

Work done several years ago by DVBA. If Government St to be renewed, it needs to be relevant to people who live or work in Victoria. That means food and hopping - not buses or dedicated transport of any kind. Government form Pandora should be the people street - business deliveries before 10 am as is done in much of Europe.

Survey has completely avoided any questions related to the key issues that plague Government Street:
Crime, vandalism, homelessness, panhandling, open drug use. Huge impoacts on the viability of businesses and visitors

There are a couple of aspects that would commit to the pedestrian element downtown. First you need to lose the curbs, and make the entire sidewalk and street, one flat surface, with bricks or paving stones. Second you need to introduce bollards at Humboldt which go up and down according to the hours reserved for pedestrians. Let's make this a world class area.

The city needs just a few bisecting streets going north/south and east/west that are pedestrian/cyclist only. Government Street would be a perfect start. Ban cars. Give us somewhere to walk where we aren't choking on exhaust fumes.

I like the pedestrian only elements, but I think bicycles should be excluded as well. Let people spread out, and let the businesses push out. There is a bike network along wharf and up Fort St., lots of places to cycle. This should be PEDESTRIAN ONLY; I saw a family have to pick their kid up to avoid a bike and I have to do that with my dog as well on some of the more narrow corridors where patios have pushed out and seating (red benches) are added. Also would be nice if it extended all the way to Yates.

Just get rid of the cars entirely please

Be bold! Make this one of the best public spaces in not just Victoria, but in Canada. It's a rare opportunity to have a centrally-located, deeply historic, popular space that isn't an essential traffic corridor. The tourism, culture, and community possibilities are immense! For businesses worried about reduced parking, create a space that everyone wants to visit and business will benefit!

I would feel more safe and welcome if the street was car-free

Would love Victoria to have a dedicated walking street like they have in Europe! Streetside cafes and restaurants on a walking street sounds like a great tourist destination

The temporary street closures have been excellent in providing an attractive place to visit downtown. Government Street connects well with the harbour/waterfront area and the Bay Centre. It feels much safer and more welcoming without traffic, much more pleasant to dine on the patios, and when I drive around the CBD I don't miss the road access. It would be nice to see the closures made permanent and the street developed to support

parades/festivals and events.

Less people camping in doorways

I strongly support prioritizing people over cars on Government St, so I think the steps taken towards this over the past year are wonderful. I would encourage more movement in this direction. The idea of more patios, areas for children to play, and further restricting car use, more art and events on Government St sounds amazing.

Pedestrian and bike only would be a boon. Most tourism-heavy cities have a pedestrian mall and if done well will boost business. Also, make sure to encourage buskers, don't make licensing too onerous and don't keep too high a bar. Buskers make a downtown more lively and engaging. And they do it for tips! They are underrated yet make up the essence of a city's vibe.

Less vehicles.

Last summer's pedestrianizing was great, please make that permanent and expand it!

No cars... There are enough drivable streets around downtown that closing Government Street to vehicles 100% of the time will not make a big difference.

Increase safety and cleanliness. I've been hassled by violent, homeless addicts and the experience is not pleasant. I can only imagine how tourists feel. Downtown in general absolutely has a safety issue.

Government Street would be more welcome if there were fewer tacky



souvenir stores.

I would love for it to be open to pedestrians only during the day after delivery times and definitely throughout the summer. More patios would be great.

Vehicle traffic is necessary on government street during the week. Closing the street for pedestrian use on the weekend makes sense but not during the week.

I love the street closed to vehicles. I have been for that for 30 years.

We love walking and rolling on Government Street, but as seniors, we sometimes feel unsafe (panhandlers, skateboarders, people with alcohol/drug/mental health challenges).

Keep it pedestrian oriented with accommodations for accessibility

Opening government Street to pedestrians year round is long overdue. It would help the tourism industry. It would help downtown. It would help make Victoria a desired destination.

I would like to see more of government street closed off so more people can enjoy what the downtown core has to offer

No matter what, we can't afford to let cars (other than essential deliveries for businesses) ever back onto the street! We are finally on verge of a European-style old town heritage "high street" that where residents can create culture and tourists will talk about when they go home!

Get rid of cars. Always looking over shoulder for cars. No need for them

in all of downtown. More bike lockers so can enjoy shopping. I don't bother anymore since just locking up is not safe. Do what Vegas does and have paid lockers for bikes.

fewer souvenir shops, more boutique shopping

Eliminate all vehicles

Anything but bike lanes

The city shouldn't go out of its way to accommodate tourism. Those tourist trap shops only sell overpriced crap and then vanish in winter. The vacancy rate in winter is largely responsible for killing life on Government St.

Please ensure that operators of patios maintain adequate space for pedestrians adjacent to their outdoor spaces: some make it very difficult to maintain adequate distance in sidewalks between establishments and patios, and their podiums for menus/seating add to the clutter. Thinking specifically here of the Bard and Banker and the sidewalk between the building and the patio on Government south of Fort. The patio plus the podium leave enough space for maybe one pedestrian at a time, safely.

For those of us with disabilities who need to drive, it can be impossible to find parking

I dont think all of government should be closed off. i think road closures really work for small streets like on View from government to broad or broad street from fort to broughten. the current government st is too long and not animated enough. Also looking car traffic is a loss for business as some of the best shopper are the ones driving by.

Keep trees and parking. Still allow access for cars, especially in the fall and winter.

I value (currently) the absence of big buses that make me feel unsafe. I value the liveliness of patios and people gathering. I value the buskers, the sidewalk chalk art.

I would like to see Government as the main pedestrian only walking street in Victoria, closed to vehicles other than emergency response between 9 AM and 5 PM. It is done all over Europe with great success.

remove vehicles

As Esquimalt residents, we do almost all of our shopping downtown, and travel there by bus or bike. Making Government St. even better would encourage us to spend more time and money downtown on merchants.

drag like Waikiki does. Make it people centric with a defined look to attract people into the zone. Build it for locals not tourists. Tourists will come if it's cool.

I would like to see more of a police presence and less homeless people and crackheads peeing in doorways.

Accessibly by ALL modes of transportation is the key to success in revitalizing any area of any city around the world. Its about carefully balancing all interests especially after the devastating affects of Covid for all small businesses.....and thats all Victoria has is small businesses.

Government Street needs to be a destination, somewhere that attracts both visitors and residents, that is attractive, interesting and charming, that shows off it's historic building facades. A place where you can have a coffee, ice cream or meal and not have vehicles driving by inches away, where young families or elders can stroll without the risk of being hit by speeding cyclists. It should provide a contiguous link from the inner harbour to Bastion Square, Market Square and Chinatown. It needs a WOW factor so that it would feature in a Lonely Planet guide as a "must see" (Broad Street is getting close).

Accommodate EVERYONE walkers, bikes and cars (remember
car lanes also accommodate horse &
carriages and pedi-cabs as well as
seniors and those with disabilities
who can't walk or ride). Reduce it
permanently to one vehicle lane
open 24-7 all year long in the middle
with traffic flowing in the direction
from Humboldt to Chinatown with a

very low speed limit. Move the bike lane off Wharf Street and on to Government Street (yes, I know money wasted, but that's where it should have gone in the first place). Expand the width of sidewalks in narrow areas and expand restaurant patio space. Love the existing trees for shade and ambiance, keep or replace with the same/similar and replace/add circle benches around the tree trunks. Add many more benches for sitting, particularly in the shade. Would love to see all patios a bright red for postcard pics! Add string of white lights above/across the street for evening glow. A Win-Win design for everyone.

Less cars, more patio space

I would like it to stay closed to cars and to have the road changed into an accessible walking / sitting area.

to becoming a pedestrian promenade
without vehicle access. The many
promenades I've visited throughout
the world bring so much more culture
and atmosphere to a city, and vastly
improve tourism, traffic for local
businesses, public space, events,

Before investing any more time and money on this Government Street initiative, please first address the ongoing and traumatising crime, open drug use, and violence on Government Street and elsewhere downtown so that both perception of safety and actual safety is restored.

I feel less safe being downtown.

There are so many people who seem more aggressive than in the past that has stopped me visiting downtown and government street. I feel this is a major issue that needs a better plan in place. In the meantime, I would value more security presence on government street.

The sidewalks can be very busy in the summer with tourists - and with people driving on the street - closing the street to car traffic and making it more welcoming and interactive for pedestrians and cyclists would be great. More family/kid activities - a playground or things for kids to do!

I was walking down government street with my dog yesterday and while it's closed at Humboldt it was still open at Courtenay street. Government (as well as the streets that run from East to West from Douglas to Government) should be closed to vehicle traffic from Humboldt to Yates year round aside from certain hours to allow for deliveries. After living in Europe and seeing this in action we do not have to live in such a vehicle centric community. The people driving through that area do not need to, it just creates a less welcoming environment for pedestrians.

For government Street and ALL other Victoria neighbourhoods, I would like to have a City Council who will design the entire city in a consistent, safe, professional and accessible manner.

More restaurants and non-tourist shops would mean a better, safer experience at night.

Given diversity of community - more outdoor market opportunities in the summer and even include night

markets on certain evenings similar to what you might see in Asia - these are fun for tourists and residents alike. Patios that expand out further it is very social and if there are good food options more will come. Avoid cars as much as possible. Music and artists who are working - that may be more an inner harbour event, but there is likely spaces that the downtown could think about. I am thinking about the laneways in Quebec City and the wonderful artisans you will see as you stroll through the city. Street art with meaning - similar to Seattle - this is interesting. Highly promote water tourism - similar to what you might see in Chicago on the river. Given the nature of the city and its moderate climate, Victoria should look to other great cities and incorporate the very best of what they offer. While new to the city, this is a great opportunity to make the most of the gains achieved through the pandemic in terms of more space for walking, running, fewer cars, etc. Victoria with its many bike paths and walking paths should continue to move towards alternate transportation methods and promote that component heavily elsewhere.

Lose the cars. Government is a nightmare to drive on already. Model it off of whatever that street is in DT Ottawa, very similar feel already. More patios, pedestrian only, low speed bike, and for goodness sake, sweep the streets of the homeless. It's a disaster and giving them free everything isn't helping.... I'm the furthest from an expert that there could be but can we not better fund social services, St Vincent DePaul and other mental health initiatives instead of just buying them hotel

rooms and hoping they don't burn them down?

I would like to see a car-free, bikefree pedestrian mall

With an aging population, maintain long access and parking to all areas of Victoria needs to be a priority. Eliminating/reducing parking and vehicle access coupled with implementation of bike lanes is ostracizing our seniors and disabled to be able to safely and conveniently access all areas of our city.

Nothing at this time

Incentivize local businesses instead of tourist traps. A bolder approach to closing vehicle traffic with clear indications that you are safe to walk in the middle of the road. A day/night market during the summer/holiday months

it would be awesome to have it closed to vehicles (except deliveries) and have as a town square type of feel to it

I love the idea of this being a car-free zone.

I really love the pedestrian priority you started during the pandemic. Keep it please!

Government Street is no longer an area to walk through. I now walk around to avoid the patios, people eating and drinking and noise.

All great cities have areas that are pedestrian focused. Let's not squander the changes we've made to Government Street. Instead, let's amplify the pedestrian experience,

make it exclusively for people rather than cars, and create even more vibrancy and energy on this street. It's been such a pleasure to amble on Government over the past year.

Dog friendly patios and places walk and people watch! Charge for a special dog licence that permits calm, well trained pups to sit on shaded patios at designated restaurants with responsible owners.

I think Covid has helped City Hall bring out the better side of Government Street: more outdoor patios, fewer cars, and a slower pace. Please don't backtrack! Please continue to move in a more human direction.

Close Government street to motor vehicles of all types.

Less homeless and open drug use.

If you're going to allow vehicles in certain sections of Government Street, but not in others, there needs to be VERY clear signs and physical barriers to stop drivers from entering pedestrian only zones. It's terrifying to cycle or cross the road not knowing whether a driver will see the signs or come up the road in the wrong direction. I personally would prefer the whole street to be pedestrian only like Stephen Avenue in Calgary. There's enough parking downtown that people should be able to park and walk to their destinations on Government Street, with accessible parking and drop off zones for people with mobility limitations.

Full and permanent removal of motor vehicle traffic.

I value the people-scale of the storefronts, the shopping, restaurants, pubs, bars with a cozy atmosphere that makes it a destination. To improve the experience, I would like to see Government Street, or at least a portion of it, as a shared-space street where the pedestrian experience is prioritized and events could be held. I think it is important to maintain the heritage facades with their beautiful details but that the new streetscape infrastructure (lighting, furnishings, plantings) should be a contemporary expression of our time (it is not a museum but a living street!). I would like to see more attention paid to the maintenance of the street and business awnings (including seagull mess) so that it looks well kept and clean for residents and visitors. (Perhaps a Business Improvement Area could be established?) I think it is important to use high quality materials for the pavement - stone would be beautiful - could even be a pattern like Strøget in Copenhagen. Accent lighting to make evenings feel special will be key. Overall, we should invest in this important piece of our City's public realm. Hopefully this will help to attract quality retail to improve the shopping experience and will become an updated expression of life in Victoria today.

Yes - Gov't St is not 3 blocks - the City needs to expnad its view to Chinatown so that Johnson St, Pandora and Fisgard ALL benefit - locals don't go to the 3 blocks that sell tshirts and postcards. Extend it and encourage merchants and residents to do more - block parties, sidewalk sales - there used to be a lower Johnson event. Have a vision

that is expansive not limited to 2-3 blocks

more patios year round would be a bonus for everyone. Also please don't get rid of the paving stones on the sidewalks and anywhere else they are, they add so much more character than pavement

Amount of traffic on the street needs to decrease significantly. Look at the plazas and pedestrian areas in Europe - and even Stephen Avenue Mall in Calgary - to see what a busy vibrant place these streets can be. At the moment you never know if the street is open or closed to traffic.

Seeing more "parklets" as established by the City and local businesses during the pandemic would be welcome - some permanent place making would make Government a destination for more locals.

it would be nice to walk/ride through the street without feeling hassled by cars. also cars drive through sometimes blaring music, revving engines. just stop it.

would love to see more outdoor entertainment.

The elimination of cars should be a top priority.

Ban cars 24/7. More places for folks to hang out without having to spend money at business. More local food and beverage, art and culture; less souvenir shops.

Make the history of victoria more visible with like tunnels or murals showing what buildings used to be.
Allow cars to drive at least during winter because it's a magical place to

drive through. We can not have people begging for money and loitering if we want people to come downtown and hang out. It needs to be safer. Like an Europe's street with patios and businesses spread onto street. At long last, Government st should be used as more of a square and less as a road. There is no reason for it to be open to traffic downtown. Let the locals enjoy this amazing street! It could be so so much more inviting and fun. Hopefully something good will come out of Covid 19! As restaurants spill out onto the street further, some thought to a cohesive and pleasing aesthetic to the look across restaurants. More cleaning We need more parking downtown. I strongly support the city's efforts to limit cars in downtown - we need more of this! (and I say this as a car owner). Don't close it off to cyclists. If you do, please make it easier to access Broad from the current cycling infrastructure. I value any aspects of heritage that remain and would like to see them taken into account with any changes/additions to the street. Since most of the rest of the

> downtown has almost completed it's tranformation into a dense forest of towers completely out of scale to the

size of the city, it would be appreciated if it could remain an

oasis of scale and interest.

I love having a car free environment. I understand the plight of the underhoused but laying on the street or dragging bags of cans about isn't very pleasant, also sometimes I feel a little unsafe

I'm originally from St. John's, NL. That city has George Street, which is similar to what Victoria is considering and, as well as an amazing go-to place for locals, it is also a major tourist attraction. They have mostly pubs, but it is closed to traffic most of the day, great outdoor patios, and an amazing entertainment area. What they did has worked well there for at least 35 years, so I suggest maybe you research their model for ideas and to see what things they did would work here as well.

Greater visibility and better sight lines of the existing heritage buildings from street level. Maintaining accessibility for all modes of transportation including CAR!

I love the wide sidewalks and I love street musicians in the summer.

Please make it accessible to everyone including people with disabilities who use MV ad do not give a contract to Aryze to do any of the work

What's really lacking is interesting, local commerce to draw locals and visitors. Munro's is a great example of what we need more of. I live in



James Bay and often to downtown on foot. Government Street is a natural route for me to take. For people coming from other parts of town, there needs to be more of a draw. Having public art would be important, but commerce is what really keeps things moving.

Completely closed to car traffic only buses like Granville on Vancouver

People taking a leisurely stroll without having to accommodate bicycles and other wheeled vehicles unrelated to accessibility needs.

I would like to see an incentive program to encourage locally owned and operated businesses. Currently, the rent/lease situation on Government Street is so untenable it does not allow for smaller businesses to operate. The economic focus on the street should not be to promote a few cruise ship reliant businesses. If the current economic focus remains on cruise ships, the street will become less and less appealing to locals (and visitors seeking authentic experiences) and eventually become a ghost town when ships do not return in the numbers we saw pre-COVID. I would also like to see vehicles banned permanently from Belleville St to Johnston St (with an exception in the early hours for delivery vehicles). The street has the potential to draw in residents and visitors to walk, cycle, and enjoy the historic heart of the city. The space should feel warm, welcoming, and inviting to people of all races, genders, abilities, etc. Consideration should be made to incorporate local Indigenous voices, design the space for all accessibility needs, and consider the safety of those walking

at night. As Victoria is the "Garden City," I think it would be nice to incorporate more permanent garden beds on Government Street instead of relying solely on expensive flower baskets - an emphasis on local plants and foliage would be great (especially if they incorporated Indigenous names and histories).

I love how it is cut off from traffic right now. It feels so nice to stroll along and see all the outdoor patios.

More patio space for restaurants it is too cramped at the moment.

I would like to see functional seating/shade elements added for people to hang out on Government Street without having to spend money.

If you are going to close the street permanently, please provide opening hours for non commercial vehicles for curbside pick up that overlap when businesses are open. Please provide many more, well designated accessible parking spaces near by (room to swing doors open to unload walking aids, not on a steep hill, no obstruction from lamp and sign posts, curb cutouts etc). Provide unobstructed level pathways and sitting areas that can accommodate a range of mobility devices. Drop off zones are inadequate and deny independance access and use of the space..

I love having Gov. Street closed to car traffic this summer and seeing how vibrant it is, with so many people enjoying sitting on benches, talking, eating lunch or drinking coffee, reading, sitting at patios with friends, laughing, enjoying fine dining, and strolling along in the middle of the road with ice cream and little ones. (I think bike and skateboard traffic should still be OK too, as long as they are yielding to pedestrians, not sure if they are currently allowed.) It would be great to see more street vendors here. food trucks, local artisans, and live musical / theatrical / magical / comedy performances. The vibe could continue down the lower blocks to Wharf Street where there could be music festivals and special events down by the water, maybe even a seaside boardwalk ferris wheel / carnival, that would be awesome.

It's currently a wasted opportunity to add culture to the city. Cars don't stop there; they just pass through. Close it to traffic and put in retractable bollards that allow commercial vehicles to access it. Otherwise, 100% pedestrian zone with food trucks lining the street.

In the interests of traffic efficiency, transit efficiency, and fuel-saving:
Government St should be made into a three-lane road (two car lanes and a bus lane) with a separate bike lane, all one-way southbound, over the entire stretch from Hillside to Belleville. At the same time, Douglas St should be made one-way northbound (including a one-way bike lane) over the same Belleville-Hillside stretch. Anything else is a waste of time and money.

I'm sorry to bang on about this, but I believe that Government Street would be an excellent pedestrian thoroughfare. Permanently close it to traffic from Humboldt to Johnson or Pandora:)

I would love to see Government street and more of downtown in

general become inaccessible for cars. The great part about so many European cities are the city centers that are reserved for people, not built for vehicles.

I would like to see a pedestrian high street like Carnaby in London, or Liverpool One in Liverpool or other cool engaging pedestrian only areas.

Any pedestrian friendly street that I have been to has services and amenities at all hours. Government street needs to be seen as a 24hr space and also needs to have the ability to accommodate food trucks and pop up shops.

A pedestrian oriented Government Street, with a focus on patios, diverse local business and events would be a draw into downtown. There is a fantastic opportunity to make this historic corridor lively and local, so that tourists and full-time residents alike can enjoy it.

I would like to see Victoria City ,nice welcoming ,the Government Street with Trees and Flowers, Google other city's and you will learn what is possible!

I access Govt Street usually on foot, but also by recumbent trike and taxi. I have a disability, so these methods of access work really well for me (I don't drive or need parking specifically because of the disability). So yes there still needs to be access for those with disabilities who come by vehicle, but not all people with disabilities do or can drive (most of my disabled friends use recumbent trikes or taxis if it's too far to walk

with a walker, etc). More patios and less traffic! A vibrant retail community that offers a fun alternative to a shopping mall. Please close it to cars and open the street for people. I welcome an upgrade and "facelift" to the area. I am however, vehemently opposed to changing the current footprint. There has been limited vehicular access for many years and it has worked well with the extra wide sidewalks that line both sides of the street. There should be no diminishing of access for the myriad of tourist vehicles (buses, pedicabs, horse carriages) in addition to the folks who would like to drive through slowly and admire the beautiful old buildings. The closing of

> vehicle access would not only take away from the enjoyment of the area, it would force traffic onto already overburdened narrow streets. Also, dear mayor, please go fuck yourself.

No cars, more police walking the area

I do not believe that any change that does not complementary eliminate automobiles from the street (except for legitimate deliveries early morning) will make such changes an expensive boondoggle.

I'm very much in favour of a primary closure to vehicles like a European

town centre.

I most value those aspects that resemble the great pedestrian promenades in Europe, and I would like the street limited to pedestrian traffic as much as possible.

I would like to see it become a pedestrian street full time.

It is a good idea to make it pedestrian.

Highlight the heritage (as we are losing buildings and homes in James Bay and other areas at an alarming rate) to keep the "old" historic feel of a bygone age... if we mess this up, we can never regain it.

I think the city's progress towards

closing Government Street to vehicle traffic is a step in the right direction. It has plenty of opportunity to become a world class street in the heart of Victoria. I would lend my support for removing the large trees that block sightlines and take up extra potential space on the street between Humboldt and Pandora on both sides of Government. These trees take up valuable walking and outdoor recreation space. When I ride up Government street now with the portions closed to vehicle traffic, it appears to me that the ideal location for patios is on the brick walkways (not the street). but until the trees are removed, it doesn't allow that possibility. I would like to say I'm a huge supporter of creating an urban canopy with more nature and trees/foliage in the city's core.. however, I feel like the actual road on Government Street - is ideal addition for pedestrians to walk up and down the street, or those on

wheeled devices, wheelchairs, bikes etc. By keeping patios off of the actual road (or limited to specific locations) it would provide more room for arts and culture opportunities and general space for people to roam. The trees really limit the space on this stretch in my opinion.

Early morning mechanical street washing in Spring and Summer.

I understand the need for service vehicle access early in the day; however, it is so much better without vehicles. This should have been done long ago.

Vehicle traffic is unneeded on government as well as several other streets downtown. If we want a lively corridor that focuses on people first, traffic needs to be removed year round. This would also be nice for areas like upper fort where there is a large collection of delicious restaurants. Another aspect that can be improved is the number of restaurants on Government. There are very few and it would be nice if they were encouraged to move in.

I admire the City's initiative (with businesses) to limit vehicle traffic. Would be nice to have one day a week with no vehicle traffic and a chance to fill the street with entertainers. One of the worst things of Government Street is the noise (and pollution) of the tour buses.

The restricted vehicle traffic on Government Street that's been in effect during COVID is great, and I hope that the future of Government Street moves away from a focus on vehicles and transportation and towards pedestrian access.

No vehicle traffic from Humboldt to Yates!

I have long said that Government Street should be a year-round Urban Pedestrian Park (foot, bicycle, skateboards, hoverboards and mobility scooters only). Accordingly, I would like to see the elimination of curbs and sidewalks, which would not only fully facilitate people with mobility issues, but also invite people to swarm throughout the street. Trees and garden beds need not be planted in lines along the curbs, which again is a visual clue to stick to the edges of the road, but may be clustered in some places and spaced out in others, their locations coordinated to enhance public art, but also to slow bicycle traffic. Perhaps placed with regard to undulating designs in the cobblestones. This should be a place for meandering, not speeding through in a straight line. Accordingly, restaurant patios should expand into the street, to designated but not squared-off limits (think misshapen bubbles, perhaps designated by the cobblestones design), and without physical barriers fencing them off, thus allowing on foot pedestrians to wander between tables, and thus inviting a greater ambience of inclusivity. I have envisioned this Urban Pedestrian Park extending from Yates to Humboldt, because then only one through street would be necessary, thus eliminating the need for traffic signals within the park except at Broughton, which I choose as the through-road because of the carpark located between Wharf and Government. Obviously, it can extend as far as Pandora, but Yates and Johnson will have to remain through streets, which will interrupt

the ambience of the park. The park will feel like it has ended at Johnson, so that the block to Pandora will feel like an appendage. View Street would dead end at Government, since traffic cannot turn on to the street, and I would extend the park up to the entrance to the Bay Centre Parkade. Fort Street between Broad and Government, and between Langley and Government, would become part of the pedestrian park, offering opportunity for stage performances during community events like Canada Day, Jazz Festival and during Pride. Offsetting through traffic to Humboldt should encourage most drivers to find other routes through downtown (Humboldt, Yates, Johnson, Pandora, the last three all with carparks), but still allow access for deliveries along Langley. But there is more to envisioning a new Government Street than streetscaping. I appreciate the variety of unique and mostly locally owned and operated shops that already occupy the entire lower downtown area. This local flavour must be preserved (along with the heritage of the buildings in place). I do not want mall stores, like Eddie Bauer, Birks and Lush, to dominate (And neither do tourists who can visit such stores at home if they like). We have enough shopping malls. I think the current ratio of local and chain stores is acceptable now, so keep it there. please. Nor do I want the street to become essentially a food court lined with endless coffee shops, pubs, icecream and chocolate vendors, and cafés and restaurants of various styles. There are enough of these already, and plenty more in the surrounding area, and their variety is great. We should do more to

advertise the culinary richness of our downtown, but that's another topic. What I would like to see is quality local artisans filling up empty storefronts, such as W.J. Wilsons, with their wares: local clothiers, local jewellers, purveyors of preserves and condiments, and whatever else Victorians are creating: an yearround exhibition of what Victorians are doing, imagining, and being.

This is an incredible opportunity to bring out the best of downtown Victoria. A car-free and vibrant steet-level landscape on Government that extends to Pandora would foster more of the vibrancy that exists in places on Government already, as well as on Fort Street between Douglas and Blanchard, and on lower Johnson, Pandora and increasingly Herald st. These locations are what draw people of all ages and backgrounds to downtown which makes it feel welcoming and safe, not to mention fun and exciting.

Keep in mined that not all the homeless is form here ... why are we spending money on hotels for them .... Clean drugs and a cell phone????? We all know other provinces are sending them here for the winter.... someone needs to talks to make a phone call these city's / towns and take them back . Maybe at least they can send us money with them so we can put them up on the other towns dime and NOT OURS!!!!!!!!

Completely closed to vehicles. Why do they even need to drive up government street there is no parking and the traffic gets so congested by pedestrians.

Government street is meant for

tourists...if you want people who live here to go there then the store mix has to change

I would like the street, especially the awnings to be cleaned, and the litter picked up each day. It's looked pretty grubby in the last few years. Maybe students could be hired from a fund created for the purpose or maybe the vendors could contribute to a fund for the purpose.

Please do not touch the Bricks with family names on them surrounding old Fort Victoria

Allow only one lane of car traffic.

Make Government two-way for

Make it a showcase for the entire region: a place where local farmers and producers come to sell their products, a place where local and international talent comes to perform and entertain, a place where the best of the island and the world can be seen, eaten, and learned about. A shared conduit that is open to all who walk or roll to enjoy true theatre: the theatre of a vibrant and confident city. Weather protection and more benches would be nice too!

More police presence and continued or improved vehicle access

My vote is to permanently eliminate motorized traffic.

Vehicle free. Think The Stroget (Copenhagen)

I find it the height of hypocrisy that

your stated goal is that you "want to support downtown businesses impacted by the pandemic". You were brazenly disrespectful of both businesses and your residents by allowing the homeless/addicted/mentally ill situation get so out of hand; exacerbated by the misguided policies of SOME on council. A small handful of dysfunctional people, many criminal and violent in nature, were allowed to take over our city parks (f\*#King essential in a pandemic and with restrictions!) and

our city streets, including residential neighbourhoods, that impacted the 99.9% of the rest of our City! My neighbourhood (James Bay) was terrorized at night! I visualize a lively car-free urban area with year round greenery, food, art, exhibits of indigenous art, serving as a magnet for locals and visitors alike.



More diverse shopping for locals and visitors...less t-shirt stores etc














A fun and inclusive destination for Victorians of different ages!

There is a crying need for accuracy when describing the "age" of the current configuration. Perhaps it is approaching 50 years, but I clearly recall being able to drive DOWN Govt St and park outside Spencers Stores, where a school chum was working after we graduated. Also, my

first-ever MVA was in the southbound lane of Govt at Fort when the police car in front of me did not proceed on the green light. It's probably still on records somewhere at VCP. I was 18, so it had to be after October 1972. Again, less than 50 years ago. More seriously- Govt St needs to remain open to vehicles, at least partially. There are simply not enough ways out of James Bay to support the ever-growing population. Should the worst happen (Tsunami or other) how would they be able to retreat up town? Vancouver is done, Cook is already greatly reduced, leaving only Douglas, Blanshard and perhaps Quadra as ways out of the Precinct area.

No vehicle access, except early morning to supply businesses

I would love to see Government Street become Victoria's Ramblas, from the causeway to Chinatown. It is halfway there and transforming the street into a pedestrian promenade with street kiosks, restaurant and bar terraces, art and permformance building face to building face at least from 10 AM to Midnight during the summer months and the Christmas season and on weekends the rest of the year, would pull the energy from the causeway all the way along the street. It was totally shut down to vehicle traffic but open to pedestrian access, bike, e-bikes, skateboarding, etc. I love this idea, and to expand on busking and outdoor events in the summer would be really cool. Obviously, while incorporating a great shopping and dining experience.

I love the pedestrianization of Government st in the summer, eliminating vehicle traffic to me is the single biggest improvement that can be made. It allows for more activations on the street from patios to public art and performance. Great cities around the world have leaned into walkable streets that are a destination in and of themselves, Government can be that too.

please please stop running cars through this space - plenty of ways to accommodate deliveries etc - just look at Europe

public bathrooms (for family outings with little kids....)

Get rid of the cars during daytime.

There are plenty of other streets for cars. Create a pedestrian square with large areas where restaurants can set up dining, pubs can serve drinks.

Set up public areas for children to linger and people to perform.

Government St is just fine. Stop trying to turn it into a tourist attraction and make it work for people in this city.

Closing down the street poses issues for small businesses needing access for delivery drivers. How will you support small businesses woth this?

More inclusion of biophilic design features to enhance biodiversity. More space for crafters and makers including spaces that blend teaching, making and resale.

Beer garden/October fest events.

When tourists are here in full swing, the sidewalks are too narrow to walk comfortably, especially if they are walking in large groups. Keeping government street pedestrian-only will allow more space for locals and tourists to share the space together. I love walking down government street, but it's always been too busy with vehicles and tourists. PLEASE make it pedestrian-only. It would be awesome for events, in that case.

I would like to see fewer stores with the same touristy stuff in them. We need more diversity in what is being offered downtown.

Restore heritage buildings, do NOT ban cars, and get rid of the bike lanes and signals downtown, I've driven as far as Naniamo to avoid going downtown since Helps destroyed it.

My wife has MS and needs a walker/wheelchair to get around, Recent bicycle lanes and closures on Government though nice for others have made downtown in general and government street in specific far less accessible. 5 years ago, we traveled downtown regularly (more than twice a week), now 1 or twice per season

Street vendors and food trucks would also be a welcome addition.

More variety in businesses, less geared to tourists. Secure bicycle parking.

I think Government Street should be set up as pedestrian only. There are bike lanes elsewhere to accommodate "rollers" who are essentially wheeled traffic.

If it is to be truly accessible bikes need to be walked only in this area. Bikes cause a great risk to those if us with disabilities especially when they are celebrating a space without cars. If you are truly doing this no bikes allowed, they have a million other bike specific routes to use.

If Victoria is going to put culture and heritage on display we need to include a lot more Indigenous history. I'd love to see more street food vendors allowed as well as night Markets for food, music, and art.

Fewer tacky souvenir shops, no cars or buses, more secure bike parking

If you want to attract locals the shops have to sell to locals. Lose the t shirt shops.

It would be amazing if Government Street could become one of the great gathering and walking ("rambling") places of the world. For that it needs reasons to visit that go beyond tourist storefronts. Encourage food carts and trucks. Support musicians, buskers, and artists. Patios, patios, patios, but also comfortable places for people who don't have money to spend. Please include the Spirit (Centennial) Square in this vision - that space should be crowded the





seven or eight months of the year of great weather, but there's no reason to go or to stay. Storefronts alone do not make for a vibrant social area - but a vibrant social area will support the storefronts.

Keep vehicles out so that pedestrians can walk freely.

It just needs to be blocked off from Pandora to Humboldt from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 a.m. for commercial traffic only to restock.

I have always thought that Government should be closed to traffic and have a more European feel. Even in the fall/winter/spring there could be outdoor seating and people watching.

Focus less on activities for tourists and more on people who live here

I've lived in Europe for many years and the best cities have stopped all vehicle traffic in main areas of downtown. They have created large open squares and spaces as well as pedestrian only streets. For example in Brussels, Vienna and Venice. These spaces attract locals and tourists and create a sense of vibrancy. Many also have set 'walks' that you can pick up a guide from the tourist booth that lead you to heritage cites, popular eat/drink establishments and shopping areas. Victoria is very well suited to such a strategy as there are many such locations and opportunities in a close radius. I strongly support closing Government and other streets to all vehicle traffic. There will be strong resistance likely from commuters and the inertia of the status quo but the eventual result will be well worth the



fight ahead. With all the high density building going on, traffic is going to get worse. We need this street to help move traffic along. Would love to see replication of European models of walkable cities I appreciate that it is currently limited to cars. I like being able to walk along it and seeing new patios pop up is great. We need a bylaw which prohibits excessive tacky t-shirt shops and multiple store ownership selling the same merchandise. I would prefer only pedestrian access to the main part of Govt. st. This would allow patios to spread out across the road, making it less crowded. Less crowded makes it more enjoyable. Good and varied seating is also useful. Permanent patios and street performances I can't believe you didn't just ask if we want to close it to cars. Do it.. you know you want to More trees and flowers to enhance the pedestrian mall that is proposed. Also, if this is going to be a long-term project please ensure that it's "done right". No ugly concrete barriers /planters, no "homemade" restaurant patios, no "cheap and nasty" modifications to this historic and, potentially, beautiful street. Keep expanding the limited traffic lanes and amenities along Government and use this model to ban or restrict vehicle traffic on other

streets and transform them into safe,

attractive and green public spaces for pedestrians and rollers to gather and relax, Turn it completely into a pedestrian street like they have in downtown areas all over Europe, for cafes, bars shops and art & culture. Keep the cars out! Pedestrian only Allow delivery and service trucks but no cars. Help quiet the street with vegetation and trees to encourage people to linger and talk to each other without needing to shout. Create attractions for all age groups, from children to elderly - Don't focus only on patios and shopping or else it will become a "party" street frequented by young people and tourists only. Make Government an attractive destination for all residents. Open businesses that are accessible Very excited for this change! I would love to see it be pedestrian only (and bikes in specific areas). Have more greenery (trees, flowers). And encourage more outdoor dining. No motorized vehicles I value the street musicians and performers, and proximity to the outdoor patios. The pandemic made us be more creative about using the outside spaces in winter. I would like to see activity all year round.

I value a vibrant retail core. If there are only tourist shops then myself

and many others will not come downtown. We need to offer incentives to attract anchor tenants to downtown Victoria and in particular Government Street. The bigger name stores help to prop up the smaller local businesses all of which keeps our downtown alive and thriving. If the Government Street stores continue to become vacant, no amount of play structures or art will keep the public coming because many vacancies draws crime and other issues.....If you look to other cities and their efforts to pedestrianise their streets- cutting off cars, building up interest through art and family activities- it failed. The streets became ghost towns with vagrants and drug users. (Granville Street in Vancouver, 8th Street Outdoor Mall in Calgary, Sparks Street in Ottawa) We must have the backbone of the retail stores first if we want Government Street to survive. The city could market to the anchors using leasehold improvement incentives to draw them to the street. Go after and land the key Store names that bring traffic. Thanks for listening!

Make it a people place. That will serve wellness and the economy.

More people, no cars

Victoria seems to be more vibrant with pedestrian street and outdoor patios. Keep it going. We don't need cars on that street. Ever again. Just do it.

I think delivery trucks should still have access to the street during set hours perhaps until 10am each morning.

I recently had an accident that forced me to use a wheelchair then a walker. Some street to sidewalk access was very difficult and some slopes store to street were super challenging. Take a look and try to fix these, maybe using volunteers in manual wheelchairs to help determine where some modifications are necessary

spaces have been a huge success and could remain a huge success afterwards. When certain areas are closed to vehicle traffic, more pedestrians enjoy the space. I think that the municipality should extend the area that is closed to vehicle traffic. I also think that the municipality should extend the period that government street is closed to vehicle traffic for more than just the summer.

The tour busses for the hopeful return of cruise ships need access. With the construction at customs house, Government St is very tacky and concerning and loud. We need more high end shops and less tourist shops as they come off as cheap.

I would like to see electronic
RETRACTABLE car barriers set up
on the side streets at the
Government Street intersection so
that from 9 am to 6 pm Government
Street is only for pedestrians and
cyclists. Businesses can set up on
the side walks and food trucks can
go down the middle of the road if
needed. If you are going to rip up the
road to fix the sewer, you can make

the barriers RETRACTABLE. I would also like to see the street parking next to these barriers between 9 am to 6 pm to have one or two handicap spots at each intersection. This will allow businesses to get their goods shipped and free flow of traffic during non peak hours of pedestrians This could be done daily or from May-September . With diverting more traffic from this proposal, I would like to see Rockland Street reopened between Quadra and Vancouver to help with the flow of cars. Between closing roads, one way streets, bike lanes, paid parking on Sundays, it is getting less and less attractive to go downtown so I have stopped going unless I absolutely have to. I know that I am not the only one as many small businesses have felt the impact of Greater Victoria residents getting their services outside of downtown. I have found other businesses that have free parking lots and easy drives in other municipalities and I would rather go there then come downtown. Which is a shame because I used to love to shop in all the small local businesses and bring my guests there.

A high standard for the aesthetic of elements/buildings introduced

Have pedestrian zone all year round and have outdoor patios all summer!! There is no need to have car traffic on Govt St, except for folks with disabilities.

1. Recent efforts to reduce traffic have improved Government Street but even more restrictions would be welcome (e.g. reduce speed limit and enforce "unnecessary noise" section of noise bylaw). 2. Street performers are nice but they should be vetted for

talent and their volume should be controlled (e.g. no amplifiers). 3. Enhance amenities and services for the homeless so they can be more a part of the community.

It is an important corridor to cross Victoria by car. Both Douglas and Blanshard are already clogged. We need to keep this corridor open to car traffic. My workplace is behind the Royal BC Museum and on my lunch hour when I need to get to a store or access professional services, and I need to be able to get there and back within that time. Walking takes too long (I'm a short person, not a lot of length to my stride).

I appreciate the brick sidewalks and the greenery. I would be in favour of maintaining or increasing the greenery because it helps make the area less hot in the summer (and therefore more inviting).

Yes Government Should be Turned into a Promenade from The Visitor Centre to Chinatown. The Road Surface could Change to the Same Surface as the Sidewalk. This Will Completely Revitalize Government St. All The Best Shops & Restaurants & Hotels Will want to be on Government St. A New Hotel at The Corner of Government & Pandora.?? This will Greatly increase Tourism in Victoria.

I think Government Street has the potential to be a core attraction of downtown if it is made pedestrian only. I appreciate the current system where it is open to vehicles during specific times to allow for deliveries, etc. and then pedestrian only for the remainder of the day/evening (please block off the street better). I would prefer that it remain pedestrian only all year. There are great opportunities to bring in people during the winter especially for winter/Christmas shopping or for an outdoor holiday market. As a driver and cyclist, I generally avoid Government Street

now and usually go around either on Douglas or Wharf. The closed street and increased patio space has transformed this area to a welcoming civic space. Unique street vendors not competing with brick and mortar shops.

Go full time pedestrian/walking mall on Government street. It's tourist friendly, and allows businesses to create more outdoor patio space (including covered space for Fall). If there were a way to include cycling in the plans, I wouldn't be opposed, but I'm also happy to use Wharf, Fort, and Humboldt to get where I





need.

I love when government is closed to traffic. Busking and live music creates a positive, lively experience. I'd like to see more art and comfortable patios or places to sit and linger with a cup of coffee.

Plant more where you can.

I would like to see Gov St closed off to cars and made exclusively pedestrian friendly with out door seating for cafes, pubs and restaurants, similarly to a European experience. I feel both locals and tourists of all age groups will embrace the experience to enjoy a a walking, gawking, shopping, eating experience without having to breath in the exhaust, and talk over the noise created by cars.

Improvements that would make it a safer place to go and enjoy. I would love to be able to pass through by bike, but failing that, clarity on whether bikes are allowed would be appreciated. I would love if that section was closed to cars completely. When only partially closed it can be confusing with cars trying to drive into you. Also if there was less homelessness in general it would be cleaner and safer. It would be wonderful to have no cars on Gov't Street (as many other cities boast, esp. in the Netherlands) although bicycles would be alright.

Add more colour with awnings, umbrellas, window displays and outdoor art installations. Allow busker musicians to play although no more than one per block so not too noisy.

Makes me enjoy going downtown.

Public safety on all streets, not just Government Street. Go check out Pandora Street......another Vancouver downtown eastside in the making. Handing out free housing, free food, free camping in publicly funded parks by monies provided by contributing members of society (AKA taxpayers) does not make for a pleasant city. Certainly all the 'talking heads' from the government, local and provincial as well as social service and mental health and policing can come up with a better solution to these social issues. The taxpayers are fed up with all the freeloaders that are on the streets daily causing chaos.

When I look at plazas and shared spaces in European cities, I wish that our Gov't street was more like this. Right now, it's focused primarily on tourism and doesn't contain any amenities that I need as a downtown worker. I would like to have shops that are intended for both locals and tourists, which showcase locally designed and handcrafted goods - i.e., remove current souvenir shops. Replace souvenir shops with local artisan shops (check out MadeHere PDX) and establish an indoor market space. Include art installations and usable public seating. Expand and make patios a permanent fixture. No car traffic. Government St has huge potential to become a cultural heart of Victoria. I feel cars should not be on Government St... pedestrian only

Generally I like Government. I don't think we need to take the road out, but in the end I don't care. The biggest drawback is that some of the people I have (rarely) encountered on government have been potentially dangerous - e.g. drugged out, loud, and belligerent. Some of the people with mental issues need actual help, not platitudes.

It should be a pedestrian zone most of the time, with hydraulic bollards that raise and lower to allow delivery trucks in the morning. A designated cruiseship bus drop off area, bike parking, pet friendly areas

A welcoming, traffic free zone

I would like to see no motor vehicles and a street for residents of the city, i.e., not geared towards tourists.

It would be nice to have food trucks, activities, entertainment, street art, street performers...basically things to engage people and bring them to the street.

Making Government Street traffic free in the downtown core would make it an attractive place to visit, eat, and bring friends.

I find some of the tourist souvenir shops to be a bit off-putting. The goods they sell don't represent what is culturally strong about Victoria, and instead just feels like gross consumerism for unthinking visitors. As a local, an artist and an environmentalist, it makes that part of Government street feel like it's not meant for me -- nor is it somewhere I bring my own friends when they are visiting from out of town. Murchies, Munro's, and Silk Road, on the other hand, seem to be the type of businesses that delight and serve tourists AND locals equally! I love those places, and encourage more businesses like these that serve both demographics.

Pre-pandemic, the tourist trade on the south end chases locals away. Many businesses have been unfriendly to local pedestrian usage. The focus needs to be on year-round attractiveness that truly welcomes local visitors (tourists will come too!) rather than giving noisy, smelly buses the priority in summer and Government Street Refresh - Phase 1 Survey : Survey Report for 22 June 2021 to 14 July 2021 leaving it deserted in winter. More car free areas Changes made to downtown traffic flow both on government and wharf st mean that I often detour around the area. As a result, I shop and dine less in the area because it isn't top of mind. I am very impressed by the efforts to make Government street pedestrian friendly. I don't believe cars need the use of that street at all. I am loving the temporary pedestrian zone during the pandemic and would love to see it become a pedestrian space long term with places to sit and read or people watch, food carts, etc. When I visited Denver and walked around the 16th Street Mall, my immediate reaction was "I wish Government Street was more like this!" Buskers and street entertainers need to be monitored and supported in a way that is safe and respectful for all Keep up the good work:) I love the street so much more during the pandemic, and would be so happy to see it evolve into a pedestrian-focused space with greater patio, store front, and bicycle access. I like the noon to 10 PM with no cars. As a walker along Government Street throughout the day, I would like to see no bicycle/skateboarding etc. to make it more safe for pedestrians. Plus I would like to see this continue all year.

I love the direction of where the city is taking Government Street. For too long, it has been a place of tacky tourist t-shirt shops and the like, catering to cruise ship tourists rather than a vibrant, localized, and permanent base of people. I intensely value the role that Government Street could bring in fostering a lively cultural scene filled with arts, culture, and festivities. Live music, especially, should be paramount, if I was designing this space. Indeed, I'd want it to feel like a neighbourhood space, as the Participatory Budgeting 2021 project defines it. I think the focus on foot traffic, patios spilling out onto sidewalks, and more interactive, cultural elements will help ensure that this space feels like everyone can meaningfully belong there. Make Government Street cool!

Close the street after 6:00PM every day to enhance the experience. We still are a city that is getting bigger and traveling from James Bay for work from Esquimalt and View Royal is already too busy on Wharf Street, No left hand turns on Douglas or Banchard to easily access the two bridges to Esquimalt. Improve the flow of traffic downtown and then think about closing Government street to vehicles. One will not work without the other.

Make it a pedestrian place. No cars, no bikes.

This survey is bogus. You do not address the mess that Government St. has become. The fact that that we are being accosted and verbally assaulted by people living on the street. You don't ask about the aesthetics - it looks HORRIBLE. The ad hoc, hap-hazard methods used to cordon off eating/sitting areas and block vehicle traffic are terrible both from a safety and appearance perspective. You do not ask about the fact that you are proposing to do all of this at a time when quite possibly the businesses who have suffered through the pandemic, may have a chance of bouncing back. Timing is everything. You can't plan major construction in the first year of pandemic recovery. More businesses will not make it through this second bleak summer without tourists and international boarders/cruise ships open and operating. Your vision is short sighted and messy. This city is a major destination for travel and now it looks terrible and is an unsafe place to be. Go back to the drawing board.

More variety in the type of stores... not all to attract tourists

I have felt for years, that government street should be a pedestrian zone. It is such a beautiful street and almost any city in Europe has a pedestrian zone in the inner city. Even as an avid cyclist, I would have no problem pushing my bike for a few blocks. I like, what is happening this summer. Open to cars until noon and then closed. However, it should only be for cars with deliveries. There is no parking on the lower part of Government Street anyways and any shops can easily be accessed from the side streets.

I need 2 things to visit Govt St more often: 1. Shelter from the rain. I spend at least \$100 per month on Govt St and I simply do not go there when it rains. Many streets in Australia have overhangs or awnings to protect pedestrians from hot sun. If we had the same on Govt St I would visit more often and walk farther on each visit. 2. Parking, parking, parking. DO NOT get rid of existing parking garages. Tourism might not recover enough in the near future to save businesses that pay those insane rents on Govt St, so we must facilitate locals' desire and ability to visit. We can live with diminished onstreet parking but if we can't find a parking garage nearby, it just gets too hard. If we can park a block or two away.and then get to Govt St without getting soaked to the bone, we will come. Mayor Helps' and Council's creation of bike lanes and the attendant disruption was a hard pill to swallow but many of us realize it was a necessary step forward and change of focus. Love that you have closed the street to traffic for some of the time.

Please look to Government but City must also consider what is happening in the immediate areas -Broad, Yates, Douglas - this city looks terrible compared to what it used to. Suspect the unwelcome transient and homeless is driver of why it's so bad. Every province needs to manage their own and unless welfare is going to become provincially manage a much tougher stance by Victoria and British Columbia needs to take place. Need a committed plan to make Government Street pedestrian year round as do many cities in Europe. For example Oxford in England has rising bollards either end of the main street. From 10 am to 6pm they prevent through traffic-except for emergency vehicles -from entering. Outside of this time the bollards go down and the delivery vehicles can access the street.

More nearby parking

There should be safe play areas for children, interactive street art (like pavement murals/maps, etc.)

Throughout the GVA there is often insufficient parking because commercial and residential buildings have not been constructed with parking capacity of their own, or too much vehicle traffic right next to areas with high volumes of foot traffic (especially tourists). In making our cores more walkable and improving mass transit infrastructure, we can achieve more pleasant and livable public spaces for everyone.

A TRULY safe bike lock-up area.

More benches & sitting areas for individuals & small groups of 6 or so.

A designated, recognizable spot to meet a friend before going to cafe or shopping - maybe a large map or a public art piece?

No car traffic between Humboldt and Herald streets. More patios and bollards that can be removed for deliveries before 10 a.m. and for emergency vehicles. With Douglas and Wharf Streets, there are two streets with enough lanes to go in the same direction as Govt street.

While I like the idea of a pedestrian only street, a big priority needs to be placed on moving the traffic on the surrounding streets so that people can actually travel to the area to enjoy it. In particular the lights on

Wharf Street (both direction) creates so much congestion that on some days, you can't turn left way back at the light on the corner of Government & Belleville (corner by the Empress, Museum & Legislature). Idling cars is so not great for the environment or people walking / biking and trying to enjoy some fresh air. Kind of defeats the whole purpose of our bike lanes and pedestrian only streets when you can't get the cars moved out of the area.

Love the pedestrian section. Prefer less restaurants but to-go eateries. More performing art, more First Nation art presence. Independent family owned stores. Miss the glass factory

It's the heart of our city, what could be a beautiful, energetic and profitable gathering place, please invest in it, to attract people, keep eyes on the street, and help to make it safe day and night.

I think it shouldn't be just about consuming, but hanging out with friends/ family is ok too. A green space would be nice, but perhaps not possible. The area has been starved of culture since the demise of folk fest. Centennial square is not near as charming nor suitable as Market Square. The former Latin- Caribbean Festival was a lot of fun with dancing and live music for a week. I also think the parking lot across from Bastion Square is a dead Zone and waste of space- so much more could be done here for events.

public music is all very well--but it is often TOO loud! KEEP BICYCLES OFF THE STREET unless they are walked. I do believe that Government should become a pedestrian-only street between Humboldt and Yates.

I think it would be great to have more public, non-commercial aspects. I don't have a young family, but I still think it would be nice to have more stuff for kids and families to do. Water features and more robust green spaces would be good too.

The existing vibe there is pretty good. I'd love to see more real shops and fewer trashy tourist traps but that's not really something the city can mandate short of owning the buildings. Shutting the street down to cars for most of the day has been great, but the cross streets still having lights is unpleasant as it forces people to stop and wait. Since cross traffic is so low, most people ignore the lights and "jaywalk" when its safe to cross instead. Ditch the lights and have unsignalled crosswalks where pedestrians always have right of way.

I value having a safe street as a pedestrian to walk down, whether to get to a place such as a restaurant or shop, or to go for a walk with a friend. I value that I can sit on a patio and not have cars zipping by, hearing the noise and smelling the exhaust.

Dedicated, dry and secure areas to lock up bicycles either on or near Government street. Also, permanent elimination of car traffic.

Commercial vehicle parking on the west side of the street, includes taxis. Bus/bike land on the east side of the street. No cars.

Either the City of Victoria or the merchants or both should wash the

gull poop off the pavement. It stinks! There are cars and motorcycles speeding up and gunning their engines in the area. They should be charged under the noise bylaws. Timely access for emergency vehicles should be figured out. Stopping a fire engine so that one of the firefighters can get off and move a traffic cone isn't a solution. Aggressive panhandling should be stopped. Homeless and shirtless people sitting on the pavement right beside the patio where you're eating isn't acceptable.

I would love to see a permanent shift away from tacky tourist shops to more bars and restaurants and art spaces to foster a vibrant and pedestrian friendly space for locals and tourists alike. Government street should be an evening destination as well as daytime. Every major European city has an active nightlife scene on streets just like Government. It's a perfect opportunity to utilize a space that's Downton and not too close to densely populated residents so noise in evening wouldn't be too disruptive.

A retail strategy that protects and prioritizes locally-owned (and possibly 'heritage') businesses that will showcase our culture to visitors, and a retail strategy that prioritizes local-serving retail. Places that are great for locals are also great for visitors, but places that are great for tourists are not necessarily great for locals. I shop at Munro's, Ecologyst, Cowichan traders, Roberta's Hats, MEC and more. There are also many businesses that seem exclusively tourist-serving. If the balance is to shift towards more tourist serving or lean towards international chains,

Government street would lose its appeal. Now before a city planner says you cannot prioritize locallyowned businesses through land-use policy tools, let me say that you certainly can prioritize locally-owned businesses through community economic development activities.

Cars don't really seem to jive with government street. Recommend making it pedestrian only if possible. Also, no bikes. There are plenty of bike lines around gov't street for them to use, so people don't have to worry about trying to dodge cyclists while out with their young children/grandparents, etc.

I feel that cars have taken over the city. Now that Vancouver St has been closed off at McClure, I feel that we have our neighbourhood back and it's a rest spot when out walking or cycling. More of that... please.

I appreciate police presence.

Although there has been negative connotation with policing, I personally feel safer with them around.

I'd like to see this project start at Fisgard instead of Pandora

I would like to see a unique feature incorporated into the Government Street "pedestrian corridor", a focal and useful public art installation. I propose that we could build and install a Lighter Than Air Aerostat (ballon) with a small passenger compartment underneath. This could be tethered by cable to a single track, and move people along the length of the passenger corridor without taking up valuable space on the ground, or interfering with pedestrian traffic on the ground. Of

course the translucent Aerostat would glow with a Johnson Street Bridge hue at night to add to the safety and aesthetics of the installation. We are in process of launching the project to build this technology at the UVic CfAR program, and so could easily modify our basic design to suit this end use application.

Put up actual barriers to vehicle traffic. Drivers become aggressive when violating bylaw and going through the pedestrian zone during the legitimate noon-10pm hours. There is also a lot of stuff on the sidewalks making it difficult to traverse the area on foot, let alone in a wheelchair or with strollers. Businesses should not be allowed to put signs in the middle of a pedestrian thoroughfare.

Pedestrian priority from Humboldt to Fisgard in all seasons, with adequate designated times for commercial deliveries.

Please keep patios

I love the reduced and removes vehicle traffic. Much more peaceful a heritage street for people to enjoy their city.

I work downtown and LOVE how it has changed during the pandemic. Government Street is so much nicer than it used to be and Broad street between Broughton and Fort is so beautiful and lovely now. This traffic alone will compromise and further impede what you are trying to do. I'm glad for upkeep, change, reinvention, and bike lanes but I truly believe there is a some bad designers being engaged through the engineer department, I am supposing. Upgrades that are being made have little personality and rudimentary design, and aren't serving the flow of traffic. Victoria needs to assert it is the heart of the region. Feel-good, pedestrian friendly environment is an awesome achievement to aim for. However, If you want to be the heart of the region, there has to be arteries that are efficient, serve ambulances, tour buses, and shipping. If you want be to arrive in Victoria, stay here as a base for exploring the region, then they have to be able to mobilize.

My wife and I avoided Government until it became more "people priority" during the pandemic. The old, tourist oriented, Government Street is of zero interest to me.

Government street is a major throughway between James bay, downtown, and the Johnson Street Bridge. Please put your tourist spot somewhere else. Or add another roadway to maintain traffic flow to the bridge. It took my partner and I FIFTEEN minutes to get from Government and Langley to Pandora by car. (550 metres!!) I live & work downtown so biking and walking is not always the only option. Also, please look at how impossible it is to get from James Bay to a place like TD Bank during rush hour traffic. (All of the closed roads, one-ways, and backed up traffic is nonsensical. I'm not trying to be a disgruntled ranter. I love our city and I love that tourists come here to enjoy it too. But this road being obstructed makes it impossible to commute between

major neighbourhoods in our city. Move it up a block to the less busy streets. 


# Q7 How often do you visit or pass through Government Street?















# Q13 Have you moved to Victoria in the past five years?









# Q14 Do you identify as being: (select all that apply)





In some questions you should have had an "other" option. Some of these demographic questions should have a "prefer not to answer" as people may not want to give you specifics about their demographics. Right now you are only getting surveys from literate English speakers who are computer literate and have access to the internet. This is creating a systemic barrier for many people's voices who aren't being heard (not just for this survey but all of them) because the way you are soliciting information is discriminatory. If you understand that there is a huge population of people who are not able to take this survey, your recommendations on what to do

need to factor in that you only have a part of Victoria who have responded. So when you say that 'residents' were given the opportunity to consult, please keep in mind that many residents don't speak/read English, have a computer or have internet. They tend to be the most vulnerable in our society and we have an obligation to seek out their input and try to ensure decisions meet their needs. Making Victoria more welcoming means breaking down all systemic barriers including how surveys are conducted and their results are used.










# Government Street Refresh - Phase 1 Engagement Ideas - Including submitted images

1. Enforce local city bylaws: Frankly, I am disgusted when I see people lying on the street with shopping carts of garbage and shooting up in public. I am also equally disgusted to have to dodge mentally ill individuals screaming and yelling at the top of their lungs, threatening me. I want to see city bylaws enforced. Right now, because of this Mayor and certain council members, they are not and that is NOT OKAY! How is Victoria going to "rebuild" when it is not safe in the downtown!



Play area for kids: Somewhere for kids to enjoy themselves and draw families to the street! Could be
organized as part of a bulb-out of narrowing of the auto travel areas of the road so a permanent
improvement can be made.

6. Car-Free Government Street: With regards to accessibility, accessible parking spots could be added at the north and south ends of the street. A wider space with less obstacles would also be much better for wheelchairs, scooters, et cetera.



7. Pedestrian only street: Make Government St. a Pedestrian shopping street with restaurant patios, shops, and places that make people want to explore and hang out.



8. Artistic Paving, to emphasize pedestrian friendliness: The short-term response of the city to create pedestrian-focused areas for people to gather safely and enjoy our downtown has been awesome! But for a more long-term project, artistic paving (and removed or reduced curbs) is key to represent that an area is pedestrian-first.

Currently, the Gov St closure still looks and feels like a road, which makes people stick to the sidewalk (because walking in the middle of the street is an unfamiliar feeling). Artistic paving is beautiful, but also visually and psychologically creates a space that is for people first, not cars.



9. Hydraulic Bollards: European cities such as Avignon, use hydraulic bollards to open and close pedestrian areas through the day, and to permit residents and businesses to access the area during the closed period through use of a keypad access to drop the bollards, much like key pad entry to an apartment building. Hydraulic bollards are an attractive, permanent and effective way to open and close a pedestrian area to service vehicle traffic and for seasonal street openings when pedestrian traffic can be expected to be low (February in Victoria, for example). The example in the photo is part of the pedestrian precinct in central Avignon, showing the bollards and the keypad pillar.

13. **Useful Public Art Installation Attracting Worldwide Attention:** We propose to install a cable tethered Aerostat with a small passenger compartment, this would move along a single track down the centre of the street. This would be used to transport people from one end of Government to the other, with stops along the way at raised platforms. Alternatively the Aerostat could ascend and descend at passenger pickup/drop off location by using a winch type system, this not require any special platforms. We have a project to build and develop this technology at UVic's CfAR program. It would not be a big leap for us to modify our design in order to meet this specification. Our 10kg payload model is built and so this design would fall somewhere in between that prototype and the image shown here...
