E. PUBLIC AND STATUTORY HEARINGS

E.1 Proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan

Official Community Plan Bylaw, Amendment Bylaw (No. 30) 19-031:

The purpose of this Bylaw is to amend the Official Community Plan to make changes to Urban Place Designations and Development Permit Areas in order to implement directions in the Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan.

E.1.a Public Hearing & Consideration of Approval

Marc Cittone (Senior Planner): Provided information regarding the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan, the planning process, and the engagement process.

Mayor Helps opened the public hearing at 6:53 p.m.

Council discussed the following:

 How the plan has changed through engagement with the public and Council.

<u>Sean Lindenberg (Fairfield Road):</u> Expressed support for the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as they have incorporated the City plan well into Fairfield, and expressed the desire for increased density and affordability.

<u>Joe Calinda</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as it underuses the residential land.

<u>Jordan Anderson (Arnell Avenue)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the proposed increase of density in residential neighbourhoods.

<u>Vernon Andres (Fairfield Resident)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the need for a public space in Cook Street Village on Pendergast Street.

<u>Trully Aldridge (Fairfield Resident):</u> Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as the increased density will change the feel of the neighbourhood.

<u>Cathy Gregson (Fairfield Resident)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as the increased density will change the feel of the neighbourhood, as well as the lack of inclusion of community amenities.

<u>Jack Sandor (Fairfield Resident)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the need for increased density and affordability.

<u>Fairfield Resident</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the increased density.

<u>Fairfield Resident (Richardson Street):</u> Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as further work needs to be done on transportation and traffic calming.

<u>Gervais (Fairfield Resident)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the proposal for multi-story buildings and limited parking.

<u>Graeme Briggs (Linden Avenue)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as not all voices of the neighbourhood were captured during the engagement process and due to the need for additional density and affordability.

<u>Terry (Oliphant Avenue)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the need for additional density and affordability.

<u>Fairfield Resident:</u> Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the proposed multi-story buildings and their affect on the neighbourhood.

Rob Reed (Olive Street): Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan and the proposed density, as it will not create affordable housing, and due to the limited spaces in schools.

<u>Corinne (Arnold Avenue)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as the proposed multi-story buildings will change the character of the neighbourhood.

<u>Fairfield Resident</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as the proposed increase to density will change the character of the neighbourhood.

Wayne Hollohan (Fairfield Resident): Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the proposed setbacks,

Ron (Fairfield Resident): Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the increased height and density, and due to the limited parking.

<u>Mary Doody Jones (Giblins Street)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the proposed increase in density and potential loss of trees.

<u>Fairfield Resident (Burk Street)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the multi-story buildings proposed for Fairfield Plaza.

<u>Resident:</u> Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan due to the proposed increased density.

<u>Susan Smith (Linden Avenue)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as the proposed increase of density will not create affordability in the neighbourhood and due to the need for new community amenities to support an increase in density.

<u>Fairfield Resident (Arnold Avenue)</u>: Expressed concerns with the proposed Fairfield Neighbourhood Plan as the heritage buildings and feel of the neighbourhood need to be protected.

Council discussed the following:

 The rationale behind building further housing along Fairfield Road, setbacks in Cook Street Village, and proposed Official Community Plan density.

- How the plan will develop housing diversity.
- How the Inclusionary Housing Policy will work with the proposed increase in density.
