

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

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Public Sector Collectively Spends Billions of Dollars through Procurement

\$200B annual with approximately 80% taking place at local and regional level

Vancouver Island Spending:

- \$1.5B on Vancouver Island
- \$500M on goods and services

Federal Government:

- \$18-20 Billion in goods and services annually
- \$180 Billion in infrastructure over next ten years



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




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The Evolution of Procurement


Yes, and...

Trade agreements may apply, and require parameters for language:

- ✓ You cannot restrict competition, but you can require community outcomes from all bidders
- ✓ Trade agreements have exceptions for contracting with non-profits
- ✓ Trade agreements have financial thresholds

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Social Procurement Pathways



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Municipal Social Procurement Implementation Options

- ✓ Purchases below the trade agreement and municipal financial threshold policies can be direct awards to social enterprises and businesses
- ✓ Direct awards can be made to non-profits and charities
- ✓ A Social Value weighting can be included in the purchasing process and evaluation criteria
- ✓ Community Benefit Agreements can be negotiated for major infrastructure projects to support local community development outcomes
- ✓ Large contractor's existing supply chains offer local SE and SME opportunities

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City of Victoria Progress – Building on Equity Workshop

Working Definition

- Equity is treating everyone fairly by acknowledging their unique situation and addressing systemic barriers. The aim of equity is to ensure that everyone has access to equal benefits and outcomes.

Values

- Social Justice - remove systemic barriers
- Intersectionality - reflect multiple lived experiences
- Quality of Life - health, happiness and satisfaction
- Resilience and Prosperous Community - inclusion and access

Guiding Principles

- Practical - scalable to initiative size
- Achievable - pragmatic in terms of implementing in desired time frames
- Transparent - simple and understandable
- Measurable - moving the bar

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City of Victoria Progress – Building on Equity Workshop

Considerations

- **Ability** - persons with disabilities
- **Age** - children, youth and seniors
- **Citizenship Status** - immigrants and refugees
- **Education** - level achieved
- **Ethnic Origin and Race** - includes Indigenous people and visible minorities
- **Gender** - male, female, intersex, transgender, non-binary, or gender-nonconforming
- **Housing Security** - tenure and precarity
- **Income** - absolute and relative level, living wage, wealth
- **Religion** - faith, belief systems, customs
- **Sexual Orientation** - lesbian, gay, bisexual, queer and two-spirit

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City of Victoria Purchasing Policy Recommendations

Building on the Equity workshop with Council, amend the Purchasing Policy by including:

1. Objective: removing barriers
2. Guiding principles for policy application:
 - a) Practical
 - b) Achievable
 - c) Transparent
 - d) Measurable
3. Evaluation criteria considerations: descriptive rather than prescriptive using intersectional approach

- ✓ Update Purchasing Policy (pending Council direction)
- ✓ Develop an inventory of suppliers that incorporate social values
- ✓ Select small pilot projects to test, evaluate results and learn from the experience

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
