Proposed Amendments to Expenditure Bylaw



Goals of Competitive Procurement

- Obtain goods and services needed to achieve City's objectives
- Provide best value for the taxpayers
- Open, fair and transparent access to City business
- Adhere to legislation, expenditure bylaw/policy and good procurement practices



Bylaw or Policy

- Council sets policy direction through a bylaw or policy
- No legislative requirement to have a bylaw
- Best practice research indicates that most municipalities have policies, not bylaws



New West Partnership Trade Agreement (NWPTA)

- · Agreement between BC, Alberta & Saskatchewan
- Applies to municipalities
- Requires open and non-discriminatory access to procurements
 - \$75,000 or greater for goods
 - \$75,000 or greater for services
 - \$200,000 or greater for construction



Proposed Changes

- Sustainability Guidelines
 - To encourage the use of environmentally friendly and fair trade/ethical products, services and practices
- Community Involvement
 - To strengthen the City's support for community involvement and to recognize a vendor's community involvement at the local, national or international level
- State of Emergency
 - To provide expenditure authority to Emergency Operations personnel



Proposed Changes

- Single Source Purchases/Notice of Intent
 - To provide vendor community notice prior to Single Sourcing
 - · Emergencies would still be exempt
- Standards of Conduct
 - To embed ethical procurement practices in bylaw/policy
- Approval Limits
 - To increase Request for Offer limits to \$50,000



Proposed Changes

- Efficiency/Clarification Amendments
 - To allow for electronic Tender & RFP submissions
 - To allow access to other governmental agencies' procurements
 - Exclusions
 - To clarify that the expenditure bylaw/policy does not cover some procurement processes such as investments
 - To allow for the purchase used goods and equipment



Recommendations

That Council:

- Direct staff to bring forward a Procurement Policy for Council's approval as outlined in this report or as amended by Council
- 2. Repeal the Expenditure Bylaw after approval of the Procurement Policy
