SUBJECT: Motion to shift one percent of capital expenditures for 2014 and 2015 to

pedestrian and cycling infrastructure

FROM:

Councillors Shellie Gudgeon, Lisa Helps and Ben Isitt

WHEREAS in the summer of 2012 Council identified "explore alternate transportation options" as its top priority giving this item a score of 43 out of a possible 45 points;

AND WHEREAS on the negative side, yet another pedestrian was hit by a car in a crosswalk last month:

AND WHEREAS on the positive side, study after study indicates the social, economic and environmental benefits to cities of increasing walking and cycling as modes of transportation;

AND WHEREAS total projected capital expenditures for 2014 and 2015 are \$28 Million and \$31.7 Million respectively (excluding costs associated with the Johnson Street Bridge Replacement Project);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Council direct staff to shift 1 percent of the capital budget for 2014 and 2015, \$280,000 and \$317,000 respectively to enhance pedestrian and cycling infrastructure.

Re: <u>Priority Setting Session</u>, <u>December 9th – Victoria High School sports facility</u> refurbishment project

Colleagues, I had planned just to raise this item on Monday, but in response to Jocelyn's request for topics in advance, I leave with you these background materials for consideration in advance of our conversation.

After reviewing both our list from last time and my own lengthy list of hoped-for priority projects, I've decided to bring forward just one – the one I think best matches our other priorities and established plans.

Victoria's only high school, Vic High, has for some years been trying to interest the city in collaborating on an upgrade to the Vic High sports facilities to include a new all weather field, aluminium bleachers, a new running track, lights, and a field house.

The entire project is intended to be phased in over at least 5 years, to result in a multi-faceted facility that would be available to the broader community, funded from a variety of sources, most prominently by the Vic High Alumni Association who is embarking on a major fundraising campaign in advance of the school's 100th anniversary next spring (2014).

The City of Victoria has indicated its support in the past, through a 2007 application to the federal government for infrastructure funding (which was declined).

I won't make the case here, but wanted to give you some background and history to help inform the conversation on Monday.

Attached you will find a series of documents outlining the history and substance of the proposal. Several of you will be familiar with this project, as it has been percolating off and on for several years.

In the package you will find:

- Brief Overview of the Proposed Refurbished Vic High Multi Sports Facility, outlining the history of the project (I would note that this is a version prepared for what I anticipated was a priorities session earlier in the year – since this document was prepared, I have met with the organizing group twice more)
- Letter from the Victoria High School Alumni Association outlining their vision of the project, their support and their hopes for city involvement
- Minutes from a School District 61 Board meeting in which the Board approves the project in principle
- Historical photos of the existing track being built next to the former tech buildings
- An application for funding support for the project, to the federal government, from the Victoria High School Alumni Association
- A costing spreadsheet for the project
- 5 drawings detailing the phases of the project, from its current state to its final view after 5 years of work

- A letter to Mayor Fortin from Roger Skillings and Keith McCallion re-establishing contact with regard to the project
- An email from Lee Herrin on behalf of the Fernwood NRG endorsing the project in principle
- An email from Rachel Franklin on behalf of the Central Middle School PAC supporting the project
- An email from Sarah Caron on behalf of the Lansdowne Middle School PAC supporting the project
- An email from Kate Wallace on behalf of the George Jay Elementary School PAC supporting the project

On Monday, I'll be asking you to:

- 1. Confirm Council support for the project
- 2. Commit to a financial contribution in **2015** that matches the amount raised by the Vic High Alumni Association to a maximum of \$250,000
- 3. Commit to continue working with the Vic High Alumni Association and Victoria High School to explore other partnerships and move the project forward.

I look forward to our conversation on Monday, and thank you in advance for your consideration.

BRIEF OVERVIEW OF THE PROPOSED REFURBISHED VIC HIGH MULTI SPORTS FACILITY

December 11, 2007

City of Victoria (Todd Stewardson) requests meeting at Vic High to discuss improving the 1951 Memorial Stadium. Keith McCallion and Roger Skillings (Vic High School Alumni Association). Tony Sprackett and Bill McKechnie (Fernwood Community Association), Garry McLaughlin and Roberta Martell (Neighbourhood Resource Group), Stephen Bennett(principal) and Seamus Howley (School District Operations Director) attend.

Fall, 2008

Keith and Roger meet with Mayor Dean Fortin to discuss the proposal further. The Mayor refers us to Councillor Phillipe Lucas, with whom we meet twice. A number of meetings follow, over the next number of months, with City staff including Kate Friars, Julie McDougall, Jeff Brehaut and others. We meet again with Mayor Fortin to review progress.

The City makes application for a Federal Government Infrastructure Grant that is ultimately unsuccessful.

Spring, 2009

Councillor Chris Coleman meets with Keith, Roger and School Board Chair Tom Ferris. Councillor Coleman requests that the alumni association bring the FCA and NRG together to review the proposal. This was done with Lee Herrin now representing the NRG.

2010

Under the direction of Bob Johnston of Johnston Sports Architecture, the alumni association has drawings done to provide the groups with a visual representation of what the refurbished multipurpose facility might look like. A budget of \$5.2 million dollars is the estimated cost in 2010 dollars. Drawings are shared with all groups.

2011

Keith attends Vic High Parents' Advisory Committee meeting to update them.

2012

Board Of Education unanimously endorses the proposal at its Operations and Board meetings. Vic High Alumni Association applies for a \$250,000 grant from the Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund. This proposal was unsuccessful.

2012-2013

Councillor Marianne Alto meets with Keith, Roger, Trustee Ferris and principal Randi Falls. Five meetings have taken place, the last being on July 23rd of this year.

In conclusion, the alumni association has engaged the students, parents and staff of Vic High, as well as the Vic High Family of Schools. In addition we have worked hard with the immediate community including Bays United Soccer, the Belfry Theatre, and Glenwarren Seniors' Lodge, the FCA and the NRG. Our efforts have resulted in support for the project, but as of September, 2013, despite the efforts of everyone, we still do not have the funding.

VIC HIGH STADIUM IMPROVEMENT

The Victoria High School Alumni Association and the City of Victoria have been working together for seven years with various community partners to create a vision and bring it to completion; upgrade and refurbish the Vic High multi sport memorial stadium to better serve the students and staff of Victoria's only high school, the Vic High Family of Schools (Vic High, Central Middle, George Jay Elementary, James Bay Community School, Margaret Jenkins Elementary, Sir James Douglas Elementary, South Park Elementary and Sundance Elementary), the local community and its various youth sporting groups and the adjacent Glenwarren Lodge Senior's home.

This refurbished school and neighbourhood asset will expand community use after school hours and provide benefits such as a healthier lifestyle for citizens old and young, improve safety with increased pedestrian traffic (the area is dark and deserted), and improved lighting and increased neighbourhood use. This, we believe, is a classic win-win development for all concerned. Currently the school uses the stadium and playing field for inter-school athletics until 5pm. After that, it is dark, except for local citizens walking the dilapidated 400 yard (not metre) track or letting dogs walk on the soggy wintertime field.

We envision the refurbished facility as follows:

- new artificial turf all weather playing field (phase 1)
- new aluminum stadium bench seats to replace old wooden benches and original 1951 decaying concrete structure (phase 5)
- new eight lane 400 metre track (phase 3)
- four light standards to facilitate evening community use (phase 2)
- field house separate from the school building (phase 4)

The Board of Education has been very clear since the outset that they enthusiastically provide the property, but currently have no cash resources to contribute. However, the additional 25 metre strip of land that will convert the track from 400 yards to 400 metres is approximately 1.22 acres and valued at 2 million dollars. Bays United Soccer has indicated they have money to help, and our Vic High Alumni Association is prepared to go to the 15,000 Victoria and Island residents in our database to request them to assist their alma mater financially. We believe we can raise \$300,000 between the alumni association and other sporting groups.

The project cannot proceed without the City's support, both moral and financial in concert with potential provincial and federal funding partnerships. Over the seven years of work on this project we have received embedded professional services estimated to be worth tens of thousands of dollars. Now is the time to improve the school, neighbouring community, health and safety and the overall aesthetic. Let us work together to make it happen for the benefit of all. Together we can provide the leadership to support students and Victoria citizens.

4. PRESENTATIONS

1. Randi Falls, Keith McCallion - Refurbished Multisport Facility at Victoria High School

Keith McCallion, retired GVSD Principal representing the Victoria High School Alumni Association, presented the plan for upgrading the field and stadium at Victoria High School. The field and track were created in 1949 to honor the students and staff killed in World War II. The alumni would like to upgrade the facility while continuing to honor the fact that this is a memorial field. The upgrade will be a 5-phased approach and when all phases are complete will cost \$5,000,000. All costs will be raised through fundraising efforts and it is understood that the Board is not being asked to provide any funding. The new facility will benefit not only Vic High students but the community and family of schools as well. The alumni have approached the City of Victoria and the community with the new plans and have asked for input. They will ensure that community consultation takes place before fundraising commences. Ms. Falls and Mr. McCallion are asking the Board for an approval in principle.

The Victoria High School Alumni Association, an entirely volunteer organization, submits this application for funding support for this worthy community project - the Fernwood/Victoria High School Refurbished Athletic Playing Field. The athletic playing field is the first phase of a refurbished multi-sport facility at Victoria High School for use by Greater Victoria School District students and City of Victoria citizens. the existing grass field will be replaced by an all-weather artificial turf field to ensure 12 month use. Students will have priority during the school day, and the field will be available for community use in the evening hours and weekends. The community will have full use in July and August.

Additional phases to complete the vision of the refurbished multi-sport facility will include field lights, a regulation 400 metre track (currently 400 yard track), stadium seating and a fieldhouse. the total cost for all phases is projected by Cannon Design, the architectural firm that supplied pro bono drawings and estimates, to be \$5.2 million. The projected cost of the all-weather, artificial turf field is \$1.3 million. Western Economic Diversification Canada funding will be applied to phase 1, the all-weather, artificial turf field.

Provide a rationale for the project: (Maximum of 4000 characters)

Increased rates of obesity, type 2 diabetes and associated health challenges affect youth, adults and seniors across all social economic groupings. An artificial turf playing field centrally located in teh Fernwood Community within the City of Victoria will facilitate increased physical activity for students and citizens providing associated health benefits.

Victoria High School is adjacent to the Fernwood Neighbourhood Resource Group, the Fernwood Community Association, local businesses, the Belfry Theatre, a Senior Citizens' Home and mixed residential housing. Victoria High School family of schools is comprised of six elementary schools and two middle schools. As stated above, the students will have priority use of the refurbished playing field. Some of the most challenged socio-economic residents in the City of Victoria live within the Victoria High School catchment area and currently do not have priority access to an all-weather playing field.

Community soccer, football, rugby, field hockey, baseball, softball and field lacrosse are among the many sporting organizations that may benefit from this artificial turf field.

Mayor Dean Fortin,

While we have not spoken personally in over a year, we had numerous occasions to do so when I served on the Greater Victoria Chamber of Commerce and the Greater Victoria Development Agency. I have always appreciated your forthright, sensitive and professional approach to issues affecting the City of Victoria (City).

Keith McCallion and I remember fondly meeting with you in your offices in December, 2008 within four weeks of your successful election to your first term as Mayor. At this initial meeting, you introduced us to then City Councillor Philippe Lucas, who was the Councillor responsible at that time for issues within the Fernwood area. We had an informative discussion regarding the feasibility of the Greater Victoria School Board (School Board), the City, sport associations and the Victoria High School Alumni Association (VHSAA) all working together to realize the completion of an all-weather, artificial turf playing field to replace the existing grass field at Victoria High School. Keith and I were delighted that the City had prioritized the field at Fernwood's Victoria High School as the top priority for a new all-weather field to be completed when appropriate funds are secured.

Keith and I spoke on how appreciative we were that the City of Victoria in 2007 forwarded an application to the federal government for an infrastructure grant to assist with the funding of a new all-weather, artificial turf playing field at Victoria High School situated in the heart of Fernwood. While that first application for federal funds ultimately did not succeed, we applauded the City's initiative and foresight in pursuing federal funds to adequately secure appropriate funding and to reduce the project's costs to Victoria's tax payers. Of course, the VHSAA agreed to do its part to raise significant funds once again, as we had clarified to City employees prior to the City's 2007 federal application, when an appropriate, new federal infrastructure program became available for us to apply for federal funds.

In the ensuing years since 2008 following the positive direction from Philippe and subsequently Councillor Chris Coleman who assumed responsibility for Fernwood, the VHSAA has had numerous meetings with City Parks and Recreation employees, the Fernwood Neighbourhood Resource Group, the Fernwood Community Association, the Belfry Theater, the Greater Victoria School Board, sport associations and others to determine whether a common will existed to realize the "refurbished" field at Victoria High School. As well, the VHSAA received pro bono expertise from Cannon Design, one of the world's leading sport architectural firms, to create drawings and a cost envelope for a *Victoria High school Renewed Multisport Facility* vision with the first phase being the completion of the all-weather playing field. Councillor Coleman, City recreation employees, School Board trustees and employees as well as others have reviewed the exciting work completed by Cannon Design. We are pleased to advise that over the last 12 months the following organizations have approved-in-principle the realization of the new field at Victoria High School: the School Board, the two Fernwood Community Associations, the VHSAA and a number of sport associations.

As you can see with the email below, Western Economic Diversification Canada has a new, appropriate Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund (CIIF) which, in our opinion, fits very well with potentially securing \$250,000 of federal funds for the new playing field. Certainly, significant additional funds would need to be secured through a variety of potential sources: 1) City; 2) VHSAA; 3) Sport associations; 4) Corporations; 5) Community Foundations; 6) Other philanthropists particularly interested in the health and well-being of youth, adults and seniors; and 7) Provincial government.

City residents may not understand that the City has only one high school, Victoria High School, and its increased role in reducing obesity and type 2 diabetes in youth, adults and seniors with an all-weather playing field used for twelve months of the year would be significant. In Oak Bay, as you may already know, the Oak Bay Municipal Council has approved one million dollars to the new Oak Bay High School. The City's past efforts in attempting to secure federal funds is a primary reason the VHSAA has submitted an application to the federal CIIF at this time. As clarified in the email below, we found out about the CIIF too late to have meetings with your Councillors and Recreation staff, which we regret.

Given our initial meeting with you in 2008, we thought it important and appropriate to ensure you heard directly from us regarding the VHSAA application we have submitted to the CCIF.

Finally, we hope to work effectively with City staff and Council to realize a needed all-weather playing field in the heart of Fernwood, to be used by both students and community citizens within an appropriate joint-use arrangement.
