For the betterment of our city, please freeze the VicPD budget and allocate funding towards community-level supports instead.

We have to be even more strategic with the use of our resources during COVID-19. VicPD already accounts for nearly a quarter of the City's operating budget. What I see right now are people who need programs and services to improve well-being. With that in mind, I am writing today with deep concern, and to express my strong opposition to the proposed 1.5% increase to the Victoria Police Department (VicPD) budget. Rather, I am demanding that the VicPD budget is frozen so that the city's limited municipal resources can be more appropriately allocated to communities most in need and communities who have been historically underfunded and ignored.

I am appalled and disappointed that Victoria's governing bodies continually allocate a greater percentage of the municipal budget to the VicPD than any other municipal function, especially given Mayor Helps' Statement on the Need to Take Action Against Racism on June 3, 2020. In that statement, Mayor Helps said, "For those of us with privilege, we need to step up as allies and condemn racism in all its forms." Continuing to inflate the VicPD's budget, against the will and advice of so many of your constituents whom you claim to represent, and to whom you claim to want to listen, is not stepping up as an ally. Failing to invest in the growth and development of community programs that address and combat housing issues, colonial violence, and the overdose crisis, is not stepping up as an ally. Condemning racism in a statement, and providing zero material follow-through, is not stepping up as an ally.

I believe a budget increase of 0% for VicPD is the only appropriate action at this time given the following:

- COVID-19 has resulted in a substantial decrease in revenue for the City of Victoria, requiring Council to make more fiscally responsible decisions for the 2021 budget cycle.
- As a result of the fiscal challenges related to COVID-19, municipalities across Canada are either
 freezing or decreasing their police budgets, including the City of Vancouver that recently <u>voted to</u>
 <u>freeze</u> their police funding for 2021.
- According to <u>Statistics Canada</u>, in 2019, VicPD had more officers per capita than any other municipality in Canada with more than 100,000 people.
- The VicPD budget is the City's highest operating expenditure, with a whopping 23% of the City's total operational budget.

- The City of Victoria's 2021 Draft Financial Plan allocates \$60.7 million of its \$256 million budget to the VicPD. a 1.5% increase from 2020.
 - In stark contrast, the draft operating budget only allocates \$23.7 million for parks, recreation, and facilities, \$6.0 million for sustainable planning and community development, and \$5.6 million for public libraries.
- Despite the already enormous allocation of city funds to the VicPD, the VicPD's budget is steadily increasing every year. From 2019-2020, the VicPD's budget increased by 4.43%. My name Personal resident of Victoria proper. I am a 25 year old student at the University of Victoria and have grown up in Victoria. In large part due to my white complexion and housed status, I have been privileged to avoid negative interactions and behaviour at the hands of the Victoria Police. I have, however, witnessed firsthand police brutality during the peaceful protests in early 2020 in support of the Wet'suwet'en, where 30 armed police officers forcefully arrested 12 Indigenous youth at the BC Ministry of Energy, Mines, and Petroleum Resources. I also witnessed the forceful arrest of Indigenous youth during a peaceful sit-in at the BC legislature in support of Wet'suwet'en. On social media, across Canada and of course in the United States, there were multiple examples of police brutality against BIPOC communities and sparked weeks of unrest in the name of Black Lives Matter. It was made painfully clear that the police force was created to uphold white supremacy and colonization. It was NOT created for public safety for all. If 2020 taught us anything at all, it is that there needs to be alternatives to this unjust system that centres safety for all community members.

Greetings,

I'm writing to provide feedback on the 2021/22 Draft Financial Plan.

Premise of the budget: The City's entire financial plan is a colonial premise rooted in the assumption that settlers have jurisdiction over stolen Lkwungen lands and the authority to decide what to do with those lands and how to divvy up benefits accruing from use of those lands. My participation in the process is to express objection to the City's plans, not to affirm colonial presence or entitlement to make decisions about Lkwungen Territory.

Consultation process: While COVID has limited in-person options, the City's process this year is so narrow that it is completely inaccessible to many residents. Email, an online survey that requires registration, and a webcast town hall are all largely inaccessible to people with very low incomes (especially in these times when public computer access is severely restricted), people who are not fluent in English, people who are sheltering in parks without a reliable way to keep devices charged or safe, and people with cognitive or learning disabilities. These methods of getting input also aren't accessible to Victoria residents who are institutionalized and don't have access to technology in the time of the public input period. When consultation is done in this way, it is not a sincere creative effort to listen to communities and it facilitates privileging certain populations. My participation in the process is to express objection to the City's plans, not to affirm any legitimacy to this consultation process.

Defining parameters: Movement Generation explains that "eco" comes from the greek word "oikos", meaning 'home'; and that economy therefore most accurately means "home" + "management". In their words:

Economy means management of home. How we organize our relationships in a place, ideally, to take care of the place and each other. But "management of home" can be good or bad, depending on how you do it and to what ends. The purpose of our economy could be turning land, life and labor into property for a few, or returning land, life and labor into a balanced web of stable relationships. Economy does not mean money, or exchange or financial markets, or trading or Gross Domestic Product. These are simply elements or tools of specific economies. Economies ("how we manage our home") can be measured in many ways: How healthy are the soil, people, water, animals? How much wealth is generated? Who owns the wealth? What

even constitutes wealth? Is it money? Well-being? Happiness?

The City's budget is absent of any consideration of relationships and implications. For example there is no consideration in the Draft Financial Plan of how City revenue is obtained and whether that money comes from ethical sources. Relying on wealth derived from stolen land, exploited labour, or damage to the environment keeps us stuck in violent relationships with the earth and each other.

REVENUE

Land is not settler property: Most of the City's revenue comes from taxing settlers' use of Lkwungen land. By calling this "property tax", the City is entrenching colonial ideas of land as property -- and settler property at that -- rather than this place being a living, organic place that is the home of many beings. As a starting point, a real land tax would acknowledge that the City is on Lkwungen Territory, and would actively work with Lekwungen communities on how to decolonize and begin to engage in respectful relationship. The Draft Financial Plan doesn't consider Lkwungen ways of making decisions or ensuring that any benefits derived from settlers' use of Lkwungen resources (including lands, waters, knowledge, etc.) are returned to Lekwungen people.

Keeping wealth in settler land-holder hands: It's contradictory to commit to 'Make Victoria More Affordable' while limiting the annual land tax increase to a maximum of the rate of inflation + 1%. By protecting settler land-holders from a reasonable land tax increase, Council is making 'victoria' less affordable to the most economically precarious people. Addressing affordability is great, but limiting property tax only benefits people wealthy enough to own land. This year's property tax increase is 1.75% which according to the budget summary works out to an annual increase of "\$44 for an average household and \$124 for a typical business" --minor amounts that will make little difference to people who are wealthy enough to own land, but that if increased could significantly improve real affordability measures like return of stolen lands, rent banks, community-controlled housing, urban agriculture, etc.

EXPENDITURES

The budget doesn't align with community needs or the City's Strategic Plan.

The Draft Financial Plan identifies the City's priorities as local area land use planning, supporting
businesses, affordable housing, active transportation, climate change, and emergency preparedness.
According to the Goal Statement on page 13, by 2022 "We will be known globally for our climate
leadership practices, multi-modal transportation options, innovative approaches to affordable
housing, and for meaningful reconciliation with the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations on whose
homelands our city was built."

- However, none of these aspirations are substantively resourced. Instead, the City continues to
 prioritize surveillance, criminalization, and punishment, proposing more than 25% of the operating
 budget -- \$64.5 million -- be used for the VicPD, bylaw enforcement, and security guards.
- The decision to once again prioritize policing over people's needs has a double impact on marginalized people, who are targeted by policing through racial / social profiling, and also because of societal injustice face the most barriers in meeting basic survival needs.

Council talks about "Reconciliation and Indigenous Relations" but there's no financial commitment to either one.

- The City's current Strategic Plan includes a commitment to "deeper and more engagement with Songhees and Esquimalt Nations", "recognition of Indigenous sovereignty", and "more Indigenous involvement and inclusion in all aspects of civic life". But the Draft Financial Plan isn't moving towards any of these aspirations.
- Recognition of Indigenous sovereignty means acknowleding that this is Lkwungen land and that
 authority to determine what happens to these territories rests with Lkwungen people, not any layer of
 colonial government. It is not recognizing Indigenous sovereignty to continue to control Indigenous
 territories and distribution of benefits from use of those territories.
- The Draft Financial Plan doesn't even resource Indigenous positions for the Indigenous relations activities set out in the Strategic Plan (repeated in the Draft Financial Plan). There aren't budget line items for the 2020 Strategic Plan commitments to establish an Indigenous Relations function and to pursue co-governance of MEEGAN and shoreline areas, the 2021 commitments of appointing Indigenous Elders in Residence and continuing co-governance explorations, or the 10 actions relating to Indigenous community relationships that are identified for 2022. The only two mentions of Indigenous relations in the actual budget are \$86,850 for the Witness Reconciliation Program, which drops to ~\$31,000 per year in 2022/23, and an Indigenous artist-in-residence program (which is identified as 2019-21, so no City commitment to continue).
- The current orientation of funds is insufficient to engage in the significant transformation needed to
 dismantle the colonial relationships and power structures that are the current foundation of the City
 of 'victoria'. There is huge momentum behind current settler abusive, violent relationships to
 Lekwungen people and their territories. It will take very significant investment to change that, to
 actually enact decolonization, reconciliation, and reparations for harms done.

The Draft Financial Plan decreases funding for affordable housing.

• The Draft Financial Plan states a commitment to "allocate additional City revenue to affordable housing" (page 44) but the proposed budget does the opposite, decreasing the annual allocation for the housing reserve -- dropping from \$900,000 in 2020/21 to \$650,000 per year in 2021/22 and the

four fiscal years after that. It's even more of a decrease in 2021/22 if you take into account the \$152,500 of the \$208,228 allocated to the Late Night Task Force (policing downtown) that in 2020/21 was reallocated to emergency housing -- the plan for 2021-22 has this special policing force once again at full budget, now increased to \$231,650 per year (page 136).

Affordable housing has been the general public's #1 issue for several years according to the annual local Vital Signs survey, for good reason. According to 2016 Census data (which excludes people who are homeless), five years ago 9,065 households -- 21% of 'victoria' households -- were living in housing that is overcrowded, in significant disrepair, and/or unaffordable, with 4,050 households in 'victoria' identified as "in extreme core housing need" (living in housing that is overcrowded, in significant disrepair, and/or unaffordable, and with an income so low that more than 50% of income would need to be spent to get adequate housing). Affordability and vacancy rates are even worse now.

While it's great that the City is funding staff work on policies to try to stem the loss of affordable units,

there also needs to be a tangible plan around increasing affordable housing stock, far beyond Council's current goal of 100 units per year towards the pre-existing backlog (with the additional new units only enough to keep up with projected population growth). This housing plan needs to be determined with local nations so it doesn't further entrench settler control of Lkwungen lands, and Indigenous housing needs are met first.

Housing strategies identified in the Draft Financial Plan assume housing and land will remain commodities (e.g., emphasizing private development by settler property owners and institutions) instead of exploring models to return stolen lands and enter into agreements with Lekwungen people about how to create and manage housing on their lands in ways that respect their authority over their territories and prioritize ensuring that Indigenous people on these territories have safe, culturally respectful, and affordable places to live. This colonial and capitalist approach to lands and housing are not the right direction for sustainable planning and community development. All community and local area planning processes -- including housing policy processes -- must start from a foundation of recognizing that settlers on stolen lands do not have entitlement to determine the future of these territories, and emphasize decolonization and other transformative measures.

Council continues to set aside money in financial reserves instead of acknowledging the current emergency for people sheltering outside, and using those funds to offer everyone safe and adequate indoor sheltering.

 According to the Draft Financial Plan, as of December 31, 2020 the Victoria Housing Reserve was expected to have an unallocated balance of \$2,582,942 sitting dormant instead of being used for emergency housing. In 2021/22 there is a proposed allocation of \$3,517,740 for transfer to a

contingency reserve account for unspecified emergencies (pages 547-548) -- enough to provide 244 people living outside with \$1,200/month towards rent, for a full year.

• In the meantime Council continues to ignore its human rights obligations set out in the United Nations National Protocol for Homeless Encampments in Canada, with a total of \$0 allocated in 2021/22 for basic infrastructure proximate to where people are sheltering.

Of course some level of savings are prudent and necessary, but when new money is set aside for
'emergencies' while there is an active emergency for unhoused people, that implies "your well-being is
not enough of an emergency...we're going to put money aside for a situation impacting wealthy
people". It's particularly baffling that the City is keeping Housing Reserve money dormant instead of
using it to build emergency housing.

Parks need to be re-conceived not only as recreation spaces for housed people but also as survival spaces for unhoused people.

- Until there is safe, affordable, and adequate housing for everyone, resources need to be committed to working collaboratively with people who are sheltering outside to create infrastructure in locations where people are sheltering that meets survival needs, in compliance with the United Nations National Protocol for Homeless Encampments in Canada.
- The City should include in the 2021/22 Draft Financial Plan funds to rapidly assess <u>Protocol</u> compliance issues and to address all areas where the City is out of compliance. *This is an emergency in a dual public health crisis, and emergency reserves are appropriate to use for this purpose.*
- It is extremely important to have public spaces where people can gather, socialize, rest, enjoy nature, etc. And, for some people who do not have private spaces where these things can also happen, public spaces are, additionally, spaces of survival. When recreational wants of housed people conflict with unhoused people's survival needs, survival needs must take priority -- even in COVID times where housed people feel more reliant on outdoor public spaces for socializing and recreation. Consistent with the Protocol, maintenance of parks and other public spaces should not be used as a rationale to police and displace people who are sheltering outside.
- The City currently has a hostile working relationship with people who shelter outside that is premised on the City using its power to surveill, harass, and displace people. This could shift to a respectful working relationship where the City works with people who are sheltering outside to find out what kind of spaces would improve safety, shelter, and access to necessities such as clean water, bathrooms, showers, and safe food storage/cooking facilities. City facilities could be readily adapted

for these purposes and by engaging in this in a respectful, collaborative manner the City could also be well positioned to work on broader community initiatives such as reduction of discrimination against people who are living in poverty.

Council has not followed through on its stated commitments regarding alternatives to policing.

- After years of community campaigning to divest from policing and invest in communities, at the June 25, 2020 meeting Council directed staff to report back on how to develop a framework for an accessible, culturally safe, and appropriate alternative response model -- in time for consideration as part of Council's 2021 budget deliberations. Council also instructed staff to as part of this process hold a virtual community town hall and provide a range of opportunities for individuals and communities to engage, with "strong representation of those disproportionately harmed within the current system namely black, Indigenous, and POC communities, TNB2s people, persons with lived and living experience (PWLLE) of poverty, homelessness, mental health challenges, or substance use".
- Neither the framework for the model nor the robust community engagement have happened in time
 for the public consultation process on the Draft Financial Plan. Instead, according to Mayor Lisa Helps'
 January 3, 2021 blog post, Island Health and the VicPD are working together to create a response team
 for mental health calls -- though this team is also not mentioned in the VicPD budget so it's unclear
 what is contemplated. The City's role going forward is not clear.
- As the primary funder of the VicPD, the City has a responsibility to divest from policing and invest in
 communities. As was conveyed to Council years ago, and has been repeated since, the right role of
 government in this is to resource communities most impacted by policing to determine what would be
 a more appropriate investment of public funds. It's essential that <u>alternatives to police be designed</u>
 and run by communities, not government; and that any alternative be non-coercive (unlike policeembedded Island Health teams). Replacing police-only response with police-embedded response is still
 supporting a policing response.
- The Community Wellness Peer-Informed Task Force (CWPITF) hasn't finished its work, but has no budget for 2021/22. The CWPITF, comprised of people who have experienced or are experiencing homelessness, mental health struggles, and struggles around substance use, was created to make recommendations to Council for a Community Wellness Strategy. The CWPITF is supposed to continue until Council has adopted a Community Wellness Strategy, but because of COVID that hasn't happened yet. While there are issues with how Council created this group (particularly the framing of people who are unhoused, using substances, and having mental health struggle as a problem population needing response), it is a way that people have been able to identify for Council the problems with a police-oriented response. Why is Council not resourcing the completion of the CWPITF's work?

Instead of divesting from policing and investing in communities, the City is increasing policing-based approaches by upping VicPD and Bylaw resources.

• In the 2019-20 fiscal year Bylaw had 10 FTEs, in 2020-21 this was increased to 17 FTEs (a 70% increase) and the plan for 2021-22 maintains this increase. The proposed VicPD operating budget increases by

over 1.47%, with a whopping \$61,193,160 to VicPD operations and a further \$1,546,000 proposed for VicPD capital costs. *At a bare minimum, the VicPD budget should not further increase, Bylaw's staffing should revert to 2019/20 levels, and tangible plans should be set out for a process to divest from policing and invest in communities.*

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• From an ethical perspective, it is troubling that the City is prioritizing spending millions of dollars for rule compliance rather than investing in community well-being. Policing approaches do not make our communities safer, they make them less safe for people who are racially and socially profiled. Policing doesn't build social cohesion, meet people's survival needs, or address tensions relating to injustices and inequities. As evidenced by the past 30 years, social problems can't be solved through investing in "law and order" approaches and infrastructure.

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Police spending far exceeds other municipal spending and needs to be reined in. According to Statistics
Canada between 1985 and 2013 police expenditures in Canada almost doubled, even accounting for
inflation. From 2009-2019 the VicPD received a cumulative total of \$12,840,711 in new funding, with
the City's portion being a cumulative 31.59% increase (compared to a 12.1% inflation increase in the
same period), and its budget expanded again in 2020/21. After so many years of expanding police
funding it is not appropriate that the police budget continue to expand again this year. The five-year

financial plan is even worse, with a 6% increase in the VicPD operating budget projected for 2022/23

and then increases above the rate of inflation in the following three years.

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• The Draft Financial Plan mentions that as part of the City's adopted Strategic Plan regarding "Good governance and civic engagement", there is a commitment to "exercise fiscal responsibility in policing expenditures" (p. 16). Continuing to increase the VicPD budget is not fiscally responsible, particularly in a year where many departments have had to freeze or decrease spending to reflect decreased City revenue due to COVID.

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• In particular the City should set out a tangible plan to divest from funding police as a response to health and social issues, which currently comprise a very significant portion of the police portfolio (in 2014 the VicPD Chief estimated 75-80% of calls related to homelessness, mental health, and/or substance use; an October 2017 memo from the VicPD to the Police Board identified that 19% of incidents responded to by VicPD have a mental health component). According to a recent media analysis of police data, the VicPD recommends more charges for drug possession than any other municipal force in southwestern 'bc'; in 2019 the VicPD Vrecommended possession charges nearly four times more often than the 'vancouver' police department (despite covering an area 1/6 the size of that covered by the VanPD). The City should commit to decriminalizing all health and social issues and use

funds divested from policing these issues to invest in meeting real and urgent community health and social needs.

- While Council can't control how the VicPD operationalizes its funding -- including how it manages its
 workforce -- Councillors can refuse to fund specific line items and can direct the Police Board to come
 back with a lower budget. Particular line items for consideration:
 - **COVID decreases:** In COVID times, there should be drastic reduction in lines for VicPD travel and conference attendance, the Late Night program, and policing of large events. At the current predicted rate of COVID vaccine rollout, there is no reason to think any of these lines will be needed in 2021/22.
 - Stop increasing police PR: The proposed VicPD budget for 2021/22 includes a \$192,055 (9.30%) increase to the VicPD Community Engagement Division. This comes primarily from the public relations unit, including a 50% salary increase, 26% benefits, and 26% increase to IT repairs and maintenance. It is not appropriate to increase funds for VicPD promoting itself.
 - Police overtime is out of control and needs to be curtailed: Overtime has more than doubled in just three years, with 36 units in the VicPD making a collective ask for \$2,962,090 overtime in 2021/22 (\$2,833,750 for officer overtime and \$128,340 in civilian overtime). According to a 2019 Victoria News story, the VicPD spent an average of \$1.2 million on overtime per year from 2014-2018. This abrupt increase is not projected by the VicPD to be a temporary blip -- their five-year projection assumes overtime will continue to increase above the rate of inflation. In March 2020 VicPD Chief Del Manak blamed four years of rising mass protests for increased overtime costs, but that's not supported by the VicPD budget; only three of the 36 units that have overtime budgeted for 2021/22 are identified as having a role at protests, and their combined overtime budgets are \$115,620 (4% of the total overtime). Whatever the causes, overtime can't be supported at this rate.
 - More patrol means more risk for racially and socially profiled people: The proposed budget includes a \$808,384 (4.13%) increase to the VicPD Patrol Division, including a projection of \$905,000 in overtime -- a \$103,000 (13%) increase from 2020/21. Increased police patrols have a particular impact on Indigenous and Black people who are unsheltered, who are both racially and socially profiled but don't have private space to escape "proactive patrols" (page 603) and other police surveillance and harassment.
 - Increased policing of vulnerable people increases risks: The Behavioral Assessment & Management Unit has the mandate to target those "deemed highest risk to offend and/or most vulnerable to be victimized" (page 701). Its budget is proposed to increase by \$130,001 (22.3%) in 2021/22, with salary and benefit changes consistent with

addition of an officer to the unit. This is particularly worrisome in its potential to increase police presence in the lives of low-income Indigenous women, sex workers, people who are sheltering outside, people with disabilities, 2spirit / trans / non-binary people, and others who live at the intersections of oppression. Forcing police presence on people at risk of victimization is re-traumatizing and has the potential to result in increased risk of arrest for people who are both vulnerable to victimization and also engaged in illegal survival economics, e.g., drug sales, theft, etc. Decisions about who is at highest risk to offend is also highly subjective and supports increased racial and social profiling.

- Clarification needed on Financial Crimes Unit increase: The FCU has significant proposed budget increases including a 51% increase in core salary (not overtime), 54% increase in benefits, and 400% increase in conferences/travel. It's not clear from the description on page 691 whether this unit only investigates major white-collar financial scams or also could jeopardize people with low incomes who may partially rely on check kiting or other similar kinds of low-level fraud for financial survival.
- Police do not belong in schools: The proposed budget includes \$384,730 in 2021/21 for police in schools, with a five-year plan to increase by 2.5% per year. Putting police back into schools after the hiatus from 2018-2020 threatens the safety of youth who are racially and socially profiled, particularly Indigenous and Black youth. The use of police to deliver presentations on substance use also contributes to shame, stigma, and criminalization of people who use illicit drugs.
- Along similar lines, the City should revert to 2019/20 Bylaw staffing levels and freeze the Bylaw budget

 as the increase in 2020/21 was primarily to address increased Bylaw monitoring and enforcement
 regarding outdoor sheltering. Public funds should particularly not be allocated to support enforcement
 of bylaws against sheltering outside, or chattel bylaws that prevent homeless people from being able
 to safely leave their belongings in public spaces. This criminalizes and punishes people for being
 homeless.
 - **24/7 sheltering = 24/7 interference in people's lives:** The Parks Regulation Bylaw has for years been a source of profound misery for people sheltering outside. While the decision to temporarily allow 24/7 sheltering in COVID times has meant relief from the stresses of daily displacement, it has also come with 24/7 interference in people's lives.
 - Like police, Bylaw are enforcement officers not outreach workers. People living outside need supplies and supports. Bylaw officers can't take that role; their job is to watch people to see if they are breaking City rules, and if so enforce the rules through pressure and coercion (euphemistically called "education"). If the City wants to have outreach workers who can act as a liaison with the City, this needs to happen outside of the Bylaw division and have no enforcement role.

 Bylaw officers are harassing people living outside: People living in parks and other green spaces have reported -- and bystanders have witnessed -- extensive harassment by Bylaw officers, including individuals being rousted early in the morning for non-

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consensual "welfare checks", having to repeatedly move all of their belongings regardless of weather, having belongings seized or destroyed by Bylaw even after officers were told belongings had not been abandoned, having community-built infrastructure dismantled even while negotiations were underway with City representatives for permits, Bylaw officers standing near sheltering sites making offensive comments about people living in those sites, and Bylaw officers do repeated walk-throughs of sites where people are living.

 Increased Bylaw presence also increases VicPD presence: Supporting increased Bylaw enforcement also increases policing and criminalization, as Bylaw officers often request VicPD accompaniment.

SUMMARY

The Draft Financial Plan continues a toxic, colonial approach that continues to steal land and wealth from Lekwungen people, fails to meet the most serious survival needs, and spends an extraordinary amount of money on surveillance and punishment of a small but highly marginalized group of people -- those sheltering outside. I call on Council to radically reconfigure the budget to align with its own Strategic Priorities, and to begin to set out a process for transitioning from our current highly dysfunctional (and unsustainable) economy to relations with home and resources that are based on care, consent, and respect.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed 1.5% increase in the Victoria Police Department (VicPD) budget. Instead, I am demanding that the VicPD budget is frozen until meaningful community engagement takes place to determine how funds should be redistributed in communities.

I was absolutely horrified last year when 30 armed police officers arrested 12 Indigenous youth, one by one, at the BC Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum after a peaceful sit in. Seeing VicPD close the curtains at the BC Legislature so they could arrest 5 peaceful Indigenous youth with no onlookers gave me nightmares, and filled me with a fear I cannot put into words. It was traumatic to watch VicPD drag my friends, these 5 Indigenous youth with good hearts and inherent rights, into police vans after hours of not knowing where they were or whether they were safe. I was disgusted that the city allocated an additional \$52,000 to the VicPD to increase policing of unhoused communities around Topaz Park, and embarrassed that the city even considered that as an option. These disturbing events and the trauma they caused, along with the explosion of international support to defund the police and address systemic police violence against Black and Indigenous people gives me hope that the city of Victoria will stop pouring money into this inherently violent institution and start addressing the real and social determinants of crime, which begins with making sure people's basic needs are met - not increasing police budgets.

I am appalled that the city of Victoria continually allocates a greater percentage of the municipal budget to the VicPD than any other municipal function. I believe a budget increase of 0% is the only appropriate action at this time given the following:

- COVID-19 has resulted in a substantial decrease in revenue for the City of Victoria, requiring Council to make more fiscally responsible decisions for the 2021 budget cycle.
- As a result of the fiscal challenges related to COVID-19, municipalities across Canada are either
 freezing or decreasing their police budgets, including the City of Vancouver that recently voted to
 freeze their police funding for 2021.

As a response to fiscal challenges related to COVID-19, municipalities across Canada are freezing or even decreasing their police budgets. This includes our neighbours in the City of Vancouver - on the traditional territories of the Squamish, Musqueam, and Tsleil-Waututh people - who recently voted to freeze 2021 police funding. I am calling on Victoria's elected officials to follow suit and commit to a 0% increase to the VicPD's 2021 budget.

In addition to the fiscal considerations of increasing the police budget, I also urge you to consider the social ramifications of increasing police funding. In response to protests in the US and worldwide following the killings of George Floyd and others by police, Mayor Helps' issued a Statement on the Need to Take Action Against Racism stating that "we need to step up as allies and condemn racism in all its forms" and that "[c]ondemning racism and building understanding requires more than words, it requires action." How can the VicPD keep our community safe when they refuse to engage genuinely and empathetically in "those hard conversations" around racism within the police force and to "truly listen when people share their experiences of racism in Victoria" (Helps, Statement on the Need to Take Action Against Racism)?

To be clear: increased police presence does not keep us safe. I am calling for a reallocation of city funds from policing into programs and services that are proven to support the well-being of all community members such as community outreach programs, anti-colonial mental health services, housing initiatives, income security, harm reduction services, arts and cultural programs, anti-colonial forms of social work, conflict resolution services, transformative justice, and other vital community-based support systems.

- There is a high prevalence of hepatitis C virus (HCV) across BC that is unaddressed. My research demonstrates that HCV is a mitigating circumstance in the overdose epidemic.
- Hepatitis C is a significant factor in behavioural aspects that lead to reactive policing rather than
 proactive services which would be significant in reducing impulsive behaviour and the need for policing
 interventions which can be fatal.
- Local research suggests that people with late stage hepatitis B or C infections are not included in palliative care services and are, in effect, kicked to the curb due to lack of resources. (See *Death is a Social Justice Issue* or *Too Little Too Late.*)
- VicPD spends between \$1.35 to \$1.5 million on Administration of Justice charges with added costs incurred by the Crown Council. The federal government has advised against these types of warrants since 2015, Repeated FOI requests for data have been refused by VicPD suggesting a deliberate obfuscation of the practice going back to 2016. As someone who has worked closely with unhoused communities for the past 15 years I can assure you that investments in affordable housing and community supports do far more to create change for vulnerable communities than increased policing. Truly, as someone who has worked in these communities in professional roles, I have seen first-hand the violence and harm that is inflicted in poor, vulnerable and racialized communities at the hands of police, specifically the Victoria Police Department. Over the years, VicPD has worked hard to re-brand themselves as essential workers and tried to assert their need to provide services along the lines of outreach and community mental health support. This approach does not work, and in fact, only further entraps folks in cycles of criminalization and poverty through increased surveillance and contact with police. Further, Victoria PD in particular has engaged in incredibly harmful and stigmatizing propaganda that frames people living with mental illness as dangerous to our communities in an attempt to maintain their relevance and act as though they are the only solution to the difficulties that we are facing.

As someone who is low-income myself, I have witnessed housing in Victoria increasingly become less and less affordable each year. Many of us who are housed and employed are simply one paycheque or renoviction away from becoming unhoused ourselves. This precarity is absolutely unstainable and detrimental to the long-term health of our community and city. It has been tragic to watch the housing crisis in Victoria expand year after year, and at the same time to witness VicPD continually eat up a lion's share of the budget while the city wrings its hands about affordable housing. Now is the time to re-prioritize and to finally give our communities and most vulnerable citizens the care and support they so deserve.

At a time when calls to defund the police have never been louder, the City of Victoria has an incredible opportunity to be a voice and beacon of change. Good evening,

I'm writing to you from the traditional territory of the Songhees and Esquimalt people, as a resident of this city for the past twenty years.

I'd like to share my observations and thoughts with you regarding the proposed 2021 City of Victoria budget. The first pertains to the Police budget and its tone deafness to the current trends in social consciousness. All of the City of Victoria's strategic priorities are better served by funding programmes at the community level. None are well served by increasing police presence. In fact, many priorities are undermined by involving the police. If the Covid-19 pandemic has taught us anything, it's that prevention is key. Increased police presence does not keep us safe.

The Strategic Plan Goals of the Vic PD department (City of Victoria Draft Financial Plan 2021, p. 581) list "FIGHT crime" before "PREVENT crime". It is a shame to see that the Patrol Division budget is nearly five times the budget of the Community Services Unit and nearly 10 times the budget of the Community Engagement Unit.

I'd also like to note that the overtime spending for the Patrol Unit was over \$1,000,000 in 2019. In 2020, the budget was \$800,000, though we don't have the total amount spent yet. The 2021 budget for overtime is up by 12.5%. I urge you to reflect on whether or not this overtime was absolutely necessary.

I attended the demonstration in support of the Wet'suwet'en and watched online as countless police attended a non-violent demonstration. I saw more police present at that event than I have seen at many a New Year's Eve event where thousands of drunk and rowdy people are in attendance. I would urge the Victoria Police to spend more money on cultural education led by Indigenous and BIPOC people and to reflect on whether they are responding proportionately to the actual level of threat.

I urge you to focus on Prevention over Policing.

The second pertains to budget items that do not appear to reflect reality, namely conference and travel costs. By my quick calculations, the 2021 budget includes nearly half a million dollars in conference and travel costs. This seems ridiculous in a time when non-essential travel has been limited by the Provincial Health Officer and when everyone is using web-based meeting software. Indeed, conference attendance has increased across the board because more people are able to attend due to the fact that they no longer need to spend money on travel.

I thought that perhaps the spending on conferences and travel had decreased in 2020 due to pandemic restrictions, but many departments showed an increase from 2019. It does seem that half a million dollars might be better spent on more urgent public needs.

To tie these two issues together, I observe that in the Police budget specifically the proposed Conference/Travel budget for the following groups has increased: Public Affairs (p.592) up by 25%; Community Programs (p.596) up by 20%; Finance, Purchasing and Supplies (p.609) up by 50%. I do not believe the increase in these aspects of the budget are warranted. I urge you to reflect on these requests. Instead of increasing the police budget, consider funding community outreach programs, anticolonial mental health services, housing initiatives, income security, harm reduction services, arts and cultural

programs, anti-colonial forms of social work, conflict resolution services, transformative justice, and other vital community-based support systems.





I am writing to you to bring to your attention, a project that I read in the City's budget highlights. You can see it in the photo below circled in red. I will explain my concerns below the first photo.



As you can see in the second photo below, is a satellite map of the area in question. At the moment on both parts of Douglas there's two way traffic and it works pretty well except for the traffic going towards the ocean on Douglas - the side next to the buildings- needing to turn left which face very poor visibility.



Another problem is the tourist buses that used to park on Douglas before but which now park on Dallas, as noted on the map in red, which further reduce visibility.

If the city closes down the part of Douglas which is the curve around Beacon Hill Park, I have the following questions:

- 1. How would this in any way increase the green space in any significant and meaningful manner, when we already have a whole park and a lot of green areas along the ocean?
- 2. In what way would it be beneficial for traffic?
- 3. In what way would it be of any benefit to anyone to justify the expenditure?

In my humble opinion if this goes through it will:

- 1. Reduce good traffic flow existing today. Most cars and bicycles coming from the East on Dallas that want to go downtown turn on that curve! That is the most natural way for traffic to flow to downtown.
- 2. Increase traffic on the side of Douglas next to the buildings, all of which are multi residential serving about 85 residents. With less than 20 functional parking spaces in the back of one of those buildings, the need for street parking is imperative. How will a two way traffic with tourist buses to boot work there? That means that to help traffic flow the street parking along the green

will have to end. That means even less parking available!

3. It will increase traffic congestion, increase accident risk for those turning left on Dallas as the traffic on Dallas will increase since the Douglas curve will be blocked.

I propose instead that:

- 1. The Douglas road curve along the park- remain open and functional as is.
- 2. That the part of Douglas along the buildings becomes one-way only, that is downwards to the ocean and with only right turn.
- 3. That a new parking area for the buses is created instead marked in blue on the map that will allow maximum two buses to park there for a maximum of 30'.
- 4. That no buses are allowed to park where they now do, in the area marked red on the map.

I understand that budgeting for 2021 is a challenging task with the significant decrease in revenue experienced by the city as a result of COVID-19. These challenges will require that you make more fiscally responsible decisions, especially in working with a 0% tax increase.

With this said, I am concerned to see a proposed increase of 1.5% to the VicPD budget, when other areas of the city's budget are being cut (e.g., planning, engineering and public works etc.). I recognize that this is a small increase compared to previous years, but the continuous increases to the police budget every year are very alarming, given what we know about how police disproportionately target Victoria's most marginalized community members (Indigenous, Black, people of colour, transgender, Two-Spirit, queer, people who use drugs, unhoused people, street-based sex workers, people with disabilities, people experiencing poverty, etc.), and put their lives at risk.

In the midst of a global movement to combat racism and police brutality and defund police forces across the country, I do not support an increase to the VicPD budget and call you to take the City of Vancouver's lead by freezing the 2021 budget at 2020 levels, while you continue to work with community on ways to direct funding to preventative, culturally-appropriate, compassionate and community-based alternatives for dealing with mental health, substance use and poverty. I also urge you to ensure that any work done to develop alternatives to policing DO NOT include the VicPD. I am aware they are becoming involved in the development of an alternative response model, and I want to warn you that any VicPD involvement in such an endeavor will alienate the community you need to make any alternative initiative successful and actually do what it is meant to do.

I recognize that, as a result of the pandemic, mental health, substance use and poverty have become more visible in our city and there are certain residents that feel that police presence is needed to improve public safety. First of all, this is not a good reason to increase the police budget when we already have more police per capita than another other municipality in Canada with more than 100,000 people. If the summery is to only gives some information, then I would request that the full document also be made available in an accessible format. Please withdraw my earlier question and include the following question instead.

I am a screen reader user who has a seeing disability. The accessible summery document does not include information regarding the Accessibility Reserve. I have been told that the full document does include this information and a sighted peer has informed me that only \$17,000 of the 1.5 million reserve is to be transferred out in 2021. Many accessibility concerns raised by the Accessibility Working Group in the past five and a half years were deferred to the Accessibility Framework. Given that the Accessibility Framework and Short Term Action Plan was adopted in November 2020, I am concerned that so little of the reserve funds are to be used in 2021. What accessibility improvements does the \$17,000 include? Have departments included accessibility improvements identified in the Action Plan in their operating budgets and therefore do not plan to use reserve funds? If so, please explain what these are as I cannot access the information.

Question: How is Council to make decisions about priority and trade-offs, according to the Policy, when it is not being asked to make decisions on funding the work in the Accessibility Short Term Action Plan, in which every item is said to be subject to availability of resources?

I am also submitting what will fit in the form on the 2021 Budget engagement page. I could submit a 3 minute video or speak for 3 minutes, and yet the limit of 400 words for submitting a question is much more restricted. When I read my question, it takes 28 seconds. Why the disparity? It feels inequitable. The question will not make much sense to residents without the background I included above.

Elected Officials and the Victoria/Esquimalt Police Board,

I am writing to express my total dismay at the proposed 1.5% increase in the Victoria Police Department (VicPD) budget.

I am calling upon you, and all our elected officials, to freeze the VicPD budget and begin meaningful action to divest resources from the Victoria Police Department and invest in meaningful change. Most importantly, we need to be equipping communities with the resources to provide for their own safety and wellbeing, not throwing money at a police department with a track record of unsolicited violence and harassment of racialized minorities, the unhoused, and those living with mental illnesses.

In 2017, Michael Regis of the UVIC School of Public Administration published a report titled <u>Policing in Greater Victoria: A Study in Addressing the Gaps in Engaging Greater Victoria's Diverse Communities</u>. It has been consistently ignored by the Police Board despite containing incredibly troubling evidence of blatant police misconduct, and worse. Here are some excerpts:

- Profiling and over-surveillance were consistent themes within the findings of Muslim, Aboriginal and African-Caribbean groups of this project. They indicated that African-Caribbean residents feel that they are unjustly targeted, stopped, ticketed and maltreated by the GVP and are profiled at a greater rate than any other race.... Similarly, the findings indicated that Aboriginal residents of Greater Victoria are regularly profiled by the GVP because of their race and regardless of criminal history. This is highlighted within the literature which indicates that Aboriginal people are stopped by police, overcharged, detained, held without bail and sentenced to jail at a far greater rate than any other racial group in Canada. (p. 70)
- One participant mentioned that her son is regularly targeted and stopped by the Greater Victoria Police even though he is not involved in crime. Her son is scared to leave his home because he hates being pulled over so frequently. He is a construction worker and is regularly stopped as he is walking home from work, even though he has his construction tool belt and work clothes on. She stated that officers are rude to her son and do not offer him a rational reason for being stopped. In another experience, her son was stopped by officers after buying a drink at a corner store. An officer grabbed his drink without asking and smelled it to see if there was alcohol in it. (p. 33)
- A young adult participant shared an experience of going out for ice cream in Victoria with one of her friends late at night. She noted that neither she nor her friend looked rough or suspicious in their appearance. She stated that when walking down the street, the police drove by and looped back around, stopping in the middle of the road near where they were standing. One officer looked over at the participant and asked her for her name while ignoring her friend who is white. The participant disclosed her name and the officer looked at her and responded with a cocky "ok" while slowly driving away. The participant was dismayed that they did not ask her white friend for her name, or disclose why he stopped both of them. She felt that the experience ruined her night and is confused why the

police of Greater Victoria always think she is up to something sinister. **The participant mentioned that she is consistently stopped by the GVP for no apparent reason other than being African-Caribbean**. (p. 38)

Mayor Helps' Statement on the Need to Take Action Against Racism on June 3, 2020 proclaimed that "condemning racism and building understanding requires more than words, it requires action." Action would look like divesting millions from the VicPD and investing in affordable, public housing, for example. But instead, I am appalled that the city I have called home my entire life would prefer to invest more money in the police force which has worsened conditions for those living unhoused in this unaffordable city. The confiscation of personal belongings on Pandora St earlier this year and the removal of crowdfunded showers from Beacon Hill in November were horrific and should have led to consequences for VicPD. However, these events are sadly consistent with the way law enforcement rolls in this city and I am dismayed that municipal government continues to be complicit.

Instead, it continues to oppress and harass our most marginalized community members (Indigenous, Black, people of colour, transgender, Two-Spirit, queer, people who use drugs, unhoused people, street-based sex workers, people with disabilities, people experiencing poverty, etc.), and puts their lives at risk.

VicPD have proved themselves completely incapable of being attuned to inclusive community safety and wellbeing. Why on earth does VicPD own a militarized vehicle, essentially a tank, which cost \$320,000? According to the police statistics made available by the provincial government, VicPD in 2019 alone:

- threatened to shoot 119 people;
- threatened 24 people with 'extended range impact weapons;
- shot 12 more people not included in the stats above (including a woman who was shot and killed on Christmas Day by three projectiles in the back of the head and neck);
- threatened to taze at least 41 people;
- tazed 14 more people;
- threatened to pepper spray 10 people;
- pepper sprayed 18 more people;
- threatened 52 people with police dogs and had the dogs bite at least 4 people.

At the very least the VicPD budget should be frozen so that precious municipal resources can be more appropriately allocated to much more beneficial community services. I am appalled that Victoria's governing bodies continually allocate the single biggest piece of the budget pie to the VicPD. From a purely financial perspective, this is preposterous for numerous reasons, including the following:

Considering the knowledge that Victoria is on unceded territory of the Songhees and Esquimalt nations and that Victoria, British Columbia, and Canada as institutions are founded on colonial control and cultural genocide as determined in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, there are a few aspects of the 2021 draft budget for the City of Victoria that are highly concerning to me.

First, considering the above and the fact that Victoria has committed to work towards 'reconciliation' and relationships with local nations, I am concerned with the fact that the Draft Financial Plan neglects to substantially address Indigenous sovereignty or engagement with Indigenous nations. While COVID-19 undoubtedly had a drastic impact on the City's finances, the City has a clear responsibility to consider the redistribution of stolen land and wealth by including nation-to-nation engagement as an important part of the 2021 budget.

Additionally, I want to express my deep concern with the proposed 1.5% increase to the VicPD. By increasingly funding the police in each budget, the City is deprioritizing the health and safety of those most vulnerable. Increased funding of police systems and bylaw enforcement is a highly expensive and clearly ineffective way to address homelessness, poverty, substance use, and community mental health concerns. I am asking that there is a freeze to the 2021 VicPD police budget, and further funding allocated towards alternatives to police systems. A city budget, 23% of which goes to policing, is not an equitable budget that is focused on reconciliation and relationships with local nations, but rather one that priortizes the politics and desires of those with land, money, and power. Please freeze the VicPD police budget.

Finally, I am highly concerned with the fact that the 2021 budget has a decreased budget for affordable housing. As an outreach worker in the field of harm reduction for the past 8 years, two of which have been in Victoria, I have seen first hand the desperate need for access to housing for seniors, Indigenous people, youth, and others who are experiencing homelessness. While housing is often passed off as provincial jurisdiction, the City has an innate responsibility to address this need immediately by allocating a significant portion of its budget to solving the problem, and doing so with guidance from local nations so as to not further colonial control of unceded territory. By freezing or reducing the VicPD budget, funds could easily be allocated towards affordable housing and community-based support systems. I am asking that we reflect our values in the 2021 budget and instead of investing in further forms of colonial control and criminalization of vulnerable populations, that we freeze the VicPD budget and instead invest in community needs.

Dear Mayor Helps and respected councillors,

I would like to start by saying that I am a proud Victorian, born and raised. I live in James Bay near Dallas Rd. I consider myself extremely fortunate to live in an amazing city and a beautiful neighbourhood. I am writing to you all to bring up an issue that has me troubled. In your Budget Summary for 2021 I noticed bullet point number five;

"Invest \$270,000 in capital to remove the roadway between Mile O and Beacon Hill Park to create a continuous green space."

I must say, the removal of that road would be ill advised. Here are my reasons:

- 1.) It is my understanding that the section of road you are proposing to remove is part of Circle Drive. If I am not mistaken that was once a race track in the 1800's. Would that not make it historically significant? Are you planning on re-naming that road as it would no longer be circular? In a city rich with history, with an affinity to try and protect and maintain that history, it seems odd you would disregard this portion of Victoria as not being important enough to protect.
- 2.) As a close resident of the area in question, I can say with all honesty that the road you're hoping to remove is by and large the more used road by motorists going north and south on Douglas St. Why is that? For starters, if you're driving south towards Dallas Rd it is much easier and safer to turn left as you have perfect sight lines in both directions. Motorists heading west on Dallas can easily follow the curve of the park and head up north on Douglas, instead of having to turn right at the Mile O sign and drive up the hill. Those who drive that area regularly know that to turn left onto Dallas from the other Douglas Rd is particularly difficult as it is a T intersection with no line of sight for vehicles travelling east on Dallas Rd. It is quite common to see motorists slam on their brakes who are turning left off Douglas because a vehicle comes whipping around that blind corner too fast.
- 3.) One issue that may have been overlooked is the tourist bus industry, who ferry sightseers to Mile O and the Terry Fox Monument regularly in the spring and summer months. Currently buses are able to park along Dallas Rd near Mile O facing west. Buses travelling south on Douglas to Dallas Rd can easily use the left jog of Douglas to safely turn right onto Dallas and park at their designated spot. Upon departure they may continue west along Dallas or they can turn right onto Douglas St and head back north from where they came. Effectively, they are using the roads exactly how it's designed, like a triangle. I ask you, if you remove a portion of that triangle, how do the buses reach their stop? It seems to me there are only two options. The first would be any bus travelling south on Douglas

would have to turn at the Watering Can and connect onto "Circle Drive", pass the petting zoo and the totem pole before exiting on Dallas Rd. Seems simple enough. My only argument is that increasing the volume of buses by hundreds through a park that is supposed to be geared towards pedestrians seems a bit counterproductive. More buses, more noise and more pollution through a park seems wrong. So, the other option I can think of is having the buses heading farther east to Cook St. There they can travel through Cook St Village, past a kid's playground and towards Dallas Rd to turn right. I'm pretty sure the residents of Cook St and Cook St Village would have something to say if hundreds more buses were driving south towards Dallas Rd for the same reasons going through the park is a bad idea. More noise, more pollution. So I ask again, what about the tour buses?

- 4.) Another issue that will arise if that road is removed is parking. There are currently up to 12 parking spots along that stretch of road along the park side. Some spots are used by visitors from time to time who are either visiting the park or someone in the neighbourhood. Some of those spots are used by care workers who work at nearby senior homes, Amica being the closest one. Even the odd camper can be seen parked there for a day or two. Regardless of who is using it, they are much needed spots. In an area that is already sparse of parking, taking away those would put added pressure on the surrounding residents. Those parking spots are very important to those who use them regularly.
- 5.) At the moment when travelling south on Douglas the road forks at Battery St. One veers left towards Dallas Rd while the other continues straight down towards Dallas Rd past the monuments. At that fork is a large painted median or "island". Delivery trucks who deliver goods and food to Amica, the assisted senior living complex on Douglas use that island to park and unload. They are off the road and do not block line of site to any motorists traveling by. They park there because Amica does not have a commercial parking zone on Douglas, nor on Battery or Niagara St. Amica relies on that median for its deliveries. Removing the road and altering Douglas to be just one straight road would eliminate that median. So where do the delivery trucks park? Sounds like Amicas problem. A problem you will have created for them.
- 6.) This last point really hits home for me, as it directly affects me. There are currently over 100 people living on the first block of Douglas St in 4 different rental properties, myself being one of them. Right now we enjoy the relative peace and quiet from the traffic that go by these properties. That is in large part due to the fact most traffic takes the other leg of Douglas. That other road, the road you're hoping to remove, truly gives us a reprieve. Taking that away will mean all the traffic will be coming and going out front of our buildings all the time. More noise, more pollution, more traffic. Half will be heading south towards a T intersection that is already very difficult to turn left at. But they won't have a choice. All the other traffic travelling north up Douglas off of Dallas will have to accelerate up the hill, because they won't have a choice. Meanwhile, us residents will have to endure that added traffic and noise because we won't have a choice. It seems a bit unfair.

Now, I am not naive. I am aware that proposed alterations at Mile O have been ongoing well before I was even born. I am aware that the James Bay Neighbourhood Association, led by Marg Gardner, have been working hard for years to make their own alterations come to fruition. All come from a place of good intentions. But in reality, that small stretch of road is truly essential. To remove it so as to create a continuous green space and connect Beacon Hill Park with the Mile O greens, in an area that is already rich in green space, seems a bit near sighted. I understand the need by many to have better accessibility into the park. I feel that with additional sidewalks/paths on Douglas and Dallas on the park side, along with a few more lighted crosswalks could solve a lot of problems and promote traffic calming. It would also be a lot more cost effective than what you are proposing.

I'll finish with this. In your budget summary you state that because of the pandemic funds are much tighter. On that basis alone it seems weird that it is even on the budget for this year? It seems like those funds could be used elsewhere on more pressing projects. Until our economy recovers it seems irresponsible to spend that kind of money at a time like this on a project that in my opinion would create more problems than solve. I am more than happy to speak to anyone within the Engineering and Public Works department, or a council person or even the mayor herself to offer up my 2 cents on what should be done in regards to this project and offer up other solutions on how to connect Beacon Hill Park and Mile O effectively.

I would like you to consider the following changes to the draft budget to make more funds available for affordable housing as well as for providing the basic levels of sanitation/hygiene and other services that should be freely on offer to those currently sheltering in our parks due to COVID-19 forcing them out of shelters:

- Do NOT re-allocate the Late Night Task Force money back to the VicPD allocation but rather keep it to address homeless supports (page 136)
- Increase property tax by 3.5% (rather than the 1.75% proposed) and put the additional \$2.5 million this will generate into getting people out of tents into something like tiny homes or Conestoga huts while they wait for more suitable housing to be constructed
- Do not move \$3,517,740 to a contingency reserve account for unspecified emergencies (pages 547-548) but rather use this money to work on providing affordable housing for people throughout Victoria immediately whether by using this money for rent supplements or using other approaches

I would urge you to be bold in these difficult times. What lessons can we learn from other jurisdictions and organizations? For example, Chef Jose Andres of World Central Kitchen (https://wck.org/) has brought chefs together across America to address COVID (and other disaster) related hunger. He has turned his restaurants into community kitchens. The Red Cedar initiative in Victoria is great but we need to expand on that and see how we can diversify it into other sectors.

I will close with a link to a video of Al, an unhoused person currently sheltering in Beacon Hill park, reciting a poem he wrote about the deplorable state of housing ... in 1998.

As such, I am writing to say that I vehemently oppose any increase in budget to the Victoria Police Department, as proposed in the 2021 Draft Budget.

A 1.5% increase may seem inconsequential, but this money is desperately needed elsewhere, and there is no reason that a department that already gets such a high portion of the total operational budget should be given even more resources. In fact, given the research showing that police in Canada disproportionately kill Black and Indigenous people, police departments should be given MUCH LESS funding (sources: https://newsinteractives.cbc.ca/longform-custom/deadly-force; updated with 2020 data: https://newsinteractives.cbc.ca/fatalpoliceencounters/). The numbers in these reports are not accidents or coincidental; they show racism at work. Mayor Helps said on June 3, 2020 that "Each of us must stand up and call out racism of any sort, anywhere, and anytime, each and every time we witness it. We must have those hard conversations. We must truly listen when people share their experiences of racism in Victoria." If you had done the "listening" and "learning" that you said you would do, you would know that this action, of NOT increasing the police budget, is the absolute least that must be done.

These funds could instead be used (for example) to provide much needed support to the houseless people in Victoria who are so often vulnerable to the police themselves, who are, as well, facing winter weather AND the COVID-19 pandemic. As a society, we stigmatize poverty and use the police to do it. It does not have to be this way.

I watched closely as the police forcefully moved people needing to emergency shelter due to covid from place to place to (in my opinion) appease land owners. The treatment I saw and heard from my friends volunteering to support those in need due to covid, absolutely disgusted me. Our community poured in donations of goods and sheltering materials which were thrown out by the police in order to force people to relocate. Police also antagonized some of our most vulnerable individuals that our province swore to protect during covid. I cannot support an increase in funding to the police budget in my municipality, or the continuation of this treatment of our homeless population. I want to see resources for supporting our communities increased. How can we rebuild relationships with each other if we prioritize suppression and policing over our parks, libraries, and community development?

Police are not an effective way to increase the "safety" of a city, however, they are an effective way to commit violence against houseless and marginalized people. I understand that the goal of the police budget is to reduce crime and enforce laws, but this is not the way to do it.

To reduce crime in victoria, we need to provide the people who are committing crimes with adequate access to mental health services and the resources they need to survive, so they do not have any reason to commit crimes.

To reduce the number of houseless people living outside in victoria (and thereby reduce the number of emails city council receives complaining about houseless people),

- We need to fund services which are based around social workers and people who understand and take a non-violent empathy based approach to helping and supporting houseless people.

Good evening,

I have attended Victoria and Esquimalt Police Board meetings for nearly three years. In that time I have witnessed a Police Board that is disinterested in criticism of the harms of policing, or in any self-reflection about its role in proposing increased police budgets which directly fund those harms.

It is unacceptable at this point to be unaware of this fact, but if it is a needed reminder, the Victoria Police Department profiles and surveils Indigenous, Black and Muslim people, and it targets, harasses and harms people who live in poverty and people who use drugs. Recent research published in the Vancouver Sun, for example, found that VicPD recommends more charges for possession than other police force in southwestern B.C. — far, far more.

In 2019, VicPD <u>used weapons to threaten at least 248 people</u>, including a minimum of 37 people they believed to be in mental health distress. That includes officers threatening to shoot 119 people, including at least 26 people VicPD believed to be in mental health distress. Also in 2019, VicPD used weapons on at least 48 people, including a minimum of 24 people (50%) they believed to be in mental health distress. And on Christmas Day, 2019, VicPD and the emergency response team shot and killed a woman by shooting her three times in the back of her head and neck with ARWEN rounds.

I write to request that City Council at a minimum freeze the Victoria Police Department's 2021 budget to 2020 levels, and preferably cut it far below that level to begin divesting from policing. If you support a planned quarter billion dollars in spending over the next four years on the Victoria Police Department, it means directly supporting continued violence and harm to the community.

Dear councilor:

Here we go again!

It was brought to my attention that in the budget summary for 2021 that point number 5 states;

• Invest \$270,000 in capital to remove the roadway between Mile Zero and Beacon Hill Park to create a continuous green space.

Every few years someone on council, or in the Planning Dept, gets a brilliant idea to do something that will inevitably make life difficult for the 100 permanent residents living in the first block of Douglas St. Once again it's the old idea that "Beacon Hill Park is just not big enough", or some such nonsense, "so let's remove the road section between Dallas and Douglas next to the Mile O greens"; a section of road that is of historical significance, by the way, since it makes up part of Circle Drive which goes around and through the Park and which was famously used as "the horse racing track of the colony" back in the 1800's. I have two old maps, one from 1878 and the other from 1889 which show it very clearly.

Removing that short portion of road will accomplish nothing of any practical value, but it will cause considerable harm to the quality of life of the 100 or so people living in the first block of Douglas, between Dallas and Battery St. Over the years we have had to fight City Hall on more than a few occasions because of this same silly idea and a few others, dealing with our block. For example, some years ago a group of us went to City Hall to meet with Mayor Alan Lowe to ask him to have the cruise tour buses avoid turning left onto Douglas and instead proceed to the next intersection and turn left there, onto the very road that you are thinking of eliminating. One reason we asked for this was because there is a slight uphill grade in the first block of Douglas and the buses (hundreds of them) would accelerate all the way up, spewing their smelly, greasy smoke and making a hell of a racket all the way. It nearly drove us all crazy! Not only that, but if we left our windows open, as people do in the summer, it covered our curtains with soot! Thankfully, Alan Lowe agreed with us and spoke to the tour bus companies about staying off that section of Douglas St and so life went back to being pleasant again. Not only for us and our tenants but for the many, many tourists milling around the Mile O monument and crossing

Dallas Rd to get a closer look at the ocean. Needless to say, we were very grateful to City Hall, even though it was not their problem.

My family of 5 Personal information

for 75 years now and we've seen everything you can possibly imagine happen there. We know that spot better than anyone alive, and I tell you that this latest idea is totally unnecessary and a complete waste of money which the city cannot afford. Not to mention the fact that it will deeply affect, negatively, the enjoyment of those 100 people who spend their lives there, day in and day out! We're not tourists just out for a short walk, we live there and go about our daily lives right there, day after day. This matters to us in a big way!

One final point: as very longtime observers (and in our minds "caretakers") of that small bit of Victoria, we <u>do not</u> see people moving from Mile O <u>into</u> the Park going north. Nor vice versa: coming from the Park going south down to the monument. If anything, they move from the monument and across Dallas to look at the ocean. Or across Douglas to take pictures of our buildings, which they seem to find fascinating and beautiful. I happen to agree with them. Mile O has been our pride and joy for 75 years and we have always felt responsible for its care and maintenance. It is why we have always done our absolute best to keep our buildings and grounds as presentable as possible, because they are part of "the Mile O experience" for the tourists.

Please forget this idea of removing that "historical portion of road" in order to join the Mile O greens to the rest of the Park. It's not worth it! And we're getting very tired of fighting against it. Shifting 100 per cent of the traffic onto our block would be a dangerous mistake and detrimental to all of us who live there and love it the way it is.

I have been deeply disturbed by the behaviour displayed by VicPD toward marginalized and radicalized folks, and I do not believe that any budget increase would be appropriate at this time, for the following reasons:

- COVID-19 has resulted in a substantial decrease in revenue for the City of Victoria, requiring Council to make more fiscally responsible decisions for the 2021 budget cycle.
- The VicPD budget is the City's highest operating expenditure, with a whopping 23% of the City's total operational budget.
- The City of Victoria's 2021 Draft Financial Plan allocates \$60.7 million of its \$256 million budget to the VicPD, a 1.5% increase from 2020.
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As a resident of the City of Victoria, I am calling upon you, and all our elected officials, to freeze the VicPD budget and begin meaningful action to divest resources from the Victoria Police Department and invest in meaningful change.

Mayor Helps' <u>Statement on the Need to Take Action Against Racism</u> on June 3, 2020 proclaimed that "condemning racism and building understanding requires more than words, it requires action." Unjust police violence continues to occur throughout North America, and right here in our city.

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I am calling on you to use your power to create a safer city for us all by freezing the VicPD budget and meaningfully engaging with targeted communities to determine how to work with them to meet their needs. I was just going over the 2021 Draft Budget Summary when I noticed #5 in the budget highlights.

"Invest \$270,000.00 in capital to remove the roadway between Mile Zero and Beacon Hill Park to create a continuous green space."

You must be kidding, is this some kind of a joke?

Why would you spend money to remove a perfectly good street? All traffic travelling west on Dallas Road uses that street to connect to Douglas on their way downtown. They would be forced to turn at the T intersection at the foot of Douglas and drive in front of the apartment buildings at the end of that block. After years of disruption the owners and residents of those buildings lobbied successfully to get the tour buses to stop using that route. When cruise ships were in town, the noise and exhaust fumes from all the buses going by was almost unbearable. I can only imagine what it would be like if all the traffic from Dallas is forced to use that route all the time day and night.

In order to turn left onto Dallas at the existing curve there is a stop sign and good sight lines in both directions. If you have to turn left at the T intersection at the foot of Douglas the visibility to the west is restricted. With constant traffic it would be a high accident zone.

When was this ill conceived plan approved? I don't remember any public forms or discussion with stakeholders. Just all of a sudden there it is in the budget. There is not a logical reason given, it just states that you want to create a continuous green space. There is already a continuous green space running from Clover point to the Ogden Point Breakwater.

The very first sentence of your 2021 Draft Budget summary states

"The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted cities worldwide and the city of Victoria is no different. We're experiencing significant revenue reductions this year, which is projected to continue in 2021."

So why in all good conscience are you proposing to spent \$270,000.00 to remove a perfectly good roadway, that will disturb approximately 100 residents and to make the streets far more dangerous? There is crumbling infrastructure all around this city that needs attention. This is an unnecessary waste of limited resources.

Every year our property taxes increase, please focus on spending these taxes on essential projects not frivolous make work projects.

This astronomical police budget is unacceptable and requires serious action. - 1. To never again vote to increase the Victoria Police Department budget.

Instead of investing in the police, our city must prioritize alternatives like child care support, education, comprehensive mental health intervention and social support, peer-based programming, housing initiatives, income security, harm reduction services, accessible rehabilitation, conflict resolution services, transformative justice, access to recreational facilities and other vital community-based support systems. These initiatives must support our most oppressed and repressed communities, take leadership from, financially compensate and center the experiences of Black and Indigenous peoples in Vancouver.

I urge you all to reach out to redistribute our tax dollars and effect actual change in keeping communities safe by consulting directly with, funding, and otherwise supporting the local organisations that do amazing work helping our community members.

I'm asking that our city is among the first to eradicate the notion that police are necessary for safety and order, and that harmful policing is the only solution to the many issues we face as a community, when in fact the opposite is true. We must create a better future for all, and there is a surplus of evidence and experience to tell us that policing is not the answer and only causes further harm. Defunding the VicPD will save lives and increase the overall health of many intersecting communities in Victoria

Hello City of Victoria, Mayor, Council and Staff,

I just took your online budget survey but was disappointed at the lack of detailed questions. It seemed the questionnaire focused more on sorting the citizens in the appropriate demographic categories than on hearing what citizens have to say on the actual line items in the budget. Your survey last year was much more detailed and better designed!

My key feedback on the proposed budget is that **property taxes need to go up more**. As the City itself acknowledged in the budget documents provided, there is a revenue gap due to Covid-19, and many residents and businesses are suffering. This suffering is NOT going to be alleviated by less taxation, rather the reverse! **Let the households that can afford to own real estate in Victoria carry their fair share!** I just learned from another city pdf, about housing, that the median cost of a new two-bedroom condo is over \$800,000, and of a new detached home more than \$1.5 million! Compared to these staggering sums, a median tax increase of \$44 per year is ridiculously small. Ten times that would not bee too much!

The City should raise more revenue from taxation, and by securing more grants from senior governments, in order to spend it on the following:

- (a) buying land for, and building, non-market affordable housing incentivizing co-ops and land trusts (which actually is in your strategic plan)
- (b) incentivizing market affordable housing through public-private partnerships
- (c) urgent construction of housing for the unhoused why can't we already house the 300 homeless people living outdoors (the number estimated in city documents)?
- (d) incentives and short-term bridging help to businesses especially in the hospitality industry that are at risk of closing due to Covid-19, or that are operating at lower capacity, leading to more unemployment
- (e) additional help for seniors and families with children who can't fully meet their nutritional need (expanding the Good Food Box program, for example with matching funds from the City)
- (f) acquiring properties for future non-market housing, and community gardens

Meanwhile, I appreciate your efforts in 2019 when you listened to citizens and reduced the police budget. **Not a penny more should be given to Vic PD above 2019 levels until**

there has been a comprehensive community consultation about public safety and the multiple ways it can be delivered, not just through more police officers and more expensive equipment for them.
