 - b. The application has been reviewed by the Victoria Police Department, Bylaw Services Division, and Sustainable Planning and Community Development Branch and there are no site-specific comments in terms of impacts on the community and the property has been zoned for retail sale of cannabis.
 - c. The views of residents were solicited through a mail-out to neighbouring property owners and occupiers within 100 metres of this address and to the relevant neighbourhood association. The City sent 136 letters and received 2 letters in response. Both letters share a concern about the sale of cannabis in this location. The City did not receive correspondence from the neighbourhood association.
 - d. A Delegated Development Permit is required to ensure alterations to the building exterior do not diminish the pedestrian experience and create safety concerns by obstructing the view from the sidewalk or street into the store.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council direct staff to provide the following response to the Liquor Licensing Agency:

 Council, after conducting a review with respect to noise and community impacts, does support the application of Leopold's Tavern located at 570 Yates Street having hours of operation from 9:00 am to 12:00 am daily with a total occupant load of 120 people (100 interior and 20 exterior, sidewalk café seats).

Providing the following comments on the prescribed considerations:

- a. The impact of noise on the community near the establishment was considered in relation to the request and noise impacts are expected to be proportional to existing licence capacity and associated noise levels in the vicinity. The applicant has requested a closing time of 12:00 am Sunday through Thursday and 1:00 am on Friday and Saturday, which is not fully supportable due to existing density of licenced seating in the area and higher than average calls for service related to noise and other impacts associated with late night entertainment.
- b. If the application is approved, the impact on the community is expected to be positive economically as the approval supports the business plan and long-term viability of the establishment.
- c. The views of residents were solicited via a mail out to neighbouring property owners and occupiers within 100 metres of the licensed location and a notice posted at the property. The City received five letters in response to the notification that went to 899 owners and occupants and all were opposed to the application which included one letter from the Downtown Residents Association.
- d. Council recommends the license be approved conditional on amending the closing hours to 12:00 am daily.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to seek a Council resolution, in accordance with the requirements of the *Liquor Control and Licensing Act*, regarding an application by Leopold's Tavern. The application is for a new Liquor Primary licence having hours of operation from 9:00 am to 12:00 am Sunday through Thursday and 9:00 am to 1:00 am Friday and Saturday with a total occupant load of 120 people (100 interior and 20 exterior, sidewalk café seats). Leopold's Tavern application was reviewed by City staff including Planning, Engineering, Business and Community Relations, Bylaw, and Police. In addition, a public notification process was conducted, as required by the Liquor Licence Policy, to invite public comments through written correspondence. The application was evaluated using City policy, comments provided by City staff, and comments received through the public notification process. The proposal has also been considered in the context of the local vicinity and the City as a whole, all of which are reflected in this report and the resulting recommendation.

Leopold's Tavern application is consistent with the City's Liquor License Policy; however, significant concern has been brought forward through the staff review of the application. The density of licenced seating in the area is significant, generating a higher than average number of calls for service according to police input. Complaints from residents are voiced frequently and are an issue in the area, and while only five letters were received in response to 899 notices, one was from the Downtown Residents Association, outlining their opposition to the application.

The initial proposal included hours from 9:00 am to 2:00 am daily and an occupant load of 134 people (100 interior and 34 exterior, sidewalk café seats). After reviewing staff comments and community feedback, the applicant currently proposes reduced hours from 9:00 am to 12:00 am Sunday through Thursday and 9:00 am to 1:00 am Friday and Saturday, and a reduced occupant load of 120 people (100 interior and 20 exterior, sidewalk café seats). The reduction in seating is reflective of dimensional limitations associated with the sidewalk café policy. The applicant has revised their application three times throughout the course of review and the most recent public notification reflects the current proposal.

The establishment could be licenced under a food primary licence which would entitle them to provide licenced service from 9:00 am to 12:00 am daily, and this licence would not involve referral to local government. The point of significance is that an establishment of any occupant load, not open past 12:00 am does not involve referral to local government, and is seen as a baseline for consideration even though the operational requirements of a food primary are different from a liquor primary. Consideration of staff comments and community impacts, and awareness of baseline potential, has resulted in a recommendation that does not support the applicants requested closing time of 1:00 am on Friday and Saturday. To limit impacts to residents in the area, staff recommend having overall hours of operation from 9:00 am to 12:00 am daily applicable to the combined occupant load of 120 people (100 interior and 20 exterior, sidewalk café seats).

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to seek a Council resolution, in accordance with the requirements of the *Liquor Control and Licensing Act* (the Act), regarding an application by Leopold's Tavern for a Liquor Primary licence.

BACKGROUND

The Liquor and Cannabis Regulations Branch (LCRB) issues liquor licences under the authority of the *Liquor Control and Licensing Act* and regulations. LCRB determines the category of licence appropriate or acceptable for the business based on submitted details. In the case of Leopold's Tavern, the operator is seeking a liquor primary licence. Liquor primary licences allow for a greater

level of operational flexibility where a focus on food service is not a condition of operation.

This application is for a liquor primary license for Leopold's Tavern and a letter of intent has been provided with information about the business model and is included as Appendix A.

Leopold's Tavern is seeking approval for hours of licensed service from 9:00 am to 12:00 am Sunday through Thursday and 9:00 am to 1:00 am Friday and Saturday with an occupant load of 120 people (100 interior and 20 exterior, sidewalk café seats). The LCRB is requesting a resolution from the City of Victoria regarding:

- 1. The impact of noise on nearby residents.
- 2. Impact on the community if the application is approved.

A map of the subject property and the immediate area is attached to this report (Appendix B) and illustrates the 100m public notification area targeted for comment.

ISSUES & ANALYSIS

The following sections identify key issues and provide analysis for Council's consideration:

Zoning

Zoning for the establishment is CBD-1, which permits "drinking establishment" and "restaurant" uses and imposes no restriction on hours or occupant loads. Compliance would be demonstrated through application for a building permit and the resulting construction verified for compliance through the City inspection process related to an issued building permit.

Noise Bylaw

The City's Noise Bylaw sets forth limits on four key areas within the City, which are the Quiet District, Intermediate District, Harbour Intermediate and Activity District. Leopold's Tavern is within the Intermediate Noise District and limited to 60dBA at the point of reception during daytime hours, which end at 10:00 pm. During nighttime hours, noise at the point of reception received is limited to 50dBA in Quiet districts, 55dBA in the Harbour Intermediate and Intermediate districts and 65dBA in the Activity district. 50dBA is comparable to rainfall, light traffic or a refrigerator and 60dBA is comparable to conversational speech or an air conditioner. Where issues of non-compliance exist, Bylaw Officers and Police have authority to order compliance.

The City of Victoria Noise District Map is included for reference (Appendix C).

Vicinity and Municipal Impacts

Predictability of noise related issues or other community impacts, negative or positive in effect, is challenging due to several variable factors. The business model, target clientele, quality of owner/operator, existing density of licenced capacity in the area, hours of service, demographics, and fluctuating populations due to tourism factor into predicting the likelihood of noise related issues and impacts on the community.

Consideration of those factors can assist a municipality to predict negative aspects associated with licenced establishments. The factors considered in conjunction with any application approval at time of consideration change over the life of a licenced establishment, and when they do change, and unanticipated issues arise, the fallback to re-establish compliance related to noise and other aspects is to use tools of enforcement. These tools include LCRB enforcement, which ensure responsible and appropriate service as required by the terms of the licence with LCRB. The Noise

Bylaw can be enforced to bring an establishment into compliance, and police have additional authority to bring an establishment back into compliance where issues are more complex.

Leopold's Tavern has been considered regarding the impact it would have on the community and its potential to generate noise related issues. The establishment proposes licencing under a liquor primary licence and has been compared in terms of existing capacity in the vicinity and citywide, for comparison and understanding of likely impact.

The recommended closing hours of 12:00 am daily limits the proportional impact based on existing occupant loads and hours. On Friday and Saturday nights on the 500 block of Yates Street, there are 698 licenced seats permitted to operate until 1:00 am. The makeup of the 698 seats is 510 Food Primary and 188 Liquor Primary seats. The applicant's requested occupant load of 120 people and hours represent a 17% increase in total licenced seating or a 64% increase in Liquor Primary seats on the 500 Block of Yates.

At the recommended closing hour of 12:00 am, there are 1136 licenced seats and the makeup of the 1136 seats is 948 Food Primary and 188 Liquor Primary seats. The recommended midnight closing is less impactful and represents a 10% increase in total licenced seating or a 64% increase in Liquor Primary seats on the 500 Block of Yates.

Patios on the 500 Block of Yates Street exist only in association with food primary establishments and all have hours common to both interior spaces and patios. Outdoor patio hours on the street are as follows; Fiamo Italian Kitchen and Dylan's Sports Bar are licenced until 2:00 am; El Furniture Warehouse is licenced until 1:00 am; and Ferris' Oyster Bar and Chuck's Burger Bar are licenced until 12:00 am. Other Liquor Primaries near the 500 Block of Yates Street have exterior service areas restricted to 11:00 pm.

Business and Community Relations, Bylaw and Police have noted the area as having higher than average numbers of calls for service and noise related issues. This establishment could operate as a food primary licence in which case there would be no referral to local government where the establishment was not open past midnight, and this is recognized as the baseline for potential impacts. Proposals for hours beyond midnight are an opportunity for local government to reduce impacts where appropriate.

Vicinity information is attached as Appendix D.

City Liquor Licensing Policy

The City's Liquor Licensing Policy directs staff to consider applications for liquor licences having hours of operation not later than 2:00 am. The applicable Council policy is attached to this report (Appendix E). The hours of licensed service proposed in this application are within the parameters of the policy.

City Referrals

An inter-departmental review of the project was undertaken and included circulation to Planning, Engineering, Community and Business Relations, Bylaw, and Police. That review resulted in the following feedback

Planning

 The application is supportable as the establishment is zoned appropriately for use as a drinking establishment.

Engineering

• Transportation related noise impacts or general community impact are not anticipated.

Community and Business Relations

 Community and Business Relations supports closing hours no later than 12:00 am daily and patio hours not later than 10:00 pm to support increased downtown vitality while managing resident impacts.

Bylaw

 Bylaw shared concerns regarding the applicant's proposal and supports the recommended midnight closing time.

<u>Police</u>

 Police do not support the application due to existing issues in the area related to density of licenced establishments and late-night entertainment. Full police comments are available in Appendix F.

The original application proposed an exterior patio with a 34 person occupant load which was updated due to dimensional restrictions of the Sidewalk Café permit. The proposal is now for a reduced exterior, patio occupant load of 20 people, and 100 indoors for a total occupant load of 120 people.

Community and Business Relations recommend that patio hours are restricted to 10:00 pm daily to support increased downtown vitality while managing residential impacts. This is not reflected in the recommendation as the occupant load on the patio is small, limited public concern was expressed as a result of the public notification, and no other patio on the 500 Block of Yates Street has closing hours imposed that are less than midnight. Additionally, this operator or other new establishments could operate under a food primary licence in which case the patio could operate until midnight with no referral to local government. For these reasons, it is thought to be consistent with other approvals and likely to have minimal cumulative impacts to having closing hours of midnight for the 20 person patio.

Community Consultation

In accordance with the City's Liquor Licensing Fee Bylaw and Liquor Licensing Policy, all property owners and occupiers within 100 metres of the applicant's location were solicited by a mailed notice to provide input regarding this application. In addition, Leopold's Tavern displayed a notice poster at the entrance for 30 days, which invited input to the City with respect to this application.

Five letters were received in response, all of which were opposed, and included one from the Downtown Residents' Association. Letters were sent to 899 owners and occupants within 100 metres of the establishment, and response letters are available in Appendix G.

Applicant Response

As is standard practice as a part of the liquor licence process, after City staff gives input, the applicant has a chance to review the information (and this report) and respond prior to the report being forwarded to Council. The applicant was notified of concerns brought forward through the City Staff review pertaining to the hours proposed in the 500 block of Yates Street. The applicant responded and has reduced the initially proposed hours of 9:00 am to 2:00 am daily to 9:00 am to 12:00 am Sunday through Thursday and 9:00 am to 1:00 am Friday and Saturday. These reduced hours are proposed to be common to both interior and exterior service areas.

Following public notification, the applicant was again given opportunity to review this report including community feedback and the applicant chose to provide additional correspondence. The applicant does not support the recommendation and has provided rationale for their position This correspondence is available in Appendix H.

IMPACTS

Accessibility Impact Statement

The establishment is accessible at ground level and meets accessibility requirements of the BC Building Code.

Strategic Plan 2019 - 2022

The recommendation to support the application is likely to increase the viability of the business as a local employer, which is consistent with Strategic Objective #4 – *Prosperity and Economic Inclusion*.

Impacts to Financial Plan

None

Official Community Plan

The proposed license is consistent with the *Official Community Plan* objectives for this neighbourhood as the property is located within the Core Historic District which permits commercial and mixed uses.

CONCLUSIONS

The application for a new liquor primary licence is supportable where hours of operation are from 9:00 am to 12:00 am daily with a total occupant load of 120 people (100 people indoors and 20 people on the patio). Staff and community concern make the applicant's proposed 1:00 am closing time on Friday and Saturday nights unsupportable due to density of licenced capacity in the area and above average levels of calls for service and noise related issues associated with late night entertainment. The site is appropriately zoned for the use, is consistent with current City policy, and staff's recommended amendment to hours of operation are in keeping with other establishments in the area. Staff recommend for Council's consideration that a resolution be made supporting the hours of operation from 9:00 am to 12:00 am for Leopold's Tavern.

ALTERNATE MOTIONS

- 1. Council could also support the application of Leopold's Tavern as requested having licenced hours of 9:00 am to 12:00 am Sunday through Thursday and 9:00 am to 1:00 am Friday and Saturday, and an occupant load of 120 people (100 people indoors and 20 people on the patio).
- 2. That Council, after conducting a review with respect to noise and community impacts regarding the application of Leopold's Tavern, at 570 Yates Street, does not support the application.

LETTER OF INTENT FOR THE APPLICATION FOR A LIQUOR PRIMARY LICENCE

INTRODUCTION/PRIMARY FOCUS

This Letter of Intent is provided in support of the application submitted to the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch and the City of Victoria for a Liquor Primary Licence called Leopold's Tavern. The establishment is located in the Downtown area of Victoria on Yates Street near Government Street. This location is a great central location that serves not only the Downtown area, but has great links to Victoria West, Harris Green and North Park.

The proposed areas for licensing consist of the main bar area, patio and the corridor leading to the washrooms.

The estimated total occupancy is 120 patrons and staff inclusive of 20 person patio.

Included with the application is a copy of the proposed floor plan for this venue.

The maximum hours of liquor sales and service requested for this application are 9:00am to 12:00am, Sunday through Thursday and 9am to 1am on Friday and Saturday.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE SERVICE

Leopold's Tavern is a unique food and beverage environment with an extensive menu of hot and cold items with appetizers, entrees & desserts. The menu is based around homemade comfort food, with different daily specials.

Beverages range from local craft beers, wine, coolers, spirits and non-alcoholic soft drinks.

SITE LOCATION

The proposed licensed establishment is in a well-known part of town that has a mix of restaurants, coffee shops, offices, tourist attractions and clothing stores. The vibrant neighbourhood attracts both the residents of Greater Victoria and the tourists looking to enjoy the picturesque views in this historic commercial district.

As the establishment is located close to Government Street leading down to the waterfront, this will provide a significant amount of foot traffic. It is also located a short distance to the Johnson Street Bridge, the docks on David Foster Way and Wharf area.

COMPOSITION OF THE NEIGHBOURHOOD

The proposed licensed establishment is located on Yates Street, in Downtown Victoria. The site is in the historic commercial district. The following is a list of the social facilities and public buildings in the immediate area of the site:

- Federal Government Office Correctional Service of Canada, Transport Canada
- Pacific Rim College
- Victoria Academy of Dramatic Arts
- McPherson Playhouse
- City Hall

Attached are maps of the area showing the proposed establishment, and the identified social facilities and public buildings in the area.

The liquor primary licence will not impact negatively on these facilities and public buildings for the follow reasons:

- The establishment management will not permit the facility to impact negatively on the community and the nearby social facilities and public buildings;
- The area is a commercial district with other restaurants and liquor establishments nearby, so the impact to the local community is minimal;

 The applicant has multiple locations across Canada, so is experienced in running Liquor Primary establishments; and

IMPACT OF NOISE ON THE COMMUNITY

The establishment will be conscious of the City of Victoria Noise Control Bylaw, and will make sure that noise is kept to a minimum. The City will assess this when the application is reviewed.

This is a neighbourhood pub style establishment and not a night club, so the ethos is to provide a relaxed and homely style atmosphere that caters to people who wish to enjoy local food and drink.

TARGET MARKET

This proposed liquor primary licensed establishment will primarily cater to adults nineteen (19) years of age and older, however minors will be allowed until 8pm when escorted by an adult. The target markets are the residents of City of Victoria, along with its many visitors. The establishment will cater to a broad target with mixed occupations who may be enjoying a family meal or drinks with friends.

HOSPITALITY/TOURISM DEVELOPMENT FACTORS

The proposed establishment will support the hospitality/tourism development factors by adding a different type of establishment to Yates Street. The current establishments that are located on this street are mainly clothing stores, coffee shops and restaurants.

BENEFITS TO THE COMMUNITY

There will be many positive benefits to the community as the establishment will be a destination for patrons wanting to enjoy food and beverages in a relaxed setting. The benefits will also include:

- Tax revenue to all levels of Government;
- Direct and indirect employment opportunities for residents of Victoria;
- Provide an interesting and exciting new venue for family events, fundraisers, and community events;
- A community safety initiative to encourage people to appoint designated drivers, or alternative ways to get home safely and without drinking and driving; and
- Local charity support, which is something the applicant is currently involved in across the other areas where they operate.

TRAFFIC IN THE VICINITY

The proposed venue will not impact negatively on traffic as this is already a destination that patrons visit to go for dinner or visit shops. It is in the core Downtown area with existing vehicle and foot traffic.

PARKING

There is a parkade directly across the street at Bastion Square Parkade 575 Yates Street that has 361 parking spaces. There are also additional parkades approximately 122 metres, 150 metres and 190 metres from the establishment location.

There is also limited on street parking available along Yates Street and the surrounding area.

PROXIMITY TO OTHER LIQUOR PRIMARY LICENSED ESTABLISHMENTS

The closest Liquor Primary licensed establishments are:

- Yates Street Taphouse & Grill, 759 Yates Street
- Irish Times Pub, 1200 Government Street

The proposed Liquor Primary Licence for Leopold's Tavern will not impact on the above licensed establishments as they are not in direct proximity and at least 100 metres apart.

OTHER FACTORS

- The addition of a Liquor Licence to the establishment will contribute to the tourism, and hospitality in the community;
- Liquor service will be provided to only adults, and no minors will be permitted; and
- The licensed taverns that the applicant has in Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba have not had any problems in the past. They have a good reputation within these provinces.

Sidewalk Café Guidelines

Sidewalk cases add vibrancy to our community and provide a welcoming place for people to meet, relax and dine. They can transform our streets by creating energy and drawing people into the area.

In the City of Victoria, sidewalk café I censes allow businesses to expand their restaurant or café to provide outdoor seating in some public spaces including sidewalks. The sidewalk café guidelines are intended to clarify and provide standards for sidewalk cafes in order to enhance the quality and safety of the pedestrian experience and to encourage economic vitality and street activity.

General

The main function of sidewalks is to support the movement of people throughout the city.

- Locations and design of sidewalk cafés should enhance the pedestrian experience along s dewalks and not negatively impact the movement of people or vehicles in the area.
- A sidewalk café can be allowed only if its location and construction will maintain a safe, secure and comfortable environment for pedestrians using the public right-of-way.
- A sidewalk café should reinforce the character of the area. The design and materials should respect the setting of the surrounding streetscape, buildings and neighbourhood.
- Sidewalk cafes should not negatively impact key public view corridors noted in other City policies.

Open Appearance

Sidewalk cafes should have an open appearance and contribute to a feeling of witrancy and activity on the street. Sidewalk cafes cannot be fully enclosed. While it is important that Sidewalk Cafes contribute to street vitality, it is equally important that they do not cause noise issues, particularly at night. To ensure that Sidewalk Cafes comply with the Noise Bylaw, applicants may be required to provide more information, such as a noise assessment report, and/or make design changes to mittigate potential noise issues.

Maintain Accessibility

Sidewalk cafes should be designed to be accessible both inside the café and in the surrounding areas.

- A minimum horizontal clearance of 1.5 m from the sidewalk café to the nearest sidewalk obstruction, such as a tree, bike rack, sign post, utilifty pole, bench, portable sign or bus shelter, is required to allow pedestrian passageway. A clearance greater than 1.5 m may be required in high pedestrian flow areas. The clearances for pedestrian passageway should remain as straight and clear as possible
- Access and passageway for pedestrians must only be on sidewalks or hardscaped surfaces for pedestrian safety and to avoid damage to grass, trees, and other vegetation. Access and passageway must not include tree grate surfaces or other tree well areas covered by pavers or other material.
- Unless the sidewalk café has permission

to occupy the adjacent parking stall, a minimum clearance of 1.0 m from the nearest curb is required to separate the sidewalk caté from traffic and parked cars. A distance greater than 1.0 m may be required in high traffic areas to ensure public safety.

Maintenance and Operations

The business with the sidewalk café licence is responsible for its maintenance.

- The business holding the license is responsible for the proper maintenance of the sidewalk cafe at all times, including repairs, painting, cleaning, and hazards.
- No cooking is allowed in the sidewalk café area.
- Trash receptacles are not permitted within the sidewalk café area.
- All objects associated with a sidewalk cafe such as furnishings, awnings, umbrellas, signage, lighting, and planters should be located within the sidewalk cafe area at all times with no parts overhanging outside of the area.
- Sidewalk cafés may be built only in locations where they do not obstruct access to public utilities, service connections, access for emergency vehicles and exits from buildings

Maintenance and Operations, continued

- A sidewalk café must not obstruct delivery access to buildings.
- Sidewalk cafes must not obstruct access to hanging basket lamp poles.
- The design must promote visibility to passing traffic and maintain clear sightlines at intersections and crossings.
- The design, location, and area of the sidewalk café must not adversely affect boulevard vegetation such as grass and trees or prevent City access and maintenance.
- Trees which have tree grates or other tree well areas covered by pavers and other materials should not be included in a sidewalk café area without additional fencing to keep patrons and site furniture away from these areas.
- Roadway and curb drainage must be maintained
- All objects fixed in place, such as fences and railings, must be of significant strength yet allow easy removal within two working days
- A removable deck may be approved if there is a need to level a steep incline (more than 5%) or to harmonize indoor and outdoor seating levels.

Impacts to Neighbouring Trees and Boulevards

Consideration for neighbouring trees and boulevards should be taken into account with the design of sidewalk cases.

- A sidewalk café must not cause damage to a street tree.
- No items including, but not limited to, signage, banners and lighting may be hung, attached, draped or affixed to a street tree.
- No liquids or cleaning products shall be dumped, allowed to flow or to drain in to a tree well or City drains.

 No pesticide or fertilizer applications shall be applied to street trees

Furnishing

- Furnishings such as tables, chairs, and accessories should be moveable and of a solid weight for stability.
- Furnishings should be commercial grade, safe, sturdy, durable material and manufactured for outdoor use
- All furnishings and accessories must be contained within the perimeter of the sidewalk café area.
- Furnishings must be limited to dining purposes only (e.g. tables, chairs, and accessories) and not obstruct the entrance to the café.

Weather Protection

- Awnings should be mounted on a removable wall bracket and be retractable
- Weather protection, such as awnings, umbrellas or other similar solutions should be constructed of flame-resistant and fade-resistant canvas.

Heating

- Heaters must not be placed within the dripline and/or closer than 2 metres from any part of adjacent street trees
- The visual impact of heating devices/ systems should be considered and arranged to be as unobtrusive as possible.
- All outdoor heating devices should be appropriate for use in a sidewalk cafe and complement the character of the business to which it is associated
- All outdoor heating devices must conform to safety standards established by the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and certified by Underwriters' Laboratories of Canada (ULC), where necessary

Lighting and Signage

Lighting flatures should complement the character of the business

- Lighting levels should be low and directed into the café rather than out towards the street.
- Light fixtures should complement the character of the business to which it is associated
- No signage or third party advertising, other than for the business operating the café, is permitted.

Use of Adjacent Parking Stall


Cafés or restaurants may apply to the City to use an adjacent parking stall for a sidewalk cafe. In these cases, the following guidelines apply in addition to the guidelines above.


A sidewalk café must:

- Provide a one metre buffer between the outer edge of the sidewalk café and adjacent travel lane and should not extend more than 2.5 m from the curb into the street
- Have railings that are a minimum of 1.07 m in height from curb elevation on all sides that are exposed to the street with reflectors for visibility to traffic.
- Only be located where permanent parking or loading is permitted, it must not occupy a lane used by moving traffic at any time
- Provide adequate space to allow vehicle access to adjacent parking stalls
- Not be located on a street exceeding a running slope of 5%.

These guidelines provide guidance to applicants and City staff when reviewing applications. For further detail, please refer to the Sidewalk Café Bylaw (No. 16-038). Additional City Permits may be required.








1 LEO'S VICTORIA LAYOUT








A. PURPOSE

The purpose of the City of Victoria's Liquor Licensing Policy is to provide direction to the following parties:

- 1. Liquor licence applicants on the process and fees associated with City of Victoria review of applications;
- 2. Liquor Control and Licencing Board (LCBC) on the types of applications that the City will opt-out of providing comment on; and
- 3. City staff on application review and public notification criteria for those types of liquor licence applications that require review by Council and opportunity for the public to comment.

B. POLICY STATEMENTS

- 1. This policy applies to liquor license applications in the City of Victoria.:
- 2. The city will opt out of the review and comment requirements for the following types of applications;
 - a. Liquor Primary with licensed service up to 10:00 pm and having an occupant load less than 31 persons.
 - b. Manufacturer with Lounge Endorsement, Special Event Area, or Picnic Area with licensed service up to 10:00 pm and having an occupant load less than 31 persons.
 - c. A temporary extension to hours of licensed service for all licence types up to 3:00 am on New Year's Eve.
 - d. The addition of an Entertainment Endorsement to any Food Primary with licensed service up to 12:00 am.
- 3. The City of Victoria generally does not approve the extension of liquor service past 2:00 am, with the exception of New Year's Eve, which allows for service up to 3:00 am. In extraordinary cases, the City may consider short term or one time provisions for allowing liquor service between 2:00 am and 9:00 am to accommodate international sporting or significant cultural events.



C. PROCEDURES

A business engaging in the manufacture, sale or service of liquor must have a City of Victoria Business License to lawfully conduct its businesses.

The provincial government, through the Liquor Control and Licencing Branch, is the first and last point of contact for businesses interested in applying for a liquor licence.

The application process and related fees will be made available to any business or member of the public through the internet or by request.

For any liquor applications where the City of Victoria has not opted out of providing comment, the following provisions apply:

- 1. Public notification for comment will be placed at the site for a period no less than 30 days.
- 2. The City will provide public notification through mailed notice to all residents and businesses within a 100 metre radius.
- 3. The City will provide notification to the applicable community association.
- 4. When providing comment on an application, the City will include comments on those aspects within the parameters set by LCLB which currently include:
 - a. Noise impacts in the immediate vicinity of the establishment;
 - b. Impact on the community if approved (including the location of the establishment and person capacity and hour of liquor service of the establishment)
 - c. Confirm that the establishment is being operated in a manner that is consistent with its primary purpose (only for food primary)

D. ENFORCEMENT POLICY

Businesses that have a history of non-compliance with local and provincial government bylaws and legislation or re-occurring nuisance issues may be subject to a Good Neighbour Agreement that will be reviewed along with the annual renewal of a business licence. Lack of adherence to this agreement may result in a business licence being revoked. This will be assessed by staff on a case by case basis.

The application for "Leopold's Tavern" is for a new liquor primary licence.

The location, 570 Yates St, falls within an area populated with numerous other licensed establishments. The immediate area (500 block Yates St) is mixed-use, comprised of retail, government, food/restaurant, residential, and office/commercial. The area is one which generates an unusually high call-volume for police (721 calls for service for the past 12 months, the period June 18, 2018 to June 18, 2019) This does however include two unrelated 'hot spots'. Taking out these two 'hot spots' brings that total from 721 down to 373. However, those numbers are still relevant when considering the impacts on this particular neighbourhood and the residents that live here.

The addition of a new liquor primary establishment contributes to liquor-related disorder and calls-for-service later into the night. The effects that could be attributed specifically to this application are difficult to predict or determine. Documented issues are rarely assigned specifically to one address, but are commonly tagged to the block in which the incident(s) occur.

There is some history for this particular address when it operated with a liquor licence in the past, however, there have been significant additions to the residential population in the block and immediately surrounding area.

VicPD cannot support an application for a new liquor-primary establishment. An increase in the total liquor seats and/or hours equates to a greater demand on police resources, resulting in decreased level of service to the community. Current service and staffing levels cannot manage any further increase to liquor-related calls for service. VicPD is already heavily reliant on funding through the Late Night Task Force to meet even the most basic operational needs in the downtown core during the busy liquor hours (evening through to the early morning hours). There is no additional operational capacity to handle the increased call load that would result from this application, similar applications, and the incremental effect that they have collectively.

Dear Mayor Helps and Council,

The DRA Land Use Committee has reviewed the application for a new Liquor Primary Licence for Leopold's Tavern at 570 Yates Street. It is our understanding that the applicant is seeking hours of operation from 9:00 am to 2:00 am daily with an occupant load of 100 persons inside with no exterior seating.

Feedback from the committee is as follows:

- Lucky Bar and Fiamo are the only late night liquor or food primary liquor establishments currently operating on the 500-block of Yates St that are open until 2:00 am. Both of these establishments were in business prior to any residential development on the block.
- Steamers Pub previously operated on the ground floor of 570 Yates St, the same location proposed for Leopold's Tavern, and operated from 1993 to 2007. In 2007, with a plan to develop residential units in the upper floors, the owner cited "obvious incompatible uses" between the residential units and a pub. Subsequently, Steamers Pub was permanently closed in December 2007 and the ground level premises were converted to retail.
- Approximately 75 new residential units have been created within the 500-block of Yates St since 2008; with more than half of those located at 570 Yates St and the neighbouring building.
- With the building on the N.W. corner of Government and Yates currently listed for sale, there is the potential for the addition of even more residential units.
- The insertion of a new late night liquor establishment within a residential building will create conflict between operators and residents.
- Under BC's Terms and Conditions for Liquor Primary Licences, live entertainment is permitted. Since there are residences above the proposed tavern, if this licence is granted, live entertainment should either be prohibited, or should be required to end by 10:00 pm as a condition of issuance of the licence.

- There have been a great number of applications for extended hours for food primary licences downtown recently, including at 538 Yates St. However, there is no City policy that applies within the downtown area regarding the siting of late night liquor establishments and proximity to residential development or vice versa.
- No City policy exists requiring residential developments to achieve mandatory standards of "sound transmission class" (soundproofing) for developments constructed within the "entertainment" areas of Downtown.
- No City policy exists requiring late night liquor operators to achieve mandatory standards
 of "sound transmission class" (soundproofing) between licenced spaces and residential
 units.
- The current COV noise bylaw is not suited to govern in cases of noise generated by liquor establishments.

The DRA LUC points out that the introduction of late night liquor outlets in established residential areas (or vice versa) has the potential to be highly problematic. This ongoing situation requires comprehensive policies be created to address and mitigate potential conflicts BEFORE they may arise. Certainly with the focus of much of the regional growth strategy on densifying the downtown area with many more thousands of residents, the need for such a policy is acute.

Lower Yates is, and has been, home to long-established, late-night clubs and restaurants (as well as several restaurants that are <u>not</u> open past midnight). Steamers was a long-established pub that operated mid-block for over a decade. The owner of the building that housed Steamers decided to convert the building to rental apartments and recognized that a pub and residences were completely incompatible, so the lease was terminated and Steamers shut down permanently. Establishing a late night liquor outlet again in the same location would undermine those efforts to provide a liveable environment for residents that have now established their homes on the block.

The DRA LUC points out that introducing late night activities into a residential area "after the fact" should be considered through a different and much more powerful lens. The alternative will simply be setting the residents and operators up for the inevitable but avoidable conflicts. Thank you for your comments regarding an application for a new liquor primary licence for Leopold's Tavern at 570 Yates Street. On August 1st, staff were made aware that the public notification you previously received did not reflect amendments made by the applicant since the original notice was sent.

Leo's Liquor Primary Application – Applicant's response

The applicant is pleased that the staff of the City of Victoria are generally recommending approval of the application. However, we disagree with the proposed restricted hours of operation.

The applicant feels strongly that they should have the right to remain competitive with other similarly licensed establishments within the area that are open until 1am, 1:30am or 2am. Leopold's operates pub style establishments all over Canada, and they want to bring their concept to Victoria. The location they chose was previously licenced as Steamers Pub which had licenced hours of 11am to 2am seven days a week.

Originally we wanted similar hours to the other establishments in the area, but have agreed to reduce the hours based on the initial staff recommendation. The current zoning allows for a Liquor Primary establishment and allows for a 1am close. It's important to note that an earlier closure may also cause patrons to move to other establishments in the area which are open later and may already be at full capacity. This only promotes overcrowding and people on the streets. The best strategy for Cities is to have the same closing hours for all establishments so patrons just go home at closing time. If the hours are approved as proposed in this report, the applicant may have to consider moving their business to another municipality in order be in competition with the other similar pub establishments.

With respect to the police comments, we understand there may be challenges with other establishments, however the applicant should not be penalised for issues with other licensees. If one has a rotten apple in a basket you deal with that apple but don't stop placing other apples in the basket.

It should be noted that there has been a new decrease in Liquor Primary licenced seats in this area with the cancellation of the Plaza Hotel Licence earlier this year at 603 Pandora Ave. This establishment had a capacity of 225 persons and closing hours of 1.30am Monday to Saturday and 12 midnight on Sunday.

Applicant will also be writing directly to the Mayor and Members of Council to discuss this in further detail prior to the Committee of the Whole meeting on October 3, 2019.

Types of Liquor Licences Issued in the Province of British Columbia

Last updated: October 5, 2017

The Liquor Control and Licensing Branch (LCLB) supervises over 10,200 licensed establishments and over 25,000 temporary special events per year in B.C.

The purpose of this document is to give a broad understanding of the types of liquor licences issued in B.C. Visit the LCLB's website at www.gov.bc.ca/liquorregulationandlicensing and the hyperlinks below for the most up to date information.

Licences:

Agent – for independent liquor agents who market products from liquor manufacturers outside of B.C.

<u>Catering</u> – for catering companies who wish to serve liquor in addition to food, with food service as the primary purpose.

Food Primary – for businesses where the primary purpose is to serve food (such as restaurants).

A Patron Participation Endorsement is an additional term and condition on a food primary licence that permits the active involvement of patrons in entertainment or results in patrons leaving their seats, such as dancing or karaoke. An application for this endorsement requires additional considerations beyond the routine assessment of an initial application. To ensure that community concerns about noise, nuisance and other impacts are considered, input from local government or First Nation authorities is required before patron participation entertainment will be approved for a food primary establishment.

<u>Liquor Primary</u> – for businesses where the primary purpose is to sell liquor (such as bars, pubs, and nightclubs, as well as stadiums, theatres, aircraft, etc.). Liquor primary licences are also for businesses that wish to serve liquor as an additional service to their primary business (such as spas, salons, art galleries, etc.)

Liquor Primary Club — a sub-class of the liquor primary licence for private clubs. To be eligible to apply, the club must be a society registered under the provincial Societies Act or a non-profit or veterans organization incorporated by special act of parliament. LP Clubs must have at least 50 members who pay annual fees. The service area of an LP Club is restricted to members and guests only.

<u>Manufacturer</u> – for businesses making wine, cider, beer (this includes brew pubs), or spirits (known as wineries, breweries, and distilleries). Manufacturers can also apply to add a lounge, special event area, and/or picnic area endorsement to their manufacturer licence.

<u>UBrew/UVin (Ferment-on-Premises)</u> – for businesses that sell ingredients, equipment and provide advice for customers to make their own beer, wine, cider or coolers.

<u>Licensee Retail Store*</u> – for selling liquor by the bottle at retail stores (often called private liquor stores).

<u>Wine Store*</u> – for wine stores including winery-operated stores, independent wine stores, VQA stores and tourist wine stores.

<u>Special Wine Store</u> – available to eligible grocery stores only, the special wine store licence permits the sale of 100% BC wine on grocery store shelves.

*No new licences are available at this time.

Permits:

<u>Special Event Permit</u> – for individuals and groups holding special events (such as community celebrations, weddings or banquets).

Ethyl Alcohol Purchase Permit – for purchasing ethyl alcohol for commercial and industrial use.

<u>Charitable Auction Permit</u> – for registered charities and non-profit organizations that wish to hold liquor auctions to raise funds for a charitable purpose.

What is the difference between a food primary and a liquor primary licence?

A food primary licence is issued when the primary purpose of the business is the service of food (such as restaurants and cafes). A liquor primary licence is issued when the primary purpose of the business is the service of liquor, hospitality or entertainment (such as bars, pubs, spas, and art galleries).

The approval process is different for both types of licences, with the process for liquor primaries being more involved. Minors are generally prohibited from liquor primary establishments, unless the licence specifically allows them.



Dear Mayor Helps and Council,

With regards to a Liquor Primary Application for Leopold's Tavern at 570 Yates Street, the DRA Land Use Committee understands the following:

- The application has been revised with regards to hours of operation, occupancy and the addition of an outdoor patio.
- The applicant is seeking hours of operation from 9:00 am to 12:00 am Sunday to Thursday and 9:00 am to 1:00 am Friday and Saturday with a total occupant load of 120 persons with 100 allocated to the interior and 20 to an outdoor patio.
- The Staff report to Council recommends hours of operation 9:00 am to 12:00 am daily with a total occupant load of 120 people (100 interior and 20 exterior, sidewalk cafe seats).

Feedback in response to the revisions, specifically, include:

- We applaud and support Staff's efforts to address some of the impacts this
 operation may have on the community by recommending restricted hours of
 operation from 1am to 12 am daily.
- Since the patio will be located under residents' windows, we also request that that the patio close at 10pm daily.

The original feedback from the committee remains relevant to this application so it has been updated and included below:

- Lucky Bar and Fiamo are the only late night liquor or food primary liquor establishments currently operating on the 500-block of Yates St that are open until 2:00 am. Both of these establishments were in business prior to any residential development on the block.
- Steamers Pub previously operated on the ground floor of 570 Yates St, the same location proposed for Leopold's Tavern, and operated from 1993 to 2007. In 2007, with a plan to develop residential units in the upper floors, the owner cited "obvious incompatible uses" between the residential units and a pub. Subsequently, Steamers Pub was permanently closed in December 2007 and the ground level premises were converted to retail.
- Approximately 75 new residential units have been created within the 500-block of Yates St since 2008; with more than half of those located at 570 Yates St and the neighbouring building.
- With the building on the N.W. corner of Government and Yates recently changing ownership, there is the potential for the addition of even more residential units.
- The insertion of a new late night liquor establishment within a residential building will create conflict between operators and residents.
- Under BC's Terms and Conditions for Liquor Primary Licences, live
 entertainment is permitted. Since there are residences above the proposed
 tavern, if this licence is granted, live entertainment should either be prohibited, or
 should be required to end by 10:00 pm as a condition of issuance of the licence.
- There have been a great number of applications for extended hours for food primary licences downtown recently, including at 538 Yates St. However, there is no City policy that applies within the downtown area regarding the siting of late night liquor establishments and proximity to residential development or vice versa.
- No City policy exists requiring residential developments to achieve mandatory standards of "sound transmission class" (soundproofing) for developments constructed within the "entertainment" areas of Downtown.
- No City policy exists requiring late night liquor operators to achieve mandatory standards of "sound transmission class" (soundproofing) between licenced spaces and residential units.
- The current COV noise bylaw is not suited to govern in cases of noise generated by liquor establishments.

The DRA LUC points out that the introduction of late night liquor outlets in established residential areas (or vice versa) has the potential to be highly problematic. This ongoing situation requires comprehensive policies be created to address and mitigate potential conflicts BEFORE they may arise. Certainly with the focus of much of the regional growth strategy on densifying the downtown area with many more thousands of residents, the need for such a policy is acute.

Lower Yates is, and has been, home to long-established, late-night clubs and restaurants (as well as several restaurants that are <u>not</u> open past midnight). Steamers was a long-established pub that operated mid-block for over a decade. The owner of the building that housed Steamers decided to convert the building to rental apartments and recognized that a pub and residences were completely incompatible, so the lease was terminated and Steamers shut down permanently. Establishing a late night liquor outlet again in the same location would undermine those efforts to provide a liveable environment for residents that have now established their homes on the block.

The DRA LUC points out that introducing late night activities into a residential area "after the fact" should be considered through a different and much more powerful lens. The alternative will simply be setting the residents and operators up for the inevitable but avoidable conflicts. DRA LUC members strongly support a vibrant downtown that includes late night drinking establishments but cannot support liquor service beyond midnight on the weekends with earlier weekday closings at a brand new liquor primary establishment co-located with many pre-existing residences.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve the removal of the following boulevard from the Taxed Boulevard Program effective for the 2020 tax year:

1. South side of Richardson Street between Harbinger Avenue and Cornwall Street.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bylaw No. 19-042, attached as Attachment A, establishes a boulevard tax for the cost of maintenance of boulevards in the City of Victoria. Participation in the program is optional with residents having the opportunity to withdraw from the program by presenting Council with a petition signed by a minimum of two-thirds of the property owners representing a minimum two-thirds of the assessed value on the block.

The residents of the south side of Richardson Street between Harbinger Avenue and Cornwall Street have successfully petitioned for the removal of their block from the Taxed Boulevard Program. It should be noted that 665 Harbinger Avenue and 1255 Richardson Street are corner lots and this removal is for the Richardson Street frontage only.

Each removal has a financial impact on the City's boulevard maintenance program. This removal is estimated to reduce program revenue by approximately \$463.38 for this block (based on 2019 property taxes) and is a reduction in the City's cost to provide the service.

Copies of the certification of petition and a map of the areas affected are attached as Attachments B and C.

NO. 19-042

A BYLAW OF THE CITY OF VICTORIA

The purpose of this Bylaw is to assess the cost of maintenance of boulevards in the City.

Under its statutory powers, including sections 12(1) and (4) of the *Victoria City Act, 1920* and section 259 of the *Community Charter*, the Council of The Corporation of the City of Victoria, in an open meeting assembled, enacts the following provisions:

- 1. This Bylaw may be cited as the "BOULEVARD TAX BYLAW, 2019"
- 2. For the purpose of providing the required sum for the year 2019 to defray the cost of maintenance and upkeep of the boulevards on all streets in the City of Victoria on which boulevards are maintained, the owner or occupier of any real property or any portion of real property which fronts and abuts upon any boulevard maintained by the City must pay an annual rate for 2019 of \$2.50 per m² of boulevard area upon which the real property or portion of real property fronts and abuts.
- 3. The rates imposed under this Bylaw must be imposed and collected with the annual general taxes for 2019 as a "Boulevard Tax," and are due and payable on the same date as the annual general taxes.
- 4. The rates and any interest on them, imposed under this bylaw must be specially charged as taxes on the real property for which the owner or occupier is made chargeable, as provided in section 259 of the *Community Charter*.
- 5. Bylaw No 18-054 the Boulevard Tax Bylaw, 2018, is repealed.



RECOMMENDATION

That Council direct staff to:

1. Maintain the City's current approach for the Canada Day celebrations and increase the special event operations budget by \$107,000 in the 2020 financial planning process to account for new police charges previously covered through the Police Board budget.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City has been organizing Canada Day celebrations since 2006. The majority of costs have been recovered through corporate sponsorships, with the City's taxpayers funding remaining costs such as traffic control, street cleaning and policing.

For 2019, Council approved one-time funding to cover policing costs for special events, including Canada Day. Council has yet to consider allocating funding for 2020. The event requires significant effort to organize and, to ensure successful delivery, should Council wish to continue with a similar event as in past years, a funding decision is requested. This report also outlines an alternative option for Council's consideration.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide background for Council on the history and specifics pertaining to the City's role in programming annual Canada Day celebrations and seek direction on how to proceed for 2020.

BACKGROUND

Canada Day Celebrations in the Inner Harbour have been a fixture on the summer event calendar for nearly 50 years. For more than 30 years the Inter-Cultural Association of Greater Victoria (ICA) produced Folkfest as a way for a variety of groups to come together to share their cultural heritage with the community at-large. Canada Day was programmed as an extension of Folkfest by ICA until 2006.

The City assumed the responsibility for Canada Day celebrations in 2006. Over the past 14 iterations of the celebration, City staff, one Council representative and a succession of contracted local event production companies have successfully collaborated with event partners and stakeholders to shift the culture of the event towards the more inclusive and family friendly event it is today.

With a program that features a wide variety of activities and performances, appealing to attendees of all demographics, Victoria's Canada Day is the single largest free public celebration in Victoria each year. Featuring community-centred activities like the Living Flag (Canada's original and largest), the musically acclaimed main stage, and Flavour of Canada Food Village featuring local and international cuisine. The celebrations have been extremely popular with residents, new Canadians and visitors to British Columbia's Capital.

The Canada Day celebrations reflect our national heritage and identity. As the largest free to attend public event on Vancouver Island, Victoria's Canada Day is well known, attracting peak audience estimates ranging from 35,000 – 100,000 annually (depending on day of the week and weather). It is only through the support of senior government grants, municipalities and corporate sponsors that the City is able to produce an event that welcomes all residents and visitors to the Capital Region. ISSUES & ANALYSIS

More than 60% of the total 2019 Canada Day costs were recovered from corporate sponsorship and external grants. Policing accounted for 31% of the total event spend. The events site is active for 12 hours. Programming after 6pm accounted for the majority of the police callout. Last year 8 officers from other municipal forces assisted VicPD officers downtown in the evening hours.

Production costs have remained steady since the City assumed responsibility for planning Canada Day. Policing costs for Canada Day have roughly doubled since 2010. The event has become

more inclusive and family friendly over this timeframe. Policing large public celebrations has become more challenging over the past decade due to the changing nature of real and perceived threats to public safety at these kinds of high profile gatherings. Police determine the level of response required to mitigate an ever changing landscape of threats to public safety.

Canada Day production costs are recovered through fundraising and grants. The City commits \$25,000 cash through the City's annual budgeting process to offset production costs. The contracted event producers are responsible for raising the balance of the production budget. Because the entire production budget is not underwritten through the operating budget, it can be difficult to adhere to the production fee schedule as payments cannot be made until sponsorships and grants are awarded. Some grant programs do not confirm awards until closer to the event. Since the City ultimately carries the financial risk of the production, it would streamline the administration of the project if the entire scope of the event budget was reflected in the operating budget.

Should Council wish to continue celebrations at a similar scope and direction going forward, the following considerations will be critical for successful delivery of this event model:

- Account for a 10% cost increase in event production (\$23,422) and City services (\$11,412) to be allocated to operating for 2020. Production cost escalations have outpaced the budget scope in recent years.
- Canada Day policing costs previously covered by the Police Board are now being charged to the Arts Culture & Events operating budget. In the past, the City's operating budget covered a maximum of \$12,000 towards Canada Day and police charges above this threshold were absorbed by the Police Board budget. Total Canada Day policing costs in 2019 were \$109,058. These new costs (\$97,058 +10%) will need to be accounted for in the City's 2020 operating budget. It needs to be noted that VicPD determines the risk to public safety at these kinds of mass participation events and these values are based on the 2019 expenditure which may differ from year to year depending on where the stat holiday lands, weather and threat assessment.

Should Council wish to reduce the scope of Canada Day and subsequently reduce the need for police special event call outs, the following changes could be considered:

- Reduced policing costs due to no evening component to the event.
- The change in programming would only marginally reduce the cost of production elements as much of the infrastructure required to ensure a mainstage experience on the Legislature lawns will be required and sponsors may choose not to participate.

OPTIONS & IMPACTS

Option 1 – Maintain Canada Day celebrations at current levels and scope (Recommended)

Maintain the City's current approach for the 2020 Canada Day celebration and increase
the special event operations budget by \$107,000 during the 2020 financial planning process
to account for new police charges previously covered through the Police Board budget.

Option 2 – Reduce scope of Canada Day celebrations in 2020

Council to determine key program elements and City investment level.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Victoria's Canada Day continues to maintain and enrich key programming elements that have been established over the history of the event. This included multicultural musical performances, fireworks, family activities, onsite sponsors, community groups, and food vendors. The event received continued support from local sponsors, successfully renewed old sponsor relationships (i.e. Black Ball Transport, CREST and Coca Cola Canada) and attracted new sponsors (i.e. TELUS and Bayview Place). Sponsors and supporters continue to see the value of participating publically in Victoria's Canada Day, as it is a relevant connection to the community that also celebrates our country.

In 2019, emphasis was placed on programming which would be representative of Canada's diversity and attract not only a family and community-oriented demographic but also those who love diversity in music.

The goal remains to create an event that attracts all ages and demographics to a safe and welcoming community celebration for all residents, tourists and stakeholders while providing exceptional programming and entertainment.

Below are some key objectives that were achieved this year:

- Sustain a community and family-oriented identity and message for the event.
- Continue to programme a diverse and inherently Canadian Main Stage that showcases different cultural groups and entertainment throughout the day and into the evening.
- Focus on Canada's diversity through Main Stage programming. This year we strove to buy talent that represented culturally diverse performers but that were not traditional cultural performances. The line-up was impressive in its representation and featured the first Indigenous headliner to grace the stage at Victoria's Canada Day as well as the first drag queen to emcee the show.
- Sustain the title of Canada's largest Living Flag earned from the year

- previous. Continue to market the flag heavily and encourage strong public participation. This was achieved through the support of Coast Capital Savings, heavy social media posting, increasing the number of branded shirts to 2,500 (+25% yoy), and allowing group registrations for teams of 10 people or more.
- Produce a sustainable event and communicate methods for the community to live in an environmentally friendly way. This was accomplished through the continued promotion of on-site recycling and composting program, water refill stations and bike lock-up.
- Continue to offer and expand programming and times of the Belleville St activations and Family Zone on the Legislature Lawns. All activations ran from 10:30am 5:30pm (2018 12pm 5pm). This included Coast Capital Savings, Greater Victoria Public Library, TELUS, City of Victoria, La Societe Francophone de Victoria, and Sparkle Shack face painting on Belleville St. The Kids Zone on the lawn included an Inflatable Obstacle Course, free Face Painting, The Mandala Project, The Bateman Foundation and Victoria Bug Zoo. The Family Zone continues to over perform in terms of attendance and placement needs to be perhaps re-thought for 2020.
- Continue and improve collaboration with Victoria Police, BC Transit and the City of Victoria to create joint press releases to communicate the event as a safe and family-friendly event (and to provide strong messaging that there is zero tolerance for public intoxication).
- Continue to expand the social media presence of the event (via Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and event website) to provide more information for the public and to engage the community. Started social media earlier this year (March) with themed weeks such as Canadianisms, Cool Canadians, Sponsor Wellness Week etc. The focus for this year was to create engaging Canadian content that would drive the public to follow the socials instead of those just looking for event information this proved to be very successful with an increase in engagement across the board. See social media channels.
- Delivered a VIP experience fitting of its name this year by hosting at the penthouse of Bayview One. Prime location with unparalleled Fireworks (shot from directly in front of the building) allowed for the fireworks to be seen at eye level, as we were ten stories up. Catering provided in partnership with Vessel Liquor and Urban Grocer.
- Continue to end the day's programming with a packed fireworks display synchronized to a mix of Canadian music that is with an intro and outro thanking sponsors for their support.

SPONSOR RECOGNITION

MARKETING AND MEDIA

Sponsors were recognized through our website, social media outlets, press releases, news editorials, on-site branding, posters at the VIP location, on-stage announcements, the fireworks announcement broadcast through the inner harbour as well as the newly added 10° x 20° digital screen flown at the Main Stage.

2020 suggestion is to create an actual market, curated to offer a mix of retail and community organizations that is large enough to create a space that the public will be drawn to and spend time in.

VIP SPONSOR RECEPTION

The VIP reception was held at Bayview One Bayview Place. It was sponsored by Urban Grocer and Vessel Liquor.

COAST CAPITAL SAVINGS RECOGNITION

Coast Capital Savings was included in all events branding with their logo appearing on all on-site branding, all digital assets and all external marketing pieces such as newspaper ads. They were verbally recognized from the Main Stage multiple times as well as in radio interviews that Councilor Charlayne Thornton-Joe gave.

The Living Flag was referred to only as the "Coast Capital Savings Living Flag". Branded shirts were increased by 25% from 2018 for a total of 2,500 (1,000 in 2013, 1,500 in 2014 through 2016, 2000 in 2018).

This year saw the continuation of the "Coast Capital Savings Youth Band". This was a broad social media contest aimed at local 13-23 year old musicians who could enter to win the opportunity to play a set on the Main Stage.

Coast Capital was given two public speaking opportunities:

- 1) Introduce the winner of the Coast Capital Savings Youth band (accepted)
- 2) Speak at the VIP reception (accepted)

SPONSORSHIP RECOMMENDATIONS

- Coast Capital Savings has informed us that 2019 is their last year as the presenting sponsor.
- We should continue to focus on connecting with a few larger organizations that would have an interest in being involved in future celebrations.
- Focus should be placed on expanding sponsorship dollars from existing clients that already see value in the event and would be interested in increasing their involvement and outreach or having on-site activations.
- We maintained the contribution from the Province of British Columbia and the time of this report are waiting for the adjudication of the grant for Province of Quebec. These grants helped to bring bilingual artist Dominic

Pelletier to the stage. There is still room for the Province to come to the table with sponsorship however, as this is a partnership between the Francophone Affairs branch of the Provincial government, not the cultural branch.

- Thought should be given to applying for grants to specifically bring Indigenous performers to the Main Stage, as in Victoria there is a stronger connection with Indigenous peoples culture than French culture.
- A larger sponsor specifically looking to reach the family demographic could do an expansion of the Kids Zone. The conversation with Indigo was started this year and needs to continue in the fall so we are solid for spring 2020.

MARKETING AND MEDIA SUMMARY

BRANDING & MESSAGING

Maintained the name of the event this year as *Victoria's Canada Day* and continued to use the same logo. The City of Victoria was recognized in all physical events collateral as "An Initiative of the City of Victoria".

A one-page schedule was once again made for display on the website. Prior to the event, road closure and noise notices were distributed to all local businesses and residences. Joint messaging continued with BC Transit and VicPD to ensure that the message of a safe, family friendly event was communicated across all channels.

CANADADAYVICTORIA.CA

Last year's website and domain was maintained for the event this year: www.canadadayvicctoria.ca Expanded website this year to include an ARTISTS tab that had bios, set times and pictures of all Main Stage performers.

SOCIAL MEDIA

This year we maintained all of the Victoria's Canada Day accounts in order to capitalize on the momentum of the previous years.

After the events we have a grand total of 728 Instagram followers (up 16.0% yoy), 2953 Facebook followers (up 24.5% yoy), and 884 Twitter followers (up 41.4% yoy). Large increases in both followers and engagement can be attributed to the shift in the type of content we posted as well as beginning posts earlier in the year (March). With themed weeks such as Canadianisms, Cool Canadians, Sponsor Wellness Week etc., the focus for this year was to create engaging Canadian content that would drive the public to follow the socials for content instead of those just looking for event information - this proved to be very successful with an increase in engagement across the board. We continued our concerted effort of live updating on social media during the day of the event and the response online grew considerably over last year as they were significantly more in-depth than 2018.

PRESS RELEASES

We sent out a total of two bilingual press releases with contributions by the Victoria Police, BC Transit, Coast Capital Savings, and Councilor Charlayne Thornton-Joe: Monday, June 10, 2019 and Monday, June 24, 2019. The press releases were distributed by the City of Victoria and were posted on the Victoria's Canada Day website. The first release was delayed by a week (due to controversy at City Hall regarding public events and policing budgets) in the hopes of not being aligned with a negative news cycle.

PHOTOGRAPHY

This year's photography was contracted to Lindsey Blaine Creative. A detailed shot list was given to Lindsey to ensure we captured the images required to showcase diverse and inclusive participants, as well as sponsorship brand-in-action photos in order to help sell the event in future years. Programming

MAIN STAGE- AFTERNOON/EVENING CONCERT

The focus for programming this year was to make sure we had a culturally diverse line-up without having actual traditional cultural performances.

Main Stage performances began at 3pm with an Indigenous Blessing from the leader of the Lekwungen Dancers followed by their performance and then the bilingual version of the anthem sung by the Victoria Children's Choir.

Fintan was the winner of the second Coast Capital Savings Youth Band and he performed a very well attended and successful 25 minute set on the Main Stage. Dominic Pelletier who was brought in with funding from the Province of BC and the Province of Quebec followed his performance. Victoria's Youth Poet Laureate Aziza Moqia Sealey-Qaylow graced the stage with her spoken word.

The later part of the afternoon and then evening included: Khanvict, who explores his roots through his music, blending elements of classic Bollywood, Sufi and Panjabi music with Bass, Moombahton and Trap. The solo project of Tristan Thompson, Diamond Cafe, who channels the ghost of Prince, late-night slow jams and 80's tinged R&B. Caleb Hart's eclectic mix of genres ranges from reggae, gospel and soul to calypso, a mixture Hart likes to call island soul. Fortune Killers strike you with their dynamic synth-scape sand high-voltage performance whose alluring vocals, soaring lead lines, and heart-thumping grooves weave a musical web.

Headlining the Main Stage was nêhiyawak, who hail from amiskwaciy (Edmonton) on Treaty 6 territory. Comprised of Kris Harper, Matthew Cardinal, and Marek Tyler, these three Indigenous musicians coalesce at the intersection between traditional and contemporary music. This was the first headlining performance of an Indigenous band that Victoria's Canada Day has had.

The emcees for the afternoon/evening were Elli Hart from the band Dirty Mountain, who sang and played guitar during changeovers. She was joined by local favourite drag queen; Gouda Gabor. The two of them performed choreographed numbers together between the last three sets.

FAMILY ZONE ACTIVITIES

The decision made in 2018 to eliminate the kid's performer from the main stage and re-allocate that money on family programming has proved successful. So successful in fact, that this year we had both the Bateman Centre and the Victoria Bug Zoo as well as children's face-painting by Sparkle Shack come on as sponsors and offer free activations on-site. There is now a Family Zone space on the Northwest corner of the Legislature Lawns where you can spend child-centric time over the course of the day instead of just a 40-minute set on the Main Stage.

In addition to the Family Zone programming we also hosted Canada Day Drumming beginning at 10:30 am. This a group made up of local drumming groups like the Kung-Fu Club and Uminari Taiko, drummed separately and then as a group simultaneously at 11am with other cities across Canada. This was extremely well attended and received and should become a part of the annual programming going forward.

We changed the operating hours of the Family Zone to be 10:30am - 5:30pm this year giving us an additional two hours for us to cater to the families that come earlier in the day. It is suggested that these hours be maintained in 2020.

It would be advised to find a sponsor specifically for this area in order to expand the offering and longevity of the activated space.

GREEN INITIATIVE ACTIVITIES

A comprehensive waste filtering system (of recycling, compost and garbage bins) continues to be used. ReFUSE provided these bins once again as they are extremely affordable to work with and they drop off and pick up and sort all materials. ReFUSE provided bottle-recycling services, as well.

Bike lock-up system which is offered for free, continues to proves to be a good model.

Water refill station use continues to be popular. Water access is difficult on this site but it is advised that a secondary location be found for 2020.

A FLAVOUR OF CANADA

We continued A Flavour of Canada programming in 2019 to encourage attendance and diversify food choice. This year, 14 food vendors were set up along Belleville Street offering the best of what Victoria has to offer to the public. Vendors were set up on the south side of Belleville St. backing the Legislative Lawns allowing lines to stretch across the road, and providing unobstructed views of the Inner Harbour from the street.

FIREWORKS

Bryan Capistrano at The Zone arranged the musical programming for the fireworks. An intro and outro thanking our sponsors provided a great opportunity for their acknowledgement to a large audience. The outro provided exiting instructions for people after the fireworks, helping move people out of the harbour quickly. The total show time this year was a little over seven minutes due to budget constraints; the goal is to get the show back to the 10-minute mark.

COAST CAPITAL SAVINGS LIVING FLAG

Coast Capital Savings continues to provide generous support through sponsorship of the Living Flag in order to have naming rights to it. A portion of their total contribution goes to the purchasing of the branded shirts for this activation. Coast Capital Savings sees some of their greatest value in this piece of the event and made the request to have 2500 shirts printed an increase of 25% over 2018. It was suggested that they re-allocate the money they have spent in previous years on swag, to purchasing additional shirts. They agreed this was a better use of funds and branding money and added an additional \$2500 to their sponsorship in order for the extra 500 shirts to be printed. We had approximately 3100 participants in the flag this year.

The T-shirt pickup was scheduled to start at 12:30, as in past years, however we had participants lining up as early as 9:00 a.m. to pick them up. As in previous, we encouraged group sign ups and priority pick-ups for those with teams of more than 10. These were picked up through the Coast Capital Savings tent, which was very popular with the public as well as valuable to Coast Capital Savings as a client touch point in the day.

Work done to mitigate protestors was deemed successful and included:

- A discussion held with indigenous leaders prior to Canada Day in order to offer them time in the programming to speak publically. This went a long way in deterring any asks for speaking opportunities from additional indigenous groups.
- A communication email sent to all parties taking part in the organizing of the Flag (City of Victoria, VicPD, Elite Security, and Atomique) confirming chain of command and protocols for disruptions.

SITE SET-UP/DESIGN

Scrims for delay and branding towers were exchanged for a $10' \times 20'$ screen flown from the back of the Main Stage this year.

Belleville Street was closed at 6am (one hour earlier than in 2018), which was fundamental to ensuring that set-up for the Family Zone and A Flavour of Canada could be completed before the 10:30am start time. It is recommended to maintain the same street closure time in future years. Closing Government earlier or extending further West on Belleville to create a market is recommended so there is more to coming down to the site than just the Main Stage.

Suggestion to use a smaller stage in order to reallocate some of that funding to the talent spends.

Atomique continues to use a crash barricade at the front of the main stage to help security and police when maintaining the larger crowd into the evening.

Elevated reduced mobility access signage this year to eye-level making the access points easier to find. The Legislature changed their landscaping to add in an additional two permanent ramps allowing access to the laws, Atomique added one at the Cenotaph, and one at the Queen Victoria statue bringing the total to four as opposed to the single point in 2018. This eliminated any issues that may have arisen in getting people onto the lawns.

Placing food vendors on the South side of Belleville allows for better crowd/line management and has the vendors in the thick of the crowd in order to exploit sales opportunities. However, with more activations this year than any year previous, Belleville has begun to feel a bit tight and we may need to think about expanding earlier in order to meet the demand from Sponsors to be on the street.

OPERATIONS

Operationally, the event ran smoothly with no major issues coming to our attention. Communication with the City Events Department and Victoria Police Department was excellent and the road closure timing worked well with the event schedule and allowed the public to feel safe throughout the entire event.

Although no security risks arose throughout or following the 2019 programming, Atomique will continue to work with local enforcement agencies to refine our operations plan to ensure that public safety procedures are current and effective.

STAGE & TECHNICAL

Pacific Audio Works was hired again to provide technical support for the Main Stage. Main Stage sound had a small kickback issue at the delay tower around 8:30pm but it was resolved in less than 10 minutes.

ADDITIONAL PRODUCTION RECOMMENDATIONS.

It is suggested that a complete map of the stage and stage area be mapped by itself in order to provide exact measurements for landing the stage, the concrete blocks to weight the scrims and what goes on the stage itself.

CANADA DAY, VICTORIA

The Canada Day celebrations held annually in Victoria are a reflection of our national heritage and identity. As the biggest event on Vancouver Island, Victoria's Canada Day is well known, attracting more than 75,000 people. EVENTS & ENTERTAINMENT

There will be expanded offerings for families & children in the daytime so that you can plan to spend the whole day in our beautiful Inner Harbour. This year will be a reimagining of a community celebration with emphasis on the unique and local aspects of our great Capital City.

With a Main Stage on the lawns of the legislature featuring live entertainment, a local food village, and family activities, this national celebration remains an anticipated and engaging community event. Over the past decade there have been performances by internationally recognized artists, such as Arkells, Radio Radio and Fred Penner, as well as homegrown favourites like Jon and Roy, Hey Ocean!, Quoia, the Odds, Current Swell, and Charlotte Diamond.

MULTICULTURALISM

A past focus on multiculturalism has included food and entertainment from countries including, Ireland, China, Guinea, Haiti, Cuba, Brazil, Mexico, the Metis First Nations, India, Mexico, Japan, the Songhees First Nation, Haida First Nations, Greece, Argentina, Salish First Nation, and Jewish and Quebecois cultures. Victoria's Canada Day is proud to continue this tradition in 2019.

THE LIVING FLAG

Each year participants gather on the legislature lawns to animate a living flag, which receives coverage in both local and national media. Victoria holds the distinction of having the largest Living Flag in the country for the last few years. Since 2017 alone it has had almost 10,000 participants.

Sponsor branded t-shirts are given to all participants for an amazing photo opportunity, which is widely circulated locally and nationally both during and after the event.

FIREWORKS SHOW

The highlight of the evening is a spectacular fireworks display which lights up Victoria's Inner Harbour, accompanied by a broadcast soundtrack and announcement that recognizes contributing sponsors before the fireworks. The fireworks are visible from a number of areas in Greater Victoria, but are set off in the Inner Harbour.

A FLAVOUR OF VICTORIA

This year's culinary offering at Government St. and Belleville St. incorporates an eclectic mix of local food vendors offering some of Victoria's best and most exciting mobile food experiences.

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KEEPING CANADA DAY GREEN

OUR COMMITMENT

Being green is becoming an increasingly important focus for people of all ages and demographics. It's something that affects the future of all Canadians, including those who come to appreciate the picturesque surroundings of Victoria. By working to decrease our carbon footprint, this celebration prioritizes the longevity and health of our beautiful community and that of our planet.

GREEN INITIATIVE

The past six years have also seen the expansion of our green initiative to include a Bike Valet, Green Team Volunteers, and a waste system that differentiates between compost, recycling and garbage.

IN ACTION

- We require food vendors to only use recyclable and compostable eating containers and utensils
- Water refill stations are placed around the site to accommodate refillable water bottles
- Recycling teams monitor the site, with participating local community groups, and receive all monies from returnable items
- Sponsors are encouraged to provide environmentally-friendly giveaways and prizes; styrofoam and plastic items are strongly discouraged
- Printed materials are closely reviewed for quantity printed, materials used, and proper recycling methods employed
- Information booths on site raise awareness among participants, staff, service providers and the community about the benefits of sustainable living and environmental practices

Subject: Affordable Artist Housing in the City of Victoria

BACKGROUND

The Create Victoria Arts and Culture Masterplan states that "culture and creativity are essential aspects for vibrant and sustainable cities". For arts, culture, and creativity to thrive in a community, artists need to be able to live and work in that community. The City of Victoria is at a crucial moment for arts and culture as the City has increasingly become unaffordable for many residents including artists.

During the engagement process for the Create Victoria Arts and Culture Masterplan, the City of Victoria heard from many members of the arts community who expressed concerns about the impacts of the affordability crisis on artists' ability to live and create in Victoria. In response to this input, one of the goals of the Create Victoria plan is to "align with affordability initiatives by identifying artists and creators as potential applicants for affordability housing".

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That Council direct staff to align the Create Victoria Masterplan with the Victoria Housing Strategy to include the creation of housing for artists as a goal of the Victoria Housing Strategy.
- 2. And that Council direct staff to consider ways to encourage the creation of affordable housing for artists through the implementation of existing policies including the inclusionary housing policy, housing reserve fund, and other relevant policies.
