

Smart South Island Update for Councils and Boards

Smart Cities Symposium – Saturday November 25th 2017

- If you had the opportunity to fix one challenge impacting the South Island region, what would it be? Is your commute driving you crazy? Would you tackle the affordable housing issue? Maybe access to healthcare is at the top of your list?
- Public engagement is key to developing our region's proposal for the federal Smart Cities Challenge (<http://www.infrastructure.gc.ca/plan/cities-villes-eng.html>) Planning and research regarding smart cities will be driven by the needs of citizens, not by technology
- As part of the federal Smart Cities Challenge, the South Island Prosperity Project will be hosting a two-part Smart South Island Symposium series.
- The first event will be held on November 25th at the Victoria Conference Centre, and will be designed to determine what issues our region should solve using 'Smart' solutions. This will help to define and refine our region's 2040 Smart Vision
- It'll be a packed morning facilitated by Charles Montgomery, author of *Happy Cities* and with an opening keynote by José Quadrio Alves on future cities and smart city megatrends being implemented around the globe
- A second event will be an Innovation Challenge held in early February (date TBA), where participants will be invited to submit 'Smart' pilot project ideas for a chance to be included in our federal RFP, and compete for prize money and in-kind support to help seed their pilot project ideas

- Smart cities have the potential to improve every aspect of community life – how people move around, how they live and play, how they earn a living, how they learn and are empowered to participate in society, how they interact with the natural environment, and how they create safe and secure public spaces.

The South Island Prosperity Project (SIPP) is coordinating the regional proposal for the South Island in an effort to win \$10 million in funding for the Greater Victoria area
