


OUR ASK


That the City of Victoria suspend consideration of a 25-cent fee on single-use cups and work with the Diverters
Foundation and other local NGOs to find a more equitable solution that addresses the issue of single-use cup waste.



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OUR CONCERNS AND QUESTIONS?

- Who is being consulted on the development of this new bylaw?
 - Are more equitable policy applications being explored?
 - How are single-use cups currently being recycled and what's the success rate for diversion from the waste stream?



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WHAT OUR MEMBERS SAY

- The fee will have an outsized impact on the diverter community.
 - Mug sharing systems are less accessible to those with low incomes.
- A fee absorbed entirely by businesses doesn't ensure that cups will not find their way into the waste stream and doesn't support a community already in place and able to help.

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WHAT DOES THIS KIND OF FEE MEAN IN PRACTICE?

What this means in practice is that people who can not access alternatives to single use cups will be, almost singularly, responsible for paying into a system that they will never be able to participate in.

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WHAT DOES THIS KIND OF FEE MEAN IN PRACTICE?

While a fee on disposable cups may seem like a good idea, the reality is that it will unfairly target people of lesser means. In the best case, the fee will be used to hire a living-wage dishwasher to handle the number of reusable cups needing to be washed, but the reality is it'll likely simply end up in general revenue. We need a better approach, one that encourages businesses to work with a local group such as The Diverters to divert those disposables from the landfill, and one that does not place yet more barriers on low- or no-income folk.
