Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw, 2019

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

 Amend the Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw, 2019 by replacing the bylaw that was given first reading on December 13, 2018 with the bylaw appended to the Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw, 2018 report, dated April 1, 2019.

2. That the Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw No. 18-121 as amended be read a second and third time.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to outline amendments to the Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw, 2019 that received first reading on December 13, 2018 and recommend second and third readings at today's Council meeting.

During December 2018 and January 2019, the City sought input from the public on the draft financial plan. Upon completion of the public consultation and based on the feedback received, Council allocated new property tax revenue from new development and 2018 surplus.

The following allocations are reflected in the amended Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw attached in Appendix A:

1. Ongoing allocation of new property tax revenue from new development - \$3.747 million

The 2019 Draft Financial Plan presented to Council in November 2018 included \$500,000 of the new property tax revenue allocated to the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve in accordance with the Financial Sustainability Policy and \$239,000 to pay back the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve for the new library branch in James Bay.

Prior to the February and March budget deliberations, Council approved, \$250,000 for 2 FTE's for the Strategic Real Estate Division, \$114,000 (including pension, benefits and employer costs) for the Mayor's Office Support and \$223,000 for two new positions for the Climate Action program leaving \$2.174 million available to allocate.

BC Assessment has finalized the assessment roll for 2019 enabling the calculation of the new property tax revenue from new development. This revenue has been increased to \$3.747 million from the estimate of \$3.5 million that has been allocated. The additional \$247,000 increase will be shared equally between the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve and the Vehicles and Heavy Equipment Reserve as directed by Council.

2. One-time allocation of the 2018 surplus - \$4.544 million

The 2018 surplus was originally estimated at \$4.5 million. Now that the 2018 year end is complete, the final surplus amount has been confirmed at \$4.544 million. The main drivers for the surplus include higher than expected revenues from parking, higher revenues from the Victoria Conference Centre, savings due to vacancies and unspent contingency.

Council allocated the \$4.5 million estimate during the financial planning discussions and directed that any remainder be transferred to the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve. Further surplus details will be provided in the 2018 Financial Statement report being presented to Council on April 25, 2019.

3. Capital Project 2019 Adjustments

The capital budget has been updated to include carry forwards for 2018 projects in progress, reflects the change in approach to delivering the Crystal Pool and Wellness Centre Replacement Project, and adds projects approved from Council prior and during budget deliberations.

During January and February, staff brought forth update reports to Council on the Climate Action Program and Bicycle Master Plan Implementation Strategy Update. Council approved \$50,000 for the investment of EV infrastructure and \$175,000 to expedite the Bicycle Master Plan Implementation in 2019 and \$350,000 each year for 2020 to 2022.

During the budget deliberations, Council allocated funding for a variety of projects including a new crosswalk at Blanshard and Kings funded through Gas Tax, capital investment in the Urban Forest Master Plan funded by the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve and computer equipment, space reconfiguration and office furniture to support new staff funded by the Equipment Reserve and the Buildings and Infrastructure Reserve. As well, the Central Park Renewal Plan project was replaced with the Laurel Park Planning and Design project.

4. Police 2019 Adjustments

Council approved revisions to the Police budget during the budget process and provided direction to shift the City's portion (\$34,120) of the Restorative Justice from the Police budget to the City's grant budget. This revision has been made to the budget, though we are waiting for Esquimalt Council's decision on April 8.

5. Employee FTE's

During budget discussions, the City's permanent FTE total increased by 33.8 FTE's as part of the ongoing allocation of new property tax revenue from new development and the use of existing ongoing funds. As well, 12 FTE's from one-time funding were identified which does not impact the permanent FTE count. The revised total permanent FTE count in the 2019 Financial Plan is 849.11.

At the January 31 meeting, staff updated Council with the plan to hire 12 permanent FTE's for underground utilities using existing ongoing funding based on staff's interpretation of the following motion:

"That Council adopts the policy that the FTE count indicated in the Financial Plan for each department / division / business unit is approximate, meaning that the FTE count will not be interpreted in a restrictive manner to prevent in-house delivery of services, subject to expenditures not exceeding the maximum budgeted amount for the relevant department / division / business unit."

6. Other Adjustments

Since the draft financial plan was introduced in October 2018, Council has given approval to a number of initiatives including the creation of a direct-award grant for the Victoria Film Commission funded by the reallocation of \$45,000 from the Strategic Plan Grant program, the introduction of the on street pay parking on Sundays effective May 1, and approval of \$369,700 allocated from the Climate Action Reserve to commit funding for the Climate Leadership Plan that includes temporary staffing and priority actions.

Remaining funding for operating budget projects underway, such as the Downtown Public Realm, Accelerated Local Area Planning, Witness Reconciliation Program, Sustainable Mobility Strategy, Victoria Housing Strategy Implementation, Neighbourhood Transportation Management Plan initiatives and High Risk Tree Removal have been carried forward to the 2019 year in the financial plan.

The Government of Canada's one-time doubling of the national federal Gas Tax transfer has been added to the financial plan. For 2019, the City will receive an additional \$3.666 million of gas tax revenue for a total of \$7.257 million. As well, grant funding of \$23,300 recently awarded for the Community Child Care Planning program has been added to the budget.

All above adjustments do not impact the overall tax increase except for reduction of the Police budget that reduces the amount of property tax to collect by \$428,500. With the reduction of the Police budget, the overall property tax increase is now 3.98%; combined with utility fees, the overall residential increase is 3.52% and the overall business increase is 3.77%.
