcement
- Individual Accommodation
- New terms of reference and operational guidelines for an Accessibility Working Group

The comprehensive list of topics, issues, and ideas that have been raised at the Working Group meetings and/or through formal motions have been shared with the City's consulting team for their professional consideration and integration into draft documents.

City staff plan to present the draft accessibility framework and policy to the Accessibility Working Group in Q1 2019 for review and insights, before presenting to Council and completing broader public consultation. The framework will provide further direction to staff in the prioritization and recommendations for healthy, long-term funding requirements for this program. Staff would assess that Framework completion and subsequent financial planning is critical *before* any major changes are made to funding allocations identified by any single stakeholder group.

There are 5 motions that were specifically identified by the AWG for consideration in the 2019 Financial Plan.

As the actions for the Accessibility Framework will occur outside of the 2019 financial planning process, Council may wish to allocate funding for potential expenditures before the 2020 financial planning process or to accelerate certain actions within the calendar year. Council could consider allocating the already planned \$250,000 addition to the Accessibility Capital Reserve to an operating reserve instead to be able to fund initiatives that are not capital in nature, such as staff training.

MOTION 1: Barriers in Council Documents and Procedures: That Council direct staff to research and plan to address barriers in the Council documents and webcasting service and

system/page and report to Council on financial implications as part of the 2019 Financial Planning process.

BACKGROUND:

The Accessibility Working Group has identified barriers related to the publishing of documents and webcasting services for persons with disabilities. Specific topics include, but are not limited to:

- 1. People with hearing impairments being able to watch webcasts
- 2. Reliability of webcasts for people who cannot attend in person at city hall
- 3. Navigation issues on the page for people using screen readers
- 4. Lack of process for people who cannot attend City Hall in person

FINANCIAL & HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The development of the City-wide accessibility policy and framework includes establishment of tools to prioritize investments to reduce systematic barriers in different areas, including city communications and governance documents.

A few of the recommendations can be implemented quite easily and will be actioned. Closed captioning for the webcasts will be implemented, to enable people with hearing impairments to watch the webcasts. This functionality is part of the existing system. Staff have established additional procedures with the service provider to reduce reliability issues of the webcasts, including adjusting automatic re-boot schedules of backend systems. Staff will continue to monitor this. For the navigation issues we will explore options to improve screen reader access to the webcasting landing pages. Should the options for improving the navigation issues be more difficult than anticipated, staff will report back to Council.

The remaining recommendations are best integrated as part of broader city governance considerations. The implications of introducing processes to appear before Council without attending in person should be analyzed as part of a comprehensive approach to support effective decision-making. For resource implications of such a review, please refer to the Strategic Plan motion response.

MOTION 2: Accessibility of the Planted Environment: That Council direct staff to plan, scope, cost and look at options to resource a project for 2019 to consult, research, analyze and develop a long-term, phased plan and policies for addressing accessibility of the planted environment, to remove barriers for people with environmental disabilities, consistent with the accessibility objectives of the Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan.

BACKGROUND:

Balancing accessibility considerations with pollinator habitat is a complicated task given the numerous variables at play in the outside environment and the relatively limited ability to control all sources of allergens. The characteristics of Victoria's natural ecosystem must also be taken into account. For example, Garry Oaks are high on the allergy index scale and yet are a critically important part of the City's natural ecosystem.

In November 2017, Council directed staff to work with the Accessibility Working Group and Urban Food Table and to report back on options for balancing accessibility considerations with pollinator habitat, including in the vicinity of playgrounds.

In July 2019, through the Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan, staff reported back on these issues and committed to undertaking two actions in an effort to balance accessibility considerations with the management of the City's natural habitats. This includes working with the Accessibility Working Group and the Urban Food Table on the development of information resources for the public in effort to raise awareness among residents about allergen considerations and pollinator plants in the public realm; and, developing a reference list for staff that identifies low allergen plants that are sensitive to Victoria's natural ecosystem. This work is underway and will be completed in 2019.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish to undertake a more detailed study to address accessibility considerations within the planted environment, staff recommend *developing a scope of work in 2019* for a consultant to assist the City with a study in the 2020. Staff estimate the cost of the study to be \$100,000.

MOTION 3: Accessible / Barrier-Free Parking: That Council direct staff, when reporting back to Council as part of Financial Plan with resource estimates for AWG recommendations, that staff consider combining the AWG's recommendations regarding conducting a parking study for City-provided parking, with the scope of the accessible parking study for privately-provided parking, to determine any efficiencies that might be gained.

See response under a separate parking motion that covers accessible parking standards on private lands and on City streets / parkades.

MOTION 4: Accessibility Awareness Training: That one-time operational funding for 2019 be allocated, sufficient to address recommendations arising from the Accessibility Framework, with the highest priority activity being delivery of accessibility awareness training to staff and Council, consistent with recommendations from the Accessibility Framework consultant's pending training needs assessment.

BACKGROUND:

Staff training and education is a topic included in the city-wide accessibility policy and framework which is under development. This motion requests that Council provide an allocation of funds specifically for rolling out training and development activities in 2019 after adoption of the framework.

The BC Public Service has recently launched a three-year action plan to support Diversity and Inclusion. As part of this action plan, a new training for provincial government employees will be launched in the Spring of 2019. The City is exploring opportunities to access Provincial training and will be meeting with representatives from the BC Learning Agency in January 2019 to gain insight into the applicability and focus of their inclusion training. It is possible the Government of BC may launch additional resources in future to support accessibility, as Bill M219 The British Columbia Accessibility Act has had first reading.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Allocation of \$30,000 towards the *City's Core Learning Program* to initiate new accessibility and inclusion awareness training would help to accelerate training actions in 2019 for frontline staff, the City's Management team and Council. Staging and sequencing of learning should first be delivered to the Senior Leadership Team and Management so that they are equipped to support

further roll-out. In order to manage the operational impacts, a staged approach will be used with existing staff while newly hired staff will participate within their first year of being hired. Additional work will inform the 2020 budget cycle on appropriate funding for on-going support training for all staff.

MOTION 5: Accessible and Audible Pedestrian Signal implementation: That Council direct staff to develop and implement a plan to install APS/audible signals at all existing controlled intersections/ crossings, to be completed by 2021 and that staff work with the AWG to determine priority intersections/crossings to be addressed each year.

BACKGROUND:

Accessible Pedestrian Signals are Audible Pedestrian Signals (APS) with enhanced features (locator tones/vibro-tactile pushbuttons) intended to provide improved accessibility for users with visual impairments. Many traffic signals are already updated with audible tones, but do not include the APS with enhanced features.

In 2018 the city installed APS with enhanced features at the following locations:

- Gorge/Washington
- Hillside/Gosworth
- Bay/Richmond
- Quadra/Finlayson

The following intersections have been identified for the installation of audible tones and APS with enhanced features in 2019:

- Quadra/Caledonia
- Quadra/Fisgard
- Johnson/Fernwood
- Humboldt/Wharf/Government

With the completion of the intersections identified above, the City will have completed all intersections identified by the Accessibility Working Group and funded by the accessibility reserve. A total of 79 intersections in the City have audible tones with an additional 5 installations planned in 2019. With a total of 132 signalized intersections in the City there are a remaining 49 signals without audible tones. The typical cost of retrofitting a signal with audible tones is \$14,000 representing a funding commitment of approximately \$229,000/year over three years.

A total of 10 intersections in the City have APS with enhanced features. With a total of 132 signalized intersections in the City there are a remaining 122 signals without APS with enhanced features. The typical cost of retrofitting a signal with APS with enhanced features is \$15,000 representing a funding commitment of approximately \$610,000/year over three years. In order to accommodate APS, traffic signal hardware upgrades could be required, which could impact costs.

APS at traffic signals is an existing program within the City in alignment with the city's broader direction to develop a barrier free street environment. Priority is given to those locations identified by interested stakeholders and by staff's own assessments taking into account factors including pedestrian volumes and adjacent land uses. APS is also included in all new signal installations, within any changes associated with new development, other capital projects and as part of traffic signal rebuilds.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The Accessibility Framework currently under development will help staff and the public understand the level of priority and in turn investment that should be given to all of the above programs.

Should Council wish to accelerate the funding or actions in these program areas ahead of the completion of the Accessibility Framework, then additional staff and resources would need to be made available now, depending on what mix of initiatives they wish to support. Additional direction from Council and details of scope would be required to define resultant resource needs. The current uncommitted capital funding available in the reserve is \$947,000.

The Accessible Framework will inform Council, staff and the public of important considerations for how to best spend any accessibility investment and also how best to prioritize that against other important City safety and service areas.

The framework (completing in Q1/Q2 2019) will provide further direction to staff in the prioritization and recommendations for healthy, long-term funding requirements for this program. Staff would assess that Framework completion and subsequent financial planning is critical *before* any major adjustments are made to funding allocations identified by stakeholders.

Master planning processes, like the Accessibility Framework, that are currently underway, are the best tools we have for defining asset-group long term funding needs. Improved tools / systems to prioritize projects across domains would improve our ability to prioritize across asset groups. Awaiting the outcomes from the Framework and other priority management plans will greatly reduce the risk of spending funds in a manner that does not align with priorities of public safety and other important municipal services. That being said, in anticipation of the completion of the Accessibility Framework and funding needs, Council may consider allocating the already planned additional funding of \$250,000 to an operating reserve rather than the Accessibility Capital Reserve, so that the funding can be used for initiatives that are not capital in nature, such as training and program development.

BIKE MASTER PLAN:

That Council direct staff to report back on the resources required and/or de-scoping required to complete phases 2 to 4 of the Bike Network by 2022 or earlier.

BACKGROUND:

A full staff report will be brought to Council in Q1 2019.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

A full staff report will be brought to Council in Q1 2019

BLANSHARD STREET/KINGS ROAD AND OTHER CROSSWALK UPGRADES:

Direct staff to report back on options for expediting the implementation of crosswalk installations and upgrades including Blanshard/Kings crosswalk.

BACKGROUND:

The Transportation Division has historically had a crosswalk budget of approximately \$110,000/year. In 2019, the budget was increased to \$260,000. Improvements can range in cost from \$5,000 for a simple signed and marked crossing, to \$250,000+ for a pedestrian signal. This program typically funds two crosswalk improvements a year. Priority is given to projects where analysis has shown the crossing is warranted, there is a history of collisions involving pedestrian injury and other locations which have been identified as community priorities. This program in isolation does not fully accommodate the implementation of the higher priority crosswalks contained within the City's crosswalk assessment matrix. The delivery of new and upgraded crosswalks is supplemented by crosswalk implementation within other capital projects.

When evaluating locations for new crosswalks, or crosswalk upgrades, staff use the nationally adopted Transportation Association of Canada (TAC) *Pedestrian Crossing Control Guide (2012)* to determine the appropriate level of facility warranted at a crossing. The TAC guide considers several factors including pedestrian volumes, vehicle volumes and the ability for pedestrians to find gaps in traffic, road classification and geometry and the level of risk to pedestrians when they are crossing.

Once a location has been identified for improvements, staff assess its level of priority within the context of other warranted pedestrian crossings elsewhere in the City using an assessment matrix which takes into account network connections, (eg Greenway crosssing), adjacent land uses (eg proximity to a school) and pedestrian safety.

For the 2019 Crosswalk Improvement Program, 2 installations are identified:

- Gorge Road at Rock Bay, which has an identified collision history involving pedestrians. This is the top priority within the crosswalk assessment matrix.
- Hereward Road at Wilson Street, which was identified as a community priority in the Vic West Neighbourhood Plan (2018), for a new crosswalk installation.

In addition to the city crosswalk capital program, crosswalks and upgrades, are also delivered in coordination with other capital programs as well as through requirements of new development. The following projects are anticipated to be delivered in 2019, beyond the two funded within the \$260,000 crosswalk program, representing approximately an additional \$1M of investment in crosswalks.

- Wharf Street at Yates Street
- Wharf Street at Broughton Street
- Wharf Street at Bastion Square
- Mid-block on Humboldt at St. Ann's Academy
- Vancouver Street at Bay Street
- Vancouver Street at Caledonia Avenue
- Fort Street at Fern Street
- Morrison Street at Fort Street
- Fernwood Road at Denman Street
- Fernwood Road at Johnson Street

• Superior Street at Menzies Street

The Wharf Street projects at Yates Street, Broughton Street and at Bastion Square are all identified as high priority projects within the City's priority matrix. The Crosswalk Evaluation Council Report from 2016 identified 35 priority crosswalks. Since 2016, 17 of these crosswalks have been improved with another 5 expecting upgrade in 2019. Of the top 25 identified crosswalks, it is expected that 19 will have been improved by the end of 2019. The majority of the outstanding crosswalks on the list are awaiting coordination with redevelopment or other transportation planning initiatives.

In the Summer of 2018, the Transportation Association of Canada published the new Pedestrian Crossing Control Guide (Third Edition) containing new assessment criteria and recommended treatments. Through 2019, staff will be undertaking a review of the new guidelines to determine the potential implications on the city's current inventory of crosswalks. Future upward pressure on funding and staffing resources is expected in order to bring these up to current recommended standards.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The transportation division design resources are fully committed on the 2019 capital program and consulting engineering services would be required to advance this project including an RFP to be developed and technical oversight for the design process. Consultation with the community would be required, including private property access. The Public Works Department is fully allocated and would not be able to accommodate an additional project of this scope without eliminating other established capital construction projects from its planned 2019 list.

At this time, the Engineering Department is unable to absorb the additional work required to consult with the community and tender and manage a contractor to build a new signal at Blanshard at Kings without additional resources. The design and construction of this intersection improvement is anticipated to be complex and costly due to the length of the pedestrian crossing, impacts to an arterial road, and the need to coordinate with other traffic signals on Blanshard. Preliminary estimates of any project at this location indicate a cost up to \$500,000. It is noted that this location is identified for upgrades as a part of the Bicycle Master Plan program implementation in 2020/2021 and staff expect improvements to be advanced at that time.

The existing priority list of warranted crosswalks, the crosswalk retrofits and upgrades expected with the new TAC Guidelines, plus the need to undertake a system-wide review of current crossings and the public desire to see additional crosswalks, in combination, requires significant staffing effort through 2019 and 2020 in order to establish an updated prioritization and sustainable funding framework.

Without additional staff or a reduction in work in other operational areas, the transportation division and public works does not have funds or capacity to increase the number of crosswalks being delivered in 2019 and beyond.

An additional 0.5-1.0 FTE plus seasonal staffing (approximately \$50,000 - \$100,000) is required for data collection and updating the crosswalk prioritization. Updating this prioritization tool is critical for staff to be able to respond to public concern and ensure that funding is used as effectively as possible in future years. A traffic/crosswalk monitoring and survey program supported by dedicated staff and investment in survey equipment is considered a critical 2019 pre-requisite to continue to deliver or expedite crosswalks in the city.

Additionally, Council may wish to allocate capital funding contingency for potential expenditures to accelerate the implementation of additional priority crosswalks within the 2019 calendar year. An additional allocation of \$250,000, above the \$260,000 in the proposed financial plan, would provide staff with additional flexibility for an additional signalized crossing to be designed and constructed by consultant/contractor teams in 2019.

DALLAS ROAD/SIMCOE STREET CROSSWALK:

That Council direct staff to report on the implications and options of installing a marked crosswalk at Dallas Road and Simcoe Street on a cost-sharing basis with the Greater Victoria Harbour Authority.

BACKGROUND:

Staff and the Greater Victoria Harbour Authority have discussed how to work together to provide improved crossing options from Ogden Point, across Dallas Road, into James Bay. Staff are examining options for improvements at both Simcoe Street and between Niagara and Montreal Streets.

The installation of the crosswalk in the block of Dallas Road between Niagara and Montreal Streets would need to be coordinated with the current CRD sewer force main works on Dallas Road. This Dallas Road location provides the most direct connection from the cruise ship terminal into James Bay and towards downtown.

A pedestrian crossing at Dallas Road and Simcoe Street has been reviewed and is challenged due to the geometry of Dallas Road. The intersection of Simcoe Street and Dallas Road is located adjacent to a sharp corner and on a hill which reduce sightlines between the crossing pedestrian and motor vehicles and would require additional interventions to allow it to operate safely.

Staff assessed a number of alternative options at this location including:

- A new traffic signal
- A raised crosswalk
- Centre crossing island
- Signed and painted crosswalk

Staff support implementation of a centre crossing island which will cost approximately \$40,000. Considerations include accessibility features and design geometries that can support large tour buses. Impacts of introducing a new crossing at this location include removal of on-street parking on Dallas Road between Simcoe Street and the Coast Guard Base and signage considerations for cyclists who will be required to "take the lane" in this segment.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Investment in a crosswalk for a Dallas Road crosswalk at either location would be included within the 2020 financial planning process and a more thorough review will determine the most appropriate location (Niagara Street, Montreal Street or a mid-block crossing in line with the new pedestrian access to the cruise ship terminal). The priority of these locations is based on the premise of receiving cost sharing with the Greater Victoria Harbour Authority, and a lack of cost sharing would likely delay the implementation timeline.

The existing warranted crosswalks waiting for implementation including those above, the changes expected with the new TAC Guidelines, the need to undertake a system-wide review of current crossings and the public desire to see additional crosswalks, in combination, requires significant staffing effort through 2019 and 2020 in order to establish a prioritization and sustainable funding framework.

Additional staffing (0.5 FTE, \$50,000) for design and data collection and analysis would provide the potential to reduce this timeline. Staff are in discussions with the Greater Victoria Harbour Authority for matched funding towards the Dallas Road improvements.

JSB REVENUE

That Council direct staff Council direct staff to report back on options for and implications of increasing revenues to offset the costs of opening the Johnson Street Bridge for marine users.

BACKGROUND:

The Johnson Street Bridge crosses a navigable waterway where the marine vessels have the right of way. As a result, the City of Victoria is required to lift the bridge for marine traffic when requested and does so at its own cost. The city has a Bridge Operator on shift seven days per week, between 8:00am and 4:00pm, to perform bridge lifts as requested and to perform inspections and maintenance functions. Outside of these hours, the bridge lifts are done on an "on call" basis by other trained staff who are on shift attending to other duties.

The only revenues for opening the Johnson Street Bridge come from Special Lifts. These are defined as any lifts that take place between the hours of midnight and 7:00am, Monday to Saturday and after 4pm Saturday and Sunday. This definition has been in place for many years, previously negotiated with the relevant marine users. When the Special Lift has been completed, the marine user is charged a fee of \$75.00. When a Special Lift has been arranged and the vessel fails to arrive at the appointed time, or the special lift is cancelled once the Bridge Operator has been called out, the company having made the arrangements is billed. Legal advice would be required if consideration is being given to change this agreement with marine users. The current rate of \$75 has not changed since at least 1975.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

City records show out of about 1000 lifts per year about 15% or 150 of the lifts are Special Lifts. This equates to a revenue of approximately \$11,250 annually. Making changes to the fee structure and rates for the JSB bridge lifts will require:

- 1. Initial legal review;
- 2. Determination of the objective of the financial price scheme:
 - a. Is it to achieve full cost recovery for all lifts or Special Lifts only?
 - b. Should the price scheme take into account time delays and costs for the travelling public who use the bridge?
 - c. Are there other costs associated with providing this service to marine traffic such as the maintenance of traffic signal equipment and advance electronic message board signs
- 3. Engagement with marine and harbour stakeholders;
- 4. Review of rate classifications and consideration of possible modifications of these rates depending on the operational requirements for lifting the new bridge
- 5. Reporting back to Council with proposed amendments to the bylaw, including new provisions for an annual review of lift-rates

If directed by Council, this work can be planned for 2020 using existing resources.

If Council wishes to accelerate this review in 2019, other higher priority work in the 2019 plan would have to be de-scoped/deferred across safety, service and waste, climate, fleet or other planning priorities.

PARKING:

That Council direct staff to report back on funding in the budget for policy work in 2019 on accessibility, including accessible parking.

BACKGROUND:

Where previously the 2012 BC Building Code prescribed minimum accessible parking supply requirements, the new 2018 BCBC refers to the National Building Code which simply defers all regulatory authority to the local jurisdiction. As such, the City will need to establish new supply requirements to be included in Schedule C under the City of Victoria Zoning Bylaw.

The accessibility working group has also identified the need to develop design guidelines for onstreet or parkade parking stalls. This work can be done at the same time and would inform a subsequent retrofit program on City streets and in the parkades.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The estimated cost of undertaking this work is \$100,000 and includes:

- Review and collate previous and current City documentation including feedback, information and insights already documented from the Accessibility Working Group and members of the Victoria Disability Resource Centre's parking committee
- Undertake a best-practice review of barrier-free parking regulations in other jurisdictions;
- Review guidance provided by National and International standards;
- Development of a new set of requirements for accessible / barrier free parking and engage with stakeholder groups including:
 - The Accessibility Working Group;
 - Victoria Disability Resource Centre;
 - Community Association Land Use Committees
 - Urban Development Institute; and
 - Rental / property management organization(s).
- Host a public event to share draft recommendations for public review and comment;
- Prepare a final report that includes:
 - A summary of the process undertaken;
 - Recommended requirements and associated zoning bylaw amendments;
 - Recommended operational design guidelines for on-street and parkade accessible parking stalls

There is no budget established for this project in the 2019 Financial Plan. Resources would need to be allocated. Staff assess that this work is led by existing staff in the Transportation Division with support from an external consultant, and existing staff in Parking Services, Engagement and Sustainable Community Planning & Development departments. Funding for a city-wide retrofit program would be required as a part of 2020 and 2021 financial plan to implement the recommended changes to on-street and parkade parking stalls. Accelerating this work before the introduction of the Accessibility Framework risks expenditures that are misaligned with other important accessibility priorities. These risks are mitigated somewhat by the coupling of this work with the on-street and parkade accessible parking assessment project.

TRAFFIC CALMING: (See Strategic Plan Action 7.12)

That Council direct staff to report back with options and implications for increasing traffic calming in general.

BACKGROUND:

In the 1990's the City of Victoria developed Neighbourhood Traffic Management Plans (NTMPs) for the different neighbourhoods in the city. Over the decades the actions laid out in these plans have been completed and staff are working to finalize the final outstanding locations. Since the completion of these plans there remains some public concern about the impact of traffic on local residential streets with council and staff continue to receive requests for traffic calming. Changes to land use and re-development of private land may also contribute to new traffic related concerns on neighbourhood streets.

Community concerns should be acknowledged and so it is an appropriate time to update the City's approach and criteria for traffic calming.

When vehicle speed data is collected, it is often below the current speed limit meaning that traffic calming would be unlikely to offer further reductions in speed.

Individual residents can perceive problems on their own street while discounting similar problems on their neighbours' street. In addition, responding to a traffic issue on one street in a piecemeal way can result in traffic diversion onto other local streets potentially creating a problem on a neighbouring street.

Through the Sustainable Mobility Strategy the contribution that traffic calming will make to broader transportation outcomes will be better understood allowing appropriate approaches and resources to be established within new policy.

Through 2019, staff will continue to assess and prioritize any neighbourhood traffic calming requests taking an evidence-based approach.

Traffic calming is also introduced as a part of capital construction projects. For example, traffic calming features are being installed as a part of the implementation of All Ages and Abilities (AAA) bicycle route implementation. The following streets are identified for traffic calming in 2019/2020 as a part of the Bicycle Master Plan implementation:

- Vancouver Street (Park to Bay)
- Graham / 5th (Bay to Tolmie)
- Haultain (Cook to Shelbourne)
- Richardson (Cook to Foul Bay)

In general, safety on our local streets is good with few serious collisions being reported. The majority of motor vehicle related collisions occur on arterial and collector roadways. Traffic calming on local roads can help respond to the perception of danger and create a more comfortable experience on neighbourhood streets. Currently, traffic calming is mostly being implemented on a squeaky wheel basis, which does not foster a positive and transparent relationship between residents and staff.

The consistent, fair, equitable and sustainable implementation of traffic calming requires the use of objective data on the speed and volume of traffic in conjunction with established criteria to allow prioritization of projects in those locations where there is the highest need and the greatest

benefits will be achieved. Currently the City has limited base line data on neighbourhood traffic speeds and staff have identified the need for relevant and objective data on vehicle speeds and volumes as a critical element of any future policy development.

The implementation of traffic calming at individual locations where speed is already low as well as the over use of traffic calming within the City can result in the loss of support for it from the broader travelling public.

Any future traffic calming program also requires a comprehensive process to effectively establish the broader nature of community concerns and the level of community buy in to traffic calming. Once established, a funded, prioritized annual program with criteria and proposed projects would be developed.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Establishing the contribution and broader priority of traffic calming to transportation priorities within the SMS (completing in 2019) and developing specific policy, criteria and longer-term funding requirements will support the implementation of projects at locations where there is the greatest need and where the most benefits will be achieved in a transparent and consistent way.

Staff would assess that SMS completion and subsequent financial planning is critical *before* any major changes to these funding allocations. Awaiting the outcomes from the SMS and other priority management plans will greatly reduce the risk of spending funds in a manner that does not align with priorities of public safety and other important municipal services.

If Council wishes to advance this work ahead of the results of the SMS, additional staffing resources to support any future development of criteria and city policy for a traffic calming program and appropriate community outreach process will be required – 2 FTEs and approximately \$250,000. It is important to be aware of the risks of advancing this work ahead of the SMS, such as not investing in the highest priority areas and potential re-do of work. Establishment of a traffic monitoring and survey program supported by dedicated staff and investment in survey equipment is considered a critical 2019 pre-requisite. Improved data collection capabilities are being sourced within the SmartCity program to allow more convenient, efficient and real time data collection with enhanced analytics and reporting. Following the dedication of staff resources, staff could report back to council on options for implementing traffic calming programs citywide.

VCC CONTRACT SERVICES:

That Council direct staff to report back with information on contracting out janitorial and security services for the Victoria Conference Centre.

BACKGROUND:

Housekeeping and security services have been contracted since opening of the facility 1989. These contracts were initiated to ensure that the facility opened with professional services in each department which would establish the reputation of the excellent service that the VCC has today. The event industry is highly competitive.

These contracts have a 5-year term. Each contractor is an expert and national leader in their industry and backed by 35 to 40 years of best practices of event industry standards.. They are also familiar with the VCC client base users across Canada and understand the specific needs of the clients. The VCC is a 24/7-hour operation and backed by companies offering 24/7 support for specialized resources, trends, planning, regulatory, legislation, training, health and safety protocols, licensing, fluctuating labor needs, with proactive processes. The experience of these companies offers a depth of experience which enhances the services offered to VCC clients. Both contracts are members of the Building Owner Management Association aligning their sustainability practices with the VCC Boma Best Platinum accreditation and the City Victoria Climate Leadership Plan.

Security requirements are complex and in this global world, there are many issues that have affected our client's programs, and the security operation of the building for all users. Ranges from protective services, levels of specialty first aid services, Client RFP security plan advice, relationships with all levels of military and police personnel, and pertinent client industry knowledge and more.

FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Should Council wish the explore this further, funding for a consultant (\$50,000) would be recommended to analyze the complexity of these services to ensure that the needs of the clients and the VCC reputation are considered to maintain the current excellent customer service and to avoid any negative financial impact to revenue generation.


Surplus Funding


- Surplus is one-time funding arising from the previous year's expenditure budgets being underspent or revenue budgets being exceeded, or a combination of the two.

- Reason for this Policy is to ensure that ongoing expenditure requirements are funded by ongoing revenues, not surplus which cannot be counted on annually.

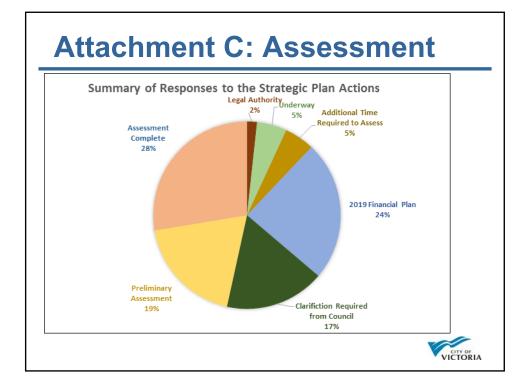

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to seek direction regarding adjustments to the draft 2019-2023 Financial Plan based on the feedback from public consultation before Council gives final approval to the Financial Plan Bylaw prior to May 15 as required by the *Community Charter*.

On December 13, 2018, following review and discussion, Council gave first reading of the 2019 Financial Plan Bylaw indicating preliminary approval and signalling to the public that Council had an opportunity to review the draft prior to commencing public consultation. The opportunity to provide feedback on the draft financial plan concluded on January 20, 2019. In addition to requesting feedback on the content of the entire draft Financial Plan, the City also sought feedback on how to allocate the 2018 surplus and the 2019 new property tax revenue from new development. Council directed staff to bring forward options, upon completion of public consultation, for the use of new property tax revenue from new development, 2018 surplus, and funding options for supplementary budget requests (Appendix A) and an additional grant request (Appendix B). During the budget meetings, Council approved shifting the Overnight Sheltering supplemental request from on-going funding to one-time funding. The ongoing supplementary requests now total \$905,000 and one-time requests total \$751,500.

The new property tax revenue from new development is estimated at approximately \$3.5 million. However, the amount available from this revenue is \$2.174 million as Council has already allocated \$500,000 to the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve, \$239,000 to repay the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve, \$239,000 to repay the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve for the tenant improvements at the new library branch in James Bay, \$250,000 for 2 FTE's for the Strategic Real Estate Division, \$114,000 (\$90,000 plus pension, benefits and employer costs) for the Mayor's Office Support, and \$223,000 for two new positions for the Climate Action program. This new property tax revenue is likely to change before it is finalized due to assessment appeals that property owners file with BC Assessment. The final amount will not be known until the end of March.

The 2018 year-end is not yet complete, but the surplus (one-time revenue) is estimated at \$4.5 million. Council has already approved \$50,000 for the Victoria 2020 Francophone Games, \$55,000 for the 55+ Games BC 2021 and \$200,000 for the Medical Services Plan Premiums. In addition, Council commitments for a Citizen's Assembly up to \$250,000 and \$220,000 for the South Island Prosperity Project, should Council approve the funding from surplus, leaves a remaining balance of \$3.725 million to allocate.

Through the financial planning process, Council sets services levels and makes difficult funding decisions between competing priorities, including determining the merit of supplementary budget funding requests. Should Council wish to fund any supplementary requests, the ongoing requests are recommended to be funded by new development property tax revenue, and the one-time requests are recommended to be funded by 2018 surplus.

Three separate reports form part of today's agenda that will provide information for Council's review in preparation for the budget meetings scheduled in February. One report provides information in response to the Council Motions and draft Strategic Plan actions, and two separate reports summarize the consultation results from the survey, Town Hall and Summit. A summary of the public input will be included in the final Financial Plan.

The online survey shows that 50% of respondents indicated they were moderately or very satisfied with value for tax dollars, with 51% agreeing with the proposed 2.85% tax increase for City operations, 34% felt the increase should be reduced, and 15% felt the increase should be higher to address additional services or service levels. The majority or 63% of respondents indicated the Employer Health Tax should be funded from tax revenue from new development, 22% recommended a property tax increase and 15% suggested that the City cut current services levels. In terms of surplus, the highest response was to invest some surplus in reserves and some in new initiatives (50%), followed by saving for future infrastructure investment (41%) and investing in new initiatives (9%). For new property tax revenue from new development, the majority (52%) indicated a preference to save for future infrastructure investment, followed by a reduction to the tax increase (44%) and to invest in new initiatives (34%).

Any adjustments approved by Council will be incorporated into the 2019-2023 Financial Plan and the Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw, which is scheduled to be given second and third readings, and adoption in April once the final assessment data has been received from BC Assessment.

Tax notices will be sent out once the financial plan and tax rate bylaws have been adopted by Council.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to seek direction regarding adjustments to the draft 2019-2023 Financial Plan based on the feedback from public consultation before Council gives final approval to the Financial Plan Bylaw prior to May 15 as required by the *Community Charter*.

BACKGROUND

Section 165 of the *Community Charter* requires that a financial plan be approved annually following public consultation as required by section 166. The financial plan must be approved before the tax rate bylaw is approved, and before May 15 as required by section 197.

The draft 2019 Financial Plan was developed based on Council's direction for a maximum tax increase of inflation plus 1% plus the cost of the new Provincial Employer Health Tax, as well as the City's Financial Sustainability Policy as the guiding document for budget development. Budgets were developed to maintain existing services and service levels; staff's recommendations on service level changes are presented as supplementary budget requests for Council's consideration.

The draft operating budget totals \$244.7 million and the draft capital budget totals \$118 million for 2019. The proposed budgets would result in an overall increase in property taxes of 4.30%, (2.85% for City operations and 1.45% for the Provincial Health Tax) combined with utility user fee increases, the total is 3.76% for the average residential property.

On December 13, 2018, Council passed the following motions, for which direction is sought today:

- Direct staff to bring forward options for the use of the remainder of new property tax revenue from new development (non-market change) upon completion of public consultation
- Direct staff to bring forward options for the use of 2018 surplus upon completion of public consultation
- Direct staff to bring forward options for funding supplementary budget requests upon completion of public consultation
- Direct staff to bring forward options for funding increased grant requests upon completion of public consultation

After detailed review and discussion, Council gave first reading to the Financial Plan Bylaw on December 13, 2018 prior to commencing public consultation that took place through an online survey and a Town Hall/eTown Hall part way thorough December and January. Building on the activities and tools used during the 2018 financial planning process, the process for 2019 included summary materials in print and online, the budget simulator, the property tax estimator and the budget video explaining municipal budgets. Three separate reports are part of today's meeting agenda which outline the results of the consultation and provide information in response to budget motions passed to-date and Strategic Plan actions.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

Available Funding

New Property Tax Revenue from New Development (Non-Market Change)

Non-market change revenue is new property tax revenue resulting from new development that the City will be collecting on an ongoing basis each year. The Financial Sustainability Policy, as amended by Council in 2015, recommends that \$500,000 of new property tax revenue resulting from new construction be transferred to reserves.


The most recent estimate is \$3.5 million, though this new estimate is likely to change again due to assessment appeals filed by property owners before the assessment roll is finalized in March. Council has already approved allocating \$500,000 to the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve, \$239,000 to pay back the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve for the new library branch in James Bay, \$250,000 for 2 FTE's for the Strategic Reals Estate Division, \$114,000 (including pension, benefits and employer costs) for the Mayor's Office Support, and \$223,000 for two new positions for the Climate Action program leaving \$2.174 million available to allocate.

The remaining estimated new property tax revenue from new development is equivalent to an approximate 1.7% reduction to the tax increase.

Over the last decade, Council has used the majority of the new tax revenue for capital investment (savings in reserves) and reducing the annual tax increase. Only a portion of this new revenue has been used to fund new services as illustrated in the graph below:


2018 Surplus

Surplus is one-time funding arising from the previous year's expenditure budgets being underspent or revenue budgets being exceeded, or a combination of the two. The Financial Sustainability Policy provides that prior year surplus can be used for one-time expenditures and/or is transferred to infrastructure reserves. The reason for this policy is to ensure that ongoing expenditure requirements are funded by ongoing revenues, not surplus which cannot be counted on annually.

To illustrate this rationale, the following very simplistic example shows that the increase is not eliminated, but rather deferred to the following year:

The 2018 surplus is estimated at \$4.5 million primarily as a result of higher than expected revenues in parking, higher revenues for the Victoria Conference Centre, savings due to vacancies, and unspent contingency. As part of the report on 2018 Financial Statements coming to Council in April, finalized details about the 2018 surplus will be provided. Council has already approved one-time allocations of \$50,000 for the Victoria 2020 Francophone Games, \$55,000 for the 55+ Games BC 2021 and \$200,000 for the Medical Services Plan Premiums. Should Council fund the Citizens' Assembly (\$250,000) and the South Island Prosperity Project (\$220,000) through surplus, the remaining balance will be \$3.725 million.

Annual Gas Tax Funding

The City receives annual funding from the Federal Government through their gas tax program. Each year, the amount received is transferred to the City's Gas Tax Reserve which Council approves allocations from through the annual capital plan. For 2015 to 2018, Council allocated funding for the David Foster Harbour Pathway implementation, storm drain brick main replacement, LED streetlight replacement, and new bike lanes in priority areas. The unallocated balance is currently \$3.289 million.

The City is required to report annually through the Union of BC Municipalities on which projects have been funded using gas tax and the Gas Tax Agreement outlines which types of projects are eligible. There are a number of capital projects that would qualify for this funding including the Bicycle Master Plan and David Foster Harbour Pathway. Staff are not proposing any allocation

from this reserve at this point since those programs are already funded to align with staff capacity. However, subsequent to the Climate Action workshop, initiatives identified may align with this funding source and staff will report back at that time.

Funding Considerations for Council

Council Commitments

On July 12, 2018, Council approved spending up to \$250,000 to establish a Citizens' Assembly to explore the costs, benefits and disadvantages of the amalgamation between the District of Saanich and the City of Victoria. During the 2018 election this question was asked with the electors voting in favour.

Council has committed funding for the South Island Prosperity Project. The annual funding of \$220,000 has been through surplus for the past three years.

The recommended funding source for these items is surplus.

Supplementary Requests and Additional Grant Request

The draft Financial Plan includes proposed funding to maintain existing services and service levels. Proposed service level changes are brought to Council as supplementary requests and summaries are attached as Appendix A. The annual financial planning process involves making difficult decisions between competing priorities. Council sets service levels and allocates funding to the approximately 200 services and over 200 capital projects the City provides through this process as well as determines the merit of each supplementary request.

A direct award grant organization, the Victoria Civic Heritage Trust is requesting a 2% or \$2,250 increase. This request is attached as Appendix B.

Should Council wish to fund any of these, the recommended funding for ongoing requests is new property tax revenue from new development, and surplus for one-time requests. Alternatively, Council could consider a tax increase as a funding source.

The table below outlines the estimated remaining balances for new property tax revenue from new development and surplus, in addition to the supplemental requests put forth by staff and the additional grant request.

Other Considerations for the 2019 Financial Planning Process

A draft policy on Conflict of Interest Matters have been prepared (Appendix C) which outlines the procedures for Council to seek legal advice related to conflict of interest matters and the terms of reimbursement. If Council chooses to add this new budget, it is recommended that \$10,000 be funded from new property tax from new development.

Capital Budget Adjustment

Council has directed a change in the approach to delivering the Crystal Pool and Wellness Centre Replacement Project, shifting the proposed site from Central Park to the parking lot next to the City's arena. As outlined to Council during those discussions, the Financial Plan is proposed to be updated to shift the funding (\$80,000) from the Central Park Renewal Plan to the planning and design for Laurel Point Park.

Victoria Police

In addition to the above requests, as part of the financial planning process, VicPD put forward requests for additional funding – some ongoing and some one-time. The VicPD 2019 provisional budget presented to Council on November 27, 2018 is attached in Appendix D.

Remaining Funding

As outlined during the 2019 financial planning process, three asset areas require additional funding to maintain current service levels: roads, facilities, and fleet. In addition, the Climate Leadership Plan presented to Committee of the Whole on January 31, 2019, identified several opportunities for facilities, transportation and fleet. Therefore, it is recommended that any remaining funding, once Council has approved funding for any supplementary requests or Strategic Plan actions, be transferred to the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve and the Vehicle and Heavy Equipment Reserve.

Borrowing Authority from Municipal Finance Authority

In the next five years, there are a number of larger aging vehicles that are scheduled for replacement, totalling approximately \$4 million. As identified in the November 2018 report on the draft financial plan, there is a funding gap for fleet. Staff have identified a funding option that would increase capacity to narrow that gap – namely short-term borrowing through the Municipal Finance Authority at a very low interest rate (approximately 2.7%). This would free up reserve funding that could, among other things, enable electrification of the fleet in the nearer-term. This short-term borrowing option requires a Council resolution providing authorization to staff to initiate. The City has used previous iterations of this MFA program in the past, specifically for very large purchases.

Public Consultation Input and Council Motions

During the budget and strategic plan meetings in November and December, Council passed a number of motions requesting additional information. Responses to these are also part of today's agenda, as are the reports summarizing the feedback from public consultation.

It is recommended that Council provide direction to staff to address the public feedback and any actions regarding the information provided in response to the Council motions passed during and after the strategic plan and budget discussions.

Some motions Council passed during budget deliberations provided direction for staff to action and some related to Council advocacy; these will be actioned or tracked. Some will be reported back on as part of future year budget processes; these are listed in Appendix E.

For Council's awareness, staff is intending on hiring 12 permanent FTE's for underground utilities using existing ongoing funding. This would increase the FTE count to 828.03. This is being actioned based on staff's interpretation of the following motion:

"That Council adopts the policy that the FTE count indicated in the Financial Plan for each department / division / business unit is approximate, meaning that the FTE count will not be

interpreted in a restrictive manner to prevent in-house delivery of services, subject to expenditures not exceeding the maximum budgeted amount for the relevant department / division / business unit."

The discussion at Committee was regarding *temporary* hiring of staff, however, the motion does not specify this. Therefore, staff are bringing this to Council's attention to ensure alignment with the intent of Council's motion. Should Council wish that all permanent FTE additions be approved by Council, clarifying direction to that effect would accomplish this.

Victoria Civic Heritage Trust 2019 Expenditure Budget 2019 Capital and Operating Direct-Award Funding Requests

Dear Mayor Helps and Council Members:

As requested by the department of Sustainable Planning and Community Development, the Victoria Civic Heritage Trust (VCHT) respectfully submits our **2019 Expenditure Budget**, approved by our Board of Directors on 15 October 2018. The 2019 Capital request is the same as 2018 based on anticipated demand; the 2019 Operating request is the same as 2018 plus a 2% cost of living increase.

The VCHT had strong demand in 2018 for application requests under the Building Incentive Program (BIP), with some applications submitted in 2018 and a number of others expected in 2019. Projects approved in 2018 were located in the downtown, Rock Bay, Fernwood, Hillside, and Jubilee neighbourhoods. Projects expected in 2019 include significant heritage buildings in and outside of the downtown core. We are excited to continue working with several Chinese Associations on heritage conservation projects in Chinatown.

The VCHT continues to emphasize the seismic upgrading of heritage buildings. The Seismic Parapet Incentive Program introduced in 2015 generates sustained interest and a number of projects are in the works for 2019. This pilot initiative operates through BIP using existing resources and is the first of its kind in Canada.

In 2018 the VCHT participated in conference planning and conducting sessions at the *Understanding Risk Conference: UR + BC in the Built Environment* in Victoria on 16-17 April 2018 hosted by the BC Construction Association, which focused on natural risks to the built environment such as earthquakes, fire, and floods.

Members of our Board participated in the City's Old Town Design Guidelines working group May-December 2018. VCHT staff also reviewed with City staff the Market Rental Revitalization program and proposed Inclusive Housing and Density Bonus policy with respect to heritage conservation projects.

A one-time special project funding award of \$4,000.00 was approved for the preparation of *Heritage Conservation Guidelines for Modern Architecture in Greater Victoria*, which also received funding from the Victoria Heritage Foundation, Oak Bay Heritage Foundation, Saanich Heritage Foundation, and UVic.

The VCHT Board of Directors looks forward to welcoming and working with Councillors Jeremy Loveday and Charlayne Thornton-Joe in 2019-2020, and Councillors Marianne Alto and Sharmarke Dubow in 2021-2022.

PROJECTED APPLICATIONS

In 2018 approved applications include <u>seven</u> Building Incentive Program and <u>three</u> Design Assistance Grant funding awards plus administration of <u>two extensions</u>, <u>one</u> transfer to a different owner, and <u>three</u> BIP site visits and payouts plus <u>one</u> DAG payout. <u>Two</u> PIP-DAG funding awards under the Parapet Incentive Program were approved in 2018; one PIP application was reviewed but declined. The VCHT also reviewed <u>one</u> Tax Incentive Program application and conducted final financial reviews for <u>two</u> TIP buildings. City and VCHT staff met with a number of TIP applicants, with most looking to submit in 2019.

Potential projects for 2019 based on current applications are listed on page two of the attached 2019 Expenditure Budget. This list includes heritage buildings located in various neighbourhoods in the city.

We anticipate very strong demand in 2019. Based on enquiries, VCHT projects the potential for **fifteen to thirty BIP applications** by 31 December 2019, not including seismic parapet program projects. All potential conservation projects are in keeping with the City's strategic goals to create a vibrant and healthy downtown.

2019 CAPITAL REQUEST

We respectfully submit our **2019 Capital** direct-award funding request of **\$420,000.00** for the purposes of Building Incentive Program funds and assisting with the City of Victoria's Heritage Tax Incentive Program. This is the same amount that was requested in 2018 (no increase since 2008). The list of potential applications in 2019 translates to a possible deficit of <u>-\$476,777.14</u> in the BIP fund by 31 December 2019 if all projects are approved, which substantiates the 2019 capital request of \$420,000.00.

2019 OPERATING REQUEST

We respectfully submit our **2019 Operating** direct-award funding request of **\$114,250.00**, which is the amount received in 2018 plus a 2% cost of living adjustment, as per last year. Please note that with the amount requested, the VCHT will continue to operate on a deficit basis as it has for a number of years.

BACKGROUND

The VCHT was established by the City of Victoria in 1989 as a civic vehicle to administer Building Incentive Program funding, and subsequently to assist with the City's Tax Incentive Program, for the conservation and rehabilitation of downtown heritage buildings and to preserve Victoria's community heritage. Modelled on Civic Trusts in Britain that are financially supported by the local municipality, the VCHT is a widely recognized organization that has produced impressive results for the City of Victoria that would not otherwise have been achieved without these programs. To date some of these accomplishments include:

- \$155.50 million in private investment in 153 eligible heritage buildings through
 \$6,245,995 in 287 awards of Building Incentive Program funds through City Capital funding;
- Average factor of \$24.90 private investment for every \$1 in BIP funds awarded;
- 82 Heritage Designations directly related to funding applications, resulting in significantly increased protection of heritage buildings and an improved downtown environment;
- Numerous awards including: Pinnacle Award to the City of Victoria and VCHT by the International Downtown Association for the Tax Incentive Program; Gold CARE Award to the City of Victoria and VCHT by the Canadian Home Builders' Association for the Tax Incentive Program; Prince of Wales Prize to the City of Victoria for its heritage conservation programs; Outstanding Achievement Award from Heritage BC and Communication Award from the Hallmark Society for Test of Time; BCBIA "Best in the West" Award and \$125,000.00 funding from the Canada – BC Infrastructure Works Program for the Downtown Heritage Building Lighting Program; Outstanding Achievement Award and \$300,000 HARP funding from the BC Heritage Trust for the Broad & Yates Street area.

The VCHT is very proud of our strong relationship with the City of Victoria and our long record of distinguished service on behalf of the City and its residents. We look forward to continuing to work with the City of Victoria to further its strategic goals through incentive programs operated by the VCHT which successfully deal with significant community issues on multiple levels using highly cost-effective resources.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, I'd like to thank the City of Victoria for its ongoing financial commitment to Victoria's exceptional heritage programs. It is because of Council's foresight and consistent support that the City of Victoria is widely recognized as a leader in municipal heritage conservation in Canada.

More detailed program information will be available for 2018/2019 following the calendar year end.

A. PURPOSE

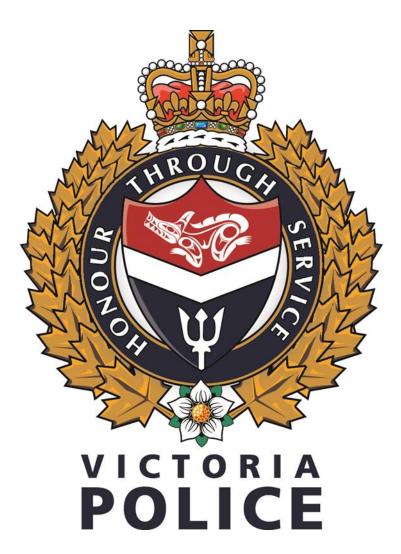
The purpose of this policy is to establish equitable rules for partial reimbursement of legal costs incurred by Council members in obtaining legal advice on questions of potential conflict of interest in relation to matters arising at Council.

B. OBJECTIVES

Recognizing the evolving and complex nature of rules regarding conflict of interest and the importance to the City of ensuring that, whenever possible, all Council members should participate in Council deliberations and decisions, the City shall contribute to the cost of obtaining independent legal advice on conflict issues by members of Council.

C. PROCEDURE

- 1. A Council member who is concerned that a matter before Council may give rise to a conflict of interest shall contact the City Clerk or the City Solicitor to determine whether the City has previously obtained legal advice that applies to the situation.
- 2. If a Council member feels that he or she needs to obtain independent legal advice regarding a potential conflict of interest, the Council member will contact a lawyer of his or her choice and seek the advice.
- 3. The City shall reimburse the Council member for the cost of obtaining independent legal advice up to a maximum of \$500.00 for each instance when conflict advice is sought. The City will treat this payment according to Canada Revenue Agency taxable benefit rules.
- 4. To obtain the reimbursement, the Council member must provide a copy of the legal bill or invoice to the City.
- 5. A Council member receiving reimbursement is under no obligation to disclose the content of the legal opinion to the City.
- 6. There is not limit on the number of times a Council member may seek legal advice during the term of Council.
- 7. This policy applies solely to conflict of interest issues arising at Council and does not apply to potential issues arising in other roles of Council members such as their role at the CRD Board.



2019 POLICE PROVISIONAL BUDGET

BACKGROUND:

The 2019 Provisional Budget was approved by the Police Board September 18th, 2018. In accordance with the provisions of the *Police Act* and Framework Agreement the provisional budget will be presented to the councils for the City of Victoria and Township of Esquimalt. Both councils must approve the budget before final adoption by the Police Board.

Any additional resource requirements, approved by the Police Board, outside of existing core operations have been identified for presentation purposes as separate line items in the 2019 Provisional Budget.

Budget Targets

The City of Victoria's council provides direction that their core budget increase must be no more than inflation plus 1%. The Township of Esquimalt does not provide specific guidance to the Police Board, but follows similar budgetary restrictions. Additionally Esquimalt relies on the amounts receivable for payments in lieu of taxes in making budget decisions. As of September 2018 Consumer Price Inflation (CPI) in Victoria is 2.48% versus the same time last year. Inflation plus 1% would therefore be 3.48%. The Police Board, in determining the provisional budget has given this input due consideration. The impact of the provincially mandated Employers' Health Tax has been treated as a separate item.

Employers' Health Tax

2019 will see the implementation of the 1.95% Employers' Health Tax. This represents a significant cost for most municipalities in the Province. For the purposes of budget presentation this is presented as a separate item in the 2019 provisional budget. These amounts may already be included in costs identified within the City of Victoria's budget for the implementation of the Employers' Health Tax.

2019 Proposed Budget

The 2019 Budget has been developed using the principles of Zero Based Budgeting, an approach to planning and decision-making where every budget request must be approved. Budget items that were approved in the previous fiscal year are not therefore carried forward, and expenditures must be justified in the budget process. The budget for salaries and benefits are based on current staffing levels but for all other operating expenditures managers need to build a budget from the ground up, building a case for their spending as if no baseline existed to start with. Annual work plans are prepared for each unit and submitted to the Chief and Deputies.

Operating Budget:

The Core budget can be defined as the budget that is required to maintain existing operations without any additional staffing resources. This does not necessarily mean operations can be maintained without additional staffing in the medium term, but treats additional resource requests as a separate line item in the budget. Similarly any requests to increase service levels or implement improvements with resource requirements attached are identified separately. Any additional resources approved by the Board to be included in the Provisional Budget are, although identified separately, subsequently considered part of the provisional budget for presentation to councils.

Extraordinary Items:

The Core budget includes expenditures that are either significant, one-time, contractually obligated, or as a result of external legislation or processes. The most significant cost drivers have been disclosed below to demonstrate the impact of these costs on the provisional budget.

Transition to Regional Communications Centre

In 2019 the Communications Centre will transition over to a Regional Communications Centre, under the administration of E-Comm. The transition is expected to occur towards the end of January 2019. The budget has been amended to reflect the fact that Communications Centre staff will be managed through VicPD for the first month of the year, then transition over to a contract for service with E-Comm thereafter.

The transition to a Regional Communications Centre will provide operational efficiencies, greater levels of support and a greater safety net for peak times and seasons. It will also better prepare us for Next Generation 9-1-1 services. Additionally we expect to see some savings on an annual basis through pooling of services. For 2019, however, there will be some one-time transitional costs, including the costs associated with transitioning staff over to the new service model for both VicPD and E-Comm. The budget has been prepared on the basis of VicPD's costs being absorbed in the 2019 Budget, and E-Comm's being spread out over three years.

The five year forecast below is based on current assumptions, recognizing that the final costs may vary slightly between now and the transition date. Additional costs for the implementation of Next-generation-911 are not yet estimated. The financial impact of this significant change will be reduced through pooling of those costs through the Regional Communications Centre.

Significant Cost Drivers for 2019

Extraordinary Expenditures:

1. Employers' Health Tax - \$690,000 (1.28%)

The Employers' Health Tax (EHT) will be implemented in 2019 in addition, for that year to 50% of MSP premiums still being in place. In the longer term, benefits costs will increase with the EHT in comparison to MSP premiums. For 2019 the reassessed impact on the operating budget will be an increase of \$690,000, representing a 1.28% increase in the overall budget. This amount is slightly lower than original estimates, due to the expected reduction of civilian staffing levels at the end of January as the Communications Centre staff transition to E-Comm.

2. Increases to recruitment and equipment costs - \$154,000 (0.29%)

The budget request for these line items will allow us to provide sufficient training in anticipation of the retirements we expect in January 2019. Additionally, due to the demographics of our employees, we expect a significant number of police officer retirements consistently over the next ten years. Historically we have been successful in attracting "exempt" (fully qualified) officers, for a third of our vacant positions. This comes with a higher salary cost, but lower training costs and a significantly faster deployment timeline.

Costs for recruitment in either case are expensive. Based on an assessment by Mercer (Canada) Ltd. we can expect our attrition rate to remain high for the next 10 years. The current operating budget is insufficient to hire, train and equip the number of new officers we will need to maintain our authorized strength. The exact number of retirements may vary from the forecast, but we should be prepared for an average of 10-11 retirements each and every year for the next 10 years.

New recruits incur the following costs to the organization:

- Advertising
- Background checks
- Training
- Equipment
- Uniforms

3. Retirement Obligations - \$300,000 (0.56%)

The 2018 budget for retirement obligations was \$400,000. Historically this budget line item has been as high as \$800,000/annum, but had been reduced in previous budget years. These costs are related to contractually obligated payouts under union collective agreements. In 2018 we expect the actual costs to be closer to \$875,000. An actuarial 10 year forecast of the retirement payout amounts under our collective agreements indicates the average annual payout will be in the \$800-900,000 range. We therefore need to significantly increase our annual budget line item to previous amounts and properly fund expected retirements. As a result the provisional budget for retirement payouts has been increased from \$400,000 to \$700,000. Without these additional funds, reserves would be depleted in the next 8-10 years.

Based on an analysis from Mercer (Canada) Ltd. it is not recommended to draw down on the reserve and that \$800,000, adjusted annually for inflation, would provide sufficient funds to meet our obligations and sufficiently fund the EBO Reserve within a twenty year span. In future years the retirement payout line item will need to be increased again to meet this target. The amounts budgeted for 2019 are sufficient to meet projected current year obligations only.

4. One-time transition costs to Regional Communications Centre - \$55,000 (0.10%)

We expect the Communications Centre to transition over to the Regional Communications Centre at the end of January, 2019. The budget has been prepared based on this timeline. The long term impact will be positive for the Department. In 2019, however there will be some one-time transitional costs that represent a net cost for the Department. This includes costs for E-Comm to transition and implement resources, of which Victoria and Esquimalt's portion will be approximately \$170,000. It also includes an estimate for our expenditures in relation to an adjustment plan that would be required under Section 54 of the Labour Relations Code. To mitigate the financial impact of these costs on the Department, we have requested from E-Comm these costs be spread out over a three year period. The budget has been amended to reflect this.

5. Changes to Bail Hearing Process - \$25,000 (0.05%)

An estimate has been included for increases for salaries and benefits of Records staff for statutory holidays to adequately staff for the changes in the bail hearing process. These

changes will require greater availability of staff on weekends and statutory holidays. In the short term the impact on operations is likely to be minimal. We may, however, need to reassess the impact on operations for the 2020 budget process.

Ordinary (on-going) Expenditures

1. Estimated Pay Increments - \$842,724 (1.56%)

The Collective Agreement with the Victoria City Police Union will expire at the end of 2018. A new contract with CUPE is expected shortly that will run to the end of 2020. The budget has been prepared based on management estimates for pay increments.

There is an overall decrease in salaries and benefits, representing the transition of the Communications Centre staff to the Regional Communications Centre at the end of January 2019. There is also a corresponding increase in the professional services line item, representing the contractual obligations for the Regional Communications Centre from that point on.

2. Capital Funding - \$100,000 (0.19%)

Over the last few years we have deferred significant replacements of IT and Fleet capital pending a review of the capital needs. Our current contribution levels to the capital reserves are insufficient to meet the replacement needs of our existing infrastructure. A review of IT capital has been made by the Manager of IT, prioritizing the needs of the organization and pooling of the fleet will soon be implemented. The increase of \$100,000 represents the amount required to meet our minimum replacement requirements. Future years will require further increases to ensure the capital reserves are adequately funded. The impact on the 2019 budget has been offset by the reduction of the automotive repairs and maintenance budget, after careful consideration of average maintenance costs over the last five years.

A recent review of the Fleet and IT capital requirements indicates that vehicle replacement costs will remain high for the next three years, but will decline in the fourth year as we see the benefits of vehicle pooling and a more efficient use of our fleet. IT costs will remain significant as our storage and processing requirements increase, and an overall increase in capital funding will be required to maintain the sustainability of our capital reserves.

An increase in the capital expenditure budget line to \$1.256 million, increasing annually for inflation, will allow us to sustain a capital reserve fund balance of approximately \$750,000.

3. Increases to Medical/Dental Benefits - \$126,525 (0.23%)

In 2018 we saw an increase of 7% to medical benefit premiums, and 10% to dental premiums. In 2019 we can expect a further 10% increase in dental premiums and yet to be determined increases in medical premiums. This is a result of increases in the costs for insurance providers to provide this coverage and does not represent a significant change to

the benefits plan itself. Increases in medical costs continue to outstrip consumer price inflation and this trend is likely to continue in the short term.

4. Integrated Units - \$138,895 (0.26%)

Most Integrated Unit Budgets reflect adjustments for inflation or personnel movements. The exception is the Greater Victoria Emergency Response Team, where an increase has been deemed necessary to increase the number of monthly training hours from twenty to forty.

Other Items or Adjustments of Note:

In 2018 six officers were reassigned from School Resources, Reserves, Community Services Division and Analysis & Intel to increase the numbers at the front line. The 2019 budget reflects these staff movements. The request for the additional six Patrol officers is under review by the Province. At this time the six additional officers, requested for the 2018 budget, have not been included in the proposed 2019 core budget. The costs, should they be approved, have been disclosed below.

It is difficult to determine with any level of certainty the level of special duties revenues and expenditures in any given year. Traditionally we have budgeted for net amounts. This causes exceptions for financial reporting. For 2019 an estimated has been made for special duties revenues and expenditures based on historical averages in order to reduce the effect this has on financial analysis throughout the year.

Additional Resources

A Business case for each of the additional resources identified in the 2019 Provisional Budget has been prepared.

Mental Health Integration:

In 2017 a pilot project was approved for 2 additional officers for an expansion of Mental Health Integration program. The cost for these officers has been included in both the 2018 and 2019 budget numbers as a separate item for comparative purposes. In 2017 and 2018 the City of Victoria funded the positions from surplus. The Department is working with academia to perform an evaluation of the project with the intent that, if deemed successful, permanent funding for the positions would be requested in the 2020 Budget process. Funds are requested to continue the pilot project in 2019 subject to the results of this evaluation.

Additional Items to Improve Service Levels:

Whereas the Core budget represents the cost to maintain existing staffing levels, additional resource requests represent increases to resources that would either enhance service levels or

maintain service levels in consideration of long term growth within the communities. Although it is the practice of the municipalities to present any increases as 'supplemental requests' the Board, on recommendation from the Chief, has included these amounts in the provisional budget to ensure an adequate and effective level of policing and to generally maintain law and order within the jurisdiction. They have been itemized in the provisional budget for disclosure and presentation purposes.

Information Management Strategy:

In 2017 an Information Management (IM) Strategy was developed with the assistance of an outside consultant. The Department is now implementing this strategy. An additional resource request has been included in the 2019 budget for an analyst position in line with the Information Management Strategy. A business case has been developed in support of this position.

Opperational Support (Service Desk):

2019 will see the first phase of a Service Desk function, building on the existing IT service desk model to expand services to front line officers. This will both improve access to administrative services and reduce the amount of time engaged by officers in administration, freeing up front line resources for policing. The first phase will be funded through savings realized through the pooling of radios, with no additional net cost. A business case has been developed in support of this function. Future expansions of this function will depend on an evaluation of the first phase.

Integrated Team Approach to Records:

A review of the Records Section was performed by CGI Canada in 2018, resulting in recommendations to implement a team based approach for the Records Section. This will result in greater symmetry between front line officers and the Records Section, as well as eliminate some of the time spent by front line officers on administrative work. This initiative will be implemented in early 2019.

1. <u>SALARIES AND BENEFITS:</u>

Police

Budgets are prepared based on authorized strength and the staff allocated to each unit or division at the time the budget is prepared. Movements of personnel occur throughout the year to meet operational requirements, causing variations from year to year between units. The current collective agreement expires December 31, 2018. Budgets were estimated based on projected outcomes.

CUPE:

The collective agreement with CUPE expired December 31, 2016 and a tentative agreement has been reached, extending to December 31, 2020. Budgets were estimated based on the tentative settlement.

Exempt:

The Police Board's Terms of Employment govern compensation for exempt staff. Budgets were prepared based on estimates.

Benefits:

Benefits include CPP, EI, Pension, Extended Health, Dental, Group Life Insurance and WCB premiums. The benefits as a percentage of salaries, has been increased to 25%. The Employers' Health Tax of 1.95% is shown as a separate line item.

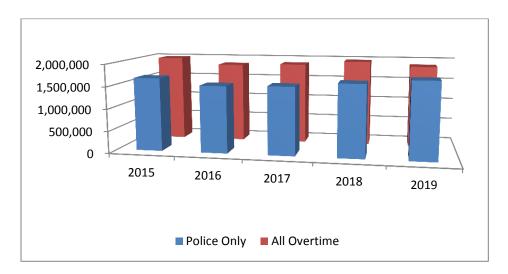
2. <u>OVERTIME:</u>

The increase in overtime is a result of the changes to the presentation of the Special Duties budget for revenues and expenditures. Once adjusted for this change in presentation, total overtime budget has decreased by approximately \$94,500. The most significant changes in overtime are:

- Communications Centre reduction of \$224,600 (Regional Comm. Centre)
- Records Section increase of \$25,000 for changes to bail hearing processes
- VIIMCU increase of \$50,000 to ensure adequate resourcing of major case files

The remainder of the increase is related to ordinary increases for Patrol and other operational divisions.

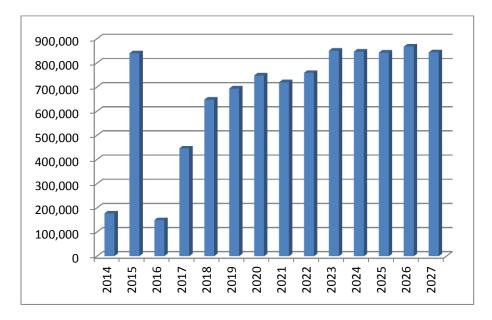
5 Year Analysis of Overtime Budget

3. RETIREMENT OBLIGATIONS

Retirement obligations are tied to the collective agreements, the majority relating to obligations under the police union collective agreement. In 2019 we will have a significant amount of police officers eligible for retirement and, based on the Mercer (Canada)Ltd. report, we can expect high retirement payouts for the next few years.



4. CAPITAL PROJECTS

An analysis has been performed on the capital requests for 2019. IT requests have been prioritized based on criticality to the organization, and a 10 year fleet replacement program has been updated. The fleet replacement program will likely be refined once we start to collect and analyze data from the key tracer system, which is being implemented shortly.

Significant capital projects for 2019 include:

- Vehicles replacements of \$854,250 are based on an assessment of the kilometers, intended purpose, pooling options and general condition assessment. For 2019 this includes the replacement of;
 - 9 Patrol vehicles
 - 2 Motorcycles
 - 6 vehicles dedicated to specialty units
- Renovations to re-purpose the Communications Centre. These costs are limited to the costs for furniture, equipment and some cost sharing of the wall installations. The remainder of the costs for this project will be borne by the City of Victoria, if approved as part of their capital budgets process
- IT capital submissions include:
 - \$887,000 for critical issues
 - \$298,000 for issues that will become critical if not addressed
 - \$340,000 for issues that are important but not critical

The capital reserves balance at the end of 2018 is forecasted to be approximately \$1.644 million. The increase of annual contributions would allow us to maintain an average balance of \$750,000 over the long term. Without an increase to capital contributions of \$200,000, with annual increases to keep in line with inflation, the capital reserve will not be sustainable.

RE: Councils Non-Approval of the 2019 Victoria Police Department (VicPD) Budget

On December 13, 2018 Council passed a series of motions with respect to the 2019 VicPD provisional budget. These motions included:

- That Council does not approve all the items in the 2019 Police budget.
- That Council refers the budget back to the Police Board, requesting that a revised budget be submitted for Council's consideration, with the total requested increase accounting for all items in the budget not to exceed the rate of inflation plus 1% tax increase related to the police budget.

We understand that the discussion on the second motion suggests that Council wished to include the new Employers Health Tax within in the "accounting for all items" portion of the motion.

As a result of the recent Victoria and Esquimalt Police Board meeting, the Board would like to highlight a number of points in our response to your request to review the budget. As background, the Victoria and Esquimalt Police Board is responsible under the *Police Act*, and respecting the Framework Agreement, to determine the police resources needed to provide adequate and effective policing for the City of Victoria and the Township of Esquimalt. The Board takes this responsibility very seriously and has exercised a high degree of oversight in the preparation of the 2019 police budget. To summarize, the Police Board's steps included the following:

- April May 2018: Received input from both City and Esquimalt CAOs/CFOs
- April June 2018: VicPD Management prepared budget
- July September 2018: Board Finance Committee reviewed, revised, and recommended a budget to the Board
- September 2018: Board approved the provisional budget and provided it to both City and Esquimalt CAOs/CFOs
- November 2018: Joint Police Board/Council meeting to discuss the provisional budget
- November 2018 January 2019: Budget presentations to City and Esquimalt Council

Through this process, the Board approved VicPD's 2019 budget request which included increases to resource levels that are necessary to provide adequate and effective policing service to the communities within its service area.

It is important to note that Councils' motions would result in a reduction of \$1.67 million from VicPD's anticipated budget for 2019, and a reduction in the proposed core budget of \$1.12 million. A reduction of this magnitude would translate into a staffing reduction of up to nine unionized officers and civilian employees and would result in service reductions for our citizens that in our opinion would significantly jeopardize public safety.

The Victoria and Esquimalt Police Board views these proposed reductions as unacceptable and not in the best interests of the communities that VicPD serves. Reducing policing services in two communities that are experiencing significant growth would have negative consequences for both our citizens and VicPD employees and does nothing to help address the various complexities associated with delivering police services in 2019.

While the population of both Victoria and Esquimalt continues to grow, VicPD has not experienced a permanent increase in police officers in over eight years. Meanwhile, our jurisdiction within Victoria continues to be the entertainment, government, business, traffic, and event hub for the entire region. VicPD has taken a conservative approach to requests for additional police officer positions for several years in an effort to respect the wishes of previous Councils to control overall municipal costs. We are now in a position that we must begin adding additional police positions in order to meet demands and to compensate for the lack of growth in previous years. We note that over the past few years, VicPD's budget, as a percentage of the City of Victoria's total operating budget, is in fact on the decline and that rarely has Council allocated any new growth revenue toward policing, preferring instead to allocate police budget increases to taxation.

Beyond the impact on police service delivery, the Police Board is very concerned about the effect these reductions would have on VicPD's officers and staff as they have reported that workload is the single greatest source of stress. All staff, particularly the officers, are already operating at capacity as they try to maintain the level of community policing, visible presence, and call response that our citizens expect. Operational stress injuries are on the rise which impacts the number of deployable officers that we require. The addition of resources is essential to help maintain the health and safety of our remaining officers.

VicPD takes pride in being a proactive, prevention focused and progressive police service. If the financial and staffing needs of the police department are not met, VicPD's focus will shift to the most basic and fundamental service functions at the expense of innovative and preventative approaches. We do not believe this is the direction we should go as a community or as a police service.

We recognize that Victoria and Esquimalt bear the costs of policing the region's downtown core area and that the cost of policing is higher than average as a result. However, the Police Board must concern ourselves with how we can ensure adequate policing in the communities of Victoria and Esquimalt until a more efficient approach is identified. While we work on the balance of cost and policing needs, we encourage local communities and the provincial government to discuss options for a more equitable distribution of valuable policing resources across the region.

It is the opinion of the Board that VicPD's 2019 budget request is what is required to police this jurisdiction. As a result, we are advising Council that our 2019 budget recommendation remains as originally submitted.



2019 POLICE PROVISIONAL BUDGET

BACKGROUND:

The 2019 Provisional Budget was approved by the Police Board September 18th, 2018. In accordance with the provisions of the *Police Act* and Framework Agreement the provisional budget will be presented to the councils for the City of Victoria and Township of Esquimalt. Both councils must approve the budget before final adoption by the Police Board.

Any additional resource requirements, approved by the Police Board, outside of existing core operations have been identified for presentation purposes as separate line items in the 2019 Provisional Budget.

Budget Targets

The City of Victoria's council provides direction that their core budget increase must be no more than inflation plus 1%. The Township of Esquimalt does not provide specific guidance to the Police Board, but follows similar budgetary restrictions. Additionally Esquimalt relies on the amounts receivable for payments in lieu of taxes in making budget decisions. As of September 2018 Consumer Price Inflation (CPI) in Victoria is 2.48% versus the same time last year. Inflation plus 1% would therefore be 3.48%. The Police Board, in determining the provisional budget has given this input due consideration. The impact of the provincially mandated Employers' Health Tax has been treated as a separate item.

Employers' Health Tax

2019 will see the implementation of the 1.95% Employers' Health Tax. This represents a significant cost for most municipalities in the Province. For the purposes of budget presentation this is presented as a separate item in the 2019 provisional budget. These amounts may already be included in costs identified within the City of Victoria's budget for the implementation of the Employers' Health Tax.

2019 Proposed Budget

The 2019 Budget has been developed using the principles of Zero Based Budgeting, an approach to planning and decision-making where every budget request must be approved. Budget items that were approved in the previous fiscal year are not therefore carried forward, and expenditures must be justified in the budget process. The budget for salaries and benefits are based on current staffing levels but for all other operating expenditures managers need to build a budget from the ground up, building a case for their spending as if no baseline existed to start with. Annual work plans are prepared for each unit and submitted to the Chief and Deputies.

Operating Budget:

The Core budget can be defined as the budget that is required to maintain existing operations without any additional staffing resources. This does not necessarily mean operations can be maintained without additional staffing in the medium term, but treats additional resource requests as a separate line item in the budget. Similarly any requests to increase service levels or implement improvements with resource requirements attached are identified separately. Any additional resources approved by the Board to be included in the Provisional Budget are, although identified separately, subsequently considered part of the provisional budget for presentation to councils.

Extraordinary Items:

The Core budget includes expenditures that are either significant, one-time, contractually obligated, or as a result of external legislation or processes. The most significant cost drivers have been disclosed below to demonstrate the impact of these costs on the provisional budget.

Transition to Regional Communications Centre

In 2019 the Communications Centre will transition over to a Regional Communications Centre, under the administration of E-Comm. The transition is expected to occur towards the end of January 2019. The budget has been amended to reflect the fact that Communications Centre staff will be managed through VicPD for the first month of the year, then transition over to a contract for service with E-Comm thereafter.

The transition to a Regional Communications Centre will provide operational efficiencies, greater levels of support and a greater safety net for peak times and seasons. It will also better prepare us for Next Generation 9-1-1 services. Additionally we expect to see some savings on an annual basis through pooling of services. For 2019, however, there will be some one-time transitional costs, including the costs associated with transitioning staff over to the new service model for both VicPD and E-Comm. The budget has been prepared on the basis of VicPD's costs being absorbed in the 2019 Budget, and E-Comm's being spread out over three years.

The five year forecast below is based on current assumptions, recognizing that the final costs may vary slightly between now and the transition date. Additional costs for the implementation of Next-generation-911 are not yet estimated. The financial impact of this significant change will be reduced through pooling of those costs through the Regional Communications Centre.

Significant Cost Drivers for 2019

Extraordinary Expenditures:

1. Employers' Health Tax - \$690,000 (1.28%)

The Employers' Health Tax (EHT) will be implemented in 2019 in addition, for that year to 50% of MSP premiums still being in place. In the longer term, benefits costs will increase with the EHT in comparison to MSP premiums. For 2019 the reassessed impact on the operating budget will be an increase of \$690,000, representing a 1.28% increase in the overall budget. This amount is slightly lower than original estimates, due to the expected reduction of civilian staffing levels at the end of January as the Communications Centre staff transition to E-Comm.

2. Increases to recruitment and equipment costs - \$154,000 (0.29%)

The budget request for these line items will allow us to provide sufficient training in anticipation of the retirements we expect in January 2019. Additionally, due to the demographics of our employees, we expect a significant number of police officer retirements consistently over the next ten years. Historically we have been successful in attracting "exempt" (fully qualified) officers, for a third of our vacant positions. This comes with a higher salary cost, but lower training costs and a significantly faster deployment timeline.

Costs for recruitment in either case are expensive. Based on an assessment by Mercer (Canada) Ltd. we can expect our attrition rate to remain high for the next 10 years. The current operating budget is insufficient to hire, train and equip the number of new officers we will need to maintain our authorized strength. The exact number of retirements may vary from the forecast, but we should be prepared for an average of 10-11 retirements each and every year for the next 10 years.

New recruits incur the following costs to the organization:

- Advertising
- Background checks
- Training
- Equipment
- Uniforms

3. Retirement Obligations - \$300,000 (0.56%)

The 2018 budget for retirement obligations was \$400,000. Historically this budget line item has been as high as \$800,000/annum, but had been reduced in previous budget years. These costs are related to contractually obligated payouts under union collective agreements. In 2018 we expect the actual costs to be closer to \$875,000. An actuarial 10 year forecast of the retirement payout amounts under our collective agreements indicates the average annual payout will be in the \$800-900,000 range. We therefore need to significantly increase our annual budget line item to previous amounts and properly fund expected retirements. As a result the provisional budget for retirement payouts has been increased from \$400,000 to \$700,000. Without these additional funds, reserves would be depleted in the next 8-10 years.

Based on an analysis from Mercer (Canada) Ltd. it is not recommended to draw down on the reserve and that \$800,000, adjusted annually for inflation, would provide sufficient funds to meet our obligations and sufficiently fund the EBO Reserve within a twenty year span. In future years the retirement payout line item will need to be increased again to meet this target. The amounts budgeted for 2019 are sufficient to meet projected current year obligations only.

4. One-time transition costs to Regional Communications Centre - \$55,000 (0.10%)

We expect the Communications Centre to transition over to the Regional Communications Centre at the end of January, 2019. The budget has been prepared based on this timeline. The long term impact will be positive for the Department. In 2019, however there will be some one-time transitional costs that represent a net cost for the Department. This includes costs for E-Comm to transition and implement resources, of which Victoria and Esquimalt's portion will be approximately \$170,000. It also includes an estimate for our expenditures in relation to an adjustment plan that would be required under Section 54 of the Labour Relations Code. To mitigate the financial impact of these costs on the Department, we have requested from E-Comm these costs be spread out over a three year period. The budget has been amended to reflect this.

5. Changes to Bail Hearing Process - \$25,000 (0.05%)

An estimate has been included for increases for salaries and benefits of Records staff for statutory holidays to adequately staff for the changes in the bail hearing process. These

changes will require greater availability of staff on weekends and statutory holidays. In the short term the impact on operations is likely to be minimal. We may, however, need to reassess the impact on operations for the 2020 budget process.

Ordinary (on-going) Expenditures

1. Estimated Pay Increments - \$842,724 (1.56%)

The Collective Agreement with the Victoria City Police Union will expire at the end of 2018. A new contract with CUPE is expected shortly that will run to the end of 2020. The budget has been prepared based on management estimates for pay increments.

There is an overall decrease in salaries and benefits, representing the transition of the Communications Centre staff to the Regional Communications Centre at the end of January 2019. There is also a corresponding increase in the professional services line item, representing the contractual obligations for the Regional Communications Centre from that point on.

2. Capital Funding - \$100,000 (0.19%)

Over the last few years we have deferred significant replacements of IT and Fleet capital pending a review of the capital needs. Our current contribution levels to the capital reserves are insufficient to meet the replacement needs of our existing infrastructure. A review of IT capital has been made by the Manager of IT, prioritizing the needs of the organization and pooling of the fleet will soon be implemented. The increase of \$100,000 represents the amount required to meet our minimum replacement requirements. Future years will require further increases to ensure the capital reserves are adequately funded. The impact on the 2019 budget has been offset by the reduction of the automotive repairs and maintenance budget, after careful consideration of average maintenance costs over the last five years.

A recent review of the Fleet and IT capital requirements indicates that vehicle replacement costs will remain high for the next three years, but will decline in the fourth year as we see the benefits of vehicle pooling and a more efficient use of our fleet. IT costs will remain significant as our storage and processing requirements increase, and an overall increase in capital funding will be required to maintain the sustainability of our capital reserves.

An increase in the capital expenditure budget line to \$1.256 million, increasing annually for inflation, will allow us to sustain a capital reserve fund balance of approximately \$750,000.

3. Increases to Medical/Dental Benefits - \$126,525 (0.23%)

In 2018 we saw an increase of 7% to medical benefit premiums, and 10% to dental premiums. In 2019 we can expect a further 10% increase in dental premiums and yet to be determined increases in medical premiums. This is a result of increases in the costs for insurance providers to provide this coverage and does not represent a significant change to

the benefits plan itself. Increases in medical costs continue to outstrip consumer price inflation and this trend is likely to continue in the short term.

4. Integrated Units - \$138,895 (0.26%)

Most Integrated Unit Budgets reflect adjustments for inflation or personnel movements. The exception is the Greater Victoria Emergency Response Team, where an increase has been deemed necessary to increase the number of monthly training hours from twenty to forty.

Other Items or Adjustments of Note:

In 2018 six officers were reassigned from School Resources, Reserves, Community Services Division and Analysis & Intel to increase the numbers at the front line. The 2019 budget reflects these staff movements. The request for the additional six Patrol officers is under review by the Province. At this time the six additional officers, requested for the 2018 budget, have not been included in the proposed 2019 core budget. The costs, should they be approved, have been disclosed below.

It is difficult to determine with any level of certainty the level of special duties revenues and expenditures in any given year. Traditionally we have budgeted for net amounts. This causes exceptions for financial reporting. For 2019 an estimated has been made for special duties revenues and expenditures based on historical averages in order to reduce the effect this has on financial analysis throughout the year.

Additional Resources

A Business case for each of the additional resources identified in the 2019 Provisional Budget has been prepared.

Mental Health Integration:

In 2017 a pilot project was approved for 2 additional officers for an expansion of Mental Health Integration program. The cost for these officers has been included in both the 2018 and 2019 budget numbers as a separate item for comparative purposes. In 2017 and 2018 the City of Victoria funded the positions from surplus. The Department is working with academia to perform an evaluation of the project with the intent that, if deemed successful, permanent funding for the positions would be requested in the 2020 Budget process. Funds are requested to continue the pilot project in 2019 subject to the results of this evaluation.

Additional Items to Improve Service Levels:

Whereas the Core budget represents the cost to maintain existing staffing levels, additional resource requests represent increases to resources that would either enhance service levels or

maintain service levels in consideration of long term growth within the communities. Although it is the practice of the municipalities to present any increases as 'supplemental requests' the Board, on recommendation from the Chief, has included these amounts in the provisional budget to ensure an adequate and effective level of policing and to generally maintain law and order within the jurisdiction. They have been itemized in the provisional budget for disclosure and presentation purposes.

Information Management Strategy:

In 2017 an Information Management (IM) Strategy was developed with the assistance of an outside consultant. The Department is now implementing this strategy. An additional resource request has been included in the 2019 budget for an analyst position in line with the Information Management Strategy. A business case has been developed in support of this position.

Opperational Support (Service Desk):

2019 will see the first phase of a Service Desk function, building on the existing IT service desk model to expand services to front line officers. This will both improve access to administrative services and reduce the amount of time engaged by officers in administration, freeing up front line resources for policing. The first phase will be funded through savings realized through the pooling of radios, with no additional net cost. A business case has been developed in support of this function. Future expansions of this function will depend on an evaluation of the first phase.

Integrated Team Approach to Records:

A review of the Records Section was performed by CGI Canada in 2018, resulting in recommendations to implement a team based approach for the Records Section. This will result in greater symmetry between front line officers and the Records Section, as well as eliminate some of the time spent by front line officers on administrative work. This initiative will be implemented in early 2019.

1. <u>SALARIES AND BENEFITS:</u>

Police

Budgets are prepared based on authorized strength and the staff allocated to each unit or division at the time the budget is prepared. Movements of personnel occur throughout the year to meet operational requirements, causing variations from year to year between units. The current collective agreement expires December 31, 2018. Budgets were estimated based on projected outcomes.

CUPE:

The collective agreement with CUPE expired December 31, 2016 and a tentative agreement has been reached, extending to December 31, 2020. Budgets were estimated based on the tentative settlement.

Exempt:

The Police Board's Terms of Employment govern compensation for exempt staff. Budgets were prepared based on estimates.

Benefits:

Benefits include CPP, EI, Pension, Extended Health, Dental, Group Life Insurance and WCB premiums. The benefits as a percentage of salaries, has been increased to 25%. The Employers' Health Tax of 1.95% is shown as a separate line item.

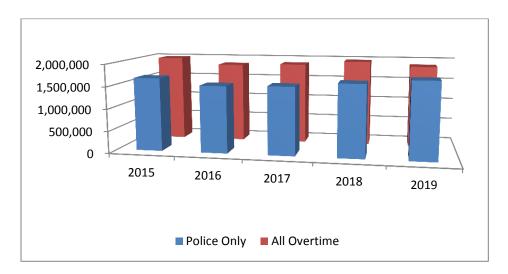
2. <u>OVERTIME:</u>

The increase in overtime is a result of the changes to the presentation of the Special Duties budget for revenues and expenditures. Once adjusted for this change in presentation, total overtime budget has decreased by approximately \$94,500. The most significant changes in overtime are:

- Communications Centre reduction of \$224,600 (Regional Comm. Centre)
- Records Section increase of \$25,000 for changes to bail hearing processes
- VIIMCU increase of \$50,000 to ensure adequate resourcing of major case files

The remainder of the increase is related to ordinary increases for Patrol and other operational divisions.

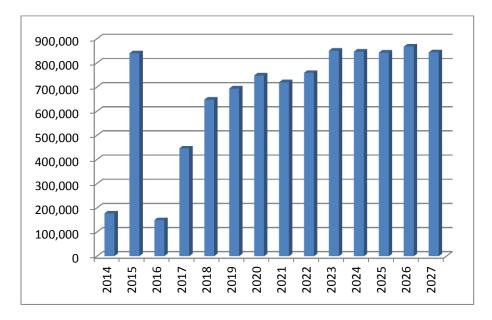

3. RETIREMENT OBLIGATIONS

Retirement obligations are tied to the collective agreements, the majority relating to obligations under the police union collective agreement. In 2019 we will have a significant amount of police officers eligible for retirement and, based on the Mercer (Canada)Ltd. report, we can expect high retirement payouts for the next few years.



4. CAPITAL PROJECTS

An analysis has been performed on the capital requests for 2019. IT requests have been prioritized based on criticality to the organization, and a 10 year fleet replacement program has been updated. The fleet replacement program will likely be refined once we start to collect and analyze data from the key tracer system, which is being implemented shortly.

Significant capital projects for 2019 include:

- Vehicles replacements of \$854,250 are based on an assessment of the kilometers, intended purpose, pooling options and general condition assessment. For 2019 this includes the replacement of;
 - 9 Patrol vehicles
 - 2 Motorcycles
 - 6 vehicles dedicated to specialty units
- Renovations to re-purpose the Communications Centre. These costs are limited to the costs for furniture, equipment and some cost sharing of the wall installations. The remainder of the costs for this project will be borne by the City of Victoria, if approved as part of their capital budgets process
- IT capital submissions include:
 - \$887,000 for critical issues
 - \$298,000 for issues that will become critical if not addressed
 - \$340,000 for issues that are important but not critical

The capital reserves balance at the end of 2018 is forecasted to be approximately \$1.644 million. The increase of annual contributions would allow us to maintain an average balance of \$750,000 over the long term. Without an increase to capital contributions of \$200,000, with annual increases to keep in line with inflation, the capital reserve will not be sustainable.

Subject: Summary of Public Input on Draft 2019 Financial Plan

RECOMMENDATION

That Council receive the report for information.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since 2014, a new public engagement strategy has been developed and implemented to increase public understanding and input on the financial planning and strategic planning processes. Efforts have focused on improving the presentation of financial information, increasing notice of public participation opportunities, an improved online survey, and new tools for the public to engage in the decision-making process.

The City began public consultation on the draft 2018 Financial Plan on December 17, 2018. Citizens were invited to provide input on the proposed budget through a variety of ways: including by completing an online survey, submitting correspondence, and through the Town Hall held on January 16.

The budgeting process continues to evolve and improve each year. Feedback on budget materials and the budget survey will inform next year's process.

PURPOSE

To provide Council with feedback and correspondence received during the 2019 Financial Plan public consultation period.

BACKGROUND

Projected budget impacts were communicated holistically, including impacts from utility increases in addition to municipal property tax increases and five-year forecasts for both residential and business properties. Information items developed for the public were provided online at <u>www.victoria.ca/budget</u>, including a video to explain the nature and purpose of a City budget, the full Draft Financial Plan, the "Budget Summary" piece, a four page "Budget at a Glance", Town Hall details, and the online survey.

Consultation was promoted widely through social media, home-page placement on the City's website, print advertising, digital display boards at City Hall and the Save-on-Foods Memorial Centre, e-newsletter, stakeholder emails, posters and handbills. A focus on increasing youth and renter feedback continued, including working once again with the City of Victoria Youth Council, and creating renter-specific messaging to encourage participation.

Online Survey

A total of 1,483 citizens responded to the online budget survey. The survey asked questions regarding priorities for strategic objectives, overall value for tax dollars, spending priorities for new revenue and prior year's surplus funds. It allowed participants the option to dive deeper into specific areas related to the operating budget, capital budget categories and supplementary budget requests for the City and VicPD.

It should be noted that the online budget survey is not a random, representative survey of Victoria residents, but rather only represents the views of those who became aware of the survey and decided to opt in.

Comments provided in the survey are enclosed as provided and their reproduction does not indicate any endorsement of them; they do not reflect the views of the City, its elected officials or employees. Some comments have been redacted to remove personal information, hate speech, or potential libel.

Budget Town Hall

For the fifth consecutive year, the City hosted a budget Town Hall with an e-Town Hall component. The meeting was interactive and webcast live. Participants were able to attend and provide feedback in person at City Hall, or from the comfort of their own homes. Citizens were invited to submit questions and feedback in a variety of ways:

- in person
- through Twitter using the hashtag #victownhall
- using the website form
- · by phone during the meeting

The meeting was well attended in person and had 56 online submissions. Comments and questions covered a wide variety of topics.

Correspondence

Formal correspondence was welcomed as part of the budget feedback process. Several pieces of correspondence were received from groups and individuals.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

What We Heard

1,483 people participated in the online survey over four weeks. Of those:

- 82.5% of respondents said they live in the City of Victoria, with the highest neighbourhood representation from Fairfield Gonzales and James Bay
- 52% indicated they own property in Victoria while 38% responded they rent in Victoria
- 21% of total respondents indicated they owned or operated a business in Victoria

In general, survey respondents noted that spending in operating categories was "just right", with the exception of VicPD, where more respondents noted that spending was "too low" with many comments noting the desire to see school liaison officers reinstated.

Regarding capital budget categories, survey respondents noted that spending in capital categories was "just right", with the exception of Active Transportation, where respondents felt spending was "too high."

The majority of survey respondents (51.2%) stated they agreed with the proposed tax increase for City operations, with 33.7% saying they feel the increase should be reduced.

49.6% of respondents noted that they were moderately or very satisfied with programs and services received from the City for tax dollars.

When asked how Council should fund the Employer Health Tax, 62.6% responded with "use new tax revenue from new developments."

When asked how the City should allocate 2018 surplus, the majority of respondents (50.3%) answered "combination of invest in new initiatives and save for future infrastructure investment" and 40.8% answered "save for future infrastructure investment."

When asked how the City should allocate new assessed revenue the majority (52.4%) responded with "save for future infrastructure investment."

Strategic Objectives

Survey respondents were asked how they would distribute \$100 among the proposed strategic objectives. The top three objectives where respondents noted they would allocate funds were:

- Affordable Housing
- Strong, Livable Neighbourhoods
- Good Governance

When asked to rank the strategic objectives from most to least important, the top three objectives were:

- Affordable Housing
- Good Governance
- Sustainable Transportation

OPTIONS & IMPACTS

Impacts to Financial Plan The public input should inform the 2019 financial plan.

CONCLUSIONS

The budgeting process continues to evolve and improve each year. Feedback from this year will inform next year's budget process.

- Bike lanes Pandora will it be moved to the other side of the road? Douglas Street bikes in Bus lane - cars can't be in bike lanes unless it is clear - why are bikes allowed to slow buses down when the bus lane was specifically created to speed bus transportation up!
- Will the budget contain funding for an Urban Forest Coordinator, with adequate resources, to implement the Urban Forest Master Plan, approved in 2013?
- Police on Pandora st is essential , please keep them at 941 and on the block .They do great work an keep it under control ,without them it would be a disaster on Pandora St, thank you

- I truly wonder how sincere this administration is when it comes to affordability? When 50% of the budget is salaries and benefits one might have thought the looking into amalgamation would a priority. One line item in the strategic plan is far from a priority. It is the only way we will ever address staffing and the associated cost. Why is there not more urgency
- I support the City's proposed budget and hope Council will support Urban food and ecosystems by: supporting increased funding for community garden volunteer coordinator grants in all neighbourhoods, by removing property taxes and supporting urban farms and by providing \$6,000 for the Urban Food Table to continue and expand their efforts to promote urban food production and education.
- The City strategic plan that supports urban food systems. Please support the food in development guidelines and explore how parks operations can support urban food systems/ecosystems. I would like to see the City expand the scope and increase the funding for the Community Garden Coordinator Grants, remove the mill rate on urban farms and provide \$6,000 of annual funding to the Urban Food Table.
- Why, when statistics demonstrate that crime rates and crime severity have been on a downward trend for years, has the VicPD received funding increases every year well over the rate of inflation, and given this why are they asking for a further 6% increase this year?
- Urban gardeners are a large part of the city's population. They garden for many reasons: land stewardship, growing food for their families, concern for insect populations, etc. In order to encourage this, could council look at how city sewer and water taxes are decided? Those of us with microdrip watering systems are not pouring water down the drains, so why are we being charged as if we were?
- Why does the Draft Financial Plan repeatedly mention policing and bylaw as a response to homelessness, when housing not law enforcement is what is needed to address homelessness?
- The Draft Financial Plan identifies these priorities: land use planning, supporting businesses, affordable housing, active transportation, climate change, and emergency preparedness. However the proposed budget doesn't align with these priorities, allocating 24% of the operating budget to policing and 0.15% to housing. Can you clarify how the City's budget aligns with political priorities?
- We need a larger budget to enable more parks Downtown, and also for planting more trees. Herald Street is an example where trees are needed and there are currently none between Douglas & Government.
- STVR enforcement needs a larger budget a 2% increase over 2018 is not enough as this is a major problem.
- I am opposed to any reduction in the budget amount that VPD has requested. Property & violent crime is up. My neighbourhood is becoming less safe. VPD plays an important role in dealing with with the most marginalized & individuals with mental health/addiction issues
- We hear people say that the high cost of housing is our biggest personal expense. In general that is not true, taxes are the largest personal expense. How does continuing to spend more and more money on pet projects, therefore increasing taxes and leading to increases in rents, help affordability?

- As a citizen who would like to cycle around town to go to work and shop, I would like an
 education program for cyclists. I am terrified cycling in Victoria because many cyclists go
 so fast and yell at people to get out of the way, some speed by at 50 or more km/hr on
 motorized bikes. As such, it's been a year and a half since I took my bike out and I walk
 instead.:(
- Hello friends In City Hall! Are you going to be committing budget money to fulfill the Create Victoria Cultural Masterplan? I really hope so! You are doing great cultural things in this city. I hope you continue on this path by fulfilling the Create Victoria Cultural Masterplan. Thank you!
- How much in parking fine revenue last year that had to be written off, foregone because of the inability to collect ?
- I am a volunteer with the Greater Victoria Green Team and live in Victoria. I am not sure why the City of Victoria does not support GVGT activities in Victoria, like many other municipalities do. I would love to see the City support the GVGT who are doing so much to take care of local habitat through volunteer engagement. Are there plans for Victoria to connect with the GVGT soon?
- Langford St directly east of Vic West School does not have a reduced speed limit; one could drive 50 km/h, while the parallel street, Craigflower/Skinner, has a 30 km/h limit. Can Council direct engineering to implement a 30 km/h limit leading up to the school and implement traffic calming measures on Langford St between Tyee Rd and Russell/Front?
- As a social worker with the ACT teams I would like to express my support for the
 ongoing collaboration w/ VicPD. Police support is helpful for both client's in crisis/risky
 situations- as well as for staff who put themselves at risk to support some of the most
 marginalized and vulnerable folks in our community. PO offer clients compassion, dignity
 & resp and do the opposite of criminalize them.
- we support the idea of Mayor and Council being full time positions and support at a minimum living wage!
- our youth run a food kart to learn employment skills. It would be awesome to be able to park on a city street with a small fee for the city of course! And of course with a non-profit rate! #yyj
- Speeding traffic is a problem in my neighbourhood of Hillside-Quadra and my family supports lowering the speed limit on residential streets to 30km/hr. When can the Hillside-Quadra start neighbourhood-led traffic calming process?
- UDI's members build the majority of housing & commercial/office/retail space in the city. If the city wants a variety of residents, including families, to live downtown - for our businesses and retail to thrive - our streets must be safe. UDI supports/encourages an increased budget to add more police and social workers to ensure that our streets are safe for people to work, live & visit Victoria
- The E&N trail is a great asset and I anticipate the improvements east of Esquimalt Rd planned for 2019. However, the most western E&N access point in Victoria at Hereward Green is poor for those on bikes; one needs to climb the sidewalk at a driveway, navigate around a large bush and climb a gravel/mud path. Do the Parks Department and the Engineering Department have plans to improve this access?
- youth for a variety for reason need safe and affordable housing. We would like to see money in the budget for this!

- we are wondering about free transit for youth. Any chance that will happen we are in full support of this!!!
- I want to highlight to council the excellent work done by the collaborative HART (housing access response) team carried out by BC housing, Vic pd, island health and msdsi. The work of this team has been very successful at the challenging work of finding appropriate housing for many our cities homeless. Is the Vic of involvement in this initiative at risk with the new proposed budget?
- I would like to support the initiative for the Douglas to Dallas intersection alignment. Having worked with residents of James Bay on the Live on Douglas initiative I appreciate the value of integrating better pedestrian spaces and access to the Park, which includes improving the connection to Downtown and to the waterfront.
- I ask the mayor and this council to please grant the request of Vic PD for increased funding. In doing so, I ask this council to demonstrate true leadership in supporting the model of community policing which is so well demonstrated by the officers of this force. In particular, I ask the new councillors to turn away from adversarial methods of political leadership and towards collaboration.
- I would like to know how much money the VicPD spent in their efforts to organize this lobbying effort (e.g., staff time organizing speakers, funding from the police union for online ads etc.)
- If, as Mayor Helps states, "housing is not a municipal responsibility" why is it a City of Victoria strategic priority? Does this mean the city's approach will be lip service? Is that why housing action manifests as 0.15% of the 2019 proposed budget? #VicTownHall
- How much has the budget for bus shelters been increased in this budget?
- At a pre election forum about homelessness hosted by Our Place, Mayor Helps, referenced an initiative called Mayors for Modular Housing. BC housing has dedicated funds for the CRD to build modular housing to address the homelessness crisis and lack of low barrier housing for some of our most vulnerable citizens. Where is the Council at in regards to identifying a location for this housing?
- I still stand by my beliefs of not freezing police budget. Thank you to the person believing in police on ACT teams.
- Can we get any guarantees regarding the waste treatment project and a maximum amount it will go over budget? The blue bridge and bike lanes cost overruns make many taxpayers nervous.
- Victorians with inadequate pensions (self-employed or 35 yrs of service for a corporation that goes bust: Nortel, Sears...) must buy property for income in old age: a VITAL aspect of retirement planning requiring a significant amnt to even approach a City pension to last 25+yrs. Housing providers are not medieval landlords & need your help. Simplistic solutions threaten all-let's partner in this.
- Why is funding for the Affordable Housing Reserve not increasing in 2019 given the priority of affordable housing? Are there notional budget allocations for fee waivers for affordable housing developments and if so, are there plans to increase these fee waivers?
- can someone speak on what the hereditary chiefs of the Songhees and Esquimalt nations have asked of the city budget!

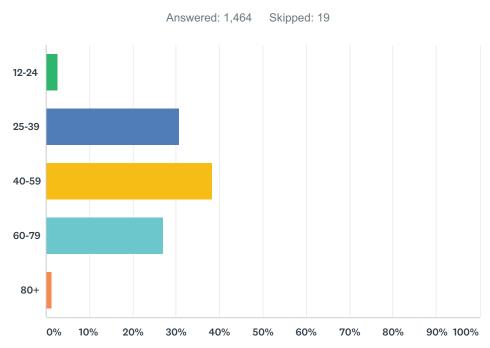
- How is council's declining of @VicPDCanada's budget request reflected in the current budget proposal? What impacts will that have to the overall budget? Where will the money needed to fund mental health & addiction response come from?
- Volunteer community groups may bring forward resources as part of testing ideas. How can City Hall embrace the LQC "Lighter Quicker Cheaper" approach to support community? That is, when ideas are floated & run up against "there's no budget" or "there is a process", how will Council recognise need to empower staff to collaborate on that level?
- the youth outside at the band shelter are hoping the city will fix the grass under the oak tree and would like you to consider safe sites to smoke that is in doors. As well as better health care for street youth.
- How does the budget reflect responses to the increasing traffic congestion in the city, working with BC Transit?
- Hello Mayor Helps and Council, Several years ago before you were elected as Mayor we had a conversation about the equitable distribution of amenities between neighbourhoods. An example amenity could be the scheduled build out of the bicycle lanes. How have you addressed equity between neighbourhoods?
- Why is so much money set aside for the public engagement department? Can the city of 85,000 residents justify this amount of money for 12 employees?
- A budget overage is anticipated in the blue bridge project due to such things as lawsuit costs and fendering costs. Has this been allowed for in the 2019 budget?
- What is city hall's plan to increase business and tourism downtown after 6h00 pm all year long? For example, Quebec City, a similar sized city and Parliement town, has vibrant business and tourism activity after 6h00 pm all year long even at -30 with wind and this is not a new innovative thing. Wake up Victoria! It can be done... How is it done? SAFETY AND LOTS OF FOOT PATROL
- There is no funding request in the draft 2019 Financial Plan for work to address accessibility of the planted environment. Is this because it can be handled within existing resources, or is no work planned? The problem to be addressed is that a large and growing number of children and adults with asthma and allergies cannot enjoy City parks and the outdoor environment to the same extent that other children can, especially while physically exerting themselves, due to triggers like pollen. Less allergenic species and female trees can be planted to correct the imbalance, without detracting from pollinator habitat. Failing to plant with the health risks in mind is contrary to the Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan objectives of making parks accessible to all yet the Urban Forest Master Plan does not include human health as a factor in planting decisions. Staff are under direction from Council to work with the Accessibility Working Group and Urban Food Table and to report back on options for balancing accessibility considerations with pollinator habitat, including in the vicinity of playgrounds, dating from November 2017. They provided an update as part of the Parks and Open Spaces annual update in July 2018 with a report of two actions they intended to take, but Staff have yet to work with these groups or the community to develop options for Council's decision. Thus, AWG made the following recommendation in October 2018 which has not been brought to the attention of Council:

"that Council direct staff to plan, scope, cost & look at options to resource a project for 2019 to consult, research, analyze & develop a long-term, phased plan and policies for addressing accessibility of the planted environment, to remove barriers for people with environmental disabilities, consistent with the accessibility objectives of the Parks & Open Spaces Master Plan."

What steps will the City take in 2019 to lead by example and start on the multi-decade process of improving accessibility of the planted environment?



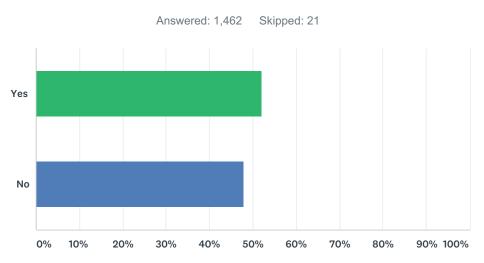

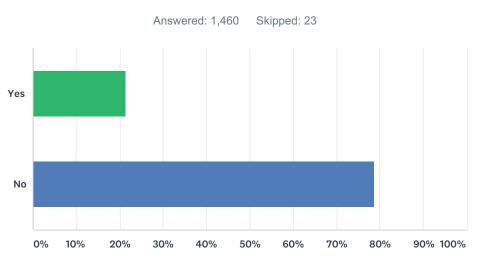
Q3 Do you own property in Victoria?

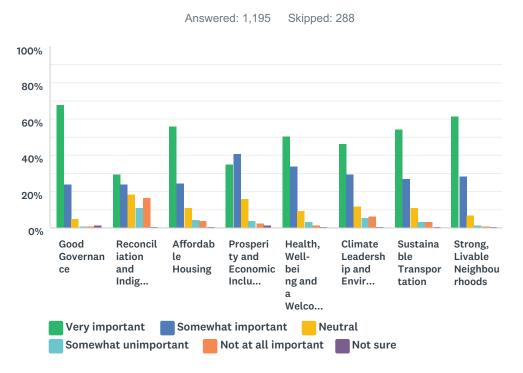
Q4 Do you rent in Victoria?




Q5 Do you own or run a business in Victoria?


Q6 In your view, how important is each Strategic Objective to making life better for you, your family, and your community?



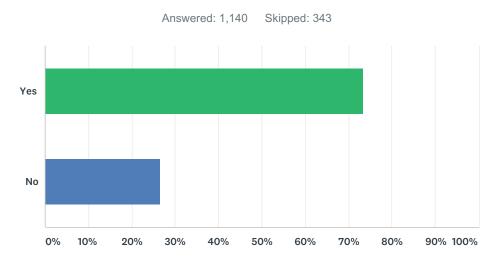
Q7 If you had \$100 to spend on the Strategic Objectives below, how would you allocate it? (graph shows total dollars in thousands of all respondents to this question)



Q8 Please rank the Strategic Objectives from most to least important.



It is not appropriate that nearly \$2M per year is allocated to a division that has the mandate to propagandize for the VicPD, engaging in pro-policing communications in ways that profoundly shape media and public perceptions of policing, public safety, crime, and marginalized populations who are targets of police attention. Funds required for IT technicians who can ensure public access to police data and other transparency and accountability measures should be separated out from public relations and the remainder of this division's funds cancelled. • On page 628 of the Draft Financial Plan, the deliverables of the VicPD Patrol Division include "strive to increase the visibility and accessibility of our officers in the community". In a society with laws and bylaws that criminalize homelessness and use of certain substances and where atypical behaviour is deemed 'social disorder', more patrol officers means more harm for individuals who are already highly criminalized. In its November 2018 presentation to the City the VicPD identified that four of the proposed 12 new officer positions will be used to create a new "Community Response Team" actively patrolling the the downtown area with a mandate to "suppress criminal element preying on vulnerable populations"; the VicPD Q3 2018 report to the City states that the Patrol Division is focusing specifically on a presence "in the areas of Rock Bay, the 2900-block of Douglas Street, Centennial Square and the 800 and 900 blocks of Johnson Street and Pandora Avenue" -locations of homeless shelters, low-income housing, street community survival services, and places where unhoused people congregate during the day. The portrayal of increased VicPD presence as providing enhanced safety and security for people who are highly criminalized is perverse given the harms law enforcement inflicts on the street community. Financially supporting intensification of such anti-poor initiatives is contrary to multiple stated commitments in the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan regarding Health, Well-Being, and being a Welcoming City, including fostering a compassionate city and fostering a welcoming environment that treats all people with compassion and respect. • On page 638 of the Draft Financial Plan, VicPD HR division deliverables include the following: "Identify new and more efficient ways to deliver services through an alternate response unit". This deliverable has been in past year's financial plans as well, and again this year there are no details on what an alternate response unit would have themandate to do, how it would be structured, budget implications, etc. Detailed information should be made available, with opportunity for public input, prior to any approval of budget. • On page 640 of the Draft Financial Plan, VicPD Community Services deliverables include the following: "proactively engage with various service providers to address issues and concerns of homelessness, mental health and addiction in order to assist in connecting people to services in order to prevent entrenchment of the most marginalized persons in one geographical area" (also a deliverable in the previous year's Draft Financial Plan), "complete the review of the 2 year pilot for the expansion of our members in the ACT team to determine the most efficient way to utilize police resources", and identification that a pilot project is underway to "centralize the VicPD's response to mental health and addiction and to implement the new VicPD Mental Health Strategy Action Plan" (both were deliverables in the previous year's Draft Financial Plan but this is the first mention of a pilot being underway). There are multiple concerns with this. In particular: o Policing is not the right response to homelessness, mental health or addiction concerns. These are not problems that can be solved by laws or law enforcement; on the contrary, police-based responses to homelessness, mental illness and substance use causes significant harm to people who are homeless, people with mental health concerns, and people who use drugs. Funding policing as a response to homelessness takes money away from actual solutions to homelessness (e.g., addressing the shortage of affordable high-quality housing), and similarly prioritizing budget for policing instead of affordable high-quality mental health and addiction services makes no sense.
O The City should not fund police to be embedded in health services and public funds should not be used to continue expansion of police presence in ACT teams [noting that the salary line item for 2 of the 3 ACT officers is in 'Supplemental Requests' not operating budget]. The police mandate of law enforcement, which uses surveillance and information gathering to pursue arrest and criminal charges, is fundamentally incompatible with the delivery of health services and embedding police in health teams criminalizes people, bringing surveillance, control and coercion into everyday life and increasing the social control function of mental health services which is contrary to a disability justice approach to mental health care. Police are in health services to be a hammer, to force people into compliance. That function is predicated on the power that police have over people's lives, the ever-present threat that if people do not comply the police have the power to detain, confine, arrest, and use force to subdue. In the very rare instances where there is immediate threat to life, health personnel, like any other individual, can call 911 for emergency response there is no need to have police embedded in health services or otherwise routinely a part of care. It is an ineffective use of public funds to have the VicPD facilitating referrals to health and social services that are already oversubscribed and have long waiting lists. VicPD's October 27, 2018 memo to the Police Board regarding the expansion of ACT police acknowledges that of 30

attempted referrals by VicPD to ACT and 713 Outreach teams, only 10 of those had been accepted as the teams already have full caseloads. We do not need more referral agents, we need more health and social services. • The VicPD Mental Health Strategy Action Plan is not available on the VicPD website and no details are provided on what is involved in implementing this action plan, budget implications, etc. Detailed information should be made available, with opportunity for public input, prior to any approval of budget. • Page 646, Investigative Services Division deliverables include the following: "Investigative Services will continue to develop effective ways to gather and use intelligence to target crime and disorder. This includes:Continued focus on the opioid crisis that is gripping the Province". • The War on Drugs has been in place for many years and is widely recognized as ineffective and harmful. Pouring even more money into trying to control the drug trade is throwing more money down the drain and creates more stigma, secrecy, and shame around substance use, which leads people to use alone and increases the risk of injury and death from overdose. Of particular concern, VicPD identified in their 2018 Q3 report to Victoriacouncil that they are focusing surveillance and visible police presence in the city blocks around three overdose prevention and supervised consumption sites on Johnson Street and Pandora Avenue, ignoring that increased police presence creates significant barriers to people accessing these services and accordingly increasing risks that people will use alone without immediate access to help in case of overdose. 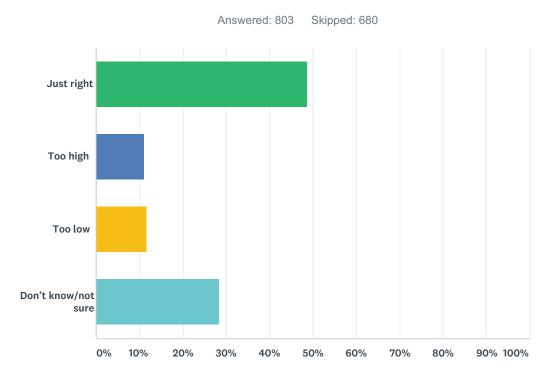

To look at how to appropriately invest money that might otherwise go to policing, we can learn from what has been done in other regions particularly in areas where, like Canada, policing is tied to colonialism. For example in the Indigenous-led justice reinvestment movement in Australia, communities most impacted by criminalization have created investment plans diverting money away from policing and prisons into building material community infrastructure -- affordable housing, culturally relevant education programs, etc. -- as well as funding system changes to address racism and economic injustice. The Oakland Power Projects uses community-based action research to facilitate collective identification of reasons why people are coming into contact with police, and to identify and implement community-driven solutions. There are alternatives that have been implemented in other regions at all points of the spectrum, including non-police-based prevention initiatives, peer and mixed peer-professional intervention alternatives, and transformative justice programs that address repair and healing after harm has occurred. Alternatives to policing not only reduce the harms inherent in law enforcement but also are often much more cost-effective. For example the CAHOOTS team which has been running for 27 years in two cities in Oregon, and which was designed specifically to provide an alternative to police response to substance use, poverty, and mental health crisis, runs a 24/7 response service for \$800,000 per year (responding to 15,000 calls, approximately 25% of all non-emergency calls). As part of budget planning and financial oversight for use of public funds, the City should require that the VicPD provide meaningful information to guide determination of operating budget. This includes providing information about calls for service to the police to help determine what infrastructure might best suit different community needs. For example, it is relevant to know not only how many calls are being made to police but also how many calls are about violence, how many are about property, how many are about public intoxication or other non-violent 'nuisance', etc as policing is not necessarily the right response to all types of calls that come to police. The VicPD should also have to provide more information about what funding is going to initiatives that are not responses to calls, such as 'pro-active policing' where the VicPD is prioritizing surveillance of specific populations -- for example locations where people with low incomes gather and live -- as police targeting of marginalized populations is not an appropriate use of public funds. I also want to comment here on specific VicPD deliverables set out in the Draft Financial Plan. Although the Police Board and not Victoria/Esquimalt Council has oversight of police operations, the municipalities that fund the VicPD are responsible for ensuring that public funds are being spent appropriately. When the VicPD is in its budget request identifying that they plan to use municipal funds to operationalize in ways that are not consistent with the municipalities' strategic plan, policies, or other commitments, or commit to activities that have the potential to cause harm to the public, it is not appropriate that the City fund these activities. I have particular concerns about the deliverables identified in the Draft Financial Plan below. On page 626 of the Draft Financial Plan, the deliverables of the VicPD Community Engagement Division include "Fostering new, bold and innovative ways to connect with the citizens of Victoria and Esquimalt", "Building enduring partnerships with media agencies by offering sustained and transparent access to VicPD people and stories", facilitating "community engagement activities", and employing "leading-edge social media practices and explor[ing] emerging technologies to connect more of our citizens in a meaningful, helpful and sustained way". It is not appropriate that nearly \$2M per year is allocated to a division that has the mandate to propagandize for the VicPD, engaging in pro-policing communications in ways that profoundly shape media and public perceptions of policing, public safety, crime, and marginalized populations who are targets of police attention. Funds required for IT technicians who can ensure public access to police data and other transparency and accountability measures should be separated out from public relations and the remainder of this division's funds cancelled. On page 628 of the Draft Financial Plan, the deliverables of the VicPD Patrol Division include "strive to increase the visibility and accessibility of our officers in the community". In a society with laws and bylaws that criminalize homelessness and use of certain substances and where atypical behaviour is deemed 'social disorder', more patrol officers means more harm for individuals who are already highly criminalized. In its November 2018 presentation to the City the VicPD identified that four of the proposed 12 new officer positions will be used to create a new "Community Response Team" actively patrolling the the downtown area with a mandate to "suppress criminal element preying on vulnerable populations"; the VicPD Q3 2018 report to the City states that the Patrol Division is focusing specifically on a presence "in the areas of Rock Bay, the 2900-block of Douglas Street, Centennial Square and the 800 and 900 blocks of Johnson Street and Pandora Avenue" -- locations of homeless shelters, low-income housing, street community survival services, and places where unhoused people congregate during the day. The portrayal of increased VicPD presence as providing enhanced safety and security for

people who are highly criminalized is perverse given the harms law enforcement inflicts on the street community. Financially supporting intensification of such anti-poor initiatives is contrary to multiple stated commitments in the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan regarding Health. Well-Being. and being a Welcoming City, including fostering a compassionate city and fostering a welcoming environment that treats all people with compassion and respect. On page 638 of the Draft Financial Plan, VicPD HR division deliverables include the following: "Identify new and more efficient ways to deliver services through an alternate response unit". This deliverable has been in past year's financial plans as well, and again this year there are no details on what an alternate response unit would have the mandate to do, how it would be structured, budget implications, etc. Detailed information should be made available, with opportunity for public input, prior to any approval of budget for these activities so it is clear what would actually be funded. On page 640 of the Draft Financial Plan, VicPD Community Services deliverables include the following: "proactively engage with various service providers to address issues and concerns of homelessness, mental health and addiction in order to assist in connecting people to services in order to prevent entrenchment of the most marginalized persons in one geographical area" (also a deliverable in the previous year's Draft Financial Plan), "complete the review of the 2 year pilot for the expansion of our members in the ACT team to determine the most efficient way to utilize police resources", and identification that a pilot project is underway to "centralize the VicPD's response to mental health and addiction and to implement the new VicPD Mental Health Strategy Action Plan" (both were deliverables in the previous year's Draft Financial Plan but this is the first mention of a pilot being underway). There are multiple concerns with this. In particular, policing is not the right response to homelessness, mental health or addiction concerns. These are not problems that can be solved by laws or law enforcement; on the contrary, police-based responses to homelessness, mental illness and substance use causes significant harm to people who are homeless, people with mental health concerns, and people who use drugs. Funding policing as a response to homelessness takes money away from actual solutions to homelessness (e.g., addressing the shortage of affordable high-quality housing), and similarly prioritizing budget for policing instead of affordable high-quality mental health and addiction services makes no sense. The City should not fund police to be embedded in health services and public funds should not be used to continue expansion of police presence in ACT teams. The police mandate of law enforcement, which uses surveillance and information gathering to pursue arrest and criminal charges, is fundamentally incompatible with the delivery of health services and embedding police in health teams criminalizes people, bringing surveillance, control and coercion into everyday life and increasing the social control function of mental health services which is contrary to a disability justice approach to mental health care. Police are in health services to be a hammer, to force people into compliance. That function is predicated on the power that police have over people's lives, the ever-present threat that if people do not comply the police have the power to detain, confine, arrest, and use force to subdue. In the very rare instances where there is immediate threat to life, health personnel, like any other individual, can call 911 for emergency response - there is no need to have police embedded in health services or otherwise routinely a part of care. It is an ineffective use of public funds to have the VicPD facilitating referrals to health and social services that are already oversubscribed and have long waiting lists. VicPD's October 27, 2018 memo to the Police Board regarding the expansion of ACT police acknowledges that of 30 attempted referrals by VicPD to ACT and 713 Outreach teams, only 10 of those had been accepted as the teams already have full caseloads. We do not need more referral agents, we need more health and social services. The VicPD Mental Health Strategy Action Plan is not available on the VicPD website and no details are provided on what is involved in implementing this action plan, budget implications, etc. Detailed information should be made available, with opportunity for public input, prior to any approval of budget. Moving on to the next issue regarding deliverables, on page 646, the Investigative Services Division deliverables include the following: "Investigative Services will continue to develop effective ways to gather and use intelligence to target crime and disorder. This includes:...Continued focus on the opioid crisis that is gripping the Province". The War on Drugs has been in place for many years and is widely recognized as ineffective and harmful. Pouring even more money into trying to control the drug trade is throwing more money down the drain and creates more stigma, secrecy, and shame around substance use, which leads people to use alone and increases the risk of injury and death from overdose. Of particular concern, VicPD identified in their 2018 Q3 report to Victoria council that they are focusing surveillance and visible police presence in the city blocks around three overdose prevention and supervised consumption sites on Johnson Street and Pandora Avenue, ignoring that increased police presence creates significant barriers to people accessing these services and accordingly increasing risks that people will use alone without immediate access to help in case of overdose. Financially supporting a law enforcement approach to the overdose crisis is contrary to the stated commitments in the City's 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan to advocate for destigmatization of mental health and addictions, expansion of harm reduction services, and provision of substances that are currently deemed illicit so people have access to safer drug supply. Public funds should instead be used for community,

I also note with concern that this year the Draft Financial Plan identifies that the VFD has had a 10% increase in calls to act generally as first responders and that this is explicitly stated as being connected to the overdose crisis including administration of naloxone and "providing pre-hospital care". While prompt first aid in case of overdose is life-saving and it is vital that this be available, it doesn't make sense to me that fire staff are the best choice for immediate response on an issue that has nothing to do with fire safety. 

These types of measures are encouraged by VicPD through their Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design program which is based on the widely debunked 'Broken Windows Theory'. According to this theory, which has now been proven to be ineffective and harmful, policing low-level offenses maintains social order thereby preventing more serious crimes a tactic that has been shown to increase racial and social profiling, increasing rather than decreasing harm. People with mobility disabilities are especially impacted by these measures as removal of benches, putting in armrests, etc. prevents people from being able to sit and get rest. I would like to see the city allocate funds to consulting with people who have been targeted and impacted by hostile architecture to identify priorities for removal of barriers, restoration of infrastructure removed by the City in past years, and other measures consistent with the City's stated commitments in the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan to foster a compassionate city, foster a welcoming environment that treats all people with compassion and respect, and identify and remove barriers. 

I am concerned that hostile architecture and exclusionary design is being widely used to discourage and prevent unhoused people from accessing public spaces, with particular impacts on people with disabilities. Examples of hostile architecture include removing benches from neighbourhood spaces where low-income people congregate, inserting armrests in the middle of benches to prevent someone from lying down, implementing spikes or concrete planters to prevent people from gathering, and gating alleys or other thoroughfares. These types of measures are encouraged by VicPD through their Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design program which is based on the widely debunked 'Broken Windows Theory'. According to this theory, which has now been proven to be ineffective and harmful, policing low-level offenses maintains social order thereby preventing more serious crimes – a tactic that has been shown to increase racial and social profiling, increasing rather than decreasing harm. People with mobility disabilities are especially impacted by these measures as removal of benches, putting in armrests, etc. prevents people from being able to sit and get rest. The rapid gentrification and expansion high-end luxury housing currently happening downtown is increasing criminalization of people who are marginalized, stigmatized, and considered 'undesirable' in this glossy vision of Victoria as a rich person's playground. Improving sustainable planning and community development requires both additional resources to be invested in this area and also a political reorientation so the work is to further building communities of care, respect, and consent, rather than to advance a profit-oriented agenda of what matters and who is important. Sustainable planning and community development is not about cashing in to make money as quickly as possible, it's about ensuring that infrastructure meets real social needs in ways that are environmentally sustainable and respectful. 
The current orientation of funds towards planning and community development is insufficient to engage in the significant transformation needed to dismantle the colonial relationships and power structures that are the current foundation of the City of Victoria. Currently, planning and development is oriented towards a vision that emphasizes expanded economic prosperity for some, at the expense of people with low incomes. The rapid gentrification and expansion high-end luxury housing currently happening downtown is increasing criminalization of people who are marginalized, stigmatized, and considered 'undesirable' in this glossy vision of Victoria as a rich person's playground. Improving sustainable planning and community development requires both additional resources to be invested in this area and also a political reorientation so the work is to further building communities of care, respect, and consent, rather than to advance a profit-oriented agenda of what matters and who is important. Sustainable planning and community development is not about cashing in to make money as quickly as possible, it's about ensuring that infrastructure meets real social needs in ways that are environmentally sustainable and respectful. There is huge momentum behind current settler abusive, violent relationships to Lekwungen people and their territories and it will take very significant investment to change that, to actually enact decolonization, reconciliation, and reparations for harms done. The Victoria Housing Strategy has not made significant headway on increasing the supply of affordable and appropriate housing. 



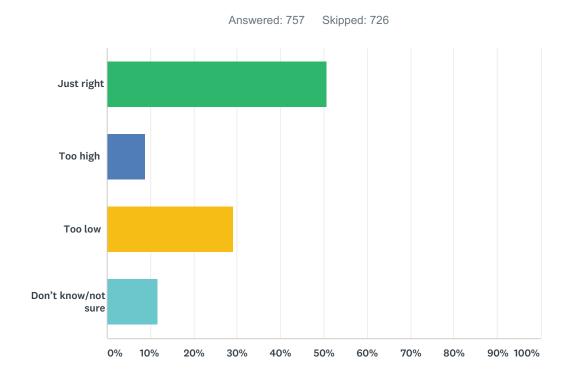

It is extremely important to have public spaces where people can gather, socialize, rest, enjoy nature, etc. And, for some people who do not have private spaces where these things can also happen, public spaces are, additionally, spaces of survival. When recreational wants of housed people conflict with unhoused people's survival needs, survival needs must take priority. The budget should be increased to work collaboratively with people sheltering outside to determine what amenities should be installed in parks to facilitate survival -- e.g., platforms to elevate tents above damp areas, storage lockers, 24/7 bathrooms, showers, food storage and preparation infrastructure, access to drinking water and electricity, etc. Maintenance of parks and other public spaces should not be used as a rationale to police and displace people who are sheltering outside, or seeking a safe place to use drugs. It is not appropriate to use public funds to "improve" parks by driving away people who are visibly low-income, whether by creating amenities like playgrounds or sports fields that whittle away the few spaces left where people can shelter, putting more pathways through sheltering spots to undermine privacy, creating terraced areas to make it more difficult for people to tent, or undertaking park redevelopment in areas currently used for sheltering. Given the dire housing crisis, budget should be prioritized not for amenities that are nice but not necessary, but rather for potentially repurposing buildings, parking lots, and other city-managed spaces to meet immediate human survival needs. (This would likely involve a mix of capital costs and operating budget.) The City currently has a hostile working relationship with people who shelter outside that is premised on the City using its power to displace people. This could shift to a respectful working relationship where the City works with people who are sheltering outside to find out what kind of spaces would improve safety, shelter, and access to necessities such as clean water, bathrooms, showers, and safe food storage/cooking facilities. City facilities could be readily adapted for these purposes and by engaging in this in a respectful, collaborative manner the City could also be well positioned to work on broader community initiatives such as reduction of discrimination against people who are living in poverty. The 'Leisure Involvement for Everyone' (LIFE) program currently discriminates against people with no fixed address by requiring that proof of address be provided to qualify for the program, contravening the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan mandate to "make Victoria barrier-free". Additionally the application process requires a CRA notice of assessment to prove income and that BC Identification be provided -- requirements out of reach for many people living in extreme poverty. An alternative application process should be investigated in consultation with the street community and advocates, to determine a respectful way forward for people with very low incomes who cannot meet these criteria (e.g., a letter from someone who is able to vouch that the person meets program criteria). Recognizing that people who are unhoused experience significant systemic barriers to being able to safely secure their belongings, there should be no blanket requirement that lost/stolen passes can only be replaced once per year, a \$5 replacement fee will be charged and 4 visits per month will be deducted from the card; instead this should be determined on a case-by-case basis -- the number of people this applies to will be small so will have no economic impact on the program's viability but will make a difference for individuals who rely on the LIFE program to access showers and other basic necessities. ما يوريا ما ا

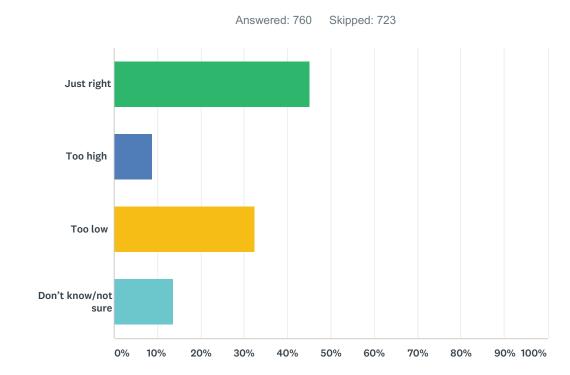

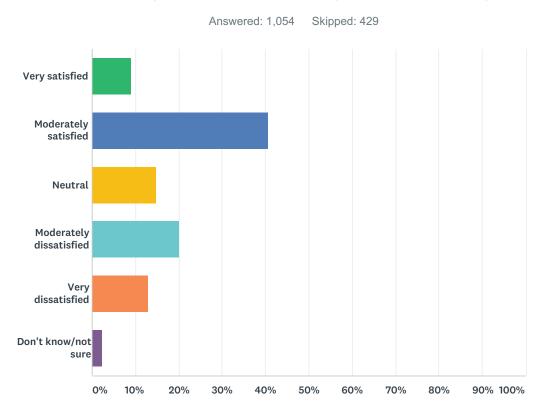



However the proposed budget doesn't align with these stated priorities. Policing is by far the highest expenditure at > \$57 million per year (23.4% of the operating budget) while in contrast only \$109,403 is proposed for implementation of the Victoria Housing Strategy and \$250,000 as transfer to a reserve for affordable housing projects (total of the two 0.15% of the operating budget). The City's budget should align with the City's stated priorities. The Draft Financial Plan states that a key goal is to "allocate additional city revenue to affordable housing" but the proposed budget does the opposite, decreasing the funding for the implementation of the housing strategy and keeping the housing reserve annual allocation the same as last year which given inflation means a decrease in real dollars. This does not reflect the widespread public concern about affordable housing, which has been the #1 issue for several years in the annual Vital Signs survey of Victoria residents and is getting worse not better. As identified in the Draft Financial Plan 61% of residents rent and that number is likely to increase as local prices for ownership of a townhouse, condo, or house have all skyrocketed in the past 20 years making home ownership unaffordable for most people. For renters, especially those with lower incomes, the situation is grim -- according to the Canada Mortgage & Housing Corporation rental rates for housing in the Victoria private market increased by 7.5% over the past year, 7.7% in the previous year and 13.2% in the two years prior to that, putting housing further out of reach for many people and resulting in increased risk of homelessness. The CMHC's fall 2018 rental market report for BC identified that the average rate for a bachelor apartment in Victoria in Oct 2018 was \$926 (up from \$850 in Oct 2017), far above the \$375 maximum shelter rate for individuals receiving income assistance. Given this context of a severe shortage of affordable housing it is particularly inappropriate that so much of the City's operating budget goes to policing. According to the VicPD, many of the service calls that come to police are not for emergency situations involving violence but rather are for policing people who are homeless (wake-ups/move-alongs, seizure of goods, acting in ways that don't conform to middle-class norms, using substances in public, etc.) under the guise of addressing 'social disorder'. This exaggerated panic about 'social disorder' both conceals the very real harms experienced by people who are homeless and also keeps money flowing to policing rather than actually meeting people's needs. This approach is not only social profiling but given the disproportionate number of Indigenous people who are homeless as a result of colonialism, is also racial profiling. As long as policing continues to take up such a giant proportion of tax dollars this will be a self-perpetuating cycle: more homelessness and social inequality, and more policing of marginalized people to appease the anxiety of people who have money and political power. We need to divest from extremely expensive responses that do nothing more than keep a small but highly marginalized population intensely trapped in daily surveillance and criminalization, and invest in programs that build community capacity to effectively meet people's needs, resolve conflicts, and otherwise collectively address societal problems. These are calls that tie up a gigantic amount of their time, either in the community, or at the hospital, and while they're left to deal with them, other police have to double up on other emergency calls for service, short staffed, resulting in the possibility of serious injury or harm, and resulting often in increased Overtime usage. You can't expect police to do their jobs, ask them to increase their fiduciary responsibility, and then turn around and say "oh well we asked for 50% more effort from you, but yeah we won't increase your budget to allow you to hire more people, to help manage the call loads, because we don't want to "appear" to be a police state" as Councilor lsitt so ignorantly put. You are elected officals acting on OUR behalf, and yet 2018 saw so many shady, backroom deals made (Removal of Sir. John A. MacDonald statue, the implemention of the "City Family", where NON-ELECTED members, made decisions on situations that affected our city, without caring how we felt, again like the statue issue, because they "didn't want to wait forever to get approval". I didn't elect them, so I don't want them speaking for me. The police need to properly supplied with not just man power, but also the proper equipment, training, and resources. Their job is a very honorable, but also difficult one, and they should have the right amount of supports in place to assist them. Each year Council denies their request for a budget increase, yet demands more and more work from them. It's illogical and frankly stupid for lack of a better term. This Council has shown a gross level of mismanagement when it comes to budgets in the past. 

The City's budget should align with the City's stated priorities. The Draft Financial Plan states that a key goal is to "allocate additional city revenue to affordable housing" but the proposed budget does the opposite, decreasing the funding for the implementation of the housing strategy and keeping the housing reserve annual allocation the same as last year which given inflation means a decrease in real dollars. This does not reflect the widespread public concern about affordable housing, which has been the #1 issue for several years in the annual Vital Signs survey of Victoria residents and is getting worse not better. As identified in the Draft Financial Plan 61% of residents rent and that number is likely to increase as local prices for ownership of a townhouse, condo, or house have all skyrocketed in the past 20 years making home ownership unaffordable for most people. For renters, especially those with lower incomes, the situation is grim - according to the Canada Mortgage & Housing Corporation rental rates for housing in the Victoria Private market increased by 7.5% over the past year, 7.7% in the previous year and 13.2% in the two years prior to that, putting housing further out of reach for many people and resulting in increased risk of homelessness. 



Q49 How should the City allocate 2018 surplus revenue?



Q50 How should the City allocate new assessed revenue generated from new development for 2019? (select all that apply)





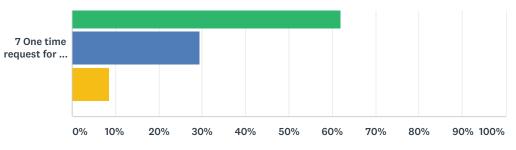

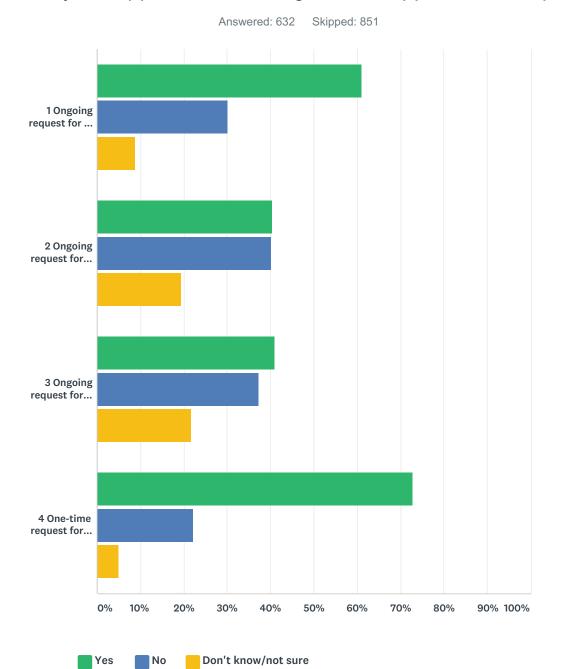

I do not support the \$1.13 million proposed over three years to support the phased-in creation of 12 new VicPD officer positions + 1 new civilian position. There should be no expansion of the VicPD force and no new hires as there is no evidence suggesting need for additional VicPD staffing. According to Statistics Canada and the VicPD's own data, the most recent available data show that from 2014-2018 calls for service to the VicPD decreased, and in the past 3 years crime rates and the crime severity index have also dropped (with consistent longitudinal trending downward over the past 10 years). This is consistent with broader societal trends of declining crime rates across Canada for the past 20+ years. Additionally, since 2009 Victoria has been the most heavily policed major city in all of Canada and there is no rationale for why Victoria in particular should have this intensive a level of policing (e.g., no evidence has been provided that Victoria has more calls for service per capita than other major Canadian cities; Victoria has lower crime rate and crime severity than many other Canadian cities). As mentioned earlier, of particular concern in relation to potential social and racial profiling the VicPD is seeking an increase of 10 patrol positions with 4 of these going to a new "Community Response Team" that would proactively target areas where people with low incomes live, socialize, and access services. For all the reasons stated earlier I do not support this direction. While I support public access to VicPD data, the proposed civilian research analyst position can be accomplished by shifting money away from existing unnecessary civilian positions (e.g., VicPD public relations). I strongly object to police being embedded in ACT teams and any other embedding of police in mental health or other health services, as set out in earlier comments. The \$262,210 proposed here for 2 officer positions in ACT teams should not be funded. No information is provided in the Draft Financial Plan or the VicPD November 2018 Council presentations about what would be covered by the VicPD's request for \$139,892 for "Special Duties Funding". In the absence of any information about what this line item is for, it should not be funded. I note a one-time request of \$362,000 for "overnight sheltering support and clean up in City parks and green spaces, allowing for reduced risk of those using City parks, as well as reduced damage to vegetation and eco-systems". While I strongly support public funds being used to increase amenities to people sheltering in parks (including bathrooms) and would also support using public funds to engage with people sheltering in parks to create new amenities to better meet their needs (e.g., storage of belongings), I am concerned that the funds identified here do not seem to be earmarked for this purpose by instead may be used to fund increased security patrols or other efforts to surveil, police or displace people sheltering in parks, and to dispose of their belongings. I am also concerned at the overstating of impact of the small number of people who shelter in parks on the natural environment and particularly the suggestion that people sheltering in parks is detrimental to ecosystems. The environmental impact of unhoused people is miniscule compared to the very significant environmental impact of industry, road and building construction -- yet unhoused people are singled out and scapegoated. I am disturbed that this language is included in this survey and hope that future surveys will consider how to frame this item in a way that does not encourage social profiling and anti-homeless hate.

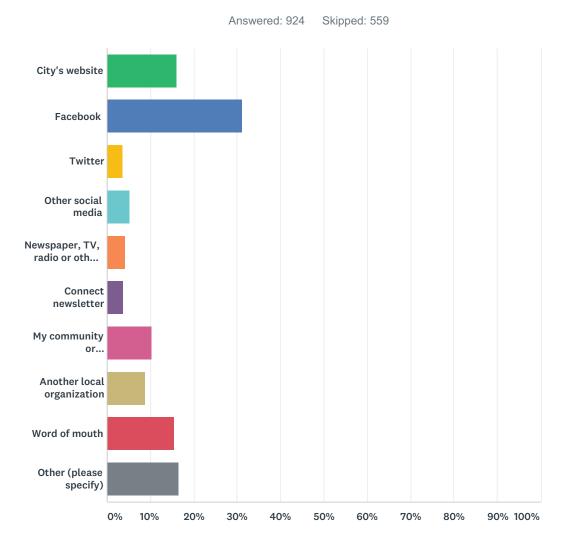

Hello,

I wanted to add support for increasing the rate of green stormwater infrastructure implementation.

As we know from the research from Dr. Jenifer McIntyre at Washington State University, <u>exposure to road runoff</u> <u>is causing acute mortality in coho salmon spawners and busy roads are the land use most closely associated</u> <u>with the mortality phenomenon</u>.

However, this research has also shown that there is an <u>extremely effective and inexpensive solution for treatment</u> through filtering runoff through green stormwater infrastructure (raingardens, bioswales, simple bioretention with filtration through sand/soil). Actions that could be enacted for this relatively simple remedy include:

- 1. Implementation of bio-filtration methods (raingardens, bioswales or simple bioretention with filtration through sand/soil) in the stormwater runoff infrastructure of all new transportation projects.
- 2. Gradual (but speeded-up) retro-fitting of existing stormwater runoff infrastructure.

Raingardens and Bioswales save salmon - it is as simple as that. Unfiltered road run off can kill them outright.

This reduction in direct pollution has impacts for every aquatic organism, from the zooplankton nobody sees to the Orcas that bring Victoria so much tourism. You can add in all the benefits of planted raingardens that increase flowers for pollinators and many other benefits.

My daughter looked forward to "Constable Craig's" visits and frequently spoke fondly of them. The regular presence of the police liaison is a valuable investment in our future citizenry, inculcating a deep sense of connection in children to law enforcement as a public good that can be trusted.

Also, the Constable's advice to students on conflict management--"walk away, use your words, or seek help"--have significantly helped to make the school yard a safer, less violent place. My children hold his instruction in high regard and have internalized it. School teachers use it. At home we have also incorporated this advice into our parenting methods. Constable Craig has made a significant positive contribution to the school and community culture, schooling many on the fundamentals of conflict management. This will benefit us all, culturally and fiscally someday.

I have not researched the public policy studies on the cost-benefits of police-school liaisons, but I suspect that the social science data will corroborate my personal experience of it's value.

The Housing Action Response Team (HART) is an integrated outreach team that offers support and information to homeless individuals within our community who are staying in parks, encampments, cars and on the street; not in shelters.

Based on a model seen in Seattle, BC Housing invited the City of Victoria and community partners including Victoria Police, to begin a pilot in May 2017 to focus on homeless encampments. On a weekly basis, community partners and outreach workers reach out to some of our community's most vulnerable citizens in parks and on the street. Within the first year of the project, HART outreach met more than 140 individuals; not only making personal connections, but encouraging service access, making countless referrals to shelter, social assistance and health care.

HART Outreach Team members now include (but is not limited to) City of Victoria Police, City of Victoria Bylaw Department, Pacifica Downtown Outreach Service, Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction, BC Housing, Beacon Community Services, Island Health 713 Outreach, and more recently, Saanich Police.

HART Outreach team engages with homeless persons on the street or in parks:

- To assess individuals and identify barriers to housing
- To provide immediate referrals to a wide range of service providers including for food, shelter, clothing, and other resources in the community
- To provide referrals to a wide range of other services including but not limited to social assistance, obtaining identification, and mental health support or physical health care
- Liaising closely with emergency shelters to identify vacancies; identifying individuals who are some of our most vulnerable homeless and then fast tracking them and transporting them into available shelter beds
- To identify and prioritize homeless persons who are particularly struggling or unwell, or highly vulnerable to prioritize "VAT" housing assessments and supportive housing applications (housing with on-site support)
- To share knowledge and resources amongst HART members

Victoria Police, and in particular Community Resource Officer Sean Hand have an important role to play on the HART outreach team; as well as part of a broader system of care for serving homeless individuals. These contributions vary on a weekly basis but also include:

- Working closely with supportive housing providers to develop and implement a support plan as we move some individuals from homelessness into supportive housing
- Participating through committee work (CAA Placement Committee) as we prioritize supportive housing applicants into supportive housing resources
- Participating at the planning level through committee work (CAA Advisory Committee), Greater Victoria Coalition to End Homelessness (System Improvement Working Group)

We sincerely appreciate Victoria Police contribution to our broader system of care for people who are experiencing homeless, and who live with mental health and addiction. If you have any further questions about HART outreach or Victoria Police contribution, please feel free to contact me.

I can't make it to your Jan. 16 or Jan. 19 meeting so thought I would send some comments on your Draft Strategic Plan for 2019-2022.

Sentiments seem worthy; scope of your intentions very wide; workload planned for your staff very broad (and deep?) I agree with much of the comment from Grumpy Taxpayers today and particularly this comment: *Often there's insufficient focus on the core mandate of providing quality, basic services that are affordable to all of its residents. Often councils pursue pet projects or ideological bound expenditures or stray into areas of provincial or federal jurisdiction.*

I'll focus on the three significant omissions I see, plug three other comments.

- Strategic Objective 7 item 7. Striking absence of any intention to assist or promote or even notice an issue of mobility for those who need to use a mobility scooter. I already knew this, because when I wrote to the last council asking for mobility aids (e.g. navigable sidewalks, cutouts to road) to be introduced in Fernwood I elicited absolutely no interest from council or staff. Still this is a shocking omission from a council's core responsibilities. "Accessible" might be a good concept to introduce instead of or as well as "Sustainable" in Transportation.
- Strategic Objective 7 item 12. Silly and retrograde to lower speed limits when you don't enforce existing ones. Fernwood Rd for instance has a speed limit of 30 but the average vehicle speed would be about 55 or 60.
- Strategic Objective 5. Absolutely no reference to what I consider one of the most serious offences against public health, and one that modern cities have generally coped with: the absence of any facilities for those who need a toilet. The amount of human feces visible in Fernwood last summer was shocking. If Victoria had a public health officer, he or she would surely be calling this to attention.
- Strategic Objective 5 item 9. I'm not sure what this means. Accessible in what sense? Depriving the downtown of parking opportunities probably lessens the need for uniformity or accessibility in standards.
- Strategic Objective 1 item 3. You might also advocate for updating the civil governance model for municipal policing by removing mayors from police boards. "Civil governance", which almost all policing authorities advocate, should not mean "political governance".
- Strategic Objective 8. You do not mention city parks other than Beacon Hill but I want to congratulate the last council for having improved the little city parks so greatly. They had been totally neglected for ages! But in the last four years wonderful improvements have been made. I hope the Council means to keep this up this excellent maintenance standard.

Although we are residents of Oak Bay, we pay taxes on 3 properties in Victoria. I believe that validates this following input.

I looked over the list of budget priorities and these additions came to mind. More input may come tomorrow. I will send this off to you tonight.

Protection of endangered Garry Oak Ecosystems

Could you kindly include protecting the endangered Garry Oak ecosystems from leash free dogs. I note there are an increase of leash free areas and I hope they are not in endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. There is less than 1 % of the original Garry Oak ecosystems remaining. These precious Garry Oak ecosystems were properly stewarded by our ancestors for the past 800 years. The Garry Oak ecosystems have diminished mostly in the past 2 generations because of the burgeoning dog population. I do not believe that all areas in the the public parks can be home to both Garry Oak ecosystems and dogs, on leash or off leash. There should be contained separated areas that are dog free zones as well as contained leash free zones. The 2 are not compatible in the same area.

Toronto is one of several cities that have transformed empty school play grounds after school hours and weekends to include areas that are contained leash free zones with special ground material to absorb the dog feces and urine. Could Victoria also follow this model instead of allowing dogs to run in parks that have endangered plant species as Garry Oak meadows.

I recommend bylaws about numbers of dogs allowed in parks on or off leash to 2 dogs per owner or dog walker. I see dog walkers with 6 or more dogs on or off leash that are crashing through endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. The number of ground nesting song birds has diminished to almost zero in some parks. The sound of song birds has been replaced by dogs crashing through the bushes.

It may take courage and strong intention to protect natural and landscaped areas from devastation by dogs as there are many dog owners who feel that dogs are entitled to run freely in parks.

I can provide examples of 'no dog' signs at nature preserve parks and green city centers. One example of No Dogs or Dogs on Leash at all times is in Ganges, Saltspring Island that demonstrate preservation of nature sanctuaries as Ruckland Park and the city center.... as a priority over dogs thrashing through and destroying the endangered ecosystems. Stiff financial penalties are enforced.

Could dog owners be taxed higher than non dog owners, considering the huge amount of tax payers money needed to haul away dog excrement from the garbage cans as well as the glut of plastic bags containg dog excrement? This takes huge management and expense at the city dumps.

<u>I wish to support Jacques Sirois' effort to recreate Southern</u> Vancouver island coasts as marine bird sanctuaries. Eliminate plastic and sterofoam service utensils from hotels and restuarants

Lets get back to paper or better yet, washable service utensils.

Eliminate plastic straws . Keep up the work to eliminate single use plastic straws and bags. Lets carry our own fabric bags to the stores and markets.

Support glass bottles instead of plastic bottles for all bevereges.. and encourage carrying home thermoses on a daily basis..

Eliminate excess bubble dome plastic packaging in food stores and for all merchandise

Eliminate plastic wrap at floral shops. Brown paper is attractive on floral arrangements.

Stronger pesticide restrictions and enforcement..... provide education for alternatives to Roundup.. eg vinegar Support organic farming, community gardens and home organic gardens.

<u>Grow crops that purify the soil from previously used pesticides.</u> I can provide more information if required.

<u>Please continue to maitain Victoria as a GMO free zone and</u> <u>support local organic farmers markets.</u>

Support education on using organic home/ kitchen vegge food waste to nourish the soil. I can provide ideas if required that prevent rats and flies. Agricultural land is being used for growing marijuana which formerly grew vegetables, Restrict marijuana grow ops. Preserve agricultural land for organic food farms

<u>Prevention and Rehabilitiation through Transcendental</u> <u>Meditation</u>

Hello,

I wanted to add support for increasing the rate of green stormwater infrastructure implementation.

As we know from the research from Dr. Jenifer McIntyre at Washington State University, <u>exposure to road runoff</u> <u>is causing acute mortality in coho salmon spawners and busy roads are the land use most closely associated</u> <u>with the mortality phenomenon</u>.

However, this research has also shown that there is an <u>extremely effective and inexpensive solution</u> for treatment through filtering runoff through green stormwater infrastructure (raingardens, bioswales, simple bioretention with filtration through sand/soil). Actions that could be enacted for this relatively simple remedy include:

- 1. Implementation of bio-filtration methods (raingardens, bioswales or simple bioretention with filtration through sand/soil) in the stormwater runoff infrastructure of all new transportation projects.
- 2. Gradual (but speeded-up) retro-fitting of existing stormwater runoff infrastructure.

Raingardens and Bioswales save salmon - it is as simple as that. Unfiltered road run off can kill them outright.

This reduction in direct pollution has impacts for every aquatic organism, from the zooplankton nobody sees to the Orcas that bring Victoria so much tourism. You can add in all the benefits of planted raingardens that increase flowers for pollinators and many other benefits.

Apologies for the delay in getting this out to you. It's not formal but this is just a quick list of some of the high priority areas that could use some attention via city budgets.

- Burnside & Jutland intersection the corners closest to the Gorge are dangerous for pedestrian traffic, both in terms of visibility and also mobility for strollers, wheelchairs, etc
- A crosswalk across Gorge Road at the Goose Trail access point (at Gorge Bridge) is a priority for the neighbourhood.
- Comments from the community for more green space, (parks, trees along streets.
- Pedestrian / bike access from the Goose Trail to Carroll and Albany Streets.
- Community Centre funding increase Community Centre operational funds, currently all seniors and community centres receive just over \$50,000 annually regardless of facility size or service delivery. The centres have been in conversation with City staff to develop more equitable and standardized operating agreements and funding models.
- Any improvements to streetscape and walkability along Burnside & Gorge Roads would be welcome
- The creation of internal green corridors remains a priority for the neighbourhood to allow for safe walking routes for residents.

The goals of the 2019 – 2022 Strategic Plan Engagement Summit were to:

- Convene an inclusive event that attracts a large, diverse and representative group of participants;


Introduction

2019 – 2022 Strategic Plan Engagement Summit

The City of Victoria invited the community to "give a day to your city" and participate in the 2019 – 2022 Strategic Plan Engagement Summit on Saturday, January 19, 2019 from 10 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. at the Victoria Conference Centre. Registration was free and the event included free childminding.

The 2019 – 2022 Strategic Plan Engagement Summit was designed to:

 Create the opportunity for people to share their knowledge and experience with the City to help shape the 2019-2022 Draft Strategic Plan and discuss levels of engagement for the 2019 draft actions



- Convene an inclusive event that attracts a large, diverse and representative group of participants
- Build new relationships and strengthen established ones with the community
- Foster dialogue between citizens and between citizens and the City about the most pressing civic issues facing Victoria over the next four years

A total of 148 individuals participated in an inspiring day of sharing ideas, learning together and community building. Participants were asked to roll up their sleeves and join their neighbours to dive deep into the proposed Strategic Plan to help set the course for their city over the next four years. The community representatives had the opportunity to discuss and highlight what was important to them as part of the draft Strategic Plan, what kind of engagement they were interested for various projects in 2019, and what actions Council could consider for future planning.

The City's 2019 – 2022 Draft Strategic Plan includes eight objectives and associated actions to direct the City's four-year work plan:

- 1. Good Governance
- 2. Reconciliation and Indigenous Relations
- 3. Affordable Housing
- 4. Prosperity and Economic Inclusion
- 5. Health, Well-Being and a Welcoming City
- 6. Climate Leadership and Environmental Stewardship
- 7. Sustainable Transportation
- 8. Strong, Liveable Neighbourhoods

Summit Format

The summit included facilitated plenary and small group discussions at Engagement Stations on each Strategic Objective.

Live interactive technology was used to poll participants on certain topics during plenary sessions, including a series of get-to-know-you activities to start the day.

One of the long-term goals of the City's public engagement activities is to grow connections among people – or social capital – building a sense of belonging, social trust and increasing the levels of civic participation. This question probes where people place themselves on the social capital rubric. Participants were asked at the beginning and end of the event to see if there was a change. By the end of the day, some people were already indicating that they had moved up the social capital scale, seeing themselves as influencing and effecting change in the community.

5. Participants also participated in two word cloud activities. At the beginning of the Engagement Summit, they were asked: *What is the ONE WORD that describes how you would like to interact and be treated today?*

The words "respect", "respectfully", "heard" and "meaningfully", were prevalent.

Feedback from Participants

The online registration form asked participants to indicate in order of preference the Strategic Plan objectives they would like to engage on at the Summit. Prior to the event, they were assigned their **top two** preferences to do a deep dive on at the Summit.

This format provided participants with advance time to prepare for the discussions.

Participants were seated in circles of 8-12 and session facilitators fostered dialogue between participants.



At each Engagement Station, there were 2-3 large information panels that displayed the strategic objective (e.g. Good Governance) and the list of proposed actions and their associated year of completion. The facilitator guided the conversation. Recorders noted insights and feedback. A designated City Councillor and staff content expert were available to answer guestions.

Morning Engagement Sessions – Strategic Objectives and Actions

The two morning sessions were each 45 minutes in length and designed to explore the draft actions within each strategic objective and consider any new actions for Council's consideration, as well as identify potential outcomes to help measure success.

Each engagement station's facilitator asked their group to:

1) Identify outcomes - How will we know if we have been successful?

In most cases, participants wanted to see clear measures of performance in each program area.

2) Review draft actions:

- a. Do you think the draft actions will achieve this objective?
- b. Is there an action that should be removed/moved?
- c. Any new actions proposed were discussed and noted on New Action Worksheets (the level of support within the group was also identified). Please see the New Actions section (page 8) for more information.
- 3) Set priorities To help provide Council with a community lens on priorities and make tough trade-off decisions, participants were tasked to indicate their top five actions that they thought would be the most effective in achieving this objective over the next four years.



Input recorded at Engagement Stations regarding outcomes, comments on Council-proposed actions, and the priority setting exercise has been compiled and synthesized by objective and included in *Appendix A - Draft Strategic Plan Objectives and Actions Feedback*.

Outcomes suggested by participants will be helpful to staff as part of an evaluation framework and key performance indicators, to be developed following Council's adoption the final for 2019-2022 Strategic Plan.

Afternoon Engagement Sessions – 2019 Levels of Engagement

The afternoon portion of the Summit began with the IAP2 Spectrum 101 presentation and interactive "stakeholder" activity by Amelia Shaw, Executive Manager of the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2) Canada. This mini-workshop introduced participants to the IAP2 levels of engagement used in the City's Engagement Framework: *Inform; Consult; Involve; Collaborate; and Empower*.

Following the IAP2 interactive activity, participants returned to their two morning engagement stations for 25-minute sessions to discuss the levels of engagement they thought would be appropriate for the draft 2019 actions.

In many cases, individuals in the groups failed to have consensus on the manner in which the City should engage with different stakeholder groups, along different phases of proposed actions. When consensus on the level of engagement for an action could not be reached, recorders noted the number of participants who supported a level of engagement for an action. This information is also included by Strategic Objective in *Appendix A - Draft Strategic Plan Objectives and Actions Feedback*.

NOTE: Once the Strategic Plan is finalized by Council, City staff will consider the range of input collected on the levels of engagement as part of determining 2019 engagement plans. Levels of engagement for 2019 actions will **not** form part of the final 2019–2022 Strategic Plan.

New Actions

During the morning engagement station sessions, there was an opportunity for participants to suggest **new actions** for their strategic objective that they would like Council to consider.

Participants were informed that any new actions proposed would be considered by Council for implementation from 2020-2022. This would provide an opportunity for Council to receive a report from staff on the proposed new action and its associated implications on existing City programs, services and costs.

If there was general support in the group following a facilitated discussion of the new action, the participant completed a New Action Worksheet. If more than one new action was proposed,




participants within the group were asked to indicate the action *most important to be achieved* over the next four years.

A selection of new actions proposed by participants were pitched on stage during an **Open Pitch session** and voted on in real-time to gauge the views of all Summit participants. Participants could select how strongly they supported the new action by selecting: | *Very Important / Important / Neutral / Somewhat Important / Not Important*

All New Action Worksheets were collected and entered into a spreadsheet for Council's consideration.

Upon analysis, of the 75 new actions submitted at the Summit:

- 38 are categorized as "new"
- 31 are already included in the Draft Strategic Plan in some capacity or already in progress, and
- 6 suggest modifications to specific actions in the Draft Strategic Plan

Goal Worksheets and Murals

For the final activity of the day, each table of participants worked as a group to synthesize the information that had been contributed by individuals on the Goal Murals, which were on display throughout the day.

Participants were asked to create a goal statement together: *In four years, the City of Victoria will ...*

One person from each table was invited to share their table's draft Goal Statement with the larger group. All Goal Statement Worksheets were collected, along with the content shared on the Goal Murals, and entered into a spreadsheet for Council's consideration.

I looked over the list of budget priorities and these additions came to mind. More input may come tomorrow. I will send this off to you tonight.

Protection of endangered Garry Oak Ecosystems

Could you kindly include protecting the endangered Garry Oak ecosystems from leash free dogs. I note there are an increase of leash free areas and I hope they are not in endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. There is less than 1 % of the original Garry Oak ecosystems remaining. These precious Garry Oak ecosystems were properly stewarded by our ancestors for the past 800 years.

The Garry Oak ecosystems have diminished mostly in the past 2 generations because of the burgeoning dog population.

I do not believe that all areas in the the public parks can be home to both Garry Oak ecosystems and dogs, on leash or off leash. There should be contained separated areas that are dog free zones as well as contained leash free zones. The 2 are not compatible in the same area.

Toronto is one of several cities that have transformed empty school play grounds after school hours and weekends to include areas that are contained leash free zones with special ground material to absorb the dog feces and urine. Could Victoria also follow this model instead of allowing dogs to run in parks that have endangered plant species as Garry Oak meadows.

I recommend bylaws about numbers of dogs allowed in parks on or off leash to 2 dogs per owner or dog walker. I see dog walkers with 6 or more dogs on or off leash that are crashing through endangered Garry Oak ecosystems. The number of ground nesting song birds has diminished to almost zero in some parks. The sound of song birds has been replaced by dogs crashing through the bushes.

It may take courage and strong intention to protect natural and landscaped areas from devastation by dogs as there are many dog owners who feel that dogs are entitled to run freely in parks.

I can provide examples of 'no dog' signs at nature preserve parks and green city centers. One example of No Dogs or Dogs on Leash at all times is in Ganges, Saltspring Island that demonstrate preservation of nature sanctuaries as Ruckland Park and the city center.... as a priority over dogs thrashing through and destroying the endangered ecosystems. Stiff financial penalties are enforced.

Could dog owners be taxed higher than non dog owners, considering the huge amount of tax payers money needed to haul away dog excrement from the garbage cans as well as the glut of plastic bags containg dog excrement? This takes huge management and expense at the city dumps.

I wish to support Jacques Sirois' effort to recreate Southern Vancouver island coasts as marine bird sanctuaries.

Eliminate plastic and sterofoam service utensils from hotels and restuarants

Lets get back to paper or better yet, washable service utensils.

Eliminate plastic straws . Keep up the work to eliminate single use plastic straws and bags. Lets carry our own fabric bags to the stores and markets.

Support glass bottles instead of plastic bottles for all bevereges.. and encourage carrying home thermoses on a daily basis..

Eliminate excess bubble dome plastic packaging in food stores and for all merchandise

Eliminate plastic wrap at floral shops. Brown paper is attractive on floral arrangements.

Stronger pesticide restrictions and enforcement..... provide education for alternatives to Roundup.. eg vinegar

Support organic farming, community gardens and home organic gardens.

<u>Grow crops that purify the soil from previously used pesticides. I can</u> provide more information if required.

<u>Please continue to maitain Victoria as a GMO free zone and support</u> <u>local organic farmers markets.</u>

<u>Support education on using organic home/kitchen vegge food waste to</u> <u>nourish the soil. I can provide ideas if required that prevent rats and</u> <u>flies.</u> Agricultural land is being used for growing marijuana which formerly grew vegetables, Restrict marijuana grow ops. Preserve agricultural land for organic food farms

Dear Mayor Helps,

I am a former Victoria resident (UVic Class of 1984) with plans to retire there in the next few years. I work as a business media editor/writer, covering communications/technology, finance, marketing, and transportation. I am also a long-time transportation advocate including having Personal info

and supported downtown streetcar and LRT plans and the SaveRail Coalition in 2002 when the E&N was threatened with abandonment.

I would like to provide comments to the draft 2019 – 2022 Draft Strategic Plan and wish for them to be entered into the public record in view of my not being able to attend Saturday's **Strategic Plan Engagement Summit**.

My comments address Strategic Objective #7: Sustainable Transportation, Section 6 "Work towards a regional rail system/advocate for commuter rail and inter-city rail along the E and N railway from Victoria Harbour without delay".

I applaud and support this Objective as the restoration and revitalization of the E&N is essential if the City and the region and Island is to support a sustainable green economy. To enable the realization of this Objective I would like to offer the following draft amendment as an addition to the existing section to read as follows:

"Designate and protect an easement from Victoria Harbour for a new rail bridge and right of way into the city centre. Study, in partnership with BC Transit and other stakeholders, hybrid commuter rail/rapid transit TramTrain."

Here is the background and rationale:

--The planned Victoria Harbour terminus would work for intercity rail, but only in the interim for commuter rail and only provided there Is bus and water transit (to the Legislative Precinct) access. But long-term it is not competitively sustainable for commuter rail because of lengthy and inconvenient transfers. Even when the E&N was still at the more convenient Store Street location it lost the 2002 *Commuter Challenge*.

Commuter rail requires downtown access to be successful, particularly in smaller markets like the CRD. Commuter rail in the similarly-sized city of Burlington, Vermont (The Champlain Flyer) failed in part because its station is at the foot of a steep hill from the city centre.

--Designating and protecting a suitable easement protects the option of bringing commuter rail and also LRT over the E&N into the downtown i.e. future-proofing. *Once lost it will be impossible to provide direct service.*

--TramTrain is hybrid commuter rail/rapid transit that permit trainsets to operate both on existing railway tracks and onstreet to supply direct no-transfer access to city centres. It combines the advantages of commuter rail and LRT, including the ability to draw motorists and attract sustainable transit-oriented development.

TramTrains are popular in Europe with applications in the USA, notably Capital Metrorail (Austin, Texas) and the RiverLINE (NJ Transit). I am firsthand familiar with the RiverLINE through having ridden it often while living in Bordentown, New Jersey in 2017-2018.

--TramTrains can be electric, diesel, and alternatively-powered with green energy. They may not need the costly installation of unsightly overhead wires in the city centre.

--TramTrains can permit high-quality (every 12 minute/15-minute service in each direction) on a signalled single-track right of way with passing sidings: which could be implemented at a fraction of the capital cost of LRT over the Highway 1 corridor (estimated at \$950 million) even with a new bridge.

Ottawa, Ontario's Trillium Line offers a template as it operates on that frequency also on a signalled singletracked/passing siding railway line also formerly owned by the Canadian Pacific Railway (that too once had a daily CPR/later VIA Budd RDC-equipped passenger train).

The Trillium Line features a single-tracked bridge over the Rideau River and tunnel under Dow's Lake. There had been plans for a North-South LRT on the same alignment, but they were scrapped. Ottawa is about to open an east-west LRT.

--TramTrains have the versatility to provide Victoria-Langford rapid transit and Island-wide commuter and intercity rail. The RiverLINE operates over 55 km from Trenton to Camden with plans to extend it south to Glassboro, providing local and intercity service every 15 minutes each way in the peak periods and every 30 minutes in the off-peak.

--Evolving best practices combined with recent regulatory changes and waivers in the U.S. (Canada tends to follow U.S. practices) now permits lightweight TramTrain trainsets to be used in mixed traffic with conventional freight and passenger trains.

--While the E&N corridor for LRT and limited E&N commuter rail has been examined, TramTrain under the above parameters has not been studied.

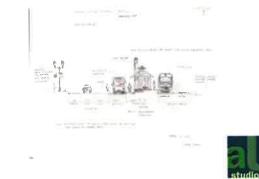



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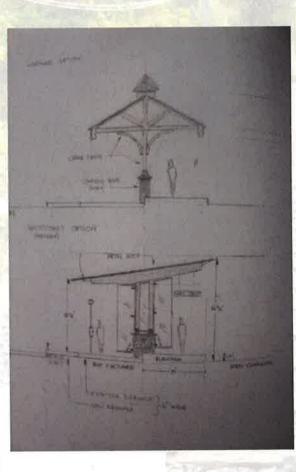
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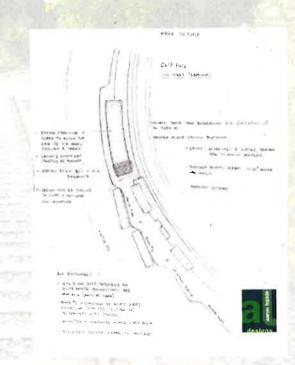


Drawings showing different types of station designs; modern and heritage.



Above a basic site map of what the station and bus exchange along Kimta Rd could look like.







Health, Well-Being and a Welcoming City

We want a healthy population in a healthy city within a healthy CRD. To achieve this we need be sure in our policies and language that we stop equating "medical" and "health." We need to focus on the promotion of wellness based on the World Health Organization's Social Determinants of Health:

- Clean air we are so fortunate to benefit from the clean air from the Pacific Ocean but need to do much more to reduce emissions, maybe significant fines for idling engines including those used or owned by the City, some 'parking for low or no emission vehicles' blocks at 25% the cost of other areas
- Clean water making progress but we need to ban bottled water and all microplastics. We also need to significantly reduce the waste of water, encouraging planting low water-use plants, accepting that grass naturally browns in the summer, set guidelines for everything from restricting water-greedy bathroom and kitchen fixtures to restrictions on in-unit washers, driers and dish washers.
- Nutritious food encourage boulevard gardening, maybe an annual prize in each neighbourhood?
- Social connections another good reason for shared use laundry facilities, food exchanges, boulevard veggie gardening etc. Anything that gets people together is a factor in safety and health.
- Safe housing whatever leads to social connections also supports safety.

By focusing on these determinants of health and the whole range of primary health care resources, including all the professions that focus on health and wellness, such as dieticians, social workers, kinesiologists we can reduce the dependency on very expensive and scare medical and surgical resources. When medical resources are needed, Nurse Practitioners offer the advantage of being aware of 'the whole person' and the community and providing almost the entire range of services provided by Family Physicians.

Can the City respond to opportunities to place Nurse Practitioners in community organizations? Can the City support attracting Nurse Practitioners rather than focusing on physicians who are not available and may not be ideal.

Can the City respond to community need for a wide range of health and wellness services for people who have no extended care plans.

My Goal is that in four years the City of Victoria will be a well governed, healthy, affordable, diverse community, keeping the best of our traditions and becoming environmentally responsible.
